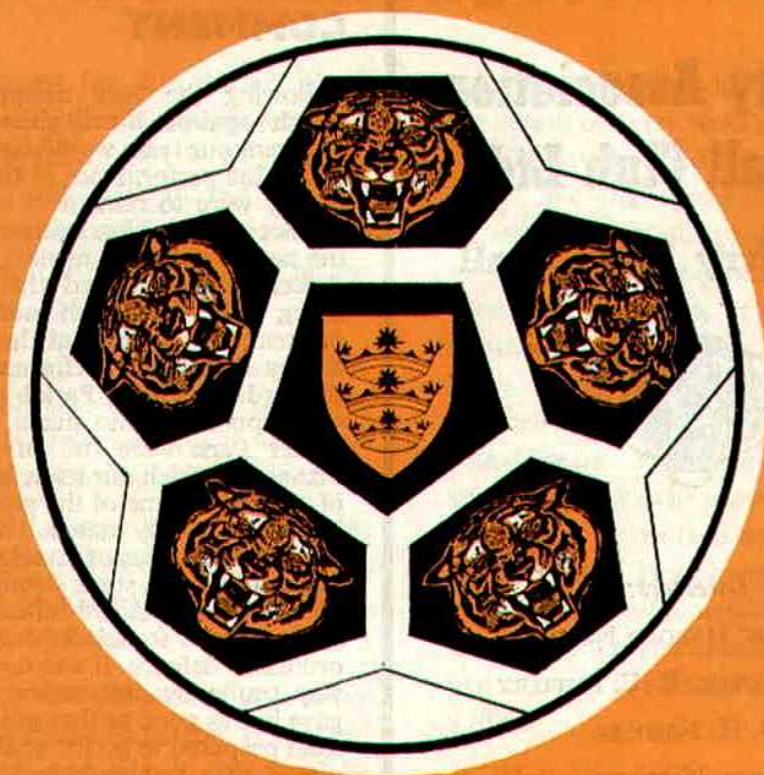

COMMENT

Following the very disappointing home match against Birmingham City it was apparent our team would have to pull out a really fine performance in their next match if they were to remain in contention with the Second Division leaders. The fact that the next match was against Sunderland at Roker Park suggested that the task was going to be that much more difficult. But our team 'came good' at the right time and a very impressive performance gave them the verdict at Roker Park by 1—0. Those of our supporters who made the journey to Roker Park were full of praise for the manner in which our team set about the job of regaining some of the ground lost in the Birmingham City match. Though the home side set up a series of attacks from the start and really put in some strong front running our defence remained intact and the home side's attacks foundered on some well co-ordinated defence. It was not, however, one way traffic by any means and our team gave just as good as they got, and with both sides prepared to go for goals the game was played at a fast pace and proved a most entertaining match for the spectators. Our goal was scored by Chris. Chilton, and those who saw this goal scored will long remember it as one of our finest of any season. This was Chris's 200th goal for the Tigers, and gave us a very valuable victory both from the points and morale point of view.

The following Saturday we faced Orient at Brisbane Road and once again met a team who had given very little away at home in this season's matches. Though not as quick moving as the Sunderland match it was nevertheless played at a good pace, but we never quite found the cohesion which had been so predominant in our match at Roker Park a few days earlier. Once again it was Chris. Chilton who notched the winner for us and thus provided the Tigers with four very well earned away points in a week.

Terry Neill is unable to write in this week's programme due to pressure of work, but he has advised us that it is not true we are seeking applications for Penalty takers. He does however, wish it to be known we are improving in this matter of Penalty kicks as he at least hit a post, which our supporters must agree is an improvement on recent efforts.

All we can say to Terry is, if you think it's bad enough on the field taking 'em, come and sit or stand with some of our supporters who watch and wait and wonder. The suspense is so great we are now saying to the Referees, 'Penalty Ref., never'.

Whitehouse, Leiper, Jones, Raisbeck, Wolfe, Martin, Wilkinson, Spence, Howe, Rushton and McKiernan. The goals were scored for City by Rushton.

We doubt very much if anyone here today will recall this match in person. If you can drop us a line and tell us. We shall be pleased to hear from you.

Mr. P. A. Bull of Cliff Road, Hornsea wants to know the names of the scorers for Hull City when they defeated Carlisle United 11—1 on the 14th January, 1939. This was a 3rd Division (North) match, and the team was:

Ellis, Woodhead, Dower, Robinson, Blyth, Hardy, Hubbard, Richardson, Dickinson, Davies and Cunliffe. And the scorers in this our highest ever win were, Dickinson 3, Davies 2, Cunliffe 2, Hubbard 2, Richardson and Robinson.

