THE VISIT of Swindon Town this afternoon means another meeting with that great friend and rival of ours, Dave Mackay. I've had some memorable meetings with Dave in the past notably when he was a Tottenham Hotspur player, and what a player, in the sixties. Following that, of course, we saw him still going strong at Derby County in the number six shirt he wore so well and now he's in the opposite corner again, this time as Swindon supremo.

Dave is a great football character and we know very well that while his team are not exactly on a wave crest, with him at the back of them they will be tough opponents.

Dave was at our game at Luton seven days ago and will have given his boys a thorough run down on us. We will therefore have to be on our toes.

IN THE PAST

It's a splendid thought that we have extended our run of unbeaten Division Two matches to 17 with the 2-2 draw at Kenilworth Road. The form forecast suggests we should not lose today but football is a rather unpredictable game and Swindon, remember, always seem to get a good result at Turf Moor. They won an F.A. Cup game here most surprisingly the year after Burnley's 1947 Wembley appearance and they were also the winners in the first leg of the League Cup semi-final in 1968-69 season.

And then there was last season! We were in fifth place when they came for the match here towards the end of November. Swindon were near the foot of the league with only one win and three goals to their credit out of no fewer than nine away fixtures. They proceeded to a 2-1 win, being two goals ahead at the interval and surviving in the second-half after Martin Dobson reduced arrears about 20 minutes from time if I recall it rightly.

AWARE

So you can bet on one thing this afternoon. We are fully aware of Town's excellent record on our pitch and of the fact that it may help their confidence somewhat. We used to feel the same

way when I was a player about such grounds as Filbert Street, Leicester and the Hawthorns, West Bromwich. On the other hand we felt a jinx on us at Villa Park.

EXCELLENT

It was an excellent afternoon's entertainment at Luton and there is no doubt we deserved the draw. A good effort by the team was highlighted by Leighton James who increased his goals tally by another two and celebrated his selection for Wales in a manner which made us all feel pretty good on the long journey back to Lancashire on Saturday evening.

Leighton was not the only man on the field. But he showed the kind of flair and finesse which will in my mind lead to further full caps for his country. Many of you will have seen snippets of the game on television and you may have noticed the enthusiasm he showed at each success with his hands in the air. It's a great feeling to score, of course.

Leighton reacted almost identically when scoring at Hull. There's a difference between this and one report in a local evening newspaper which said he had given a "Harvey Smith" sign after scoring.

To put the record right. This was untrue. Take it from me, there was **NO** Harvey Smith sign and furthermore you are not likely to see a Burnley player do that to any crowd of football supporters.

JOHN ANGUS

Last, but not least important, I have received numerous enquiries from supporters for consideration of a testimonial match for that great former player of Burnley and England, John Angus.

I understand that a committee of supporters is being formed and that an inaugural meeting is to be held in the very near future.

No doubt all supporters of the Clarets will be keenly interested in the outcome of the proposed meeting and will have their own personal ideas of what they would like to see if such a game does materialise.

I hope to keep you fully informed of the position as more details become available—possibly in the next match magazine.

SWINDON TOWN, our visitors today, were last season's "Average Second Division team."

Their record was remarkable for its level of consistency. The Wiltshire club played 42 league games—for 42 points. They won 15 matches and lost 15 matches. Goal average was dead level—47 for, 47 against.

The culmination of this statistical oddity could have only one end result—Swindon finished 11th in the league—exactly half-way.

In their matches with Burnley last season the club's finished up with equal goals and an equal number of points. Swindon won 2-1 at Turf Moor but the Clarets got their revenge when they won the away game 1-0.

So far this season Swindon have shown rather inconsistent form, following fine displays with indifferent ones and not suggesting that they are going to be one of the division's outstanding teams this season.

But they have put up some good away performances—drawing 1-1 at Huddersfield and being unlucky to lose 2-1 against high-riding Aston Villa.

They have several talented players and some who are capable of winning a match single handed.

BEWARE OF ROGERS

This is true of no-one more than **Don Rogers**, the club's

brilliant left-winger. Often he appears to be out of the game and out of form but can suddenly change the course of the match with one move. Very fast and skilful, he was an important member of the team which won the Football League Cup (beating Arsenal 3-1 at Wembley) and won promotion from Division III in 1969.

Last season Rogers played in every league game and scored seven goals. He has gained many Youth and Under 23 international caps.

The club's best-known name is **Dave Mackay**, the player manager. The barrel-chested figure is a familiar sight to every soccer fan in the country. He has now been playing professional soccer for more than 21 years during which time he has won every honour in the game.

He started his career with Hearts in 1951 and was transferred to Spurs in 1953. He was a member of the great Spurs double winning side of 1961 and has won the Footballer of the Year title. Capped 26 times for Scotland Mackay has won Scottish Cup and League Cup Winners medals; English League Championship and Cup medals and a European Cup Winners Cup medal. He joined Swindon in May last year after a successful spell with Derby County and has since taken over as team manager.

