news & views

A real welcome to our friends from Birmingham. We always look forward with great pleasure to meeting them either here or away. We eagerly await our visit to St. Andrew's, where Swindon invariably take a large party.

Last season in our away game on 31st October, 1970 we lost 1-2, the winning goal coming in the last minute. The return game, played on 27th February, 1971, was a very fine display by both teams with Birmingham an outfit of fast, hard, non-stop runners. Result: Swindon 1, Birmingham 2. A great disappointment for Swindon, as we matched our opponents in every department.

Up to that result we still had an outside chance of promotion to Division 1. Sheffield United was in first position with 39 points and Hull second with 38 points. Swindon occupied eighth place with 32 points, but with a game in hand, and an excellent goal average. One place above us with 35 points was Leicester City (who gained promotion) and Birmingham City was in tenth position with 30 points. The result virtually destroyed any chance of promotion for Swindon.

Talking of goal average, it is interesting to note that with the frequent clamour for strikers and goal scorers and the lack of goals, a periodical recently published a table of goals scored from 1960/61 to 1970/71. Peterborough head the list with 926; Spurs are in second position with 883; Swindon (believe it or not), occupy 26th

place with 755. Last place, apart from Cambridge United, is Oxford United with 526. Blackpool is 87th with 623; Aston Villa 86th with 628. Even Arsenal occupy 29th place with 751 and Manchester City 41st with 733. So in the matter of goals scored Swindon seem to have done pretty well.

Followers of Birmingham City are confident they will soon be back in the First Division, and they should be for they have a fine ground, capable of holding something like 50,000 people, and the whole club is geared up for it.

Unfortunately they have not found the consistency required to clinch promotion. At times they can be brilliant, and at others throw their supporters into the slough of despair. At present they occupy eighth position in the League table with 12 points from 11 games. Swindon is in fourteenth place with 10 points from 11 games. Birmingham has a good home record having won four games and drawn one, but away they have drawn three and lost three, having scored only two goals with five against.

Like Swindon Birmingham has spent much money on ground improvements, and also produce a very good magazine programme to keep in touch with their supporters. In fact, they are what is known as a 'with it' outfit, very much alive to all the possibilities of promotion.

Ambition is their spur, not only for honours but to put the city back in the limelight it enjoyed in the immediate post-war seasons, but also to meet the challenge of Aston Villa, whose fans still cling fanatically to that club.

The city of Birmingham, with its million-and-a-half population, is ready and waiting

to cheer again, anxious to be on a par once more with those other great provincial soccer centres of Manchester and Liverpool. We wish them well, but hope it is our turn first, or better still we accompany them to First Division football.

Our reorganised Reserve Team is now giving some very fine displays. Composed mainly of young players, with a sprinkling of experience, this team is very fit and keen. They are sharp, quick on the ball, and full of running. They have put up some excellent performances away from home at West Ham, Swansea and Cardiff. Time was when Combination games attracted up to the five thousand spectators. We wish we could see half that number at the County Ground, but at the same time realise a large number of our supporters follow the first team away from home.

Referring back to our previous paragraph of goals scored we must point out however that the number of goals has decreased considerably over the past eleven seasons. In 1960/61 the total was 6,985 and in 1970/71 the total dropped to 5,123. So the annual goal output of the Football League clubs fell by the depressing number of 1,862, or by just over 26%.

Obviously the present trend of defensive football has a bearing on these figures, but unfortunately these figures themselves seem to have a bearing on attendances.

Keith Bowker

Former West Bromwich schoolboy inside-forward. Joined Blues as an apprentice in 1966 and turned professional on the 15th August, 1968. Was a member of the successful youth team reaching the F.A. Youth Cup Final in 1966/67. Made his first team debut on the 3rd October, 1970 against Hull City and made 12 first team appearances in all last season.

Alan Campbell

Born Arbroath. Joined Charlton Athletic straight from school as a striker, but soon changed to his present mid-field role. Gained a Scottish Youth International cap and one Under-23 cap. Moved to St. Andrew's on the 14th October, 1970 making his first team debut versus Queen's Park Rangers on the 17th October. Made 31 first team appearances in 1970/71.

