EDITORIAL

Wednesday evening, Sept. 9th, 9 o'clock.
Somewhere between Swindon and Bournemouth. At this particular moment, I must confess I am a disappointed and somewhat depressed person. Reason. I have just come away from a game of "Soccer" in which my favourite team had to surrender their short, unbeaten record, in a game they did not deserve to lose, and one marred by incidents which should never be seen in League Football. It started with a penalty given against Town, which to put it mildly, astonished not only the Grimsby supporters of whom there were quite a few, but also many of the more rational home crowd.

The effect it had upon the Town players can well be imagined, and it is not surprising that they presented the harsh decision, which cost them a goal, and eventually the match. To their credit be it said, they quickly settled down, and continued to play the kind of football which delights all, friends or opponents, who really care to see football skills and craft. The two goals they scored they were well worthy of. They were both the result of well planned, intelligent football, and earned the applause which they received. And then came the second blow. Duncan Welbourne was seen stretched out, and as the trainer ran on, one wondered how great was this misfortune to be. It was soon obvious that this was something more than a slight knock, and when eventually he had to be led off the field, one felt that the fates had turned against us, and that the fight was going to be grim and tough if a point or points were to be saved. And so it proved. With only ten men on the field, Town fought back, not just on the defensive, but attacking when ever the opportunity presented itself to do so. The forwards changed and interchanged, coming back when required to help the weakened half-back line, fetching and

carrying the ball through, and never for one minute letting up. For though Welbourne was back, it was as much as he could do to hobble along, and one felt afraid that in the rough and tumble which was now taking place, he would perhaps receive a further serious injury, or greatly enhance that already received. Fortunately that did not happen, and I am pleased to say that as a result of the examination by the Swindon Club Surgeon, there were no apparent complications to fear. However, the grim battle was going on, with the Swindon side all out to take advantage of the handicap from which the Town were suffering. There was no quarter given on either side. Jimmy Fell obviously the danger man, came in for some very special attention, and when we saw him upended and stretched out near the far corner flag, we feared the worst. We were pleased to see him ready for action after attention from the trainer, and fighting back with all the others, more than holding their own, and looking like snatching that last elusive goal which would make victory pretty certain. When it got to the 89th minute, we felt happy that at least we were going to save a point, and that record, and I can only say it was a travesty of justice, when from a long kick which Barnett tipped over the bar for a corner, Swindon scored and won the match. Hence the gloom and deep depression of the moment which however, will soon be dispelled, if our lads reproduce the form and the football which they shewed in the first half of this game.

The Swindon team were a good, workmanlike, quick moving side, with two young wingers in Corbett and Darcy, who know how to get moving with the ball when the opportunity occurs. I'm sure they will find it a tougher proposition to-night, and I hope that the game will produce as

