#### A welcome return

This evening's match marks an historic occasion, as the visit of Swindon Town is the first time in nearly half-a-century that their First XI has appeared at Upton Park in a full competitive fixture. We have, of course, met the Railwaymen in reserve and youth tournaments during the intervening years, but this Fourth Round tie in the Football League Cup is the only test of the fullest available strength of both clubs since 1914-15.

Our records of the previous meeting 49 years ago (on 26th September 1914) show that we drew here 1—1 in a Southern League game; the return took place on the following January 30th and again we shared two goals. After that top-rate competitive soccer closed down for the duration of the First World War, and when the run of war-time tournaments ended vast changes took place in the Football League. The Hammers gained admission to Division II of that competition in 1919 and in the following year the Wiltshire club became founder-members of the Third Division (South).

The Town remained members of the Third Division (continuing their membership of Division III from 1958-59 onwards when the Fourth Division came into being) until the end of last season, when they had their long trail ended by promotion. In the interim they had to apply for re-election in 1933, 1956 and 1957, but their record in the F.A. Cup had more than compensated for these three temporary lapses.

The present-day background of the club is well-known to all fans, thanks to the medium of press, radio and TV; and manager Bert Head's successes with a team of very young players has well-earned the head-lines. The accent on youth at the County Ground is very marked, and when we played a "pipe-opener" friendly there prior to the start of last season the Town youngsters surprised many with their 3—2 victory. However, our Colts XI regained our prestige with a 4—1 win here last March in a Third Round tie of their F.A. Youth Cup success.

There will be comparatively few here tonight who will recall those pre-First World War days when the Hammers and Railwaymen fought out so many keen battles in the Southern League, but for the "veterans" who read these notes we need only mention such names as Harold Fleming (nine caps for England), Grenville Morris (21 Welsh caps) and John Walker (nine Scots caps) among others to bring nostalgic memories.

Having been formed in 1881, the Town club already had nearly 20 years behind it before we first played against them, and their name was extremely famous well before the turn of the century. They became a professional outfit in 1894 and from thence on (with Millwall and Southampton) held continuous membership of the Southern League until the aforementioned "change-over." There were hard struggles around the turn of the century, but from 1907 onwards they had a "golden era," winning the championship twice and also being F.A. Cup semi-finalists on two occasions.

Their first ground was The Croft (where they played in green shirts), but they moved to the County Ground in 1896 and on this more spacious enclosure (which holds some 30,000) they have remained ever since.

Last Tuesday's Match

Our first League Cup meeting with tonight's guests took place last Tuesday, and the 12,050 spectators who braved the elements saw a really

exciting match.

Geoff Hurst (20 mins.) and Peter Brabrook (27 mins.) were early scorers for us, but Swindon got on level terms before the interval with goals by Don Rogers and John Smith. A couple of minutes after the resumption we regained the lead through Ron Boyce, but in a stirring finish the homesters made it 3—3 when centre-half Ken McPherson came upfield to score six minutes from the final whistle.

We are sure that the replay will prove just as interesting, and in welcoming these long-standing friends we extend to them a most cordial welcome during which we hope to reciprocate their excellent hospitality.

## Another fine League game

We have seen some very fine League games at Upton Park during the past few weeks (as well as some top-rate ones away from home), and last Saturday week's duel with Leicester City provided yet another to add

to the list.

There could have been none among the 23,073 attendance that did not consider a draw to be a fair result, and the visiting players, officials and fans joined with all Hammers in saying what a grand afternoon had been enjoyed by all who were here. The standard of play was extremely good, the sportsmanship of both XI's was first-class and all in all the 90 minutes went to prove that British soccer has plenty to offer the genuine fan. It was a delight to watch, and if all games were played in such a spirit talk of "wiring in" spectators and disciplining players would be speedily dispelled.

After fighting back from an early reverse the Hammers appeared to be gaining the upper hand, and indeed went in at the interval with a 2—1 lead. But it was only too apparent that the Filberts were by no means out of it, and their subsequent equaliser and strong finish brought out the

best in our rearguard.

#### ... and a 'Thank You'

In addition we were very pleased to see that our appeals over the public address system and in our programme brought desired results, insofar that there was a notable improvement of conduct among the very small minority of spectators who had earned reprimand during the past few weeks. A couple of isolated incidents were quickly stifled, and we thank the patrons who have assisted in quelling what had become something of a nuisance as well as a menace.

## Facts and Figures

The facts and figures of football are always a fascinating subject, and from time to time research brings forward some very interesting items.

We have recently been checking the total appearances of Hammers' players, and have discovered one or two omissions that occurred through some of our war-time files being destroyed. This enabled us to correct our records, and at the same time revealed that two of our present staff are on the way to setting new marks.

The first is John Bond, the longest-serving player on our books, who up to the start of the present season had made 327 League appearances since he signed professional forms in March 1950 (he came into the senior side in the following year). John's 332nd appearance was against Leicester City at Upton Park on November 16th and he was therefore set to equal the 333 appearances of former winger Tommy Yews by playing against Bolton Wanderers at Burnden Park last Saturday; he had thus recently surpassed former wing-half Jim Collins' 330 appearances in our League XI.

This puts John in the first seven of our "appearances table," the leading ones being Jimmy Ruffell (508), Vic Watson (462), Jim Barrett, Snr. (442), Ernie Gregory (383), Ted Hufton (370) and Dick Walker (339): Gregory and Walker were, of course, not able to count their innumerable World War II games in the claret-and-blue.

Runner-up to John Bond among our present playing-staff is Ken Brown who (excluding last Saturday) has played in 287 League games. All being well he should attain the 300-mark by next March, and would thus become about the tenth Hammer to reach the triple century. The picture of Ken which appears on the opposite page is a recent one, and shows him leading out the Hammers on the Hillsborough ground against Sheffield Wednesday; he was deputising as skipper as Bobby Moore was away on that day playing for England.

The "three-ton-up" figure is certainly an achievement for any player with a League club, as it entails the equivalent of not missing a game for over seven seasons, and does not take into account the extra appearances made in F.A. Cup, League Cup, friendly and other fixtures.