Roger Hynd

Born Falkirk and joined Glasgow Rangers from Lanark Grammar School. Spent 10 years at Ibrox Park until transferred to Crystal Palace on the 21st June, 1969. Joined Blues on the 28th July, 1970 and made 48 League and Cup appearances last season.

Mick Harrison

Born Leicester. Member of the Mid-Leicester and Leicester County school side and a final England Schoolboys finalist. A member of the 1970/71 Youth side who reached the semi-finals of the F.A. Youth Cup. Made his first team debut in his home town of Leicester at Filbert Street on the 16th January, 1971.

Trevor Francis

Plymouth born who joined the Blues as an apprentice and turned professional in April 1971. A member of the 1970/71 youth side who reached the semi-finals of the F.A. Youth Cup. Has gained England Youth Caps and was a member of the successful England team in the Little World Cup held in Czechoslovakia. Made first team debut at the age of 16 on the 5th September, 1970 versus Cardiff City and in all made 26 League and Cup appearances scoring 15 goals.

Dave Latchford

Elder brother of Bob Latchford was discovered playing for South Birmingham Schools and joined Blues as an apprentice in May 1966. Member of the England party in European Youth Tournament played in Turkey in 1967. Made his first team debut against Bury on the 8th April, 1969. Made 9 first team appearances last season.

Dennis Thwaites

Born Stockton-on-Tees, an England Schoolboy and Youth International who joined Birmingham City as an apprentice in 1960. Made his first team debut on the 9th September, 1961 against Swindon. Can play either on the left-wing or mid-field.

Dave Robinson

Bartley Green born, joined Blues apprentice staff from schoolboy football, signed professional in May 1966. Made his debut at centre-half versus Aston Villa in September 1968. Made 45 League and Cup appearances last season.

Gordon Taylor

Born Ashton-under-Lyme. An England Schoolboys trialist who joined Bolton Wanderers straight from school. Has a degree in Economics and a preliminary F.A. Coaching Certificate. Joined Blues on the 17th December, 1970 and made his debut against Carlisle on the 19th December. Made 23 League and Cup appearances.

Bob Latchford

Local boy playing for South Birmingham Schools and Warwickshire County before joining elder brother Dave at St. Andrew's as an apprentice in May 1967. Became a professional in August 1968 and made his first team League debut at centre-forward against Preston on 21st March, 1969. Played for England in International Youth Tournament held in East Germany in 1969. Made 42 League and Cup appearances scoring 13 goals in the 1970/71 season.

Ray Martin

Joined Villa as an apprentice from South East Staffordshire Boys but was released at the end of the 1960/61 season. After a trial he joined Blues apprentices and became a full-time professional in May 1962. League debut was against Manchester United at Old Trafford on 11th January, 1964. Made 41 League and Cup appearances in 1970/71 and won the Supporters' Club 'Player of the Year' for the second year running. Succeeded Trevor Hockey as club captain.

George Smith

Born in Newcastle-upon-Tyne. Played for Barrow and Portsmouth before joining Blues from Middlesbrough in exchange for John Vincent on the 9th March, 1971. Made his first team debut against Orient on the 13th March and made 9 first team appearances in all.

Garry Pendrey

Former Aston Schools player who joined Blues as an apprentice and signed professional on 13th October, 1966. Was a member of the successful youth side who reached the F.A. Youth Cup Final in 1966/67. First team debut was against Bolton on 25th March, 1969. Made 31 first team League and Cup appearances in 1970/71.

Mike Kelly

Northampton born, but London by adoption. Was very successful as an amateur playing for Surrey F.A. Youth team and Wimbledon in the Isthmian League. Won an Amateur Cup winners medal and was capped for England in 1965. Joined Queen's Park Rangers in 1966 and replaced Ron Springett until moving to St. Andrew's in July 1970. Made 41 League and Cup appearances last season.

