news & views

All supporters will know of the departure of Mr. Ford, a grand fellow held in esteem throughout the football world. He deserved a better fate. However, that is football, in fact it is life. One minute up, and the next down. He will no doubt be back in football in a very short time.

A certain amount of reorganisation has been necessary resulting from the change of manager. Mr. Anderson has been put in charge of training and coaching. This left the young players, both in the Reserves and the 'A' team, without an experienced man to guide them. It was felt the person for this post was Maurice Owen. His example to these lads of service and loyalty, extending over twenty-five years, his attitude, behaviour and disposition both on and off the field and his undoubted skill and ability as a player. He is certainly a man to whom all young players 'look up to' and endeavour to follow.

The game at Oxford was most enjoyable. The home team had most of the play in the first half, but Swindon took over in the second. A draw was a very fair result. This was a hard fought local derby, yet there was not one stoppage for injury, although the game was full of incident.

We were sorry to hear of the illness of one of the noble workers in the past for Swindon Town F.C. Charlie Hopkins was one of a fine body of people who helped the Club voluntarily in the early fifties, when it was in financial difficulties. He was the general 'factotum', doing any job, from helping on the ground to putting up notices, but his main concern was with the Junior team playing in the Gloucestershire Northern Senior League. He was responsible for the whole of the kit for this team, and he also acted as linesman. I recall one amusing incident at Cinderford. Charlie was running along the line, fell flat on his face and did not move. With some alarm the trainer at that time (Rodney Carlyon), went dashing off and when he reached him said: 'What have you done?' 'I've broken my braces' came the reply. Many men in the 35 to 40 age group have much for which to thank this kind, warm-hearted man.

This afternoon we welcome once again Millwall, our old friends of Southern League days, now riding high near the top of Division 2, with sights on promotion. They will provide stiff opposition for our team. To date they have only lost one game away from home, won 2 and drawn 4. Swindon has lost 4, drawn 4 and won 1. Those records are almost equal, except Millwall's goal average is 11–10 and Swindon's 3–9.

Last season Swindon defeated Millwall at the County Ground by 3 goals to nil. We were a little fortunate to win by this margin as Millwall played really well. The return fixture resulted in a draw of two goals each, and a very fine game. Our opponent's form this season is rather remarkable, as the team is almost identical with that of last year. Their goalkeeper, Bryan King, recently watched by other clubs, had a trial with Swindon. He was turned down by the then manager, as being too small to make the grade – a mere 5ft 8in. Today he stands a powerful 6ft 4in, and is one of the most

consistent and brilliant goalkeepers in the Second Division. His transfer from Chelmsford City in 1967, for £4,500, proved Manager Benny Fenton a fine judge of his great potential.

Next Saturday we play Preston North End here on the County Ground, equalling the number of home and away games, thus showing us our true position. To date we have obtained six points away from home; quite a good record, just a few more shots going into the net of our opponents and we should rise in the League table.

Bryan King (Goalkeeper)

Born Bishops Stortford, age 24. Signed for Millwall in June 1967 from Chelmsford City, and is now considered one of the best custodians in Division 2.

Harry Cripps (Full-back)

Born Plaistow, age 30. Club captain, he is now commencing his 11th season with the Club whom he joined from West Ham United in July 1961. 10 goals last season and one of the most popular players at The Den.

Brian Brown (Full-back)

Born Shoreditch, age 21. Established his place in the League side during the 1969/70 season after joining the Lions from Chelsea in March 1968. One of the Club's most improved players last season.

Dennis Burnett (Wing-half)

Born Bermondsey, age 27. Experienced defender with over 200 League appearances to his credit he joined Millwall at the start of the 1967/68 season from West Ham United.

Barry Kitchener (Centre-half)

Born Dagenham, age 23. Took over as the first team pivot in 1967 at the age of 19. Worked his way up through the Club's junior teams to become a very highly rated defender.

David Coxhill (Wing-half)

Born Northfields, age 19. Previously an amateur with the Club since 1967, signing professional forms in June 1970, and making his League debut at the end of last season.

George Jacks (Wing-half)

Born Stepney, age 25. Joined Millwall from Queen's Park Rangers in July 1965. A 100% player in whatever role he is asked to play.

Steve Brown (Forward)

Born Peckham, age 19. Another former Youth player he signed apprentice forms in April 1968, and became a fulltime professional in June 1970. Made his League debut during last season.

Gordon Bolland (Forward)

Born Boston, age 28. Joined Millwall in October 1968 from neighbours Charlton Athletic. Has also played for Chelsea, Orient and Norwich City.