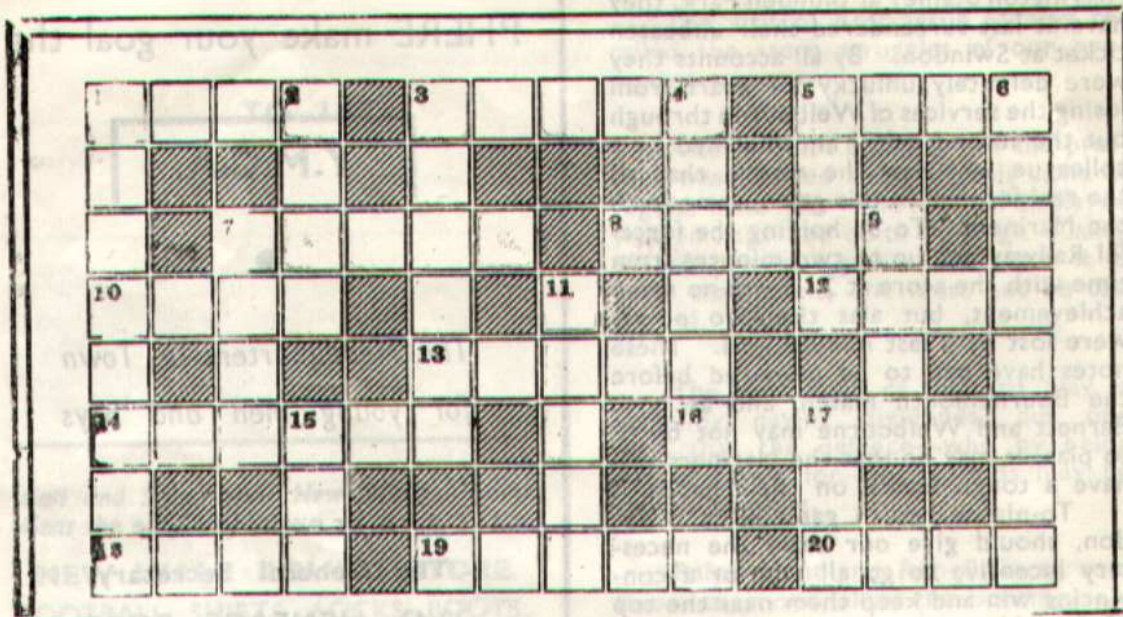

OUR VISITORS.

To-night we will see the team which lowered the Mariners colours for the first time this season—and no doubt Grimsby will be anxious to make up for that 3-2 defeat at Swindon last Wednesday night.

From all accounts the match was a tough contest with the home team battling throughout to exploit the Mariners' loss of Duncan Welbourne.

In a thrilling finish, left half Woodruff netted the winner following a corner, so it looks as if the return should be a real thriller. Swindon will be keen to prove that they won on merit—they have plenty of talent - while Town will be defending their home record.

Personality man in the visitors' line-up is Scot, Jimmy Gauld, who has given great service with a number of clubs.

This Aberdonian was the promotion key-man in Plymouth's attack last season, playing in 45 games and scoring 21 goals - a grand record for an inside forward.

He was formerly with Everton and previously he had a spell with Charlton. Swindon, who paid £7,000 for Gauld a month or so ago, are hoping that he can do for them what he did for Plymouth.

Swindon have dangerous wingers in Dacy and Corbett, while centre forward Layne is a powerful centre forward who knows how to finish - as his double against Town suggests.

Swindon have got off to a promising start without striking a really good blend. They lost at Coventry but their win over Grimsby kept them in the middle and they are being tipped as one of the many strong candidates for honours this term.

They have a stout defence, but there may be changes from last week because Town's attack gave them a rather gruelling spell.

Nevertheless, with Swindon possessing an attack as goal-minded as Town's, tonight's clash should provided the most competitive match seen at Blundell Park this season.

