CLUB NOTES

Anxious position calls for revival spirit

As our disappointed supporters would readily agree, it is far from pleasant to have to record that North End, through losing six points in six home games and suffering five consecutive away defeats, share with Cardiff City the indignity of holding up the rest of the Division. To say the least it is disturbing.

The shock of seeing the club gradually slump into such a depressing position is the greater because the decline was so totally unexpected even when one allows for the fluctuations in form and fortune which give League football so much of its fascination. We confidently expected our success to continue.

The same confidence was undoubtedly shared by the great majority of our supporters, as is understandable in view of our holding third place in the Division from September to the end of the season in one of the hottest promotion races on record, and also achieving the honour of being Cup Finalists.

It would be less ironic if, in spite of an unprecedented burden of injuries and illness, the team had played badly; if one read, as of a companion team currently having a thin time, that home fans had booed their own players for putting on a poor show. There has been nothing like this in our case.

In fact, as is generally recognised, North End, starting with a valiant display in the first match after quickly being reduced to 10 men, have turned in some super-shows from the football standpoint, so much so that it is hard for anyone to explain why the desired results have not been forthcoming.

In match after match, as everyone knows, the team had to be altered mainly through misfortunes. In consequence we were obliged to field a different side in each of the first 11 senior games. Two players were hurt in our 3-3 draw at Cardiff and Ashworth last played in the subsequent 5-1 win at Ipswich.

One does not, however, wish to labour this aspect of North End's changed circumstances for the reason that there have been such contributory factors as inability to take advantage of numerous well-contrived scoring chances, and a succession of defensive lapses which proved both untimely and costly.

Also there was a missed penalty which, if converted, would have turned a 2-2 draw into a probable 3-2 win for North End. Supporters can be assured that the disappointment they feel is fully shared by the management and the players, and no effort will be spared to dispel the gloom.

The position now is serious, and something like the determination which made our progress to Wembley possible last season, a real revival spirit, is needed to pull the club out of its difficulties. As things are the situation cannot be allowed to continue, granted that it is not yet precarious.

KNOW YOUR TEAM 7. Brian Godfrey

North End's leading scorer this season and only player capped in the current internationals, on which honour we warmly congratulate him and wish him further success, is this tenacious Welshman who seems fated to be called upon to fill an emergency and has the happy knack of coming off on such occasions. He proved himself a decidedly capable utility player for us last season, following the quite inexpensive acquisition of his services from Scunthorpe United. He played in 11 League matches and scored five goals. He also did very well in the Cup-ties, making himself a favourite by his industry and obvious enthusiasm. This season he has again stepped in with some good performances in the 12 League games he had played as deputy for either Alec Ashworth or Alex Dawson. As a result he tops the list of scorers with 10 goals out of 25. He would have had more, no doubt, if his finishing had always matched his positional sense and quick eye for an opportunity, like the one he brilliantly snatched against Swansea from Alan Spavin's through pass. As with Preston, so for Wales: they wanted him unexpectedly at Swansea last spring and he scored the first of two goals against Ireland; and this week he was in Wales' World Cup preliminary with Denmark through Roy Vernon failing a fitness test, his name already being among those named as comprising the Welsh party for this series.

OUR VISITORS—Swindon Town

SWINDON TOWN, the popular Wiltshire club promoted two seasons ago, are our welcome visitors in what is only the fourth meeting. The first was in an F.A. Cup-tie 30 years ago next January 26th, Preston winning a fourth round tie by 2-0. North End also won both our League matches last season-by 1-0 and 4-1.

THAT ODD GOAL win at Deepdale last October checked a wonderfully heartening start by Swindon in new company: they got off the mark like a track runner at his best but, as often happens, found the pace too hot to maintain. The club finished in 14th position, with 38 points, and scoring 57 goals to 69.

THIRTEEN of their 18 defeats were suffered in away matches, the team winning only three times on their travels and scoring only 18 goals to 45. Their experience in home matches was not far short of being the reverse. This season they have fared even worse away from home, having lost all six matches.

IN THE PROCESS the team scored only six goals and conceded 24. Their home record of six wins and a draw in eight matches, and 19 goals to 8, is thus entirely responsible for Swindon having a mid-table position with 13 points. If North End could win today there would be only two points between the rivals.

