
FROM THE MANAGER'S CHAIR

SK any manager or club official what he reckons is the most crucial period of the season and his answer is almost certain to be: the Easter programme.

For this, invariably, is the stage when championships are won or lost; when promotion and relegation issues are virtually decided.

This afternoon's visit of Swindon Town is the first of four games within a week for Shrewsbury. And it goes without saying that

the club's destiny will depend largely on how we fare in these vital matches.



Our performance at Home Park merited both points for, as the Plymouth officials readily acknowledged after the game, we were the better side. Yet again we left an opponents' ground with their officials and supporters alike pondering how a team that produce this standard of football is propping up the Third Division. Certainly we created the chances to have won and won handsomely, and Plymouth owed a big debt to goalkeeper Pat Dunne for keeping a point intact. Judged both from the football and work-rate points of view, I rated this an excellent all-round performance by Shrewsbury—with a special mention for trialist Bob Tooze for a very good penalty save just before the interval.

With a continuation of the spirit the lads showed at Plymouth we must still stand a chance of success in our fight for Third Division survival.

Thirty-eight points was last season's safety margin, and if the same applied this time we would need to average only slightly more than a point a game from our remaining matches to escape the drop. But this time I am very doubtful whether that points tally will be enough, and for that reason we must really go all out to cash in on the advantage of having seven of our remaining eleven matches at the Gay Meadow. Obviously our prospects of remaining in the Third Division will be that much better with the wholehearted support of our home crowd backing the players.

It remains for me to extend a sincere welcome to our visitors this afternoon, Swindon Town, whose achievement in winning the Football League Cup must reflect great credit on Third Division standards. Without doubt they will prove formidable opponents, for they need points to further their promotion ambitions as badly as we need them to retain our status. It should prove an entertaining game, and if, as I hope, we take the points on merit, it could well provide the stimulus we need to do well in our remaining games.

OUR VISITORS

Peter Downsborough (Goalkeeper). Born in Halifax, he actually captained the town schools' rugby football team. It was at the Association game that he really made his mark, however, and joined the Halifax Town club. He joined Swindon in August, 1965, in a part-exchange deal which took inside forward Bill Atkins north. Height,

5 ft. 11 ins., weight 13 st. 2 lbs.

Rod Thomas (Full Back). Aged 22, and with 3 full Welsh 'caps' and several Under-23 international appearances to his credit, few League players can have had the rapid rise to success that he has enjoyed. When Owen Dawson was taken ill in October, 1966, Thomas had made only 5 appearances in the first team-two of which were at inside forward. Joined Swindon as a youth player from Gloucester City. Height,

6 ft. 1 in., he weighs 12 st.

John Trollope (Full Back). A football League record was broken on the opening day of the 1960/61 season, when Trollope made his first appearance in the Town's first team against Halifax. Like his right back partner, Terry Wollen, he was aged 17, and they became the youngest-ever pair of full backs to appear in a League game. When he broke his arm at Hartlepools on 24th August, Trollope was making his 368th consecutive Cup and League appearance for the Town, and had been an everpresent for seven seasons.

Joe Butler (Wing Half). Born at Newcastle-upon-Tyne, he graduated through the city's schools' team before joining Newcastle United. When he joined Swindon for £5,000 in September, 1965, it was as a full back. It was Manager Danny Williams who decided to convert him to right half, and he soon settled into the

midfield role.

Frank Burrows (Centre Half). A Scot, born in Larkhill, he played for Raith Rovers before leaving his native country to join Scunthorpe United. It was to the Scunthorpe club that Danny Williams paid the sum of £12,000 for Burrows' services last July. 6 ft. tall and weighs 12½ st.

Stan Harland (Wing Half, Captain). Born in Liverpool this long-striding wing half started his career with Everton. He then moved to Bradford City and on to Carlisle United before joining Swindon at the beginning of the 1966/67 season. He took over the mantle of team captain when Trollope was injured and immediately proved himself completely suitable to the role. 6 ft. 1 in. and weighs 12½ st.

Don Heath (Outside Right). Joined Swindon from Norwich City in September, 1966 for a fee believed to be in the region of £7,000. He was born at Stockton-on-Tees, and was on Middlesbrough's staff before joining Norwich on a free transfer in 1964. 5 ft. 8 ins., and weighs 11 st. 8 lbs.

Roger Smart (Inside Forward). Another product of Swindon schools' football, he joined the Town ground staff in 1960, and signed professional the same year. He is the "Roger Hunt" of the Swindon team, always putting pressure on the opposing defences with a non-stop display of hard

and sensible front-running.

John Smith (Inside or Centre Forward). Born in London has previously played for Leyton Orient, West Ham, Tottenham Hotspur, Coventry City and Torquay United. He joined the Town from the latter of these in June last year for little more than £7,000, and quickly established himself as one of the bargain buys of the year. A former England Under-23 international, weighs 13 st. and is 5 ft. 8 ins.

Peter Noble (Inside Forward). Born at Sunderland, he joined nearby Newcastle United and quickly came to the fore as a lively 'striker'. A little on the light side for this job, he makes up for his slight lacking in physique by clever foot-work and the ability to climb really high for wing crosses. He joined Swindon from New-castle in January last year for a fee of £10,000. 5 ft. 8 ins. and 10 st. 10 lbs.

Don Rogers (Outside Left). Born at Paulton, Somerset, he joined Swindon as an apprentice and was quickly hailed as a future "star". Since he made his first appearance during the 1962/63 season, he has quickly developed into one of the most sought-after young players in the country. He has twice played for the England Under-23 team. He is 5 ft. 10 ins. tall and weighs 12 st. 10 lbs.

Willie Penman (Inside Forward). Born in Wemyss, Fife, he started his career with the mighty Glasgow Rangers, but was transferred to Newcastle United in 1963. He was signed by Swindon in August, 1966, for a fee of around £10,000. 5 ft. 8 ins.,

and weighs 10 st. 10 lbs.


