The sales points will be the South Africa Road Box Office; the Loftus Road entrance; and the Ellerstie Road School End entrance. Supporters Club members may obtain a special allocation from the Pools Office in South Africa Road. Don't rush—we have enough tighter for all who wish to go tickets for all who wish to go.

A Rangers Rocket express will be running once again for this trip and full details are given on page 14. This Rangers Rocket is bound to be a complete sell-out on this occasion but those who are disappointed may like to know that British Rail will be running one or two special trains to Derby for this match. Once you get to the Baseball Ground, don't forget that you're there in order to cheer the team on—9,000 versions of the Rangers Roar should easily silence 28,000 Derby voices!

REPLAY NOTICE

In the event of a draw against Derby, the replay will take place at this ground on Tuesday 27th February (K.O. 7.30 p.m). This replay would not be all-ticket but we would certainly expect a near capacity gate for such a game. Gates would open at 5.30 p.m. and we would advise you to come as early as possible. Terrace spectators would be strongly requested not to block the entrances but move farther along the terrace as soon as they enter.

SEASON TICKETS

A good run in the League and the Cup has brought the club the usual sequel—we are selling season tickets practically non-stop and our total is currently the best since we were in the First Division. If you are contemplating buying a season ticket we do advise you to do so immediately before the last of the best seats disappear. RANGERS REPORT

Another article in our series from the top columnist

Terry Venables

Today is the first time in seven games that Terry Venables has been available for first team selection. On Tuesday night it was typical of the man whose presence, or absence, in the past has, in my opinion, had a major effect upon Rangers results that he told me: "Iam fully fit again, but I haven't been selected yet". In other words he expected to fight for his place like anyone cise.

Terry has missed four league games and the Cup games with Barnet (twice) and Oxford, as a result of being injured first at Sheffield Wednesday and then Middlesbrough. At Middlesbrough he couldn't come off because Stan Bowles had already left the field in the 22nd minute. I think we all trembled inwardly when we knew that first Terry and then Phil Parkes would be missing for more than one game. But as Terry says: "If you're going into the First Division you must have players who can come in and do a first team job. Millwall nearly went up last season with almost 12 players. They didn't seem to have much depth, and they used the same team nearly sail the time. If they'd been in trouble we've been in this season I don't know what they'd have done".

During his absence his place has been very well filled by John Delve, who is still only nine-teen-years-old, which bodes well for the future. Yet true to his generosity Terry has helped John as much as he can: "Yes, I spoke to John Delve and pointed out this and that, but in the end he delivered himself, he did the job. Of course before I was injured we played at Luton together. It's an important function to be a mid-field player, and he took to it straightaway".

Yet although the Rangers team averages under 23-years-old it is 'knowledge' that is the most valuable factor, especially as the First Division becomes just more than a hope. To watch Terry Venables is to see someone 'read' a game, talking those around him into the right situations, bringing his past knowledge with Chelsea and Tottenham to bear on a game.

In fact he was back at Tottenham the other night to watch that epic 5—3 fight back by Derby, the team Rangers will now meet in the next round. "Obviously I'd have preferred us to be meeting Tottenham", he says, 'But Derby will be great opposition, and give us a taste of what to expect if we go up".

What chances promotion? That is the question every one asks. It is also the question no-one dare answer partly because of tempting the fates. Terry says: "The chances are very good, but it won't take care of itself. The run-in is the hardest part, but if we sustain the sort of form we've been showing we've got a good chance. The important game will be Aston Villa. I think that will be harder than the Burnley game. Although

Burnley wanted to win, they could afford to lose without it having any great effect on their chances. For Villa it will be make or break. It they win they will stand a helluva good chance of going up, but if they lose that could be the end of their chances."

We went on to talk about today's game. There is an ironic twist in the fact that Swindon should be managed by Les Allen, a skilful member of Rangers last promotion winning team. It was also after losing to Swindon in a cup game that he left the club. I remember him more vividly as player than manager, especially in Rangers thrilling fight back in the First Division against West Ham at Upton Park. Personally I think he gave up playing too soon, but only he knows the accurate answer to that. He was certainly a player of great grace and thoughtfulness, and Terry points out that Swindon's results have improved since Les went there as manager: "They are in this low position because of a bad run of results at the start of the season. They're not a bad side at all".

As for Rangers improvement this season Terry says: "The players added to our squad have been of a high standard. It's put us up a grade. I think you go up in stages. We needed two or three players, the club bought well and it's made us a better all round side".

Of those new players we talked about, of course, Don Givens, a player who seems incapable of not scoring. Terry looks at him from a player's point of view: "As soon as I saw him at the beginning of the season I knew he was good. I love to see sharp players. He is so quick. He goes in between two men a bit like Francis Lee. He has everything".