Malcolm Page

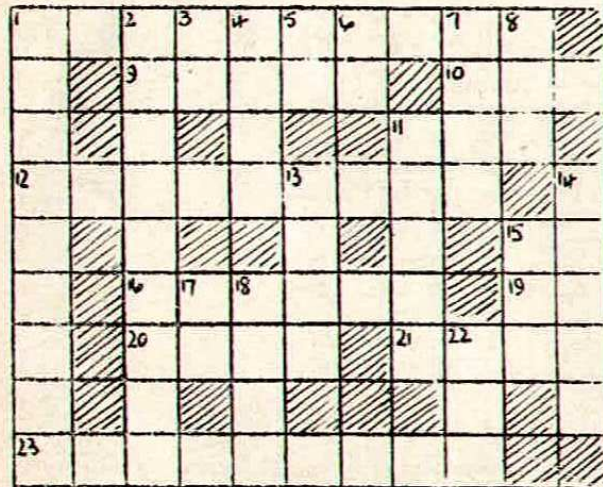
Born Knucklas (Radnorshire). Signed professional forms on 22nd September, 1964 and made his first team debut against Everton on the 6th February, 1965. Was selected for Wales against Finland in 1971 and has gained Under-23 honours including the captaincy. Made 32 League and Cup appearances last season.

Phil Summerill

Discovered on Aston Villa's doorstep playing for Aston Schoolboys. A left-winger who was taken on to the professional staff on the 7th December, 1964 after a spell as an apprentice. Member of the England Youth Party - Yugoslavia 1966. League debut was at St. Andrew's against Carlisle on the 18th March, 1967. Made 40 first team appearances last season ending as top scorer with 21 goals.

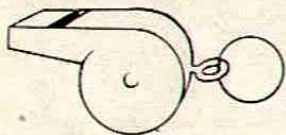

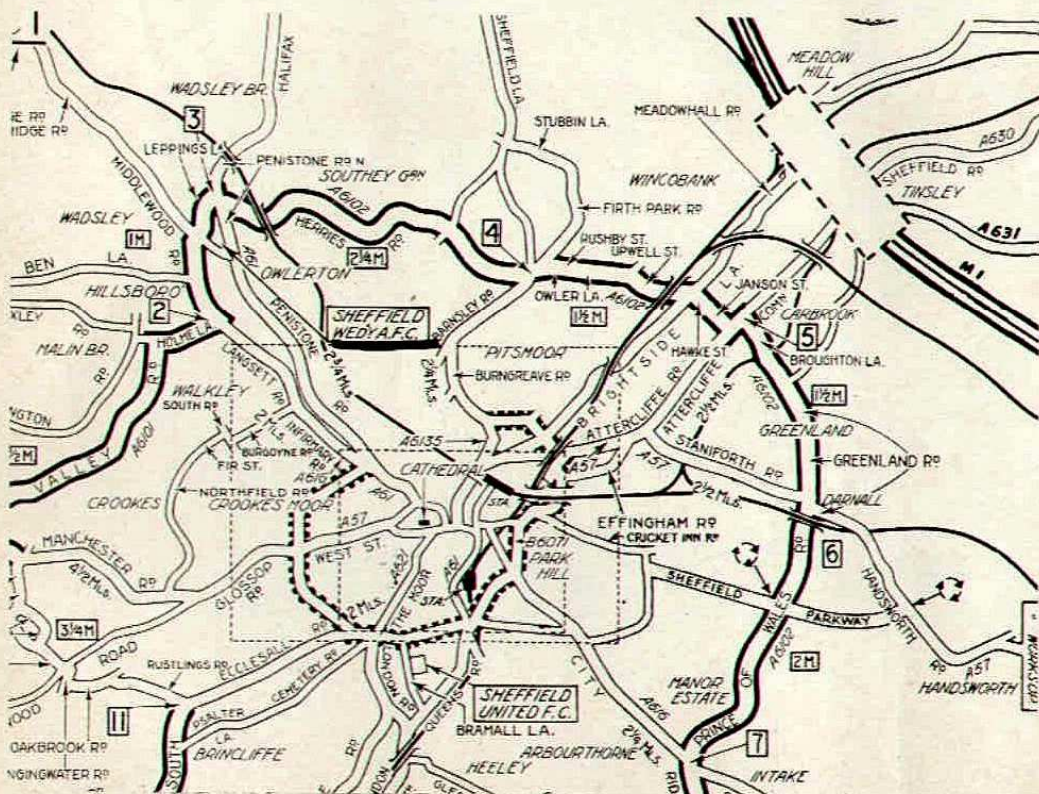
