NEWS and VIEWS

WITH ELEVEN MORE League games remaining—six of them away from home—we need another nine points to achieve what would be our highest-ever number of points in the First Division.

It was in 1964/65 that we secured our previous best total of 47 and on that occasion we finished in 5th place; that represented our highest since 1900/01 when we occupied the fourth position—the best we have ever done in this Division.

Of course, we cherish high hopes that not only will we surpass our previous best total of Division One points but that we will end the season in one of the top three places in the league table.

On paper our fixture list can perhaps be described as 'reasonable' because we do not, at least, play any of our dangerous rivals in the Championship field. Yet, on the evidence of the difficult battle we had at Bloomfield Road against relegation-haunted Blackpool, our task is far from easy.

If we make progress this afternoon against Swindon Town and our name goes forward into the draw for the Sixth Round of the Cup on Monday (for what will be only our third occasion since the war) then we shall be faced with a very formidable glut of fixtures!

Next week it's a home League game against West Ham United, then we travel to Hillsborough for the return with Sheffield Wednesday on Easter Saturday. Then, twice within 24 hours, we have games against that always dangerous combination Burnley followed by a home game against Southampton and a Sixth Round F.A. Cup-tie.

In all, seven games in 29 days and there's no doubt whatsoever that this will be our most vital phase of the whole season so that, even if our opponents do not figure as we do in the Championship hunt, our task will be as hard in each and every game.

Nothing but our best will do to surmount this most difficult period of the season and if we emerge as successfully from these fixtures as we have done in our great spell which dates back to 12th November (only one defeat in 18 League and Cup games), then our supporters will be jubilant at our chances . . . and so shall we!

Swindon Town come to City Ground to do battle with us in the Cup today and will be treated with great respect but, at the same time, if our players dedicate themselves to the task of winning at the first attempt and really set their stall out to make the manner of their performance on a par with our League performances, then they can achieve a comfortable satisfying win.

Our visitors created a shock in the Third Round by first drawing at West Ham United's Upton Park enclosure and then winning the replay; such a feat should not be regarded as a 'flash in the pan'.

We welcome them and their fans to our ground this afternoon and hope they'll enjoy their visit . . . but there we hope the hospitality ends for we look to our boys to win in style and so give added confidence for the severe future programme.

INTRODUCING OUR VISITORS

SWINDON TOWN

IT IS INDEED a pleasure to welcome Swindon Town to our City Ground because it provides not only the chance to congratulate them on their Cup success this season but also a rare opportunity of seeing them in action.

Our paths haven't crossed in a playing sense since 1949/50 and '50/51 when we were both members of the Third Division (South). Our fans will doubtless be heartened by the fact that we scored winning 'doubles' over them in both seasons with wins of 2-1 at Nottingham and 5-nil at Swindon in the first season and a 2-1 victory here and a 3-2 win at their County Ground in what was our Championship-winning season.

We have only previously met them once in the F.A. Cup and that was back in 1925/26 when, on a visit to Nottingham in the Fourth Round, they were defeated 2-nil.

Town's progress in the F.A. Cup this season has been very rewarding for their fans, their Board of Directors, Manager Mr. Danny Williams and their players because it has brought extra and needed

revenue and has also raised their hopes in the Cup so much more than has their moderate performance in their league programme this season.

To reach this stage of the competition Swindon have played five Cup games in all (including a replay) which makes them the league team which has played most Cup games this season! Not only that, they have scored more goals (15) in the Cup than anyone else this term.

As Division Three members they had to begin their quest for Cup success earlier than those clubs from Divisions One and Two and, in the First Round, won away against non-leaguers Horsham 3-nil, before an attendance of 8,000.

In the Second Round they beat another non-league combination in Ashford 5-nil at Swindon before a crowd of 12,079 and then created one of the big surprises of the early stages of the competition by holding fancied West Ham United at Upton Park to a 3-all draw after being 2-1 down at half-time; the attendance this time 32,000.

A few days later on their own ground in front of their best crowd of the season (25,789) the 'Hammers' were truly 'hammered' 3-1 in the replay and new Cup 'giants' were born.

