

NEWS & VIEWS

At the moment, everyone in football is deeply concerned with the falling-off in the number of spectators present at games. All over the country one hears complaints of lack of numbers. Some even go so far as to grumble at the public for not supporting their club. Surely the man in the street will go where he is interested.

Many clubs complain and put forward various reasons for small attendances, one being far too much football on television. People are becoming much more demanding in standards. Whatever happens it would appear football must meet the challenge. Incidentally, this has been with us now for many years. I can remember it being discussed as long ago as the early fifties. Many other clubs have suggested that the Olympics detracted from football.

Obviously, too, there are many other factors which help to cause the decline in attendance. New interests are being created, more people spend their weekends in the country, the popularity of the family car, and many other forms of entertainment.

The remedy lies with the clubs themselves. They must set out to attract supporters. Many think that football today, with its planning, training, and theories, has become far too stereotyped, with talk of four-three-three, four-two-four, or even sometimes five across the back. The tremendous competition makes clubs plan that way, but surely football today has completely lost its flair, even much of its excitement. Gone it seems are the personalities who attracted the public, possibly because of the planning, and also they become tightly marked as soon as their individual skills become known.

Football to many was more attractive when clubs played what was referred to as the 'W' formation - something which made the inside-

forwards the key men, and produced some of the finest players ever: Alex James, David Jack, Peter Doherty and Raich Carter. No mention of strikers then, all the forwards were looked upon as potential goal-scorers.

One wonders if today we are stifling the ability and skill of young players. Rarely are they allowed to develop their own individuality, but must fit in with the general pattern of the team.

Whatever the reasons, and the remedies, one hopes this decline in attendances will soon be halted. It will be difficult, as once spectators have been lost it is a colossal task to get them back.

I expect our opponents today know that only too well. When we think back to the glories of this great club in their palmy Division 1 days, when Fratton Park was packed to capacity, and now down to seven thousand (the attendance at last Saturday's match). It really is tragic.

Last season we played Portsmouth at home on 27th December, 1971. A splendid game resulted in a win for Swindon by three goals (Bunkell, Rogers 2) to one (Piper).

The attendance reached the splendid figure of 20,494, but the fact that vouchers were distributed for the cup-tie against Arsenal no doubt had a bearing on that number.

dave's column


It has been a very disappointing couple of weeks and we will have to show a great improvement all round if we are going to make any sort of challenge for the League championship.

I thought that the lads did very well against Derby County. I was disappointed that we were beaten, and I think Derby were very fortunate to get away with a victory.

Only four days later against Blackpool our performance was really pathetic. I have already had a go at the lads, obviously nobody tries to play as bad as we did in that game, but I said at the time, and I mean it, that I will not stand for performances like that every week and that they will have to pull their socks up or else. It is very hard for the home side if visitors come to the County Ground to try and get a point. This type of football is so hard to play against and, worse still, it is terrible to watch. I feel for spectators having to look at the game as it is sometimes played, and I'm sure that what the public wants is plenty of goals and goalmouth incidents. But I don't think these things will come unless we change the rules in football. I would say that the time will come when we will get points for goals scored. To me this would be a tremendous boost for football but I'm sure this is only one of the answers. Another thing I would like to see would be the removal of the half-way line and to have a line across the pitch 30 yards from the goal-lines at each end. This would enable the teams to be stretched, as I think there are too many teams playing offside at the halfway line, and this would help in making the game more attractive.

We did it again, and I am sorry to say that I'm not at all proud of the fact, meaning that we were leading one goal to nil against Aston Villa and proceeded to let them back into the game, and they finished up by beating us.

It was disappointing to read in the 'Advertiser' that Aston Villa were in a different class to the Swindon team, but I would say that there is not that much difference between the two teams and it will be interesting to see how each club fares in the League, but I'm sure that when we play them at home during February we will turn the tables on them.







Take the A361 out of Swindon to Highworth, Lechlade, Burford and Shipton-under-Wychwood, until reaching Chipping Norton. Leave on the Banbury Road (A361) and travel via Bloxham to Banbury. From here take A423 (Southam Road) through Mollington and Ladbroke until meeting B4100 at junction of roads just out of Southam. Turn right here and $\frac{3}{4}$ mile on join A426 (Dunchurch Road); continue on this road through Rugby and on to roundabout at Gibbet Hill. Cross A5 and at junction with A4114 turn right, then $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles on join M1. Proceed on motorway for $66\frac{1}{4}$ miles (approx.),

then turn off at Intersection 18, following M18 for about 5 miles until joining A631 (Intersection 1). Keep on this road until joining A60 then after 4 miles turn left to re-join A631. After 4½ miles join A614 turning left then right. ¾ mile further on turn left. Continue on this road until reaching A18; after travelling 6¾ miles turn right and one mile on keep left. From here travel on A614 to Howden (Yorks); at junction of roads A63 and A614 take A63 as for Hull. Follow this road into Boothferry Park, Hull City F.C.