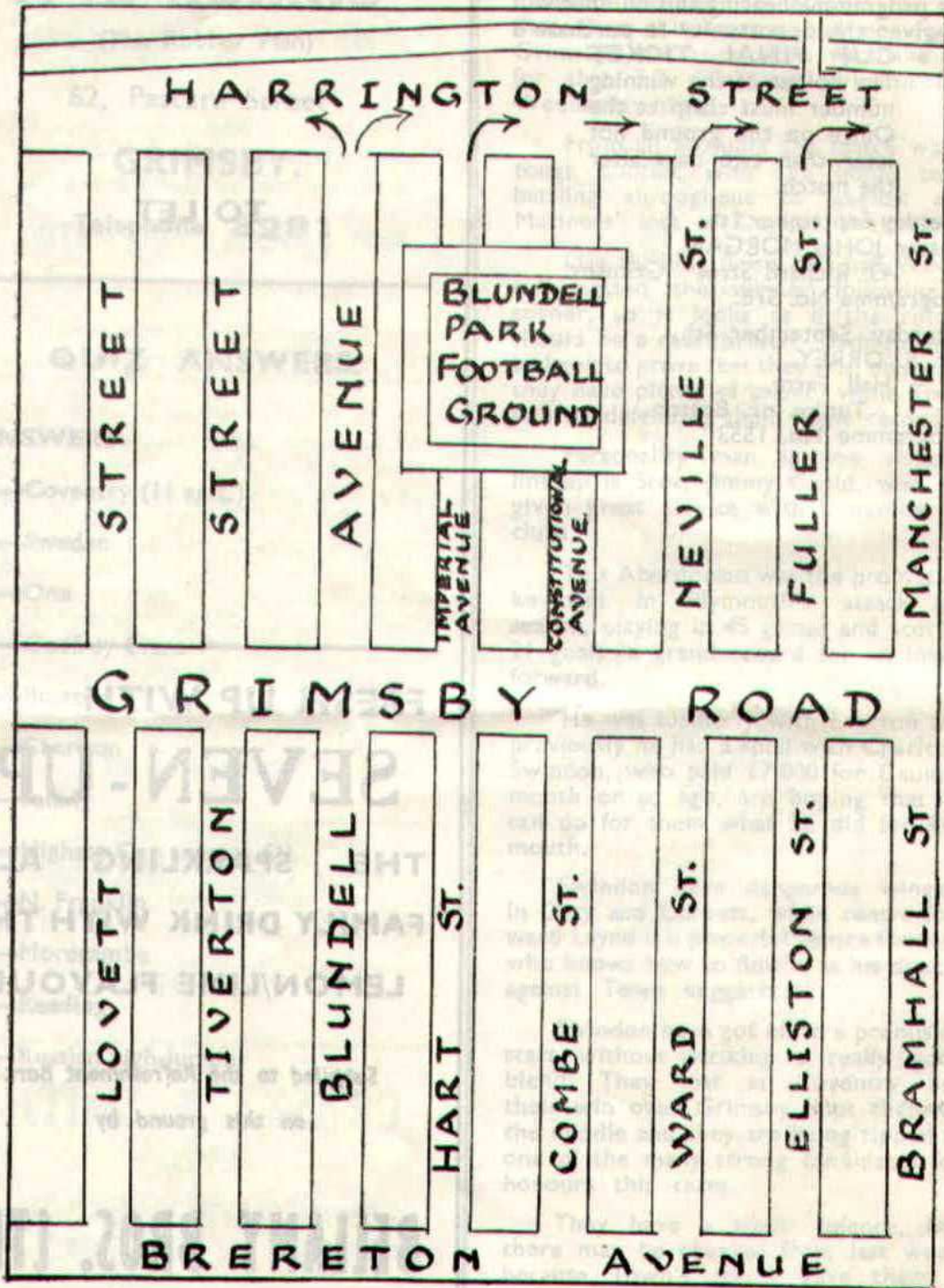

NO PARKING will be allowed in GRIMSBY ROAD or BRERETON AVENUE, as these are main roads which it is desired to keep clear, nor in that part of HARRINGTON STREET behind the football ground between the main entrance and MANCHESTER STREET, the west side of HARRINGTON STREET, that part of BLUNDELL AVENUE east of GRIMSBY ROAD, CONSTITUTIONAL AVENUE, IMPERIAL AVENUE and COMBE STREET which is reserved for buses.

PARKING will be allowed on both sides of all other minor streets and it is particularly requested, to assist dispersal after the match, that motorists approaching from CLEETHORPE ROAD, GRIMSBY, would park their cars in HART STREET, DAUBNEY STREET, BARCROFT STREET, LOVETT STREET, TIVERTON STREET or HARRINGTON STREET, and those from CLEETHORPES and elsewhere in any of the minor streets south of the football ground.

It is also requested that so far as possible, all cars should be parked with the near side next to the kerb and facing in the same direction. If a motorist should enter any minor street and find there is no space available on the left hand side, he is requested to continue into the next street where space may be available, always going with the stream on whichever main road he happens to turn.