AROUND AND ABOUT DIVISION II

Another away win—at Orient last Saturday—gave us our 10th away point of the season. It was a particularly meritorious performance for Orient are an extremely difficult side to beat at Brisbane Road—this was their first home defeat and Chris Chilton's goal was only the second they had conceded at home all season.

In an earlier programme, I remarked how difficult it was becoming for away teams in Division Two. Yet, last Saturday, the form book was turned completely upside down as five of the away clubs collected both points.

Oxford's magnificent 4—0 win at Ashton Gate equalled their best away win since they joined the Football League. And it was Bristol City's worst home defeat since March 1962 when they went down by a similar score to Portsmouth.

Another fine away win was Luton's 5—1 success at Sheffield Wednesday. A hat-trick from Malcolm Macdonald took his goals total to 13. Since losing 2—4 at Bolton on the opening day of the season, Luton have conceded only four more goals in 13 League and Cup games and been beaten only twice—by Leicester in the League, and Arsenal in the League Cup. Now they are poised to complete a fantastic recovery. The Hatters lost their First Division place in 1960 and, within five years, sank into Division Four. Yet next spring—a mere three years after winning the Fourth Division Championship—they could possibly regain their First Division status! No club has ever fallen from the First to the Fourth Division and risen back to the top again. After a poor start, Middlesbrough are now climbing steadily up the table with some performances which indicate they are in real promotion form again. A week after recovering from a 1—3 deficit at Cardiff to win 4—3 they gave Portsmouth a 2—0 lead then pulled back to win 3—2. So poor old Pompey, who were on the point of celebrating their first League victory at Middlesbrough since 1949/50, had to postpone their celebrations.

Birmingham City, yet again the Second Division's best supported club, flopped once more at St. Andrews. Sheffield United beat them 1—0.

One source of disappointment for us is that, as our team rises up the table, so our attendances are falling.

Introducing . . .

SWINDON TOWN

When the final tables were compiled last April, Swindon Town were seen to have missed promotion to the First Division by only three points. But so far this season they have been unable to re-capture the impetus which made them such a force in the Second Division last season.

Very encouraging for Swindon Town fans was their teams showing in the first Anglo-Italian tournament this summer. They reached the final of the 12-club tournament and were awarded the trophy after the final against Napoli in Italy was abandoned because of riots, when they were winning 2-0. This was Swindon's second great victory over Italian opponents—last season they defeated AS Roma 5-2 on aggregate in a challenge match between the Italian and English League Cup winners.

With all these triumphs behind them, Swindon were looking for a morale-boosting start to their League programme. But to date have averaged less than a point per game with their opening fixtures. Nevertheless, they will have drawn great confidence from their splendid 2-0 League Cup victory over Liverpool ten days ago.

We extend a warm welcome to Swindon Town this evening and look forward to an exciting game. The team is likely to be selected from:



ROY JONES (Goalkeeper). A Swindon discovery who was introduced to League football in 1967/68 but who has been kept out by the consistent form of Downsborough. Returned for two games this season.

League record: Swindon 21 aps.



ROD THOMAS (Right-back). Rod is now first-choice at full-back for Wales. He is the only player in post-war soccer to win his first seven full caps while playing in Third Division football. He helped Swindon back into the Second Division in 1969. Swindon picked Rod up from Gloucester City and put him in the senior side in 1965/66. Scored the only League goal of his career at Aston Villa last season.

JOHN TROLLOPE (Left-back). A Swindon discovery, John made his League debut in 1960 and remained in the side for an incredible run of 360 consecutive League games, the sequence ending when he broke an arm at Hartlepool in 1968. He returned as soon as he was fit again and was ever-present last season.

League Cup winners medal (1969).

League record: Swindon 429 (1) aps., 14 gls.



JOE BUTLER (Right-half). Joe entered League football with Newcastle in 1963/64 and joined Swindon in 1965. He was originally a full-back but has switched, with considerable success, to wing-half.

League record: Newcastle 3 aps.; Swindon 168 (1) aps., 6 gls.



FRANK BURROWS (Centre-half). Frank left Raith Rovers to try his luck in English football with Scunthorpe in 1965. In his last two campaigns, before joining Swindon in 1968, he missed only five League games and he has continued to perform consistently well since his move.

League Cup winners medal (1969).

League record: Scunthorpe 106 aps., 4 gls.; Swindon 92 aps. 3 gls.