And lastly it is worth remembering that it is almost a year ago exactly that Rodney Marsh left Shepherds Bush. I talked with Rodney after Manchester City's game last week at Tottenham. He scored one and made another. For the record he thinks Rangers will go up, he also thinks Manchester City are ripe to win something. Looking back Terry reflects: "I think Rodney suppressed other personalities in the side without meaning to. If Mickey Leach scored then it always came out that Rodney made it. Other players have now got their own personalities". Looking back it was a deal that has been both successful for Rodney, successful for both clubs and successful for the Rangers team. How often can that be said?

IN THE MANAGER'S VIEW...

MANAGER GORDON JAGO gives his comments on current events on and off the pitch

THEY USED TO PLAY ON GRASS

Is the title of an excellent novel of soccer in the future written by our Club Captain Terry Venables and Gordon Williams.

It tells of how every club in the First Division has installed the new all weather plastic turf, bright green and indestructible. "The old pitches had been sold off at twenty shillings a square foot, people had formed queues to buy a slice of sentimental sod and all over the country supporters were tending these precious roots of grass, in gardens and tiny backyards keeping alive some golden memory of the past when the studs of the great had skimmed over those very blades, growing remnants of a pitch which had once been sacred."

Fiction yes-far-fetched, in my opinion

I do not think so.

Already, throughout the United States, artificial surfaces have been installed in many of their stadiums, Professional American Football and Baseball games are being played on such surfaces with great success, and postponements of football games on these surfaces are unknown. Snow is simply brushed off, ice can be cracked and dealt with in the same manner, whilst water is vacuumed away.

If adopted in this country we would no longer see games reduced to farce, due to ankle deep mud or a surface more suited to skating boots than football boots. I know that tradition in this country dies hard and the adoption of something so radical will be opposed on a principle of "why should we change, our grounds have always been satisfactory and anyway the adapting to the mud and ice is part of our game and makes it what it is."

West Ham United whilst on tour in the United States in 1969 had the opportunity of playing on artificial surfaces and, following a game against Dundee on a Tartan surface at Portland Oregon, Ron Greenwood stated that "Everything they are doing is perfect. It is so easy to do everything perfectly. The players themselves say its just sheer joy to play on. It's so true—like velvet really."

Bobby Moore commented "When you

get a perfect surface like this I think it would make everyone far better players" and Geoff Hurst said "That surface is probably the best I've ever played on."

When a Manager and players of that calibre and with such experience make such statements then I feel that we should at least look into the possibility of such a product. I am certain that there may still be problems with artificial turf but I sincerely hope that in the immediate future the F.A. and the F.L. will set up a committee comprised of experts to investigate every aspect of artificial surfaces.

If such a committee's report was favourable then immediately one would hear the cry "it's too expensive, we cannot afford it". At present for one club to approach the manufacturers for a Tartan surface, the cost would be in the region of £100,000. Way out of reach for almost every club but if the League acting on behalf of all its 92 members, made a bulk order for every League ground plus a guarantee of any new club coming into the League being immediately equipped, then that price would be halved at least.

When one considers the amount of money each club spends each year on its field and only two weeks ago a Chairman of a First Division club in the Midlands stated that they had received an estimate of £28,000 to renew their soil and correct their field, then surely we may be able to

save money over long periods.

An artificial turf will give us a true surface, the possibility of no postponement and, above all, we can then use our stadiums for almost any event we wish any day of the week, commercial or otherwise, without damage to our field. More revenue can be gained and a financial loan arrangement with the F.L. or F.A. for the initial cost of installation could be repaid with monies gained from new found entertainments or activities.

"They used to play on Grass" is at present the title of a book but I hope that one day in the near future that expression

will become a reality.

UNDER THE MICROSCOPE

A detailed Examination of the past record of today's visitors

A run of seven League games without a win has halted Swindon's rapid rise up the table, inspired by new manager Les Allen who took over when Dave Mackay left for Nottingham Forest. So the Robins once again find themselves caught up in the relegation battle.

It is good to see Mr. Allen back in the driving seat again following a spell as coach to Swindon. He gave us fine service as a player towards the end of his career and then took over as manager. There were no hard feelings when he left us—he simply found it difficult managing players with whom he had played. So welcome back to the Bush Les!

It is possible, of course, that Swindon are now beginning to feel the loss of England under-23 winger Ron Rogers who, after playing his 400th League game for the club, was transferred to Crystal Palace for £140,000 a few weeks ago even though £50,000 of the Rogers fee was quickly re-invested in Southampton's unsettled left-winger Tom Jenkins.

