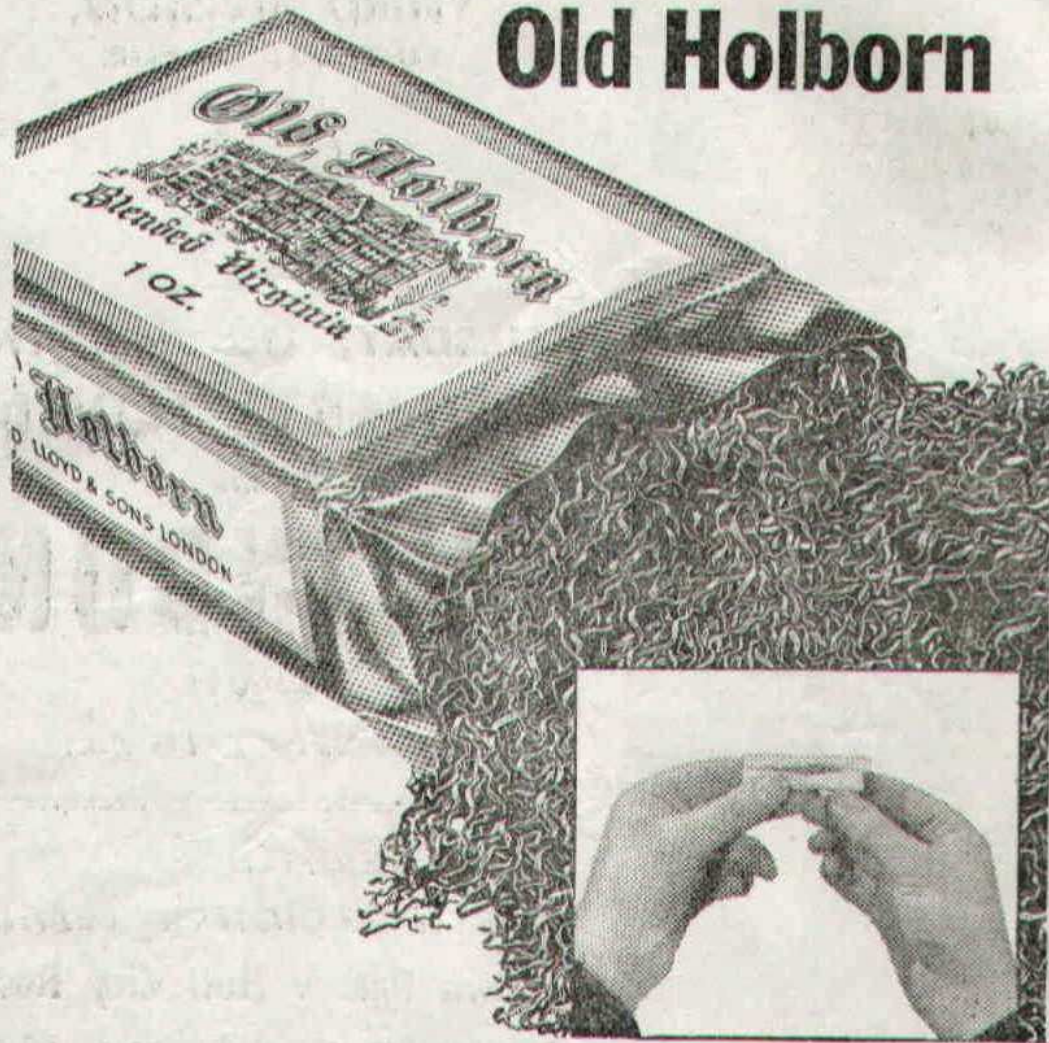

CLUB NOTES

The match at Reading made head line news in the National Press. All accounts stressed the excellent football provided by both teams.

The return of Derek Williams to the forward line provided him with the chance to score two splendid goals, but the whole team fought with great spirit to accomplish the best away victory to date.

Against our opponents from Port Vale the entertainment was of a different order. In this game, hard tackling and big kicking robbed the game of the finer arts. Combined movements were scarce, but there were plenty of thrills. The last few minutes were packed with narrow escapes for the visitors. Certain goals were somehow scrambled away for corners on several occasions but the winner did not materialise.

The return match with Reading was a classic. This was the considered opinion of all who saw it. Both sides right from the start played fast, clean football with both goal-keepers constantly in action.

