

Turner, Mike. Just demobbed from the R.A.F. he joined the Club whilst still in the services from Dorchester Town. Took over in goal following the injury to O'Hara last season and is expected to make strong bids for the first-team position this season.

Wollen, Terry. Another local boy who made his debut for the First Team when 16 years old. He played the majority of first

team games during Season 1960/61 and last season.

Trollope, John. A local boy who joined the Swindon ground staff from school. Was selected for the First Team at the beginning of the Season 1960/61, when he was 16 years old and was ever present during that season and last season.

Morgan, Keith. A strong, attacking wing-half, who joined Swindon as a youth player from Westbury. Played in every first team game during 1960/61 and missed only three games last year through

injury.

Owen, Maurice. The team captain and oldest member of the team. Formerly a centre-forward, he has had a long and outstanding period of service with the Club. Has played in several representative

games.

Woodruff, Bob. Another local born player who came to the town direct from the Swindon Schoolboys' team. Has played at centreforward and inside-forward in the senior side and his performances have made him a target for several transfer offers.

Darcy, Arnold. Joined the Club in November, 1956, from Wigan Athletic. In spite of his lack of inches he is a strong forceful winger

with a powerful shot.

Hunt, Ernie. Joined the Club's ground staff from school. member of the First Team at 16 years old, he is a player of outstanding ability for whom the Club has had many offers. A local boy, he was top goal scorer 1960/61 and again last year.

Smith, Jack. Joined the Robins from Watford during the 1960/61 close season. He was formerly with Hartlepools United. A strong

forceful player with the ability to get the unexpected goal.

Smart, Roger. Another local born player who joined the Club direct from the Swindon Schoolboys' team. At 17 he made the Centre-forward berth in the Reserve team his own. More recently converted to a wing-half, he made four first team appearances last season.

Jackson, Cliff. Swindon born, he joined the club direct from school. He was a schoolboy international and he made his debut in Swindon's First team at the age of 17. Has a very powerful shot.

FOOTBALL GOSSIP

Just added to the still comparatively small number of players who have sampled all four Football League divisions had been outside-right Colin Hudson. He operated in the Third with Newport County, Second and First with Cardiff City, and Second with Brighton and Hove, and now has completed the circuit in the Fourth—back with Newport.

It seems full early to discuss F.A. Cup possibilities, but if "form" counts the season's winners will come from 'Spurs, Manchester United, Burnley, and Newcastle United. They are the only four who, since the war, have won at least twice as many ties as they have lost.

Now that former man of many clubs Tommy Johnston, with 236 goals behind him, has moved into non-League company as Folkestone's player-coach not many could say which Scot left claims most in the Football League. He is West Ham United international Johnny Dick, who has collected 153.

Several of the Football League clubs must now be regretting having slapped big fees on the heads of listed players last May. Many such have gone into non-League play. Surely it would have been better for the League clubs they left to have pocketed reduced fees rather than nothing at all.

It isn't often that a player moves from one League club to another and then returns to his original love, but three who went "back home" like that during the close season are forwards Mike Grice (Colchester United), Johnny King (Crewe Alexandra), and Colin Hudson (Newport County).

While many Scots have gone back home since last season several have come south for a second English spell. Ex-Villa inside-left Jimmy Goldie has moved from Kilsyth Rangers to Luton Town; former Everton and Rotherham outside-left has gone from Greenock Morton to Barnsley.

Raiding forward Reg Cutler has just completed the rare feat of figuring in all four Football League divisions in correct sequence in as many years. After having been with Portsmouth in First, Second, and Third in that order he is turning out with Stockport County in the Fourth.




