SEVEN points out of eight and figure "16" in the goals-for column represents one of the finest starts in Q.P.R. history. Well played indeed!

You cannot build without foundations, and with this sort of opening to the season we could hardly have put in more solid groundwork.

Since last we gathered here, the lads have made two long away trips and returned with full points, following five goals at Carlisle

last Friday night with four more at Halifax on Monday.

Early days that these are, the League table made pleasant reading on the train home from Halifax on Tuesday. Frank Large, switched to centre forward for this game because of a pulled groin muscle sustained by Bernard Evans at Carlisle, skippered the side on the occasion of his return to the Halifax ground and played a big part in the victory.

Though without actually scoring himself, he gave the home defence a mighty shaking-up, and considered the result more than

worth the buffeting he took.

ONE POINT AND FOUR GOALS UP

So, after four matches, we are one point and four goals better off than a year ago, when we took six points from the first four fixtures—and lost the fifth.

Brian Bedford and Mark Lazarus have the distinction of having scored in every game. Incidentally, Mark scored two at Carlisle—not one as appeared in the newspaper summaries, in which one of his goals was mistakenly credited to Bernard Evans.

After a frustrating past at Tottenham—eight years and nine seasons without a first team chance—goalkeeper Frank Smith decided he must make his Soccer future elsewhere. He became a Q.P.R. player on May 21st.

Born at Colchester, Frank joined Spurs as a lad from Colchester Casuals. At 17 he was all set for his big-match debut — Reynolds and Ditchburn were unavailable—against an England XI under floodlights at White Hart Lane, but just half an hour before the kick-off he was replaced by a "guest", Ian Black.

Now 26, he and his wife Margaret have two children, Yvonne (4) and Mark, nine months. The Smiths live at Cobham, Surrey.

Not surprisingly, the ambition of 6ft. Iin. Frank is to play in League football. He started in our reserves, but says, with a glint in his eye: "It's a long season. I must have a better chance here than if I had stayed on at Tottenham."

KEEN CRICKETER!

Mike Keen showed he's no one-sport star last Sunday week. In a 12-a-side cricket match against Eastcote—proceeds went to the local club's pavilion fund—he took ten wickets for 92 then made top score for the Q.P.R. cricketers with 69.

TODAY'S REFEREE

Mr. Tom Langdale, born at Chilton Colliery, Co. Durham, and a template-maker by trade, became a Class I referee in 1944 and was appointed to the Football League list at the start of season 1954-55.

This is his second consecutive appearance in London, for on Wednesday night he was in charge of the Spurs v. Aston Villa match.

Aged 45, he is well on the way to having refereed 1,000 matches. His total at the start of the season was 867, and at his Darlington home, he keeps a complete statistical record of every game—name of competition, result, scorers and names of linesmen.

He is a keen badminton player and club cricketer and, at home, a do-it-yourself handyman.

Keith Morgan (Right half): Attacking wing half who joined Swindon from Westbury as a youth. Has missed only three games in two seasons. Born

Trowbridge. 6ft.; 12st.

Maurice Owen (Centre half): Club captain and senior player, he joined Town in season 1946-47. Originally a centre forward, he has in recent years served splendidly at centre half. Born Abingdon. 5ft. 10in.; 11st. 4lb. Bob Woodruff (Left half): Joined

Swindon straight from the local schools team. Has played centre forward for the club. 5ft. 11in.; 11st. 7lb. Mike Summerbee (Outside right): Much-sought young winger from Cheltenham and a product of Swindon's youth scheme. Switched to the wing from centre forward. 5ft. 11in. Arnold Darcy (Outside right/left): Signed in November 1659 from Wigan Athletic. Born Blackburn.

Ernie Hunt (Inside right): Signed onto the groundstaff from Swindon schools, he went into the League side at 16 and has been the club's top scorer for the past two seasons.

Jack Smith (Centre forward): viously with Hartlepools and Watford, he joined Swindon in June, 1961. Born West Hartlepool.

Bill Atkins (Inside left): Strong, ballplaying forward signed from Aston Villa at end of season 1958-59. Born Solihull, 6ft.; 11st. 8lb.

Cliff Jackson (Outside left): Swindonborn and a schoolboy international, he made his debut at 17. Also plays inside forward. 5ft. 10in.; 11st.
