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NEWS & VIEWS

It is with real pleasure we welcome to the County Ground this evening, League Champions Derby County. We mean not only the team and chief officials, but also all the members of the Board of Directors, and that great character and Chairman – Sam Longston, a football legislator for something like thirty years – and known throughout the football world.

Tonight's game will recall memories of one played almost four years ago – 5th November, 1968 to be precise – Football League Cup, Round Five (Replay). The result: Swindon 1, Derby County 0. Attendance: 26,449. Whilst tonight's game has aroused much interest, I very much doubt if the number present will reach that figure. I only hope it does.

One wonders occasionally why Cup matches attract such attention, because it is the League games which are the real backbone of football in England. They provide the entertainment for almost the whole of the season, and are the mainstay of the Club's revenue. So much of the Cup receipts have to be paid out. Incidentally, talking of revenue and payments, our police bill is now staggering. No need to tell you the reason, more is the pity, because apart from the expense incurred, we are sure the reason for the presence of so many police affects attendance at football matches.

Reverting back to the previous Cup-tie, I wonder how many players present tonight were on duty in that match? Our team on that occasion was: Downsborough; Dawson, Thomas; Butler, Burrows, Harland; Heath, Noble, Smith, Smart, Rogers.

Derby County: Green; Webster, Robson; Durban, McFarland, Mackay; Barker, Carlin, Butlin, Hector, Walker.

It was a very hard, fast game with some great football by our opponents. The goal was a little fortunate, as a shot by Don Rogers was partially blocked and then dipped in over the head of goalkeeper Green, who had advanced from his goal.

We first played Derby in a League Division II match on Saturday, 3rd October, 1964. Few playing that afternoon are still with their respective clubs.

I think I am right in saying that those of the Swindon side are Trollope, Smart and Rogers; and Webster and Durban of Derby County.

The result of that game was a win for Swindon by four goals to two. In the return fixture at Derby in February 1965, the home team gained an easy victory by four goals to one. The gate that day was just over 12,000 spectators, and of that number I doubt if fifty came from Swindon. Yet that was our first season ever in Division II.

What grand entertainment the game against Sheffield Wednesday produced. Fast, open and clean football for the whole of the ninety minutes, not one bad or deliberate foul, not one player spoken to, and not one booking. There were no stoppages, and neither trainer was required during the whole game, and strangely enough no substitutions. This was real football, which undoubtedly will bring the crowds to the County Ground. A real credit to the players, and many thanks to our opponents, Sheffield Wednesday, for a great display, played throughout in a fine sporting spirit. They must have been disappointed in losing after such a fine match. That is football. Swindon, of course, were highly delighted with the result, the game itself, and the well-taken goal.

dave's column

Four wonderful points from two home games and, believe me, they were most satisfying, especially as Bristol City had beaten us twice last year and Sheffield had already beaten us in the second game of this season.

The main thing is that we moved right up the League table and that is what I really want, because I feel that if you lose touch early on with the top teams, it is not long before the fans decide that it is not going to be our year for the Championship and tend to lose a little interest. Also, for any team it is so important to be in the top six throughout the season, because it gives the players a target to go for, and I don't really have to try to get the players keyed up for a match because the tension and excitement is already there if we are near the top.

The match with Bristol was very hard, and I was delighted to collect the two points as I thought that their goal just on half-time should never have been allowed, but there was justice in the end, when Steve Peplow scored with what should have been a very simple save by the goalkeeper. But as I have already said after our first three matches, that I always feel as far as luck goes it will be fairly evenly balanced throughout the season, and we didn't get any the first week of the season. Already this has changed, and I'm grateful for it.

Hooliganism is an ugly word and it was certainly in evidence at the County Ground against Bristol City. I was most disappointed, especially after last year when the Bristol City supporters went through Swindon smashing windows and generally making a nuisance of themselves. Last year their team won, so it is obvious that the result does not make any real difference, that all they are out for is a trouble-making afternoon and they don't care who they hurt and how many other people's Saturday afternoon they spoil.

I would like to add that they are in a minority, and there were only about five hundred of them looking for trouble. As far as I'm concerned

they are a big problem because to me those 500 will be keeping at least five thousand people away from their Saturday afternoon's pleasure, and the sooner we get them sorted out the better it will be for us all.

At the time of writing this article I don't know the result of the match at Sunderland, and I'm not going to make any predictions as far as the score goes, but I feel very confident that we will do well away from home this season, and that we will be just as comfortable playing away as we are at home. The formation that the team are playing at the moment, is that it looks just as strong no matter where we are playing and I hope we manage to get our away record improved at Sunderland, as it is always nice to get started. After our first victory of the season against Bristol I now want to get our first away victory as soon as possible.

