Good Afternoon -

The visit of Swindon Town this afternoon recalls the meeting with United in the F.A. Cup way back in 1929 when they gave United the K.O. by two clear goals. It is only recently that they have come to the forefront and since joining the Second Division they have proved themselves a first class club and team.

This season they had a great run in the F.A. Cup going out eventually to West Ham to stamp them as dour opponents. They defeated Sunderland at Swindon 1-0 in September but came a cropper at Roker Park on February 1st losing 6-0. At the moment they hold 9th position in the League having won 11 of their 31 games and drawing nine. Last Saturday they were trounced by Preston North End losing at home 4-1.

United on the other hand were victorious at Rotherham when Alan Suddick claimed two great goals to turn the tables and clinch the issue. It was a most commendable win for United who had a weakened team through injuries, and hit during the match with an injury to Stan Anderson. Despite the handicap United showed an abundance of grit and determination. Ollie Burton played in this game at right back.

Hopes are that Stan Anderson will recover in time to lead United out at Gallowgate for the great Tyne-Wear Derby clash due on Saturday March 14.

Supporters should, however, note the result of the Sunderland cup battle this afternoon at Old Trafford. Should Sunderland defeat Manchester United then the Gallowgate derby match will need to be played at a later date for March 14 is F.A. Cup semi final date.

Spotlight on Swindon Town . . .

Swindon Town was founded way back in 1881 by the Rev. W. Pitt for youngsters on his parish. They became a professional club in 1894 when they were admitted to the Southern League where they stayed until 1920. Then they became one of the original members of the League Division Three.

Many names are attached to this club for they are spoken of as the Moonrakers (from the Wiltshire legend) the Robins from their colours and like Crewe The Railwaymen. They play on the County ground that boasts a top gate of just under 30,000.

Many famous men have managed the club including B. Head, S. Allen, N. Harris, M. Lindley, L. Page and E. Vizard. The League career reads Division Three 1920-21, Three (South) 1921-39; 1946-58; Division Three 1958-62 Division Two 1963-64

One of their best seasons was in 1926-27 when they netted 100 goals in 42 matches. Highest League score was set up when they defeated Luton 9-1 in 1921. In 1926-27 D. Morris was top scorer in Division Three with 47 goals.

Notable transfer deals include the signing of J. Murphy from West Brom, J. Gauld from Plymouth Argyle, and the selling of N. Uprichard to Portsmouth in 1952.

Honours include semi-finalists F.A. Cup 1910 and 1912; quarter finalists 1911, 1924. 5th round 1929 beating Newcastle United 2-0 and Burnley 3-2. They reached the last 16 also in 1913 and 1952. They were champions of the Southern League in 1911 and 1914. They met Manchester United for the F.A. Charity Shield in 1912 losing a high scoring match 8-4.

Swindon Who's Who

- Mike Turner—(Goalkeeper)— Just demobbed from the R.A.F. he joined the Club whilst still in the services from Dorchester Town. Took over in goal following the injury to O'Hara last season.
- Owen Dawson—(Full-back or Centre-forward)—Signed during the close season from Portsmouth. Was a former Youth International.
- John Trollope—(Left Back)—A local boy who joined the Swindon ground staff from school. Was selected for the First Team at the beginning of the Season 1960/61, when he was 16 years old and was ever present during that season and last season. Maximum appearances in the League side during 1962/63.
- Keith Morgan—(Right -Half)—Team Captain. A strong, attacking wing-half who joined Swindon as a youth player from Westbury. Played in every first team game during 1960/61 season and missed only three games last year through injury. Made maximum appearances during 1962/3.
- **Ken McPherson**—(Centre-Half)—Signed from Newport County in August, 1961, he is a player with a reputation for hard work. Originally a centre-forward he has proved he has the ability to take over in defence.
- Bob Woodruff—(Wing Half)—Another local born player who came to the town direct from the Swindon Schoolboys' team. Has played at centre-forward and inside-forward in the senior side and his performances have made him a target for several transfer offers.
- Mike Summerbee—(Outside Right)—Born in Cheltenham, he is another product of the Swindon Youth policy. Formerly played at Centre-forward, but has now made the outside-right berth his own. Another of the players wanted by several clubs.
- Bill Atkins—(Inside-forward)—Joined Swindon from Aston Villa at the end of the 1958/59 Season. A strong ball playing forward. He played several representative matches while in the Army. Was demobbed mid-way through last season and quickly made the inside-left position his own.
- Arnold Darcy—(Outside-left)—Joined the Club in November, 1956, from Wigan Athletic. In spite of his lack of inches he is a strong forceful winger with a powerful shot.
- Peter Leggatt—(Forward)—A close season signing from Weymouth. He is a fast powerful player who can play in any position in the forward line.
- Graham French—(Left-wing)—Close season signing from Shrewsbury Town.
 Gained his Youth International Cap for the very successful England
 Youth side last season. He is a fast, elusive player.
- Eric Weaver—(Right or left wing)—A very capable amateur player. Now in the R.A.F. Two footed can play on either right or left wing.

Great United Players of the Past. No. 4

Jackie Rutherford

"Jackie" Rutherford came to Newcastle United from Willington Athletic as a Centre Forward for which position he was not overburdened with weight. He did, however, have speed, ball control and shooting ability, qualities that he was to exploit as an Outside Right and became one of the best local "finds" that the St. James' Park club ever made.

Yet Rutherford would not have became the power he did had he not been linked with one of Scotland's outstanding Inside Forwards in Jimmy Howie to ultimately form one of the most brilliant-ever wings in the game.

Rutherford, quiet and unassuming, relished the prompting of his partner to excel when, with his almost uncanny ball control he would cut in goalwards to serve in spectacular fashion. Skilfully, too, he would veer to the wing and sweep the ball backwards to a colleague postioned to profit by the most accurate of passes.

On his last day with Newcastle United after 261 First League appearances Jackie Rutherford confided to me: "I would not have the regular outside right choice by Newcastle United had I not been associated with Jimmy Howie. He made me and as our key man he made Outside Rights and Centre Forwards star performers".

Rutherford ranked high among the many talented players in Newcastle United's greatest glamour spell and it is to his credit that he played in all the clubs five Crystal Palace Cup Finand tals hat he was capped for England on three occasions and twice against both Ireland and Wales, besides being in England teams that visited Austria, Hungary and Bohemia.

In these internationals Rutherford would probably rank that against Scotland in 1907 at St. James' Park as his outstanding match. In it he partnered Steve Bloomer who was indebted to the Newcastle winger for the opening from which he scored to make the final result 1-1.

Another game Rutherford recalled with pleasure was the 1910 Cup Final in which he scored the goal with a first time shot following a free-kick by "Sandy" Higgins that meant a reply with Barnsley.

The second game was decided at Goodison Park and here Rutherford and Howie starred as a wing, while Albert Shepherd got the club's two goals that were scored.

Rutherford moved to Woolwich Arsenal in May 1913; had a short stay as Stoke City Manager in 1923; returned to Arsenal later that year and ended his playing days with Clapton Orient with the close of the 1926-27 season.




