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news & views

Tonight we welcome once again our friends from Luton. Like ourselves they were prominent members of the Southern League and became founder-members of Division Three (South) when it was formed in season 1920/21. In fact they were our opponents in the opening game of the competition.

Like ourselves they have not enjoyed a particularly good season at the time of writing, Luton occupy sixteenth place in the League table with thirty-four points from thirty-eight games. It is worth noting however, that away from home they have won two and drawn nine, with thirteen goals for and twenty-one against. Quite a good away record. Mentioning away form, Swindon's this year is better than for many seasons, having won five and drawn five, producing fifteen points out of our total of thirty-six. Swindon are in twelfth position with thirty-six points from thirty-six games, so there is little difference between the two teams. Both should be free from relegation worries, but many things could happen yet. Some clubs suddenly find their best form on the 'run in', for instance Liverpool, who could still surprise many by winning the Division One championship.

Similarly, who wins promotion from our own Division, and which clubs join us from Divisions One and Three. What interest

there would still be if four clubs were promoted and four relegated as in Divisions Three and Four.

Last season the visit of Luton to the County Ground produced one of the biggest gates of the season - 18,698. The result was a no-score draw. The visitors played very good, neat football in the first half of the game. Swindon had the better of the second half, but the Luton defence, with its strong, tall men, won all the balls in the air.

The return fixture was our last game of the season. At half-time Swindon led by a goal scored by Chris Jones (who seems to be finding the net regularly for Walsall, who are climbing to a high position in Division III), but Luton equalised in the second half. At the time of the game Swindon and Luton were challenging for the most goals scored in Division II, which meant a place in the Watney Cup competition. Swindon had scored fifty-eight, but Luton went on to exceed that total by defeating Cardiff City by three goals to nil on the following Tuesday.

Unfortunately they did not proceed far in the competition as they were defeated in the first round by Colchester United, who eventually became the winners by beating West Bromwich Albion in the Final - penalties deciding the issue after a drawn game.

Welcome to one of our oldest friends, Mr. Alex Stock, still a manager and a real

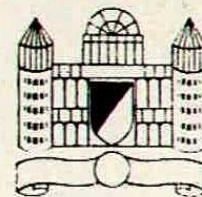
gentleman after twenty-six years of 'sweat and toil'. That speaks for itself as well as his record of gaining promotion for clubs which he has managed.

Many of us still remember him in 1946 when he was player-manager of Yeovil and Petters United and the unique cup runs of that club - great days!

After tonight's match we have two home games remaining, Watford (whom we are going to lose this season, and remember they won Division 3 when we were promoted in 1969) on Tuesday, 25th April, and Orient, still fighting to remain in Division II, on Saturday, 29th April.

John Ryan (Full-back)

Probably the best free-transfer signing Luton have ever made because he was allowed to go by Fulham after having made 21 appearances in their team when it was relegated from Division II. In the two seasons he has been with Luton, he has made 78 out of 88 League appearances and has developed into one of the fastest, most dependable full-backs in the Second Division. A Londoner, he had a spell with Arsenal before going to Craven Cottage.

Ken Goodeve (Full-back)

Was signed from Manchester United twelve months ago as a centre-half and showed much promise there in the Reserves. However, towards the end of last season, a first team vacancy occurred at left-back where he did so well that this is likely to be his future position. Was born in Manchester and signed for United as a youngster.

Alan Slough (Full-back)

At 23 years-of-age, Slough has a wealth of experience, all of it gained with his home town club, Luton. Most adaptable, he began his career as a full-back, had a spell in the attack and then it seemed that he had found his best place as a driving force in midfield. However, it was then decided that he would serve the Club better in the back four where he had a brilliant spell last season. When First Division clubs were showing interest in him, he asked for a long-term contract, and signed one for three years with the option of a further three.

Mike Keen (Midfield)

One of the most consistent players in the game, something that was recognised last Easter when the Club presented him with a silver salver to mark his 500th League appearance. Most were made for Q.P.R. whom he captained during their meteoric rise to Division I and in their League Cup triumph. Luton paid Rangers £18,000 for him, made him their captain and he has been a tower of strength to them. Toured Australia with the F.A. party last summer and was appointed captain.

David Court (Midfield)

A record fee for Luton of £35,000 changed hands when this clever midfield player moved from Arsenal just over 12 months ago. For a long time was a member of the first team squad at Highbury where he made over 150 first team appearances and it came as something of a surprise when the 'Gunners' agreed to let him go. In fact the deal went through only after protracted negotiations.

Don Shanks (Full-back)

Served his apprenticeship with Fulham who did not offer him terms as a full-time professional, so Luton snapped him up. Since then he has developed quickly having been a regular member of England's youth team squad and he did not miss a match during their triumph when they won the Little World Cup in Czechoslovakia during the summer. Is now regarded as being ripe for a League bleeding.

Keith Barber (Goalkeeper)

Came late into the game as a professional, being in his early 20's, but looks an extremely good prospect, having already made a successful League debut. Comes from Vauxhall (London) and played for Dunstable Town in the Southern League before Luton signed him on a permanent basis.