Eamonn Dunphy (Forward)

Born Dublin, age 26. A current Eire International he was transferred to Millwall in January 1966, after playing for Manchester United and York City.

Derek Possee (Forward)

Born Southwark, age 25. Signed from Tottenham Hotspur in August 1967, for a then record transfer fee. Scored 14 goals last season to be second highest goalscorer.

Barry Bridges (Forward)

Born Norwich, age 30. Joined the Club in September 1970 from Queen's Park Rangers for a record fee. A former England International he has also played for Chelsea and Birmingham City. Leading scorer last season with 15 goals and toured Australia last summer with the F.A. party.

Billy Neil (Forward)

Born Midlothian, age 26. Signed from Bonnyrig Rose in March 1964. Has now recovered from a knee operation carried out in November 1970 which restricted his first team appearances last season.

Doug Allder (Forward)

Born London, age 19. A former England Youth International he became an apprentice professional in April 1968, and then a full-time professional in October 1969. Is now an established member of the first team squad.

Alan Dorney (Wing-half)

Born Bermondsey, age 24. He has been with the Club since the age of 16 – first as an amateur, then as a part-time professional and finally as a full-time professional, signing in 1968. Now firmly established in the first team.

Billy Holmes (Forward)

Born Balham, age 20. Signed as a fulltime professional for the Club during the summer of 1970 after playing as an amateur with Woking.

Millwall — a brief history of the club

Across

The Club was formed in 1885 when it was known as Millwall Rovers. It consisted then of employees in Messrs. Morton and played on land near the Millwall Docks in a part of East London known as the Isle of Dogs, so called we are told because Queen Elizabeth I kept her hunting dogs there when she resided in the Royal Palace at Greenwich, which is on the opposite side of the River Thames. In 1890 the Club moved its headquarters to another part of the 'Island' to a piece of ground in East Ferry Road and at the same time adopted professional status. Two years later they won the Luton Charity Shield and the Middlesex Junior Cup. In 1893 the Club became known as Millwall Athletic and joined the Southern League which had just been formed and remained in membership until 1920 when it joined the newly formed Division 3 of the Football League. In 1910 the Club had moved its ground to the South side of the River to New Cross to its present site, and having already acquired the nickname of the Lions appropriately christened their new ground The Den.

In 1928 Millwall were promoted to Division Two and remained there for six years. They were relegated to Division Three in 1934, but jumped back again in 1938. Ten years later they were back again in Division Three and in 1950 were compelled to apply for re-election. In 1958 the Football League formed the Fourth Division and Millwall by virtue of their position in Division Three (South) at the end of the season prior to the formation of the new division were placed in Division Four. There then followed years of struggle to get back into the Third, which was eventually achieved in 1962. Two seasons later, however, the Club found itself back again in the Fourth Division, but not for long. Back they came the following season, and this was followed up with promotion to Division Two. It was during this period that the Club wrote its name in the history books of Football by creating a new record for consecutive home games without defeat. The Club went 59 games at home without defeat, and it is the sort of record which is unlikely to be equalled or beaten in the modern set up of soccer.


Millwall has reached the Semi-Finals of the Football Association Challenge Cup on three occasions in its history — in 1900, 1903 and 1937, the last occasion being the first time a Third Division club has reached this stage of the competition. In the Semi-Final Sunderland beat Millwall on the Huddersfield Town ground by 2–1 and Sunderland eventually won the Final. Also during this Cup campaign the Club's ground attendance record was set up, 48,327 spectators saw the cup-tie at The Den against Derby County.

During its long and varied history Millwall has had many well known personalities and Internationals on their playing staffs, both amateur and professional. Names to recall are 'Tiny' Joyce, a giant of a goalkeeper who, the ancients tell us, could throw a ball from one end of the field to the other. Bill (Banger) Voisey, who apart from playing for his country was in charge of International teams when they were on tour. W. I. Bryant, Amateur International centrehalf. Tom Brolly, Irish International, Charlie Hurley and Pat Saward, Eire Internationals and Lawrie Leslie who was a Scottish International goalkeeper. On the staff today. John Gilchrist, a former Scottish Schoolboy International, and Eamonn Dunphy has been capped many times for Eire. Alex Stepney, now with Manchester United, also started his professional career with Millwall and was transferred to Chelsea at a record fee for a goalkeeper.

The Club colours have changed over the years. For many years the colour was blue, now they play in an all white strip.