Swindon have not traditionally been great operators in the transfer market yet they have twice broken their club record fees in the past few months. A new record high was set when they paid Charlton £35,000 for Republic of Ireland international Ray Treacy in the summer and this in turn was beaten by the Jenkins transfer.

Swindon Town are one of the modern breed of ambitious clubs, trying desperately to break away from their old image. For years they were no more than an ordinary Third Division club, quite content to drift on aimlessly from year to year. Today Swindon want it known that their declared intention is a place in the First Division.

The real turning point for Swindon came one March day in 1969 when they outplayed Arsenal at Wembley to win the League Cup.

At the end of that season, Swindon were promoted to Division Two. And, with those Wembley memories burning bright, the directors planned ground improvements in preparation for the day when First Division status is achieved. Part of these plans reached maturity last season with the completion of a new grandstand.

Founded in 1881, Swindon became members of the Third Division (South), along with all the other Southern League first division sides, in 1920.

It was in 1963 that Swindon first broke out of the Third Division, with a star-studded young team assembled by manager Bert Head. They made a brilliant start to their Second Division career, heading the table for several weeks. Alas, they could not maintain the pace and, within two years they were relegated.

Danny Williams, who was responsible for the Wembley side, Fred Ford and Dave Mackay have since followed as Swindon managers and now Les Allen is in charge.

Though results haven't been running too well for Swindon in the League, they defeated First Division Birmingham City quite easily by two clear goals in the third round of the F.A. Cup.

Like us, they have been suffering a lot through injuries and, in his search for a settled team, Mr. Allen has called upon 20 players for first-team duty so far.

ROD THOMAS (Defender)

A Welsh full and under-23 international, Rod has been Swindon's right-back for the past six years. He joined them from Gloucester City. He now has 25 full Welsh caps. League record: Swindon 269 aps., 4 gls.

FRANK BURROWS (Defender)

Frank first entered English football with Scunthorpe in 1965 after serving Raith Rovers. Swindon signed him in 1968 and only injuries have since kept him out of the side. League record: Raith Rovers (not known); Scunthorpe 106 aps., 4 gls.; Swindon 178 aps., 5 gls.

RON POTTER (Defender)

Ron took over Dave Mackay's role in the back four, playing dual centre-half with Frank Burrows. A former West Bromwich apprentice, he made his League debut for them in 1968/69 and transferred to Swindon two seasons ago. League record: West Bromwich Albion 8(1) aps.; Swindon 34 aps.

JOHN TROLLOPE (Defender)

John has been on parade—apart from a short injury absence—continually for 12 seasons. He completed 500 League appearances last term and in one unbroken run he played 368 consecutive games for the club. League record: Swindon 528(1) aps., 16 gls.

JOE BUTLER (Midfield)

Joe, who was signed from Newcastle in 1965, has played in several positions for Swindon, proving one of their most valuable players over the years. He is one of seven survivors of that wonderful occasion at Wembley in 1969 when Swindon crushed Arsenal 3—1 in the League Cup final. League record: Newcastle 3 aps.; Swindon 264(2) aps., 13 gls.

ROGER SMART (Midfield)

Another of Swindon's Wembley survivors, Roger came through the club's junior network to make his League debut in 1961/62. He hasn't been holding a regular place this season but hopes to be in the team today. League record: Swindon 337 (6) aps., 42 gls.

RAY BUNKELL (Midfield)

Though Ray won England youth honours when he was with Spurs, he didn't get a game in their League team. But he satisfied his ambition for League soccer soon after joining Swindon in 1971. League record: Swindon 41(3) aps., 2 gls.

TOM JENKINS (Midfield)

Swindon paid a club record £50,000 fee to Southampton for Tom this season. Once discarded by West Ham and Orient, Tom made his League come-back with Reading in 1969. Within weeks he was the subject of £60,000 transfer to Southampton. League record: Orient 1 ap.; Reading 21 aps., 5 gls.; Southampton 84 aps., 4 gls.; Swindon 6(1) aps.

DAVID MOSS (Midfield)

Another Swindon discovery, David turned professional with the club in 1969 and made his first League appearance against Hull City in January 1971. After several appearances as substitute this season, he has now come more fully into team affairs. League record: Swindon 6 (7) aps., 1 gl.

RAY TREACEY (Striker)

With nine goals, Ray is now Swindon's joint leading scorer. He began his League career with West Bromwich, moved to Charlton in 1968 and last season was their top scorer with 19 goals. A Republic of Ireland international, Ray cost Swindon £35,000. League record: West Bromwich Albion 2(1) aps., 1 gl.; Charlton 144(5) aps., 43 gls.; Swindon 26 aps., 8 gls.

PETER NOBLE (Striker)

A £10,000 fee secured Peter's transfer from Newcastle in 1968 and he has been a persistent scorer for them since, never failing to reach double figures in a completed season. He was top scorer with 14 goals last season. League record: Newcastle 22(3) aps., 7 gls.; Swindon 198(4) aps., 61 gls.

