

Review Chat-in

WHAT IS A FOOTBALLER? This was the question Hunter Davies tried to answer in the Sunday Times, just recently and he came up with these opinions in an extremely readable article.

FOOTBALLERS are an elite unto themselves. They think no-one outside the game understands them, least of all the football writers. But they don't communicate with each other in words. It's all a matter of feeling. A manager exhorts them by his presence and personality, not by his prose.

Footballers live in semis, don't smoke, hardly drink, only swear at each other, wear conventional clothes, go early to bed. Footballers are rarely like Georgie Best.

Footballers have left school at 15, have fathers in unskilled or semi-skilled jobs, are not interested in politics, never read hard back books, are still working class, have no airs and graces, drive Ford cars, have pretty wives who stay at home and know their place. Footballers like Tony Bennett, Frank Sinatra, Chinese meals, tea rather than wine, watching TV, and calling their children Darren, Grant or Lee.

Every member of a successful First Division club can make £200 in a good week. About fifty of them are household names to millions of people. About five of them are treated like pop stars. This is why it is sometimes expected today that every footballer should somehow be other than ordinary.

The real way in which he's so extraordinary is that from the age of 13 he's known he's going to be a professional footballer and because of that, the rest of the world has been shut off. Like all successful sportsmen, from racing drivers to swimmers, he has been isolated in a hothouse and one part of him developed to such an extent and at such an early age that the rest of him becomes lopsided.

He can earn the same as some Government Ministers, but he'd be hard put to tell you the name of any. He stays in the best hotels in Europe but if he had to ring up himself and book a room he probably wouldn't know how.

Footballers stick to their class. In showbusiness proper, the stars change their style and their friends as often as they change the size of their billings. But footballers, however often they are compared with pop stars, are isolated and uninfluenced. You just couldn't imagine a footballer following a Maharishi.

ON PARADE,

PETER DOWNSBOROUGH (goalkeeper): Born Halifax. Signed in August, 1965 from Halifax Town where he was a product of local football. Regular member of promotion-winning side of season 1968-69, played in Football League Cup-Final winning team of season 1968-69, League Cup-Winners' Cup winning team of 1969 and played in Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition winning team of season 1969-70.

ROD THOMAS (full-back): Born Glyncorrwg. A former youth player, he was signed from Gloucester City in July, 1964. Has gained Welsh Under-23 caps and full caps. Regular member of promotion-winning side, played in Football League Cup Final winning team, League Cup-Winners' Cup winning team of 1969 and in Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition winning team.


JOE BUTLER (full-back): Born Newcastle. Joined Swindon from Newcastle United in August, 1965 where he graduated to the senior ranks through the club's junior team. Regular member of promotion-winning side, played in Football League Cup Final winning team, League Cup-Winners' Cup winning team, and Anglo-Italian winning team.

JOHN TROLLOPE (left-back): Born Swindon. A local player who joined the Swindon ground staff from school. He was selected for the first-team at the beginning of the 1960-61 season when he was just 16 and was ever-present during that season. Together with his partner that year, who was also 16, they were the youngest full-backs ever to appear as a pair in League Football. Regular member of promotion-winning side of season 1968-69, played in League Cup Final team, League Cup-Winners' Cup team and in Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition.

ROGER SMART (right-half): Born Swindon, Another local player who joined the club direct from Swindon Schoolboys' team. At 17 he was appearing regularly at centre-forward in the reserve team, but he excels as a deep-lying inside-forward. Regular member of promotion-winning side and played in League Cup Final winning team, League Cup-Winners' Cup team and Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition.

FRANK BURROWS (centre-half): Born Larkhall, Scotland. Joined the club from Scunthorpe for whom he played three seasons. Formerly with Raith Rovers. A strong defender who has made his mark in the first-team. Regular member of promotionwinning side of season 1968-69, he played in League Cup Final team, League Cup-Winners' Cup team and in Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition.

STAN HARLAND (left-half): Skipper of the side. Born Liverpool. Was signed from Carlisle in July, 1966. Formerly with Everton and Bradford City. He has been a regular choice at left-half since making his debut at the beginning of the 1966-67 season. A forceful player who likes to go forward, Regular member of promotion-winning side of season 1968-69 he played in League Cup Final, League Cup-Winners' Cup and in Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition.

TONY GOUGH (half-back): Born Bath. Signed for Bristol Rovers from Bath City at the age of 17 and subsequently returned to Bath. Signed from Bath City July, 1970, to return to League Football.

DON ROGERS (winger): Born Paulton. He was signed by Swindon when only 15 and gained many England Youth international caps and subsequently played in the England Under-23 team. Regular member of promotion-winning side of season 1968-69, played in League Cup Final, League Cup-Winners' Cup and in Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition.

PETER NOBLE (inside-forward): Born Sunderland. Joined the club from Newcastle in January, 1968, for whom he played for four years. Prefers to play an attacking role. Regular member of promotion-winning side of 1968-69, he played in League Cup Final team, League Cup-Winners' Cup team and in Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition.

JOHN SMITH (inside-forward): Born London. Signed from Torquay in June, 1968, and previously played for Leyton Orient, West Ham United, Tottenham Hotspur and Coventry. Former England Under-23 international. Regular member of promotion-winning side of season 1968-69, he played in League Cup Final, League Cup-Winners' Cup team and in Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition.

ARTHUR HORSFIELD (Inside-forward): Born Newcastle and signed from Newcastle United 18 months ago. Previously played for Middlesbrough whom he joined as a Youth international. Top scorer last season. Played in League Cup-Winners' Cup team and in Anglo-Italian Inter-Club Competition.