For tonight's match, I just hope it turns out to be as good a game as it looks on paper, and I will be satisfied. I hope that you will give the boys plenty of support and that they will not let you down, because they are all looking forward to meeting the League Champions and, of course, hoping to beat them.

Once again I would like to congratulate Brian Clough and his team on the wonderful achievement last year, and I hope that they will do very well again this season, except of course in the League Cup!

Colin Boulton (Goalkeeper)

Even as a Police cadet in his native Cheltenham, all he ever wanted to do was play football. Joined the Rams in 1964 after a short trial, infrequent appearances before stepping into the first team in place of Les Green at the beginning of 1971. Solid temperament, kicks well with either foot – and 'determined to make up for lost time, all those games in the Reserves'. 5ft 10in. 12st 6lb.

Steve Powell (Defender)

Local-born son of former Derby County star forward Tommy Powell. Made first-team debut last season when just over 16, youngest debut in the club's history. Still not 17. Replaced Ron Webster in third game of this season and has retained right-back berth ever since. An England Boys and Youth international, and looks certain for stardom.

David Nish (Defender)

Signed from Leicester City on August 24th for a record fee, reputed to be £225,000. Nish, a regular England Under-23 international, is equally at home in the back four or in midfield, but is playing at left-back for Derby. A local Leicester product, he came up through their youth teams and is one of the most stylish defenders in the modern game.

Terry Hennessey (Wing-half)

Captain of Wales, in succession to his close friend, Mike England, Terry began as an attacking wing-half with Birmingham City, moved to Nottingham Forest for £45,000 and there made his reputation as a defensive wing-half – and, towards the end of his Trent-side stay – as a centre-half – of world class. His £105,000 move from Forest to the Baseball Ground in February 1970, was seen as a logical step in view of the fact that Dave Mackay would have to be replaced eventually. Two cartilage operations on his left knee dented those plans a bit, and Colin Todd turned out to be the 'new Mackay'. But Terry, whose balding head belies his age (but not his vast experience), is now playing as well as ever as the defensive, ball-winning member of the midfield three, or two when it's 4-2-4, and has many seasons at the top ahead of him yet. 6ft. 12st 2lb.

Roy McFarland (Centre-half)

Succeeded Mackay as skipper during the Summer of 1971. Brian Clough calls him 'the most complete player with whom I have ever been associated', which is some tribute, and Sir Alf Ramsey has installed him as England's regular No. 5 after Under-23 appearances. McFarland, tall, dark and single, was brought up on a diet of Anfield soccer in Liverpool,

began his career with Tranmere Rovers. Skill of the highest order for a back-four man, he has been called 'a great centre-forward going to waste' by more than one top leader of the past, although he does more than his fair share of attacking. Roy was Mr. Clough's second signing, in 1967, in a dramatic midnight swoop. The fee was £24,500, and County wouldn't hesitate a second before turning down ten times that amount for him today. 5ft 11in. 11st 9lb.

Colin Todd (Wing-half)

They all laughed, or most of them did anyway, when Derby County paid £170,000 in hard cash for the Sunderland and England Under-23 captain. That much money for an out-and-out defender? He can't be worth it, seemed to be the popular opinion. But the modest Todd, as quiet off the field as he is ruthlessly efficient on it, has proved them all wrong. After a few games in midfield and at right-back, he has taken Dave Mackay's place in the middle of the back four and reinforced his claims to a full England cap with outstanding power and consistency. Lack of height is his only possible flaw, but few are quicker off the mark or harder in the tackle. 'Cheap at the price', says Brian Clough, 'and he's good for another ten years yet.' 5ft 9in. 11st 5lb.

John McGovern (Inside-forward)

John, just 21, engaged to be married, and well in line for a Scotland Under-23 cap, is another Brian Clough-Peter Taylor discovery. Born in Montrose, his potential was spotted at Hartlepool, when they ran the little North-East club, and he joined Derby in exchange for a modest £7,000 fee in their second season with County. John was then more of an orthodox winger - since, he has developed into a midfield man of rare skill and with a formidable workrate; also the youngest player to appear in all four divisions. Excellent at man-for-man marking, now running games his way - and he can shoot, too, with either foot. 5ft 8in. 11st 5lb.

Archie Gemmill (Inside-forward)

Like Willie Carlin, his predecessor in the Derby County side, Archie is a little man with a big heart. The Rams paid Preston North End £65,000 for him in September 1970, with half an Under-23 appearance to his credit, and promised that he would soon be winning full honours for Scotland. The prophecy quickly came true, and the jet-heeled former St. Mirren man, born in Paisley, is now one of Tommy Docherty's top midfield forces. Has the rare ability to get behind a defence on either flank. 5ft 4in. 9st 10lb.