STAN HARLAND (Left-half). Stan made several abortive attempts to break into professional football before he eventually succeeded. He was an amateur at Burnley, turned pro with New Brighton then had a go with Everton—but he didn't make the League side. Bradford City gave him his League debut, then he spent two seasons at Carlisle before joining Swindon four years ago.

JOHN SMITH (Outside-right). Former England youth and under-23 cap, John kicked off with West Ham as a wing-half. After holding a regular place for four years, he moved to Tottenham in 1960 but rarely got a League game with Spurs. Consequently, he joined Coventry City, then had short spells with Orient and Torquay before linking with Swindon in 1968.

TONY GOUGH (Inside forward). Tony, picked up for a song from Bath City this summer, made a remarkable return to League football this season, after a 12-year absence, at the age of 30!. He scored in his first game for Swindon against Sunderland. Tony was once a part-timer with Bristol Rovers, made one League appearance for them in 1958/59, but decided against a full-time career then. He spent all the intervening years with Bath City.

ARTHUR HORSFIELD (Centre-forward). Swindon's leading scorer with 22 League and Cup goals last season, he was quickly off the mark with 6 in the opening games. Middlesbrough spotted Arthur in Newcastle junior soccer and he continued his scoring ways in their reserve teams until given his chance in the League team in 1963/64. He started a short stay at Newcastle in January 1969, moving to Swindon only four months later. He is a former England youth international.

League record: Middlesbrough 107 (4) aps., 51 gls.; Newcastle 7 (2) aps., 3 gls.; Swindon 50 aps., 22 gls.



PETER NOBLE (Inside-forward). A native of the North-East, Peter started with Newcastle and cost Swindon £10,000 in January 1968. Last season he bagged hat-tricks in successive games against Charlton (League) and Swansea (League Cup) and has netted four times this season.

League record: Newcastle 22 (3) aps., 7 gls.; Swindon 105 (4) aps., 34 gls.



DON ROGERS (Outside-left). An England under-23 international, Don has been a regular for seven seasons and top scorer for three of the past four campaigns. Last season he scored only 10 goals. Many First Division clubs have made fabulous offers for him but so far Swindon have been able to hang on to their prize asset. He scored both goals which knocked Liverpool out of the League Cup last week.

Chris Chilton scored his 200th goal for the Tigers in our match against Sunderland at Roker Park, and we congratulate him on this fine achievement. Chris continued in the scoring vein when he registered his 201st goal for us against Orient last Saturday, this being his 177th League goal for the Tigers. His other 24 goals being scored in F.A. and Football League Cup matches.

Malcolm Lord completes his 50th League appearance for the Tigers today. Malcolm made his 1st XI debut against Birmingham City at the St. Andrew's ground on 27th March 1967. He joined the Tigers full-time staff on 28th July, 1965. In his first three seasons he completed eleven 1st XI appearances, and in seasons 1968/69 and 1969/70 became a more regular member of the 1st team squad making 27 appearances. So far this campaign Malcolm has been an ever present in the senior side with 11 appearances. Malcolm has notched four goals for the Tigers during his 1st XI career.

Swindon Town today's visitors held a unique place in our record book. It was against them at Boothferry Park on 19th January, 1963 that the Referee abandoned the match at half-time with the score 0—0. This match is the only one to be abandoned at Boothferry Park since the ground was opened in 1946. The match was replayed on the 18th May, 1963 and ended in a 1—1 draw.

The replayed Match was notable for two events. Firstly we recorded our first-ever home goal against the Wiltshire side in this match, John McSeveney being the scorer. We had played Swindon Town three times at Boothferry Park prior to this match and had never been able to find a way through the Railway-men's defence. Secondly it was in this match that we had our own was-it-or-was-it-not-a-goal controversy. When Swindon Town 'scored' it was claimed the ball had only entered the side netting. This claim was very sportingly supported by some of the Swindon Town players but the Referee ruled a goal and that was that.

JUNIORS

Last Saturday our Juniors gained a 0—0 draw against Sunderland at Sunderland. It was a much more exciting and lively game than the scoreline may suggest. Both teams played some good open football and the defences of both teams had to keep on the alert throughout the match. The Young Tigers gave a very good account of themselves and on the whole were well worthy of the point they gained.

Next week the Juniors commence their Cup Trail. They face current N.I.L. Leaders, Newcastle United in the 1st round of the 1st leg of the N.I.L. Cup at the Hull Road, Cottingham ground, K.O. 2.00 p.m. The second leg will be played at Newcastle the following Saturday.