Three weeks ago they made their next step to current soccer fame when they disposed of Second Division Bury 2-1, again on their own ground, before an attendance of 24,452 and the draw for Round Five gave them a chance to repeat—or even better—their fine performance

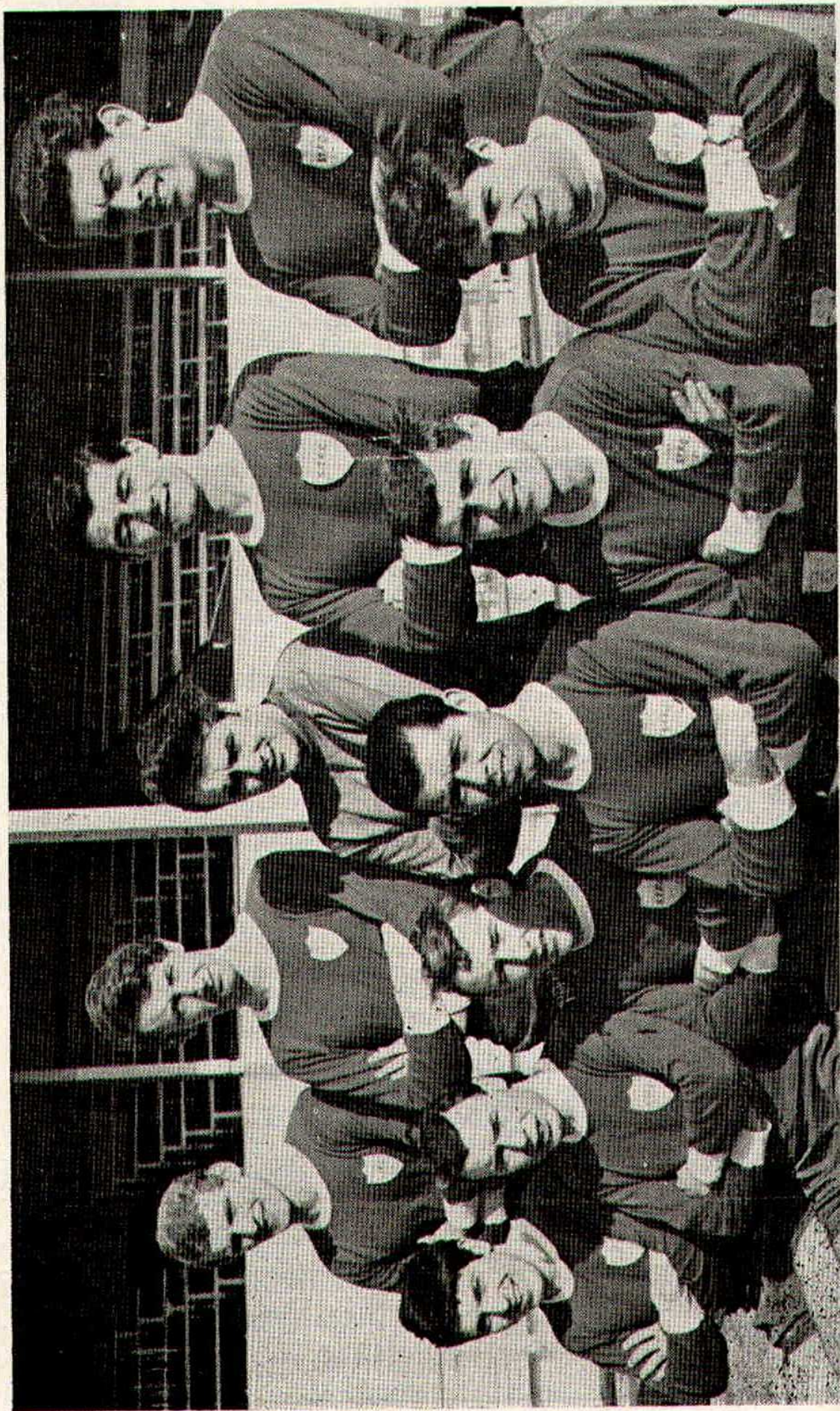

over West Ham United when they found themselves drawn to visit ourselves today.

