Man of the Moment

NOW even Billy Molyneux will believe that patience is rewarded. Last Saturday he stepped out with the first team at Walsall, for his senior debut after waiting

16 months for the opportunity.

It's an unexpected turn of events which will probably prompt the 24-year-old 'keeper to re-consider the transfer request he understandably popped at Latics several weeks ago. Playing understudy for such a lengthy period, few people were really surprised when Billy's patience finally exhausted and he decided to seek League Football elsewhere.

But now the position has dramatically changed. The sale of David Best to Ipswich Town, for a fee quite similar to that paid by Latics for his services (from Bournemouth) on September 2nd, 1966, has brought Billy into the spotlight. Being on the losing side at Walsall wasn't exactly the start he had been plaint for, but at least he is now making headway.

The frustrations of playing second fiddle to a popular choice like Best-he was voted Player of the Year by fans earlier this year-are too obvious and need little elaboration.

It's only last March that Billy was wise-cracking that he was the most under-employed senior player on the club books. The Lancashire Combination side were steaming for promotion and Billy complained: "It's nice to be winning regularly, but it gets a bit chilly at

my end on a winter's day. There's nothing to do in many of these matches."

Opportunity hasn't knocked very often for the club's Scouse wit. When he was on Liverpool's pay-roll he spent two-and-a-half years waiting for manager Bill Shankly to upgrade him. And when promotion did come, it was a give-away gesture . . . a debut against Wolves, doomed for relegation in the final week of the season. Liverpool needed their first team favourites for a stiffer match in the F.A. Cup Final against Leeds United later that same week.

It was his one and only League outing in front of Anfield's packed house. The way things were shaping at Boundary the situation was looking just as bleak.

Billy signed for the club, on a free transfer, in June 1967. But until his move to Ipswich, Best kept a firm grip on the first team jersey and remained an ever-present from that day until the week of his sale. So Billy has waited . . .

Now he's thrust into the League limelight. And he comes in at a very delicate stage with Latics having one of the worst defensive records in the Football League. Only once this season, in the home match with Rotherham, have the team kept a blank sheet. On the other 15 occasions (this includes two League Cup games) the defence has been breached at least once.

Billy hopes to rectify matters. He's a man that matters very much in these moments of distress. Good luck to him, and long may he reign in first team football. Remember, today will only be his third full League match—and Billy is 24. So he's deserved this break.

THE BOUNDARY BULLETIN

BELIEVE it or not, but there's not all that much difference between our present plight anchored at the bottom of the Third Division and the situation in October last year. And while I don't offer this comparison as a consolation, just remember that virtually the same Latics team showed its ability to rally from a deep state of depression and finish in 17th place, comfortably removed from relegation anxieties, when the 1967-68 programme ended.

I realise that such a performance isn't good enough in the eyes of fans who demand far more, but it will help lighten the load as the team seek some psychological uplft for the difficult days to come with games against promotion pace-setters Swindon Town (today's visitors), Bournemouth (our next home game) and a tricky trip to Plymouth Argyle sandwiched in between.

On October 24th last year the team was firmly battened to the bottom with the following record:

Pd. 13, W 2, D 2, L 9, F 13, A 22, Pts. 6 ... Position 24th Before this afternoon's match with Swindon, the record looks even more grim:

Pd. 14, W 1, D 2, L 11, F 7, A 31, Pts. 4 ... Position 24th

The differences are noticeable, though figures can be twisted to tell many stories. But it is fair to assume that a similar effort to the one which the players started to sustain from this point last year would be capable of hoisting us from such depths. We are not the hopeless cause which many people care to consider us—and what is more important, the display at Walsall last week when the team took the lead through a first half goal from Les Chapman, was highly encouraging.

Manager Jack Rowley put it this way: "If the team can show as much fight in future matches, only this time carry it right through to the final whistle, we will not have too many worries about obtaining points. It was their best display since I took over."

The newspaper critics at the match were convinced we were heading for that elusive first victory away from Boundary, and my Midlands colleague on "The People" newspaper, Charles Carr, wrote: "It looked odds-on Oldham's first away points of the campaign. But they made the mistake of celebrating too early." And earlier in his report he said that Walsall's 2—1 victory was "daylight robbery". And, honest . . . I didn't prompt him.

It really confirms all that was said about the match by the Latics manager, and shows why optimism continues to exist among those associated with the club.

There couldn't really be a stiffer task for the team to get back in the groove and repeat last years recovery than the arrival of Swindon this afternoon, the Wiltshire club currently sharing top place in the table with Bournemouth and, no doubt, preening themselves after the fourth round replay victory over Coventry City in the League Cup replay last Monday night.

This promises to be THE season for Swindon, a club which has baffled me because of its failure to obtain promotion in either of the last two seasons when the team strength has appeared superior to anything else in the Division.

Victory for Latics would certainly start our revival on a high note and wouldn't exactly put Swindon out of the running for better status.

This is the first opportunity to record the departure of goalkeeper David Best to Inswich Town and to thank the westcountryman for his consistent service. He signed from Bournemouth in time for a September 3rd debut in 1966 and was only two games hort of completing a century of League appearances for the club. When he figured in his final match, at home to Watford on October 12th, it was his 98th outing in the Third Division side—a remarkable record of consistency in such a short space of time.

On the front page a warm welcome is extended to his replacement, the patient Billy

Molyneux. Let's hope his stay in the senior squad is just as long-probably longer.

There's a nostalgic trip coming up for manager Rowlev on Monday night, November 4th, when the juniors go to Wrexham for their F.A. Youth Cup Tie. The Latics chief was once in charge of the Welsh club so he will have some background information to pass on to the youngsters when the trip comes up.

There will be several new names in the Latics team, but some of the lads from last winter's youth squad will again be on duty—one year wiser in the demands of this type of soccer. The knock-out at Manchester City last season was a great anti-climax after so much hope had been pinned on the youth side, so we'll take this season's competition with more caution. However, I can't resist predicting that Latics are capable of overcoming Wrexham, which would make it a happy return for manager Rowiey.

Newcomer on the staff is full back Alan Duff, a 22-year-old who set on his soceer career with Manchester United. More recently he has been in South Africa with the wellknown Highlands Park club, and has returned home with a warm recommendation from his manager over there, former Arsenal favourite, Alex Forbes.

Alan has started a month's trial here, and we wish him well.

Thumbing through my diary of events at Boundary I note that the response to the film show of the all-time great European Cup Final between Real Madrid and Eintracht (Germany) has been so huge that it has been decided to stage two showings of the game next Tuesday night. The first house, for which all tickets have been sold out, will start at 7-30 p.m. in the Boundary Club—and there will be a re-run of the match at 9-30 p.m., for which some

Nobody needs reminding what a soccer treat this game was. But if you wish to have your memory jogged, make sure you get a seat in the circle next Tuesday.

A Benefit Concert has been arranged, too, for the club's ex-Irish international Billy Johnston, who has been forced to quit football through injury. It will take place on Monday, November 18th . . . at WATERSHEDDINGS, the Rugoy League club's headquarters.

It's the kind of liaison between the two sports which is very much appreciated by Latics. Tickets for the Concert will be available next week, and the artistes are being booked by Jack Glynn, who is responsible for entertainment at the Boundary Club, and Bernard Quinn, compere at the Oldham Football Club's social headquarters.