John O'Hare (Centre-forward)

Fast becoming a corner stone of Scottish team

plans, and their one regular marksman, he was Brian Clough's very first signing, for a miserly £20,000 from Sunderland in August 1967. Despite his Scotland successes, he is not the most prolific of scorers - but his skill at controlling the ball, however, and in whatever circumstances it comes to him, holding it under pressure and then making good use of possession at precisely the right moment is unequalled in Britain. Tommy Docherty calls him 'one of the best target men in the world'. Placid by nature, O'Hare is developing increased finishing power as he moves towards his peak, and topped the County charts last season. His good looks appeal to the lady supporters. Born Renton. 5ft 8in. 11st 13lb.

Kevin Hector (Inside-forward)

Kevin is not big as strikers go, without even, for instance, the 'coat-hanger shoulders' of a John O'Hare. But few forwards inspire such doubts among defenders as he sets off on one of his swift runs from a deep position, the ball perfectly under control at top speed. He first came to prominence with Bradford Park Avenue, hammering 44 goals in one season. That led to a £40,000 move to Derby, then a record fee for the Rams, and the only thing that has held him back since was an attack of jaundice, shortly before Brian Clough arrived - 'Sheer coincidence', cracks Kevin, as Yorkshire as they come. Now one of the leading scorers among present-day players, he is approaching the 200 mark. Sir Alf Ramsey has twice picked him for the Football League team. 5ft 8in. 11st.

Alan Hinton (Winger)

A few eyebrows were raised when Derby paid neighbours Forest £30,000 for the former Wolves and England winger, unable to hold down a regular first-team spot on Trent-side. But the Rams had spotted Hinton's great ability to pass the ball with millimetre accuracy, his fierce shot and the way - when he's in the mood - he can leave defenders trailing. With penalties added, Hinton has been directly concerned in something like 50 per cent of all Derby's goals since he joined the Club in September 1967. Although Alan is now in his late 20's, Brian Clough says 'England could do worse - no, correction, could hardly do better than pick Alan, for his great ability to cross the ball from right or left. Those front runners would have a birthday. He's worth a place on his corner-taking alone!'. 5ft 10in. 12st 6lb.

Alan Durban (Wing-half/Inside-forward)

Alan, from Port Talbot, is all set to become Derby County's most-capped player while with the Club, and has led Wales. A £10,000 buy from Cardiff City in 1963, he's one of the pre-

Clough players at the Baseball Ground who has fitted neatly into the scheme of things since the rejuvenation. Now with 300-plus appearances for the Rams, and approaching a career century of goals, he's fair-haired with a flair for attack, showing neat control and the ability to run intelligently off the ball to create situations and openings of his own making. 5ft 10in. 11st 4lb.

Ron Webster (Right-back)

A local product, Ron is now the Rams' longest-serving player, and enjoyed a well-deserved testimonial during 1971. Began his career, which was at one time plagued by injury, as a wing-half, but switched with great success to right-back under Brian Clough. 'I wish he had got hold of me earlier . . . then I would have been an even better player', says Ron. 5ft 9in. 11st 7lb.

John Robson (Left-back)

Spotted by Assistant Manager Peter Taylor in a North-East youth game, signed by the Rams at 16 and made his first-team debut that same season. Then came promotion, for the Club and the player, with John playing regularly alongside the great Dave Mackay in the Rams' 1968/69 step-up campaign. Well on his way to 200 League games, a remarkable record for one so young, John has already won Football League and England Under-23 honours, and must be a Munich candidate in 1974. 5ft 8in. 10st 0lb.

WHY THEY ARE CALLED 'THE RAMS'

To answer a query or two, and end a few arguments, Derby County's nickname of 'The Rams' stems from the fact that, well over 100 years ago, the townspeople of Derby adopted the emblem of the Rams — and the musical rhyme that accompanies it — because of the animal's association with the Army regiment at that time based in Derby.

The 95th Regiment, on their outward journey to Ceylon in 1838, sailed via Rio de Janeiro, Simonstown in South Africa and Travancore, in the South of India. It was here that the local Rajah came aboard and presented the commanding officer with a fine Ram, the first in a long line attached to the Regiment.

The ram has for many years been incorporated into the Derby County F.C. badge, usually in the form of the animal's head. Before the 1971/72 season, however, a new design, a more contemporary representation of the whole animal, was adopted, and at the same time, the Club amended their colours from black and white to navy and white.

