

CLUB NOTES

TILL greater grows the enthusiasm for Charlton. You should have witnessed the fine rally of supporters at Portsmouth last Saturday and the wild demonstrations of delight after Charlton had swept to a two goals lead in the first 12 minutes. Then after the game when many of our followers risked losing their train home by waiting to personally congratulate our players on their 3-2 victory at Pompey.

To have gathered five points from the first three League matches, two of which were played away from home, shows the skill and determination of the Charlton lads, despite

the several hard knocks in the shape of injuries.

These are early days, but even at this stage there are signs that Charlton are going to be a strong force in the Second Division, and the strong backing of the fans, both at The Valley and away from home, is most encouraging to our players. They are in fine fettle, full of the zest and urge to do well in Charlton's colours, and you'll not find a happier bunch anywhere.

OUR ALL ROUND SUPERIORITY AT PORTSMOUTH

The courage of Dennis Edwards is a case in point. Soon after Charlton had built up a two goals lead at Portsmouth, Dennis was involved in a collision of heads and suffered a bad cut on the forehead, just above the eye. After stitches had been inserted by the doctor, Dennis was back on the field, fetching and foraging at inside-forward though, because of the risk of re-opening the wound he dare not head the ball.

All round superiority earned Charlton the points at Portsmouth. Eddie Firmani's duels with international Jimmy Dickinson proved quite a feature and the fact that Eddie got in the first blow for Charlton in the first minute and nearly scored another in the closing minutes,

shows that our centre-forward never allowed Dickinson to get a stranglehold.

Give a good cheer to our visitors today, Swindon Town, who earned promotion from the Third Division a couple of seasons ago.

> On the opening day of the season the Railwaymen had the misfortune to have goalkeeper Norman Oakley badly injured soon after the start of the match at Bury and they slumped to 6-1 defeat. There is a chance that Oakley will be fit enough to

BILL ATKINS (inside-forward). Born at Solihull and went to Swindon from Aston Villa at the end of 1958-59 season.

While negotiations were going on with Chelsea for Marvin Hinton's transfer to Stamford Bridge, Mr. Frank Hill Charlton's manager, was away at Manchester negotiating Frank Haydock's transfer from Manchester United. Had the Haydock transfer fallen down, Mr. Hill would have been powerless to try and retain Hinton, for the Chelsea deal, unknown to our manager, had already gone through.

CHARLIE PURVES will be remembered as an inside-forward with Charlton just after the war. We learned the other day that Charlie has just been appointed player-manager of Basingstoke, the Hampshire League club for whom he has played for some years. After leaving Charlton in 1951, Purves had spells with Southampton, Sittingbourne, Margate and Chatham.

BRIAN TOCKNELL is a restless soul and during his recent enforced idleness through injury it was not easy to keep him resting and pacified. During the period he was required to sit at home resting with his injured leg propped up, it was agony for poor Brian until he hit on the idea of coupling pieces of film together. He is a cine camera fan and the film comprised shots taken during his summer holiday in Spain. Now he has the strips ready for the projector.

RALPH MILLER, Charlton's young full-back, has grown weary of the daily journey from his home at Slough, and is to move into apartments at Plumstead. Ralph has made steady progress since you saw him make his first team debut against Spartak last year.

ONE OF THE FIRST to report back at The Valley after the summer break, Ralph Miller confessed he got a bit bored at times during his spell away from Charlton. "I even had a go at cherry picking, just for something to do"—he told us. But ever-smiling Ralph got in a couple of happy weeks at Bognor with his pal from Slough—Ronnie Hunt the Queen's Park Rangers centre-half.

KEITH PEACOCK, we hear, was invited to re-visit his first school—Barnehurst Primary—to present the school's football trophies and swimming certificates. Our young forward made a good job of it, too, according to an onlooker, making quite a natty little speech to the pupils. Keith, by the way, didn't go on holiday this year. Instead, he's buying himself a new car.

BRIAN KINSEY, Charlton's fearless left back, is president of Eltham Palace Football Club and was present at the Club's celebration dance. Besides gaining promotion to the Premier Division of one of the local junior leagues, Eltham Palace won a couple of trophies, which highly pleased their president.

SEVERAL CHARLTON PLAYERS are members of a local golf club, which is not surprising for a good percentage of professional footballers are also good golfers. Dennis Edwards, John Hewie, Brian Tocknell and Cliff Durandt are frequently seen hiking along the fairways, and they are often joined by Fred Lucas, the former Charlton player who is now with Crystal Palace.

A JUNIOR TEAM of Charlton players recently visited Newmarket to play a friendly match with Newmarket Town, the Eastern Counties League club managed by Vince Donnelly who had a season as a winger with Charlton some years ago. It was an enjoyable visit, for apart from winning 4-1, the Charlton party was entertained in most hospitable style. After the game they were given a fine meal at the headquarters of Newmarket F.C. Supporters' Club, and Vince Donnelly and his team-mates implored Charlton to come again at the first opportunity.

PLAYING FOR HASTINGS in the Southern League are two former Charlton players—full-back Keith Tucker and wing-half Eddie Stone. When we last saw Tucker he had just married. Stone is the tall fair-haired laddie who joined Charlton as a boy along with his Gorleston school-chum, Mike Bailey, now Charlton's captain and an international.
