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news & views

The New Year began well for Swindon with a resounding 4-2 victory at Fulham, after being twice in arrears, and a great victory for the Reserve team after a magnificent game. To defeat such a good side as West Ham United is in itself a great achievement, but the match proved to be one of the best seen on the County Ground this season. Splendid football by both teams, and play moving from end to end with great rapidity. Trainer Maurice Owen had every right to be proud of his lads after this display.

Reverting to the senior team the result could not have been better, it is almost as good as four points to Swindon. We have now played twenty-four games, and obtained twenty-three points, almost a point per match. Eleven games have been played at home, with eleven points gained from four wins, three draws and four defeats. Thirteen away games have been played, and twelve points won, one more than at home, but with two more matches played. Nevertheless, is it a rare occurrence for a team at any period of the season to obtain more away points than home ones.

This away record is one of the best ever, but unfortunately our home games have not produced the usual results. We now have three home games in succession, if we include the Arsenal cup-tie. After we have played Hull City on 22nd January, our home

League games will equal the number played away. If we can win our two games our position will be greatly improved.

Apart from Norwich City, the margin of points between the teams is very small. Sunderland is in fourth place with twenty-nine points. Fulham is fourth from bottom with nineteen points. A difference of seventeen places but only ten points.

Our visitors today occupy fifth position in the table with twenty-seven points. Swindon is in thirteenth place with twenty-three points. Strangely, Carlisle United is not what is called a fashionable side, possibly because of its rather remote position. They will provide strong opposition, as they are considered a team with good away form. To date they have won four on opponents' grounds, and drawn one.

Last season's game was our last at home, and resulted in a 0-0 draw. Carlisle proved to be much the better team, playing neat, determined football. Actually they came very near to promotion, finishing the season in fourth position.

Carlisle's top scorer last season was Hatton with 18. He was recently transferred to Birmingham City, thus joining one of our players, Stan Harland, who himself had a short spell with Carlisle. In fact he came from that Club to Swindon.

Probably Carlisle's best achievement was to reach the Semi-Final of the League Cup in 1969/70, a year after our winning of the trophy. They defeated West Bromwich Albion one goal to nil at home, but lost 1-4 at The Hawthorns.

CHRIS BALDERSTONE (Forward)

Born Huddersfield. Joined United from Huddersfield Town in June 1965 and up to the end of season 1970/71 had made 281 League and Cup appearances for the Club, scoring 58 goals. Had a successful season with Leicestershire County Cricket Club in 1971.

FRANK BARTON (Forward)

Born Barton on Humber. His only other professional club was Scunthorpe United from whom he was transferred to Brunton Park in January 1968. Has made 136 League and Cup appearances and scored 18 goals for United up to the end of last season. Gained Youth International honours.

TOM CLARKE (Goalkeeper)

Born Ardrossan. Joined Airdrie from a Scottish Junior side and moved south to Carlisle in July 1970. Although appearing in numerous friendly and tour matches was not called on for League or Cup duty last season.

JOE DAVIS (Full-back)

Born Glasgow. Started his professional career with the now defunct Third Lanark before moving on to Hibernian for whom he was a 'regular' for a number of seasons. Transferred to United in December 1969 and up to the end of last season had made 64 League and Cup appearances.

BOB DELGADO (Half-back)

Born Cardiff. Started his professional career in the Southern League with Barry Town where he attracted the attention of Luton Town. Released by Luton at the end of last season and accepted an offer to join United.

STAN TERNENT (Half-back)

Born Felling-on-Tyne. Joined United from Burnley, his only other professional club, in May 1968 and in his first three seasons with the Club made 135 League and Cup appearances scoring three goals.

BOB HATTON (Forward)

Born Hull. Joined United from Northampton Town in July 1969 and in 96 League and Cup appearances to the end of season 1970/71 had scored 39 goals. Previously with Wolves and Bolton Wanderers.

DEREK HEMSTEAD (Full-back)

Born Scunthorpe. His only previous club was Scunthorpe United from whom he was signed in July 1969. In his first two seasons at Brunton Park made 74 appearances and scored one goal.

LEN KINSELLA (Half-back)

Born Alexandria, Scotland. Signed from Bursley, his only previous club, in September 1970 and made 10 League and Cup appearances last season.

BOBBY OWEN (Forward)

Born Bolton. Started his professional career with Bury and was later transferred to Manchester City for a sizeable fee. After a spell on loan to Swansea City he joined United in June 1970. In his first season scored 13 goals in 37 League and Cup appearances.

TOMMY MURRAY (Forward)

Born Caldercruix, Scotland. Was one of the leading scorers in Scotland when he was signed from Airdrie in March 1967. Made 138 League and Cup appearances, scoring 41 goals to the end of last season.

DENNIS MARTIN (Forward)

Born Edinburgh. Signed in June 1970 from West Bromwich Albion, for whom he scored against United in the 1969/70 League Cup Semi-Final. Finished his first season at Brunton Park with 43 appearances and 12 goals.