Our Win at Orient provided us with our fourth away win of the season, and therefore we have equalled the total number of away wins gained in the whole of our 1969/70 campaign. Another four points from away matches will see the Tigers 'bag' of 13 points gained on tour last season exceeded.

Our First Meeting with Swindon Town at Boothferry Park was on the 1st September 1958 and resulted in a 0—0 draw. Our team for that match was: Bly, Harrison, Durham, Collinson, Feasey, Bulless, Duncan, Bradbury, Morris, Coates and Bowering. The attendance was 12,035.

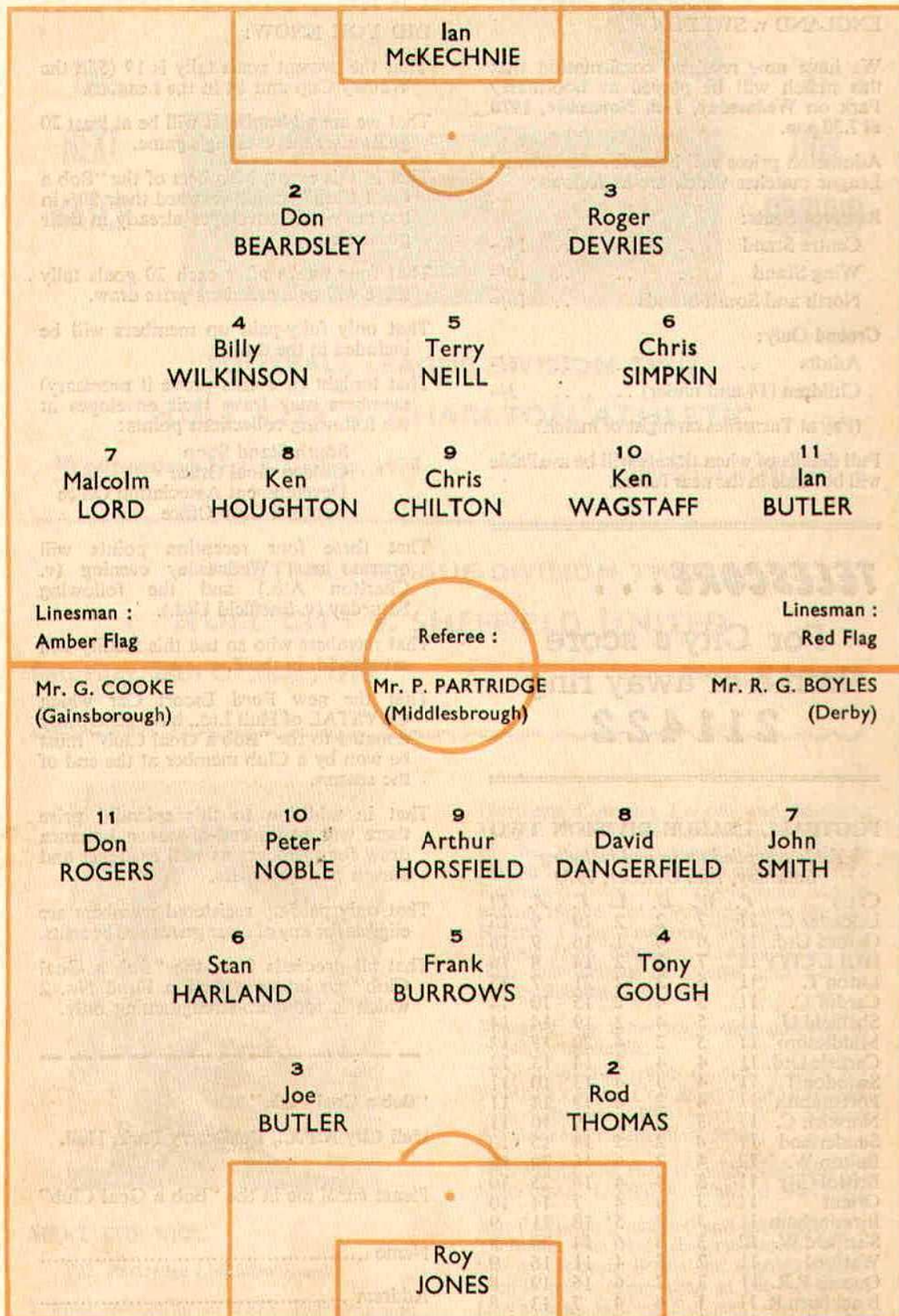
