Our Visitors

Swindon Town are no ordinary Second Division club. It must not be forgotten that last season they not only gained promotion from the Third Division but won the Football League Cup beating Torquay, Bradford City (away), Blackburn Rovers, Coventry City (away), Derby County (away), Burnley in the semi-final replay and Arsenal at Wembley in the process.

It is not the first time they have been in Division Two. When they came up in 1963 they went right to the top but failed to maintain that impact. This time they are not doing at all badly. In the F.A. Cup Third Round they won 4-0 at Blackburn. Then beat Chester 4-2 at home in the Fourth Round.

They suffered a close-season shock when Mr. Danny Williams resigned the managership to take over as team manager of Sheffield Wednesday. Mr. Williams had been behind the promotion and League Cup success. Swindon's board knew who they wanted to take over the reins. Fred Ford had impressed when he spent five months at Swindon carrying out scouting and coaching duties under Mr. Williams after leaving the management of Bristol City. He had returned to Bristol as team manager of Rovers but could hardly refuse the unanimous offer of Swindon's board. After leaving his coaching job the Swindon club showed their appreciation of his efforts by presenting him with a canteen of cutlery.

Mr. Williams policy was to see that this time the side would have the ability to stay in Division Two and make their challenge as strong as possible. Mr. Ford who took over only three days later has carried on with this aim. The £32,000 received by the club for winning the League Cup was available and Mr. Williams had paid out £17,000 for Newcastle's Arthur Horsfield who cost £18,000 four months before from Middlesbrough.

Apart from Mr. Williams' present connection with Wednesday he was, of course, well-known locally as a Rotherham United player and their manager for three years. He went to Swindon in 1965.

A Yorkshireman in the team is goalkeeper Peter Downsborough who hails from Halifax and played for Halifax Town. But, perhaps the player who has received most publicity is Don Rogers whose goal in the last minute of extra time made the League Cup safe, thrilling the millions of TV viewers and the capacity crowd as he made that tremendous dribble downfield to finally side-step the goalkeeper and place the ball in the net.

He entered football a month after his 17th birthday in October 1962, and two years later was in the England Youth team who won the tournament in Holland by beating Spain. He scored two of the four goals and was voted the outstanding player of the tournament.

Between the stripes

It is no use crying over spilled milk and we don't intend to. The result of the F.A. Cup-tie at Derby was by no means what we had hoped. As Mr. Harris said afterwards, we were the better side in the first half and, if we had scored then, as we deserved, it would have been a different story. Derby got the goals against the run of play. But that's football. It is the results which counts and that showed a decisive victory for our opponents. The record also showed a club in Division One defeating one in Division Two. Our exit could have been far more ignominious.

We felt we had some bad luck. Decisions went against us. The booking of Eddie Colquhoun seemed rather harsh in the circumstances. He went for the ball on a slippery surface. Notice of appeal has been given. On top of this we had to face suggestions that we refused to help County out of difficulties regarding tickets. You may have seen that we thought it necessary to answer with a statement pointing out that we asked for only the allocation to which we were entitled and, even then, we had to wait a week before we obtained some degree of satisfaction.

Had they approached us and told us of their troubles we would have gone out of our way to assist. But we really had to protest when our quota of the best seats contained tickets of lower-priced accommodation. Any suggestion that we wanted more than our entitlement is without foundation.

Now, back to the League battle, which is of paramount importance. The defeat of Preston took us again to the top of the Division though Huddersfield quickly overhauled us and went racing ahead

with two successive home wins. We cannot afford to slip. Our position means added tension for the players but they are determined to prove equal to the demands being made on them.

