LAWS OF THE GAME

The offside law was amended to its present form in 1925—26, the International Board in June, 1925, on the proposal of the Scottish F.A., decided (in brief) a player shall not be offside if Two (instead of Three) opponents are nearer their own goal line.

Goalkeeper's steps. In 1931 this rule was amended so that a goalkeeper in possession of the ball is permitted to take four steps instead of two. In the same year, 1931, it was decided in the case of a foul throw, the throw reverts to the other side.