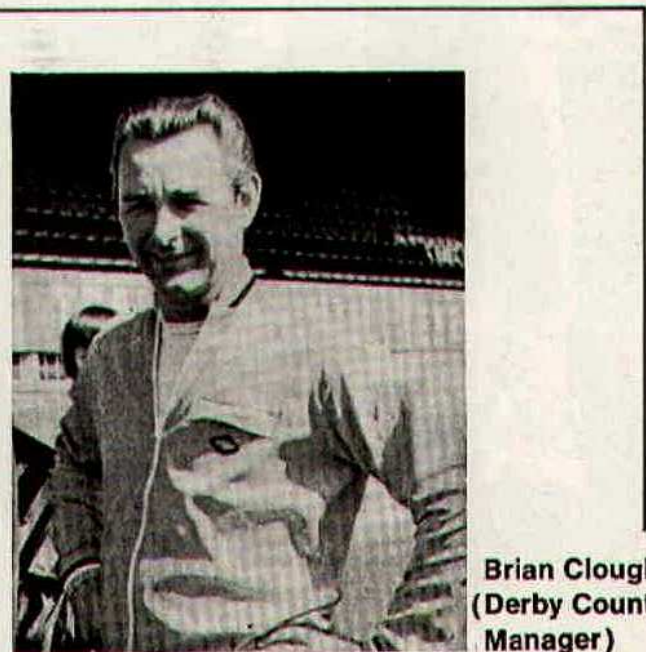

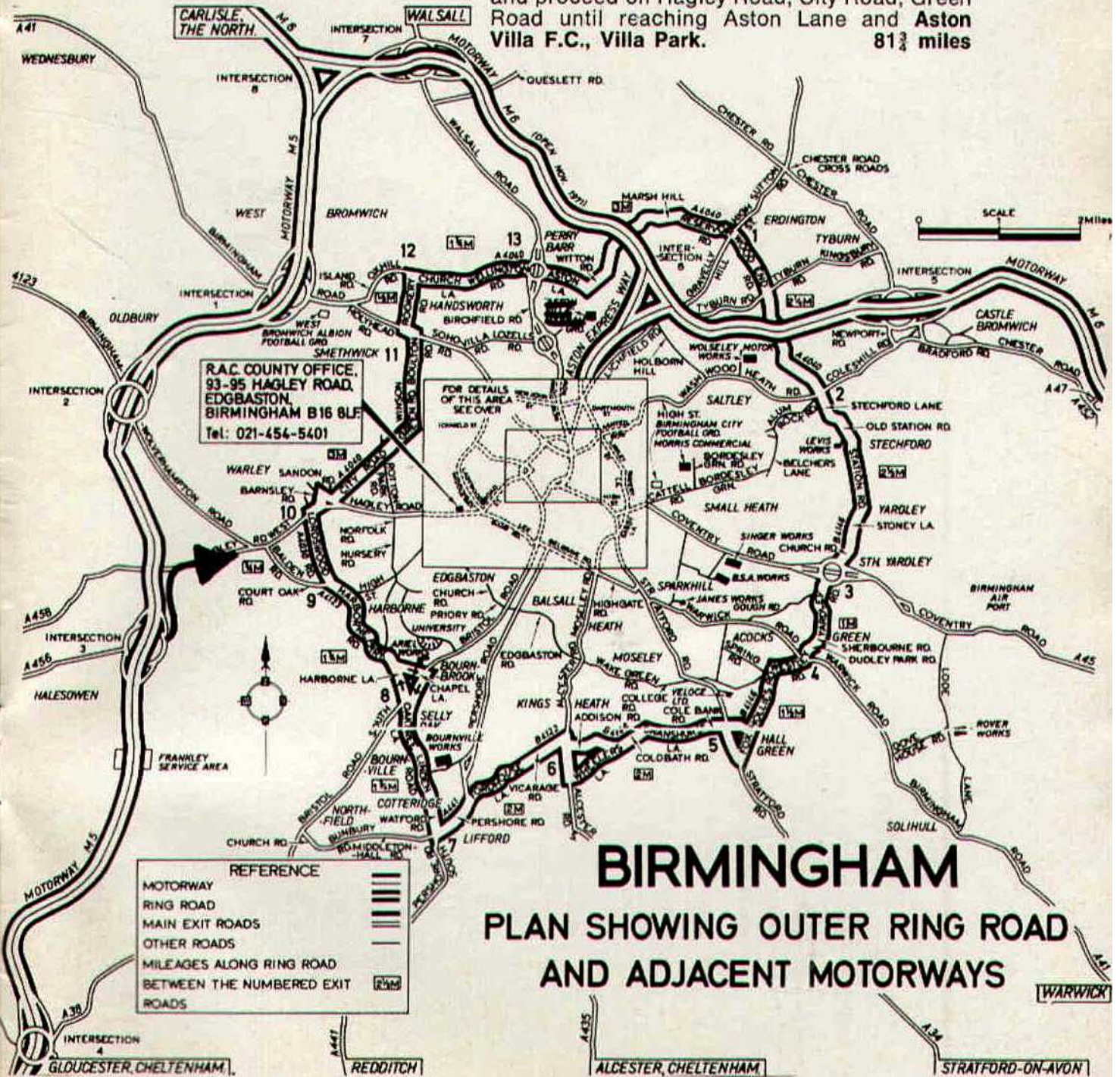