THE CLUB was founded as long ago as 1831 by Rev. W. Pitt for young men of his parish. It became a professional organisation in 1894, in which year Swindon gained membership of the Southern League and graced it until 1920. The club then became one of the original members of the League Division III.

SWINDON in their time have had three nicknames—"the Moonrakers," from a Wiltshire legend; "the Robins," from their red shirts; and, like Crewe, "the Railwaymen." Bert Head is in charge and previous managers include the renowned Sam Allen, Louis Page and Ted Vizard. Most noted player-Harold Fleming, the elegant England inside forward of pre-World War I fame. UNBEATEN AT HOME FOR T.V. AND ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES

Norman Oakley (goalkeeper).—Born Norton-on-Tees. Joined Swindon Town from Hartlepools United in March 1964, and has proved himself a capable performer.

Owen Dawson (right back).—Born Hatfield. Signed from Portsmouth June 1962. Came into prominence as a Youth international. Last season showed the benefit of increasing experience and played in 36 Second Division matches.

John Trollope (left back).—A local boy who has made good. Born at Swindon and joined the club's ground staff straight from school. First selected for the senior side at the start of 1960-61 season when he was only 16. Ever-present in that campaign and subsequently he has made maximum League appearances.

Keith Morgan (right half).—Born Trowbridge. A strong attacking wing half and team captain. Joined Swindon as a youth player from Westbury. Made maximum

League appearances during the past three seasons. Fast and a sticker.

Ken McPherson (centre half).—Belies his name in that he was born at West Hartlepools, not in Scotland. Signed from Newport County in August 1961, he has earned an enviable reputation for hard work: he never lets up.

Roger Smart (left half).—Another Swindon-born player who joined the club direct from the Swindon schoolboys team. At 17 he made the centre forward berth in the Reserves his own, but like his colleague McPherson later tried his luck in the half back line. This again was a successful switch.

Peter Leggett (outside right).—A Lancashire lad, born at Newton-le-Willows. Made six League appearances last season and is coming on. Pacey and punchy can

play in any forward position. Signed from Weymouth, May 1962.

Ernie Hunt (inside right).—Proud to be playing for the club of his native town. He is another local product who came to the County ground fresh from school, starting on the ground staff. Developed into a constructive, forceful inside man of outstanding ability for whom Swindon have had many offers. Top scorer in first two seasons of this decade and capped for England's Under-23's the following season. Twelve goals in 34 League games last campaign.

Mike Summerbee (centre forward).—Formerly an outside right. Born Cheltenham, and is another product of Swindon's youth policy. After a spell on the wing went back to the position he had previously favoured. Last season he made 37 League

appearances and scored seven goals.

Kenneth Albert Skeen (inside left).—A newcomer to League football this season, having been signed from Trowbridge Town, the Southern League club as recently

as September 1st. Born at Cheltenham 22 years ago.

Donald Rogers (outside left).—Born Paulton. A much sought-after player who often leaves a good impression by his ambitious and skilful play. An England Youth prospect who seems destined for further honours.

OLD FAVOURITES 7. Bobby Beattie

Never likely to be forgotten by his countless North End and Scottish admirers is that curly-topped, whimsical little genius of an inside forward who could switch the current of a game by the merest flick or double shuffle of his twinkling feet. Wee Bobby at any time was an interesting study as an original individual who could read a game with uncommon quickness of thought; but, on form, he was a positive joy to watch. As philosophical as he was a shrewd match-winner and artful ball player with a delicate touch, he learned to smile his way out of adversity and cheerfully accepted the rough with the smooth. Getting the "bird" from people who did not always see the brain that lay behind his subtle moves was nothing new to Bobby. The reason why North End got him from Kilmarnock in October 1937 in the first place was that he was getting lots of it from "Killie" fans and he was then only 22. At Deepdale he fitted in better, proved a fine successor to Willie Fagan and was the schemer in North End's splendid team of 1937-38 (Cup winners and third in the Championship). The war robbed the game of his vintage years but he made a wonderful come-back in vitally influencing our 1950-51 promotion triumph.