Any side capable of doing what they did to the Upton Park side (our next week's league visitors) with three of England's World Cup-Winning squad in their ranks, are to be respected and we shall be well on our guard to avoid any likely repetition of that result.

In brief, some information about our visitors' career. They were founded in 1881, adopted professionalism in 1894 and in the same year they became a Limited Company. Swindon were one of the original members of the Third Division in 1920 and had continuous membership of this section until 1962/63.

Then, as runners-up to Northampton Town who were four points better off, they won promotion to Division Two with an outstandingly good team of largely home-developed players.

Featuring in their side that season were several young players who became the target of many clubs and three of these young 'stars' were Mike Summerbee, Ernie Hunt and Bobby Woodruff. In fact all three are now with other clubs (Manchester City, Wolverhampton Wanderers and Crystal Palace respectively) but in the present Swindon side are other players attracting much attention—but more about them in a moment.

The manager at that time was Bert Head (now with Crystal Palace) but now it is Danny Williams who was, incidentally, responsible for introducing our own Barry

Lyons into League soccer when Manager of Rotherham United.

Indeed, with Rotherham as a wing-half, Danny was a pillar of strength (overall he made 459 appearances) in a side that was several times knocking on the door of Division One in the early 1950's. Wally Ardron (later to join us), Gladstone Guest and three 'Jacks' (Selkirk, Shaw and Grainger) were other members of the side at that time.

The attitude of this Rotherham side typified the kind of team spirit that Williams has instilled into this Cup-fighting combination of Swindon and, as we all know, the Cup competition calls for courage just as much as skill... our visitors are lacking neither of these qualities.

Over the years there have been many other players too numerous to mention who have done much to keep Swindon's name in the limelight and we have space to mention but four. Harold Fleming (1907 to 1924) one of the best inside-forwards (11 England 'caps') of his generation; after him Harry Morris (1926-1933) a centre-forward whose 47 goals in one season is still a club record.

Then coming nearer to the present era, was centre-forward Maurice Owen who made 554 league appearances (scoring over 150 goals) between 1946 and 1963 and finally big Ken McPherson, who will be recalled by Nottingham folk as a fairly ordinary centre-forward in his spell with Notts. County but, by Swindon fans, as

an outstandingly good pivot in many of their stirring Third Division days in a spell that lasted over many seasons before he finally retired three seasons ago.

Now a look at some of the players likely to be on duty today and in whom all Swindon (and not a few outsiders) pin the hopes that they can cause one of the season's biggest Cup upsets by bringing us down!

Tony Hicks (Goalkeeper)

Born Swindon. He has been with Swindon for five years. He joined the club as a schoolboy and progressed through the ranks of the junior teams before becoming one of the club's senior goalkeepers.

John Trollope (Left-back)

Born Swindon. Another local player who joined their ground staff from school. He was selected for the first team at the beginning of the 1960/61 season when he was just 16 years old and was an ever-present during that season. A strong player who has proved his worth in a good defence.

Keith Morgan (Right-half)

Born Trowbridge. A tall, fast, attacking player who progressed through the club's junior teams after joining the Swindon ground staff at the age of 16 years. He has been a regular player for the Town's first team.

Mel Nurse (Centre-half)

Was signed from Middlesbrough at the beginning of last season. He is a strong forceful player and is an International with Wales. His ability and experience has done much to strengthen the team's defence.

Stan Harland (Left-half)

Born Liverpool. Signed during the close season from Carlisle United. He's a forceful player who is able to go forward to back up the forwards in attack.

Eric Weaver (Outside-right)

Born Rhymney. Joined the club from Southern League Trowbridge Town after service with the R.A.F. Played representative football in the Services and, since becoming a professional with Swindon, has proved his worth, being able to play in most positions in the forward line.

Roger Smart (Inside-right)

Born Swindon. Another local-born player who joined the club direct from Swindon Schoolboys' team. At 17 years of age he was appearing regularly at centre-forward in the reserve team, but he excels as a deep-lying inside-forward or wing-half.