STEVE PEPLOW (Striker)

Steve has netted seven times — all of them, in fact, vital ones which clinched at least a point. Steve left Liverpool two years ago after getting only a couple of League games for the Reds. League record: Liverpool 2 aps.; Swindon 37(3) aps., 11gls.

CHRIS PORTER (Striker)

Rangers won with almost nonchalant ease — although Alan Spratley had to be pull off a couple of sensational saves.

This was a win conjured straight out of the Gordon Jago managership manual — the chapter subtitled "How professional can you get?" Rangers smacked in two goals in the first half and then closed up the game so tightly that Oxford will find getting in to Wembley with forged Cup Final tickets a darn sight easier than cracking this defence. And when it was all over and Rangers were in the fifth round for only the second time in 25 years, Jago coolly said: "Of course I'm pleased about winning this game, for the sake of the fans. But I'm more pleased for myself, because this result will give us a great boost when we come back here for a League match in April." Rangers did it all so clinically, even though Oxford had gone five games at the Manor Ground without conceding a goal. This one had barely started when Rangers, who took off like a flight of Boeings, were in front. A six-man move ended when Clement, coming up on the blind side, screamed to Bowles: "Leave it" before thundering a Thomas cross. Nobody would blame Burton for that one, but he was sadly at fault with the second goal when Givens squeezed the ball just inside a post. ("Sunday People".)

Rangers looked a little tired after their Oxford cup-tie and Huddersfield had the worst of luck—but the result was never in doubt.

Don Givens added two more to his growing goal tally to push Rangers a step nearer the First Division. Rangers are now one point behind Second Division leaders Burnley, and have opened up a five-point lead on third-placed Aston Villa. And Givens—the division's leading scorer—has now netted 22 times since his bargain £38,000 move from Luton during the summer. Huddersfield are pushed into even deeper relegation trouble, and they are in real danger of going down for the second successive season. Rangers were unquestionably the better side—yet they will be the first to admit they got most of the breaks. Phil Parkes—back in goal after a two match absence—made brilliant saves from Alan Gowling, Steve Smith and Jimmy Nicholson and Rangers' defenders Ron Hunt and lan Watson cleared off the line, and Bobby Hoy hit a post. Givens gave Rangers the lead after four minutes, rounding 'keeper Terry Poole to put the finishing touch to a flowing move. He was on the spot again to head through a Gerry Francis cross after twenty-two minutes, and set up the third for Dave Thomas. Then Gowling scored within sixty seconds, and two minutes later Hoy hit a post. (Jack Steggles, "Daily Mirror".)

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE SOMEWHER

DEREK BUXTON reviews previous clashes between Rangers and today's opponents

SWINDON TOWN

QPR centainly have met Swindon Town before, in fact they have met Swindon more times than any other club.

Today's meeting will be the 113th time that the teams have met, 110 times in league matches and three times in cup games—spanning a period of 73 years.

The next highest number of games that QPR played against any one club are 106 (v. Watford),

96 (v. Reading) and 93 (v. Bristol Rovers).

It is now 19 years since Swindon last won at Loftus Road in a league match. Their last league victory was on 16th January 1954, when they won 2—0.

Since then, in the 14 league games played at Loftus Road, QPR have on 13 and one has been drawn, and QPR have scored 39 goals to Swindon's 12. In fact, since 1932, Swindon have only won twice in 25 visits—and the only times that they failed to stop QPR scoring was when they won the Like Holl City the found 1954.

two matches 2—0 in 1947 and 1954.

Like Hull City, the figure 1 seems to be an unlucky one for Swindon. They have scored a single goal on 11 visits to OPR's grounds since 1934—and have never won.

Swindon spoilt QPR's good home record against them in 1971, when they won 2—1 in the third round of the cup. They have in fact, won all the three cup matches 2—1 (1908, 1937 and 1971).

However, QPR have an equally poor record at Swindon. QPR have not won their since 1956—they have drawn six and lost seven of their last 13 visits. By scoring two goals there this season, in the 2—2 draw, QPR scored more than one goal at Swindon in a match for the first time since 1953, and in spite of scoring these two goals have only scored eight goals there in the last 16 games.

For those who like seeing plenty of goals scored, they should have been around when the sides met for the first four times. All the four games were played in 1900—and 26 goals were scored. Swindon won the first two games, 5—3 and 4—0, QPR won 7—1, and finally Swindon won 4—2.

The highest score for a match is 8—3. Swindon won 8—3 on their ground in 1908, and QPR returned the compliment in 1930 when they won at Loftus Road.



Mr. R.