There is a splendid team spirit these days and 100% effort can still do the trick. It means so much, not only to them but to the club and the supporters who are so loyally behind them. Things are not easy when so much is at stake. Other clubs have been helped by fielding an unchanged team. Just as we thought Dave Powell had overcome the misfortune which seems to have dogged him, he damaged a leg and the injury proved worse than was at first thought. Repeated spells of treatment failed to cure the trouble as quickly as was hoped. It certainly wasn't for want of trying on Dave's part. He hates being out of the game. Fortunately John Flynn has proved a good deputy. What a tremendous fight back our lads made at Hull after being two goals down. Congratulations to all for a splendid "double" to keep us well in the promotion battle and it is good to see our captain continuing among the scorers.

We have mentioned our loyal supporters. Many of them came along to the Cherry St. Pavilion a couple of weeks back for the Supporters' Club Social. It was a merry affair and it can truthfully be said that a good time was had by all. Among those who came along were Mr. Harris, with the club secretary, Mr. Arnold Newton, and the assist. secretary, Mrs. Norma Webster. Players who joined in included Gil, Reece, Alan Woodward, Ted Hemsley and Roger Welch. The evening augered well for the future of the Supporters' Club and for making the event an annual one of some importance on the social side.

Most of the following should be in tonight's line-up :

Peter Downsborough, a product of local football, was signed from Halifax Town in August 1965. Born Halifax.

Rod Thomas, former youth player with the club, came from Gloucester City in July 1964. Full Welsh and Under-23 international. Born Glyncoirwg.

John Trollope is a local lad who joined the ground staff from school. Played for First Team at beginning of 1960-61 season when just 16. With his partner of the same age they were the youngest pair of full-backs ever to play together in the League.

Joe Butler joined from Newcastle United in August 1965 having graduated to the First Team through the junior ranks. Native of Newcastle.

Frank Burrows, a Scotsman from Larkhill, was formerly with Raith Rovers. Went to Swindon from Scunthorpe Utd. where he had three seasons.

Stan Harland, born Liverpool, was signed from Carlisle United in July 1964. Was formerly with Everton and Bradford City. First appearance at start of 1966-67 season.

John Smith can play on the wing or inside. Signed from Torquay United in June 1968 and was previously with Leyton Orient, West Ham, Spurs and Coventry. Born London. Under-23 international.

Roger Smart is another local player who joined straight from the Swindon Schoolboys' team. Can also play at wing-half.

Arthur Horsfield was a close-season signing from Newcastle United for a reported £17,000 fee. Previously with Middlesbrough whom he joined as a Youth international.

Peter Noble also came from Newcastle United in January 1967. Played for them for four years. Born Scotland.

Don Rogers, born Paulton. Signed by Swindon when only 15. Youth and Under-23 international. Last season's top-scorer with 22 League goals. Sought after by many clubs.

Don Heath signed from Norwich in September 1967. Formerly with Middlesbrough where he served as apprentice professional.

Chris. Jones was signed from Manchester City as a centre-forward. Played for City in America. Born Altrincham.

