



NEWS & VIEWS

Today we entertain a club with one of the greatest names in football – Aston Villa. What a thrill that title gives to all supporters, especially the older ones among us. What memories it recalls of great occasions, Cup Finals, and famous names – Sam Hardy, the prince of goal-keepers; Harry Hampton; Billy Walker; Frank Barson, a real centre-half; 'Pongo' Waring; Andy Ducat; Trevor Ford.

This season sees the resurgence of this fine club, placed near the top of the League table and attracting outstanding attendances. Week after week we hear of falling gates, with many reasons given for the drop in the paying public. Our visitors provide one of the bright spots, their gates are going up and up. To date the Villa's average gate has increased by 3,000, and their total has reached 390,364. If things carry on like this, Villa could be the first Division Two side to be watched by a million people.

What is the reason for this great following of Villa fans. No doubt promotion to Division II has played its part, but Villa officials believe the chief reason is because they try to play good football and provide real entertainment for the spectators.

Therefore, today we look forward with eager anticipation to a great game of football, one to please what will probably be our biggest gate of the season. Our visitors will bring a large contingent, but the visit of Aston Villa will bring back to the County Ground many of our supporters, and we do hope they will be well and truly rewarded.

Aston Villa F.C. produced a weekly newspaper – Villa Times – a splendid bulletin of twelve pages, full of news and pictures concerning the club. It had something like 16,000 readers, and was therefore a wonderful vehicle for public relations. Unfortunately, it was not a financial success, and it ceased publication with its final issue on Wednesday, 3rd January, 1973. A great pity but, as the club stated, it could not afford the luxury of absorbing losses over a long period.

Our Youth team is enjoying a fine run in the F.A. Youth Cup competition. Last week they gained a splendid draw at Bournemouth, after being 1–3 down with seven minutes to go. It is team work, spirit and determination which is producing the results. They are a credit to all concerned: Trainers Eddie Buckley and Harry Cousins, Maurice Owen (a wonderful example to the young boys), Kevin Morris, and not forgetting Fred Ford, who was mainly responsible for gathering in most members of this team.

Naturally one hopes these lads will develop and go on to make the first team. I should like to visualise them as the Swindon Town team of a few years hence. But a word of caution. It's a hard road and, without wishing to deter these lads in any way, there is a long way to go, and many disappointments.

The replay is next Tuesday at 7.30 p.m. If these lads produce their true form, this should prove to be a fine game, and we hope as many of you as possible will turn up and give them the encouragement they deserve.



Aston Villa pen pictures

Charlie Aitken (Full-back)

Joined Villa as a professional in August 1959 from Edinburgh junior football. League debut on April 29th, 1961, at left-back v. Sheffield Wednesday (at home). Jumped to the front in 1962, playing for Scotland Under-23 and in Scottish International trial. Villa Supporters' Club 'Terrace Trophy' winner in 1961/62 season. Ever-present in 1962/63, 1964/65, 1965/66, 1968/69, 1970/71 and 1971/72.

Willie Anderson (Forward)

Born Liverpool, joined Manchester United's apprentice staff from Liverpool Boys. Played for United in European and F.A. Cup Semi-Finals in 1965/66 before he had made ten League appearances. Transferred to Villa for a reported £20,000, January 19th, 1967. Debut v. Chelsea (away) January 21st, 1967.

Malcolm Beard (Midfield)

Born Cannock. Highly-regarded schoolboy player, joining Birmingham City's groundstaff. Signed professional on his 17th birthday and gained considerable success in a long career before joining Villa on a free transfer on July 12th, 1971.

Jimmy Brown (Midfield)

Born Wallyford, Midlothian. Made his first team debut v Bolton on September 17th, 1969 at the age of 15 years 349 days and was Villa's youngest ever player. Signed professional with Aston Villa October 15th, 1970. A Scottish Youth International and was a member of Aston Villa's League Cup Final squad in 1970/71 season.

Jim Cumbes (Goalkeeper)

From Tranmere Rovers to West Bromwich Albion, and across the city to Villa Park on November 25th, 1971, that's the career of Jimmy Cumbes, who has also played cricket for Lancashire, Surrey and more recently Worcestershire. A Manchester man, and the current joker in the Villa pack.

Alun Evans (Forward)

Once trained at Villa Park as a schoolboy – but signed for Wolves at 15, and transferred to Liverpool for reported £100,000 when still a teenager. Transferred to Aston Villa June 9th, 1972.

Greg Fellows (Forward)

First apprentice to be signed under the new administration – early in 1969. Formerly won Birmingham & District, and Staffordshire schools representative honours, also as a swimmer for Worcestershire. Signed professional on September 20th, 1971.

John Gidman (Defender)

Former Liverpool apprentice snapped up by Villa on his release and signed professional on August 12th, 1971. England's regular full-back in 'Little World Cup' in Spain, May 1972. Member of Aston Villa's winning Youth Cup team.