The difference was in the finishing, and for the first time at home our forwards were really in command. A spectacular run, finished off by an excellent goal was the spark needed. This was executed by Duncan Welbourne who has often tried the same tactics.

A welcome return to form by Ron Rafferty who performed the hat-trick completed the evenings entertainment. But the greatest thrills came from the cannon ball efforts of Ron Cockerill. He too was unfortunate not to register a hat-trick.

But our visitors too added to the nights enjoyment. Their football contained studied movements but lacked finish and so they suffered their first away defeat of the season, but their

manager Harry Johnston was most complimentary about the performance of our team on both occasions. Surely our fans will soon recognise that when allowed to play their natural game our boys are worthy of better support.

Our run of success came to an end at Bristol. Defensive errors provided the home team with the necessary encouragement. At least two penalties might have been awarded to us for infringements by the goal-keeper on D. Williams when clean through.

The visit to Swindon necessitates another long journey against a side which has suddenly struck form after a poor start.

Fred Jones will be playing against his old team, and so will Ralph Hunt, who is steadily mounting up the scorers list.

The Reserves with a much weakened forward line owing to the absence of Willie Purvis and John Waite (injured) held a strong Middlesbrough side until well into the 2nd half.

Then a goal blitz put an end to the struggle.

John Waite has unfortunately broken his ankle and will be out of action for some time.

The visit of Port Vale Reserves provided a similar game to the clash of the first teams. For a long time the visitors were in charge and in the lead.

After Brian Hill had equalised, we were soon behind again, but in the closing minutes a change came over the game. Willie Purvis took advantage of a back pass and coolly stroked the ball into the net for the equaliser. Almost immediately a quick movement on the right wing, a centre, and a splendid shot by young Hill and the game was won. A real surprise ending.

The Juniors brought off a smart victory over Scunthorpe Juniors.

SOCCER TOPICS

In the football sense I am probably as Conservative as anyone. I do not feel drastic changes in the Rules governing the game are necessary or desirable. But that doesn't mean I am opposed to a little re-thinking—tinkering if you prefer it—which might cut out a lot of unnecessary controversy and even sense of injustice.

For instance my attention has been called to an incident in a game where the Referee blew for half time—just as the ball appeared to be entering the net. No goal was allowed, I am told, and I have been asked "Do you think the decision was fair?"

Since the question has been asked I am bound to say I think the decision, while correct according to the Rule Book, was extremely harsh. Time was up, apparently, according to the Referee's watch but does anyone believe any Referee can make such a split second decision and prove infallible!

Here it seems to me is a solid case for an amendment to the existing Rule to the effect that **the Ball cannot be Out of Play so long as it is in Flight.** Under such a Ruling the incident mentioned would definitely have resulted in a goal—always assuming, of course, the goalkeeper could not possibly have saved, and what's wrong with that?

Another Rule interpretation which causes controversy time after time during the course of a season concerns Corner Kicks. More often than not the Kick finishes somewhere in the Penalty Area yet the Referee often decides the kick was an "In-Swinger" which at some stage in it's flight was out of play and he awards a Goal Kick to the defending side.

Not for one moment, of course, do I question the integrity of Referees. What I do suggest is that the Rule is slightly out of focus and should be revised. After all in all such cases the Referee has discretionary powers—and Referees do sometimes make mistakes! The onus should not be on them.

Come to think of it there are some quite fantastic Rules governing other sports, too, and I'm not thinking of Lawn Tennis where it is asking for suspension if an amateur allows himself or herself to be used by advertising mediums for cash.

Take Cricket. Could there be a more absurd Rule than that which allows runs to be scored by Leg Byes. What's the bat for anyway!

And what about that fascinating pastime, Bowls, sometimes quite wrongly called the "Old Man's Game" where it is possible to lose on five rinks out of six and yet win on a points aggregate! It doesn't make sense to me.

Any boy or girl of good standing is invited to take up membership for I am convinced that a good purpose can be served (in more ways than one) in cultivating such an organisation.