Peter Anderson (Striker)

Made his debut whilst still an amateur, against Watford on 13th February and was signed as a professional the following week. Previously he had been one of Hendon's most prominent stars and the move into the higher circle did not worry him because he maintained his place for most of the rest of the season. So far, the majority of his outings have been on the left wing but the indications are that he is happier on the right.

Chris Nicholl (Centre-half)

Most of the football world was taken by surprise when Luton paid Halifax Town £30,000 for his transfer only a day after he had put up a storming display against them. Has developed into one of the most commanding centre-halves in the Second Division and is now rated in the £100,000 class. Born at Macclesfield, he had trials with Burnley who did not keep him, and Halifax signed him from Witton Albion for a mere £750.

John Moore (Centre-half)

Longest serving member of the playing staff and one of the Club's most dependable players. Luton's Scottish scout had noted his progress when he was playing for Motherwell who gave him a free transfer after which Luton could not sign him quickly enough. Has made over 200 appearances in League football and has developed a fine understanding with Nicholl.

Jimmy Ryan (Midfield)

As the most experienced player he probably cost the greater part of the £35,000 which Luton paid to Manchester United in May 1970 for four players. A Scot from Stirling, he found his first team appearances limited at Old Trafford but he did well for Luton last season both as a raiding winger and a midfield link.

Don Givens (Striker)

Fourth member of the ex-United quartet and came as a centre-forward, but spent much of last season in the number 11 shirt, though operating as a striker. With eleven goals he was second leading scorer and it is reasonable to assume that he will boost this total this season. Dublin born and a regular member of the Eire team.

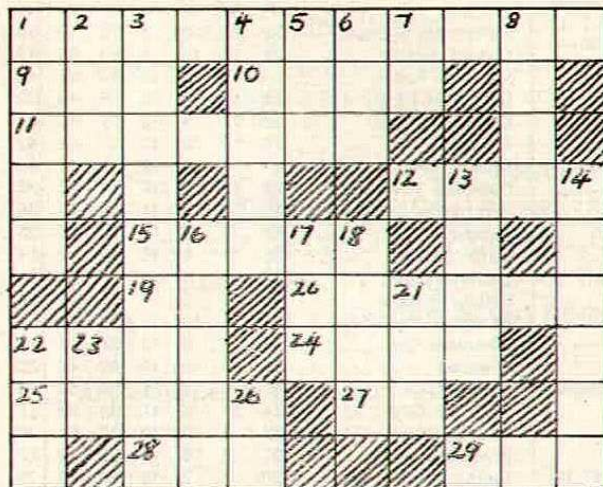

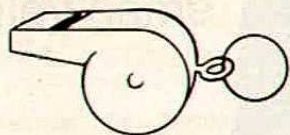

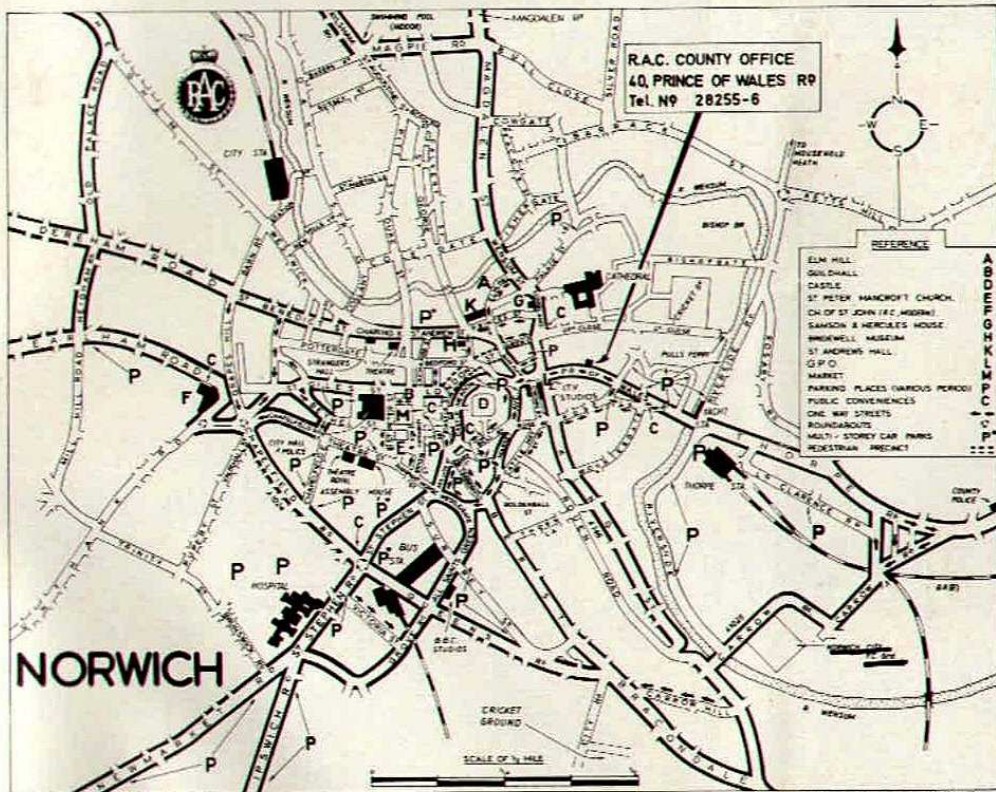