Ray Graydon (Forward)

Bristol born. Speedy winger who learned trade as an electrician before becoming a professional with Bristol Rovers. Transferred to Aston Villa in part-exchange deal with Brian Godfrey. Voted 'Terrace Trophy' winner in 1971/72 season.

Harry Gregory (Forward)

Signed from Charlton on October 14th, 1970. Joined Orient's groundstaff and made his debut for them at 17. Was transferred to Charlton and was their second top-scorer with 13 goals. Has played for London Schools and a member of England Youth team.

Geoff Vowden (Forward)

Born Jersey. Geoff was signed from Birmingham on March 4th, 1971 after seven years with our neighbouring club, after previous service with Nottingham Forest.

Brian Little (Forward)

Born County Durham. Started his career with Aston Villa as an apprentice and signed professional February 1971. Member of England Youth squad for 'Little World Cup' in Spain, May, 1972. Also member of Villa Youth team which won F.A. Youth Cup, 1972.

Chris Nicholl (Defender)

Former Burnley youngster who drifted to Halifax, before being snapped up by Luton Town. Followed the Riochs down the M1 to Villa Park almost three years later on March 8th, 1972 in a transfer deal reported to be the highest paid by a then Third Division club.

Bruce Rioch (Forward)

Born Aldershot but brought up in Luton, joining Luton Town from school. Formerly a winghalf, he became a goalscoring inside-forward, netting 26 goals when Luton were promoted to Division III. Toured world with F.A. team in summer of 1969. Transferred to Villa with his brother Neil, becoming Villa's first six-figure signing and the first for a Division III player. Villa captain.

Neil Rioch (Defender)

Born London but grew up in Luton where he went to the same school as his older brother Bruce. Joined Luton apprentice staff on leaving school and developed as a centre-half. Member of the England youth team in 1969 International Youth Tournament in East Germany.

Ian Ross (Defender)

Villa raised a few eyebrows by securing the signature of Ross from Liverpool in a surprise transfer deal on May 8th, 1972.

Ian Hamilton (Forward)

Nicknamed 'Chico'. Streatham born, can play either as a striker or midfield. Left school to join Chelsea and made his debut in the Chelsea first team when 16 against Spurs at White Hart Lane. Transferred to Southend for £5,000 in September 1968, scoring 17 goals in 38 appearances before moving to Villa for £40,000 on June 4th, 1969. England Youth International.

Pat McMahon (Midfield)

Comes from Croy, a small mining village. Joined Celtic from Kilsyth Rangers in 1967. Had two seasons with Celtic, then given free transfer. Snapped up by Villa on June 10th, 1969. Made excellent recovery from severe ankle injury sustained in first League match of 1971/72 season.

Andy Lochhead (Forward)

After 10 years with Burnley, and a 2 year stint at Leicester City, Lochhead was Villa's last signing of the 1969/70 season, arriving at Villa Park in February 1970 for £30,000. Still lives in Leicester and commutes daily for training. Scored 25 goals in 1971/72 Third Division championship season, and popular winner of the 'Midland Player of the Year' trophy.

Keith Leonard (Forward)

Big (6ft 03in, 13st 9lb) striker who made a name for himself as a goalscorer with Highgate United. Spent a trial period at Villa Park, playing several Central League games, before being signed professional on April 14th, 1972.

Tony Betts (Forward)

Fair-haired, slim centre-forward from Nottingham area. Won England amateur Youth International honours while studying as an art student at Sutton Coldfield. Signed professional on March 13th, 1972, and a member of Villa's winning F.A. Youth Cup team of that year.

Keith Bradley (Full-back)

Born Ellesmere Port. Joined Villa apprentice staff 1962, after a short spell with Everton. Joined professional staff, May 1963. Originally a centre-half, but switched successfully to right-back. Debut v Birmingham City (away) February 13th, 1965.

Paul Child (Defender)

Birmingham born. Played for Stanley Star and signed schoolboy forms when 13 for Aston Villa. Represented Aston Villa at Youth and Central League level, and England Amateur Youth International. Loaned to Atlanta Chiefs in United States for Summer of 1972. Signed professional March 8th, 1971.

David Rudge (Forward)

Born Wolverhampton and joined Aston Villa's apprentice staff straight from school. Became professional May 1965. League debut v Arsenal (away) August 27th, 1966. Broke his leg at Preston, January 31st, 1970. Won Villa Terrace Trophy award for season 1969/70.

Michael Wright (Defender)

Born Ellesmere Port, became a Villa apprentice in 1962/63. League debut v Blackpool, Bloomfield Road, September 7th, 1963, while still 16. Turned professional on 17th birthday, three weeks later. Did so well he kept a regular first team place. Played for England Youth team that won International Tournament in Amsterdam, Easter 1964. Again played for England Youth in 1965.

hampton 3-0 and so maintain second position in the Midland Youth League. Scorers were D. Syrett (2) and T. Tinson (1).