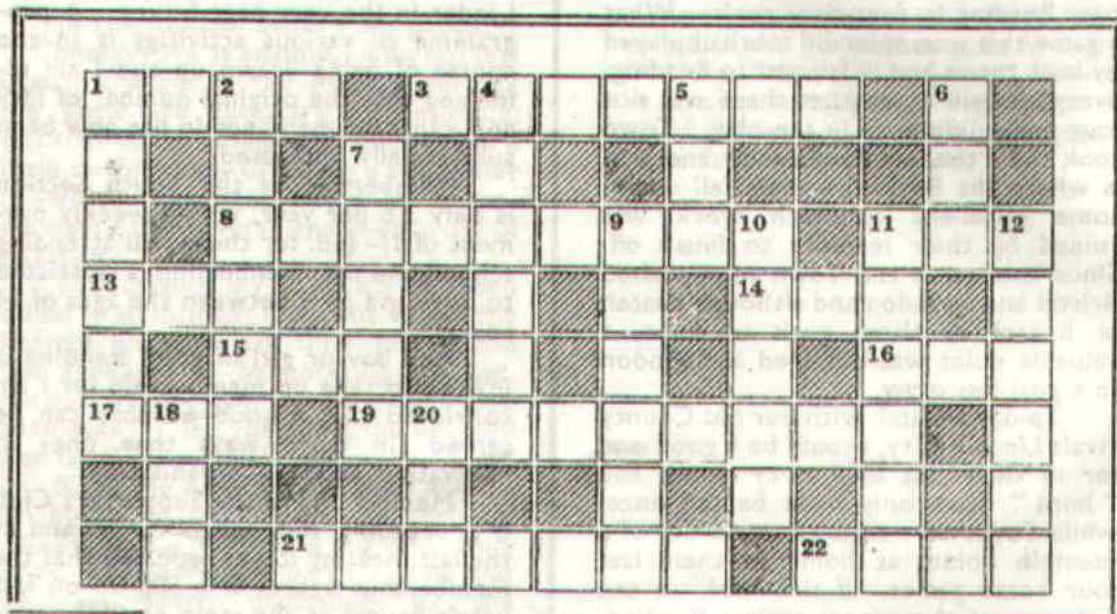
Membership of the Supporters Club is proceeding very satisfactorily, and at the last meeting it was reported that the membership figures was 500 up on last year's figures at the same period.

OUR VISITORS.

SWINDON TOWN

Swindon Town, our opponents today, must feel well satisfied with the efforts of Ralph Hunt, the former Grimsby Town inside left, who has been scoring regularly for the Wiltshire club.

Ralph, of course, went to Swindon in August in exchange for Freddie Jones and has scored 10 goals. He was part of the Swindon plan to mould experienced players with the youthful members of their side.

Last season, this team with so many teenagers in it, was pulling in big crowds to the County Ground, but they lacked an old hand to steady them down and finish off in front of goal.

With this in mind they took on Hunt, Ken McPherson, Newport's top scorer last season; John Smith, an inside forward from Watford and Bob Scott, a wing half or inside man with Cardiff City.

In addition, Swindon also have two grand fellows in defence in goalkeeper Sam Burton and centre half Maurice Owen, both long service players.

The seasoned men have been blended with the younger element with varying results. They started the season in only moderate form, but re-captured the old sparkle in beating Birmingham City in the League Cup after a replay and when slamming Lincoln City 4-0 last Saturday week.

While Hunt has scored almost two thirds of the attack's 18 goals before Saturday's match at Brentford, the defence has been giving concern.

They have conceded goals at an average rate of more than two a game. In fact, twice Swindon have had a six chalked up against them—away to Q.P.R. and Barnsley.

Swindon's most promising youngsters are Summerbee, the right winger, for whom big offers are believed to have been made; Trollope, the left back; and Ernie Hunt, a talented inside forward