ALLAN ROSS (Goalkeeper)

Born Glasgow. Went to Brunton Park in June 1963 from Luton Town. Has come close to winning a Scottish 'cap' on numerous occasions and has travelled with the national team. 288 League and Cup appearances to the end of last season.

JOHN GORMAN (Full-back)

Born Winchburgh, Scotland. Signed from Glasgow Celtic in September 1970 and although he had to wait a few months for his debut, quickly showed his ability and finished the season with 24 League and Cup appearances.

MIKE SUTTON (Half-back)

Born Norwich. Started his career with his home town club before moving to Chester from whom he joined United in June 1970. Made 40 League and Cup appearances last season and his solitary goal came in his debut match at Middlesbrough on the opening day of last season.

STAN WEBB (Forward)

Born Middlesbrough. Cut short his University studies to sign as a professional for his home town club. Signed for United in February 1971 and up to the end of last season had scored four goals in six League appearances.

GRAHAM WINSTANLEY (Half-back)

Born Croxdale, Co. Durham. Joined United in August 1969 from Newcastle United, his only other professional club. Has made 96 League and Cup appearances and scored six goals for United up to the end of last season.

The future is ours collectively to work for – let us make a determined start now.



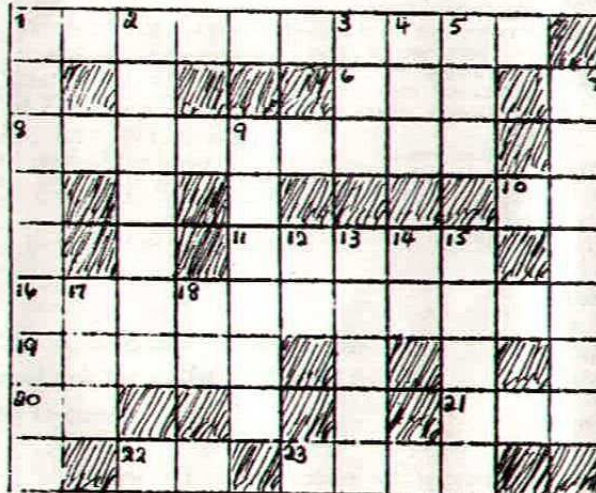

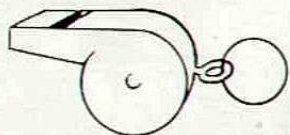

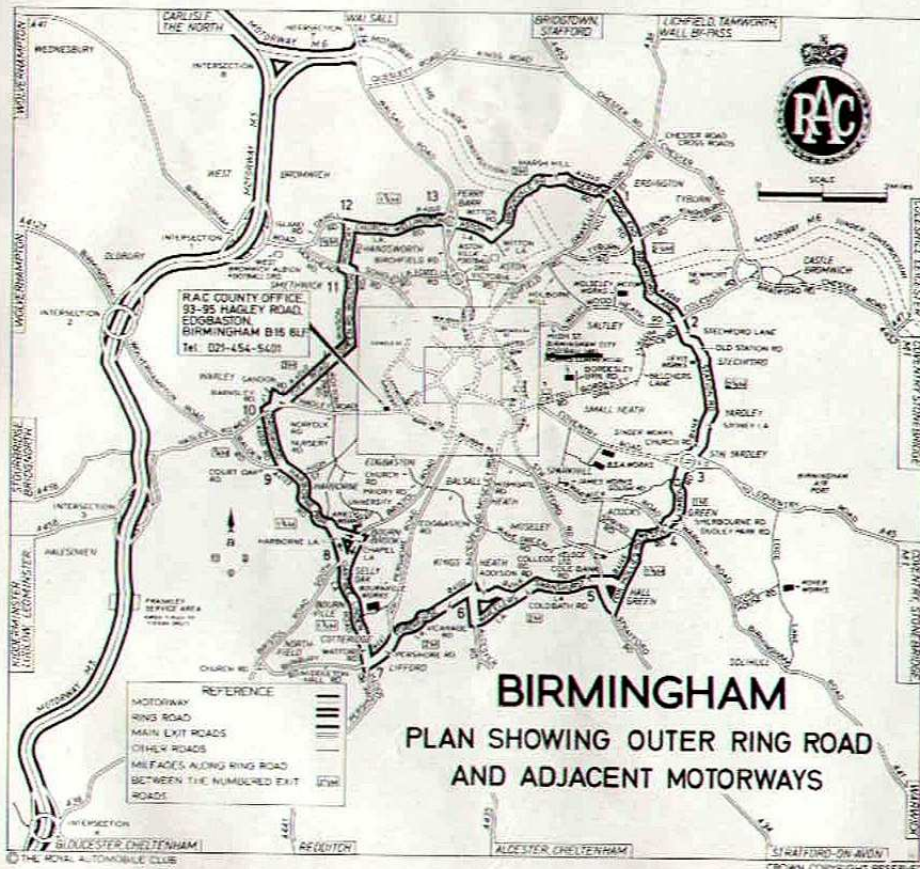