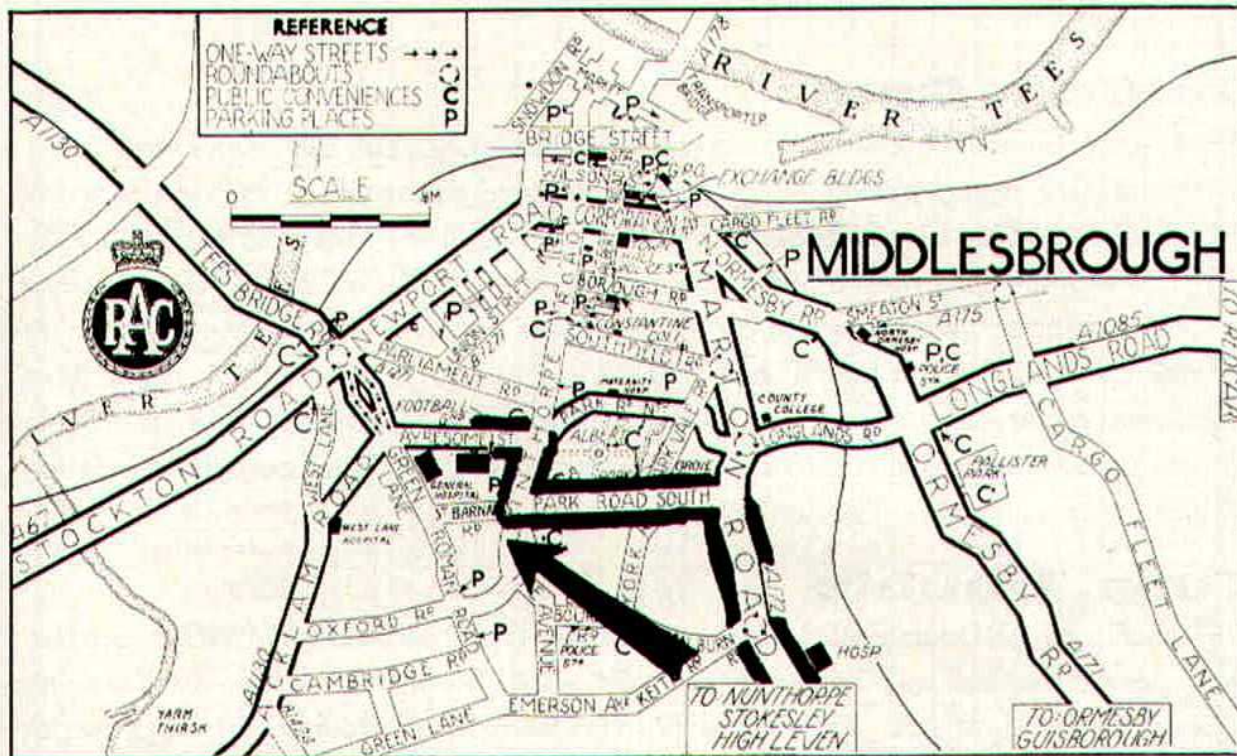

Many of our supporters write to us with helpful comment, with queries about past and present players, sometimes critical, more often to express pleasure. Despite the disappointing result at Derby, our display against Everton still brings acclaim. Here are just a few which may be of interest.

5 Kilton Crescent, Worksop, Notts.

It was with interest and nostalgia that I noticed the name of your second XI goalkeeper, Gough. Could he be related to the Goughs of Sheffield United just after the First World War? The particular reason for my interest is that on my first visit to a first-class football match at Bramall Lane many years ago just before the kick-off I decided to go to the toilet. My father gave me the directions from our seat in the stands. However, I got lost and to my surprise I opened a door and walked into the United dressing-room. I was paralysed and wondered what was going to happen to me. Gough, the goalie, must have noticed my embarrassment and got up off his seat asking me what I wanted, and when I told him he took me by the hand and took me outside and found the toilet for me. Believe me, although I was frightened at first I was very thrilled to have been in the company of some great players, Sampey, Fazackerley, Sturgess, Milton, McLean who, incidentally, I believe, scored the goal in a 1-1 result. If you could fill in the players of that team for me I would be very grateful.

I don't think there is a more loyal Blades supporter than my son Michael, although he has only seen them about five times. His grandfather, Len Mellars has a season ticket and took him in the stand the Christmas they beat the Saints (the local club in this district) 4-1. My father began taking me to the Lane when I was about six years old, my best schoolboy memories being when the Blades won the "Northern League" during the war, and the Christmas days when we walked from Shiregreen for the 11 a.m. kick-offs, the smell of cigar smoke and orange peel and the Brass Band playing Christmas Carols. From this you can easily see why Michael became a Blades fan. His grandfather sends us all the Blades programmes. His

bedroom is covered with football pictures with pride of place given to the Blades team photo which hangs over his bed. His most prized possession is a red and white shirt he received for Christmas. His favourite bedtime story is when I tell him about the day I saw the Blades beat the Owls 7-3 after being a goal down (1951, if I remember right).