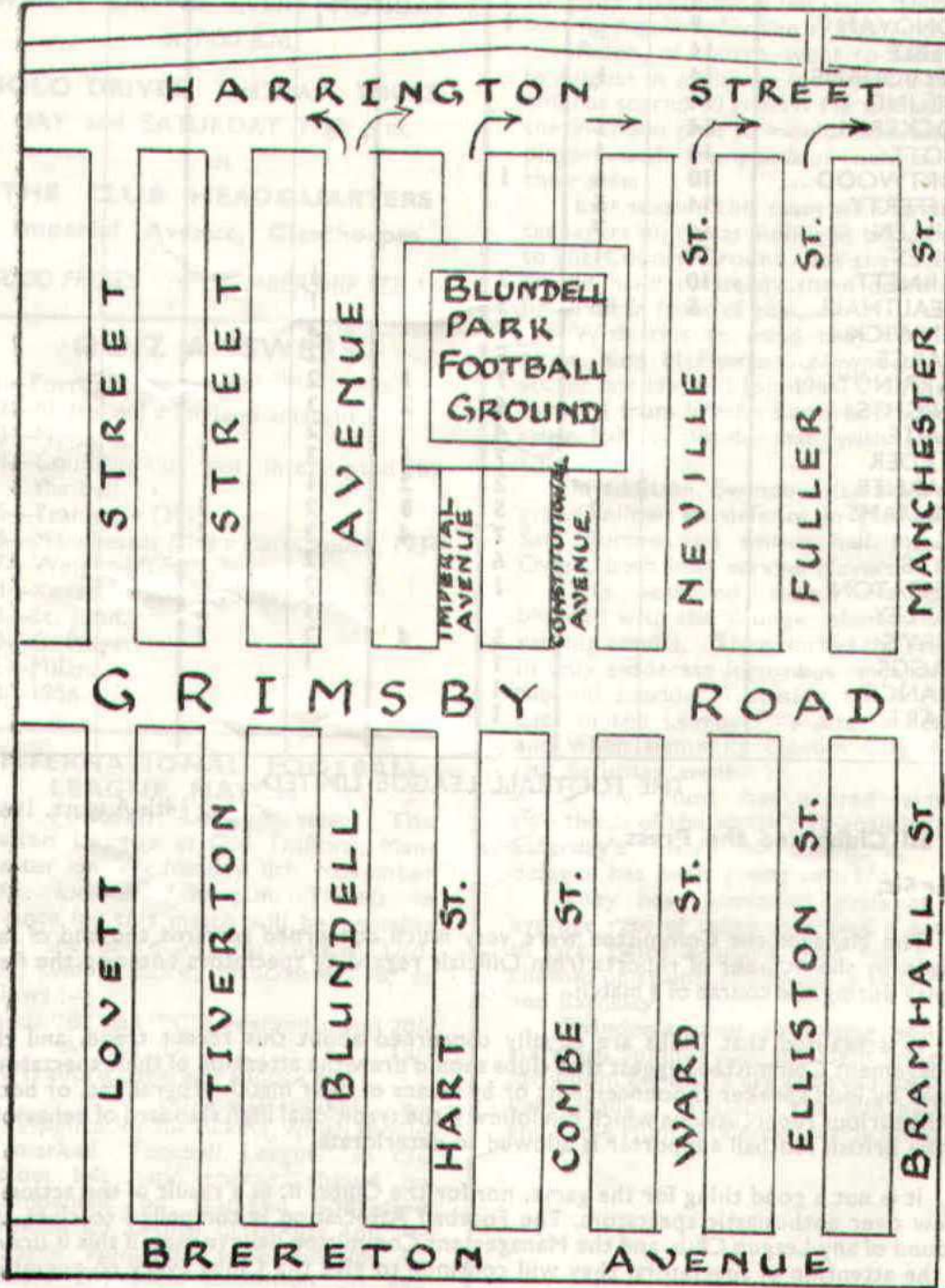

POLICE NOTICE RE CAR PARKING.

The arrangements are similar to those that have been customary for a number of years. The only one-way street will be HARRINGTON STREET, in a southerly direction from BLUNDELL AVENUE to MANCHESTER STREET. No PARKING will be allowed in GRIMSBY ROAD or BRERETON AVENUE, as these are main roads which it is desired to keep clear, nor in that part of HARRINGTON STREET behind the football ground between the main entrance and MANCHESTER STREET, the west side of HARRINGTON STREET, that part of BLUNDELL AVENUE east of GRIMSBY ROAD, CONSTITUTIONAL AVENUE, IMPERIAL AVENUE and COMBE STREET which is reserved for buses.

PARKING will be allowed on both sides of all other minor streets and it is particularly requested, to assist dispersal after the match, that motorists approaching from CLEETHORPE ROAD, GRIMSBY, would park their cars in HART STREET, DAUBNEY STREET, BARCROFT STREET, LOVETT STREET, TIVERTON STREET or HARRINGTON STREET, and those from CLEETHORPES and elsewhere in any of the minor streets south of the football ground.

It is also requested that so far as possible, all cars should be parked with the near side next to the kerb and facing in the same direction. If a motorist should enter any minor street and find there is no space available on the left hand side, he is requested to continue into the next street where space may be available, always going with the stream on whichever main road he happens to turn.