TREACY THE BRAVE

One of Mackay's close-season buys was **Ray Treacy**, who was signed from Charlton Athletic. Treacy, a courageous centre-forward, was leading goalscorer for the London club last season but his 13 goals were not enough to save them from relegation. Born in Dublin, Ray is a full Eire international.

Another international in the Swindon team is full-back **Rod Thomas**. A fast, hard-tackling player he was signed from Gloucester City in 1964 and has been a regular in the Swindon side for several years. His tussles with fellow Welsh international Leighton James could be a feature of this afternoon's match.

The other regular Swindon full-back is **John Trollope** who has been a great servant to the club. Very consistent he achieved the remarkable distinction of playing in more than 300 consecutive first-team games. He did not miss a match last season.

Joe Butler is another with a fine record of service. A tenacious wing-half he more than makes up for his lack of inches (is only 5 feet 7½ inches tall). He was a key member of the team that won the Anglo Italian tournament in 1970.

At centre-half the Robins have **Frank Burrows**, who has proved a valuable asset since he was signed from Scunthorpe.

Big and strong he is one of the Second Division's many fine "stoppers".

Roger Smart is a versatile player who can perform at centre-forward but is happiest in the midfield role. A Swindon boy he joined the club straight from school.

GOOD KEEPER

Local football in Yorkshire produced goalkeeper **Peter Downsborough**. He was snapped up by Halifax Town and since his transfer in August 1965 he has done much to strengthen the Town's defence. Courage and agility are his strong points.

Swindon's leading goalscorer last season was **Peter Noble** who bagged 14. He arrived from Newcastle in January 1968. Small for a centre-forward (5 feet 8 inches) but quick to snap up the half chances.

Right-winger **Steve Peplow** played for Liverpool School-boys and began his professional career at Anfield. But after three first team appearances moved south to Swindon. He is another forward who can be dangerous.

Another recent signing was **Paul Peterson** a full-back from Leeds United. Transferred in the close season.

Swindon have several promising youngsters who are beginning to make their mark in the first team. Wing-half **Ray Bunkell** was signed from Spurs last year and inside-forwards **David Dangerfield** and **Terry Hubbard** both progressed through the clubs youth policy.

The Referee who Changed the Course of Soccer History

IN one respect, if no other, referees are rather like artists. Their best efforts only appear to gain true appreciation when their working lifetime has ended.

Generation after generation of soccer fans and players speak with reverence of men to whom they have accorded the status of old masters—men such as Jack Howcroft, Harry Nattrass, Arthur Ellis, Kevin Howley and Jim Finney.

But it seems a great pity to me that belated praise is of no more value to a retired referee than a posthumous award to a dead hero. And it gives me good reason to wonder which members of our present day panel will be deified when their whistling days are over by those who might now despise them.

Amid the storms which have raged during the past twelve months about tough-line refereeing some people might have lost sight of the fact that there have been instances in which the course of football history has been changed by the unflinching courage of the 'men in the middle'.

To younger English fans who have marvelled at the soccer magnificence of Brazil in World Cup football it might seem astonishing to learn that it all began because of the bravery of a British referee.

Yorkshireman

They don't have to take my word for it. Brazilian officials have made public acknowledgment of the debt they owe to Arthur Ellis, the man from Halifax who took the most infamous international match in World Cup history by the scruff of the neck and steered Brazil back on to the straight and narrow path to football glory.

It happened 18 years ago in Berne. With hatred in their hearts Brazil clashed with Hungary, who

were then hailed as the greatest team of all time. Jealousy had fanned the flames of hostility long before the teams stepped on to the field for this quarter-final. The tie turned quickly into a bitter brawl, but Ellis cracked down hard on the villains.

He punished evil tackles with two penalties and sent three players off. F.I.F.A. officials admitted to me at the time that it was an outstanding achievement on his part to see the game through without complete abandonment.

Half an hour after Hungary's 4-2 victory, when Ellis's responsibility had ended, the Brazilians again bared their fangs.

They burst into the Hungarian dressing room and roughed up Puskas and Czibor. Meanwhile, Ellis sat and sipped a cup of tea and showed not the slightest concern about warnings that it might be his turn next.

For two years after that Brazil's future in international football hung precariously in the balance. There was a world-wide clamour for their expulsion. But they pleaded that they had learned their lesson and promised to mend their ways.

Result, Respect and Record

One of the most significant developments came when they showed their respect and their appreciation of the English referee who had brought the whole thing to a head by teaching them that thuggery would not be tolerated. They sent Ellis official invitations to visit Brazil as their honoured guest. And they went on to achieve with superb skill and impeccable behaviour the magnificent feat of winning the World Cup three times in the next four tournaments—a truly brilliant transformation.