Donald Rogers (Outside-left)

Born Paulton. A player of outstanding ability who has long been the target for many of the English First Division clubs. He has played for the England Youth

team and also for the England Under-23 XI.

Joe Butler (Full-back)

Born Newcastle and joined Swindon from Newcastle United in August, 1965. A tenacious player whose speed and ability amply makes up for his lack of inches. He played for Newcastle junior teams and graduated to the senior ranks before joining the Town.

Ken Skeen (Inside-forward)

Born Cheltenham. He played originally as an amateur for the Town club but subsequently joined Trowbridge Town and rejoined Swindon as a professional in September, 1964.

Rod Thomas (Full-back)

Born Glyncoerrwg. A former youth player with the club whose speed and strength has made him a reliable defender. Made his debut in the first team last season.

Bruce Walker (Outside-left)

Born Westwood Lay. Joined Swindon from County football. Though he is not a big player his ability and speed make him a menace to any defence.

Willie Penman (Centre-forward)

Was signed from Newcastle United in September last for a considerable fee and was formerly with Glasgow Rangers. A clever inside or centre-forward.

We conclude our resumé of the visitors by giving a few more details of their past history; for instance we note their ground record is a capacity one of 28,400 made for a Cup visit by Stoke City in February, 1952.

Their best performances in the F.A. Cup were Semi-Final appearances in 1910 and 1912 (they lost to Newcastle United and Barnsley) and their biggest-ever defeat was sustained in this competition when in January, 1930 (in a replay at Maine Road) they lost 10-1 to Manchester City!

This margin is also their best-ever in their own favour in any senior game for, also in the F.A. Cup, they defeated Farnham United Breweries in the First Round in 1925 by a similar score.

One small matter of interest is that their pitch (117 yards in length) is one of the biggest in the Football League (it is some two yards longer than our own) so they'll feel at home on our spacious ground and, able to play free-flowing confident football as the 'underdogs' against us, will be flat out to record an outright win.

Nothing in football, and in Cup-ties especially, can be regarded as a foregone conclusion and our visitors will merit and get exactly the same sort of approach from our boys today as if they were, like ourselves, one of the elite of the First Division.

Forest Sportrait No. 10

FRANK WIGNALL

The subject of our 'Sportrait' this afternoon is Frank Wignall who, against Newcastle United in the Fourth Round of the F.A. Cup, scored his 50th goal for the club.

It will soon be four years since he joined the City Ground staff from Everton—actually he signed for us on the 13th June, 1963. In this time he has proved a very useful signing indeed even though his career with us has been interrupted through unfortunate injuries.

Born at Blackrod, Lancs., Frank began playing football seriously with Horwich R.M.I. in the Lancashire Combination League and it wasn't long before several of the bigger League clubs in the area began

to see tremendous possibilities in this well-built attacker.

It was May, 1958 when he decided to join Everton just a few months before our chief, Mr. John Carey, took over at Goodison Park the same year (in October) but it was 22nd September, 1959 before Frank made his league debut against Burnley.

During his spell with Everton he played in 33 league games and scored 15 goals. It was around the end of the 1962/63 season that our then Manager, Mr. Andy Beattie, saw in Frank the answer to a centre-forward problem that had been plaguing us for some time. In fact, since Tommy Wilson had left us for Walsall, we had lacked a hard, fast, free-scoring leader of the line.

After a spell of negotiating with Everton we were able to persuade Frank to join our staff in the summer of 1963 and he made his debut for us in the opening game of the 1963/64 season against Aston Villa at City Ground on 24th August.

He ended that season as our leading league goalscorer with 16 successes and included in that total was a 'hat-trick' at Bolton. In October, 1964 he was selected to play for the Football League against the Irish League (the first Forest player to be so honoured for over 30 years) and celebrated with three goals. Then later the same year he was twice 'capped' for England (against Wales and Holland) scoring both his country's goals against Wales at Wembley.

He had 14 goals in 1964/65 and ended as joint top-scorer with Colin Addison but in May, 1965 in a County Cup game here at City Ground, he suffered a fractured leg bone that deprived him of a possible chance of England World Cup selection and ourselves of his services for a long spell for he played in only 19 games last season.
