### SWINDON TOWN ONCE EARNED THE TITLE OF CUP "GIANT KILLERS."

Colours:—Shirts, Red with White Edging. Shorts, White. Stockings, Black with Red Tops.

Ground :- County Ground, Swindon.

Swindon Town have never reached any really great heights in the football world. Joining the League Third Division, Southern Section, when it was formed in 1920-21, Swindon Town did exceptionally well to finish with 52 points.

However, in the years that followed, they had many ups and downs, and three times had to seek re-election.

In the last season of the old set-up, 1957-58, they had one of their best-ever campaigns, and had the distinction of finishing fourth with 57 points—only three behind Brighton and Hove Albion, who were promoted.

Their good run had a big effect on their home gates, and the average was 12,040.

Last season, however, they had a hard struggle in the new Third Division, and just managed to pip us in the table by one point.

Twice "the Robins" have managed to reach the last four in the F.A. Cup, and quite naturally at one time they earned the tag as the "Giant Killers."

The record attendance at the County Ground stands at 28,400 when Stoke City were the visitors in the F.A. Cup on February 2nd, 1952, while the best receipts were on January 25th, 1930, when they totalled £2,787 with Manchester City the visitors in the Cup.

PETER CHAMBERLAIN, right-back. Joined "the Robins" in 1957 from Leicester City. Peter also plays in the forward line. Born in Bootle. Stands 6ft., weighs 11½st.

JOHN HIGGENS, right-back. Signed from Hibernians during the close season. Born in Kilmarnock. Previously with the Scottish club, St. Mirren. He stands 5ft. 10ins. and weighs 11½st.

WALTER BINGLEY, left-back. Born in Sheffield. Signed from Sheffield Wednesday in the early part of the 1958 season. Previously with Bolton. He stands 6ft. and weighs 12st.

JOHN FOUNTAIN, right-half. Born in Leeds. Joined the Town in 1957 from Sheffield United. He stands 5ft. 9ins. and weighs 11st.

GEORGE HUDSON, centre-half. Became a Swindon player in September, 1948, joining "the Robins" from Portsmouth. A native of Havant (Hants.), he must be one of the strongest centre half-backs in the League, standing 6ft. 1½ins., weighing 15st.

REX TILLEY, left-half. Formerly with Plymouth. Returned to his home town. Stands 5ft. 11ins., weighs 11st.

DAVID CORBETT, outside-right. A product of Swindon's youth teams. Made his League debut last season, playing over 20 games. This teenager stands 5ft. 8ins. and weighs 10½st. County Youth player.

JOHN STEPHENS, outside-right. A Welshman, born at Cardiff. Stands 5ft. 8ins., weighs 11st.

"BOB" EDWARDS, inside-right. Last season's highest goalscorer. He joined the town in 1956 from Chelsea. He stands 5ft. 11ins., weighing 11st. 12lbs. Born at Guildford.

DAVID LAYNE, centre-forward. Signed from Rotherham United during the close season. Made a dozen appearances for the Second Division club. Born in Sheffield. He stands 5ft. 11ins., weighing 12½st.

JIMMY GAULD, inside-left. Close season signing from Plymouth Argyle. Formerly with Everton. A Scot, born at Aberdeen. Stands 5ft. 10ins., weighs 12st. 2lbs.
