## NEWS & VIEWS

Today we entertain our friends and near neighbours from Oxford, hoping fervently for a repeat of last season's scoreline - Swindon 4, Oxford United 0.

On that occasion our visitors played entertaining football during the first-half, but missed many goal-scoring chances. The score at half-time was one goal to nil, and it was not until the final thirty minutes of the game that Swindon got on top, scoring three more goals. Arthur Horsfield, after receiving slight barracking, completed a hat-trick by scoring in the 9th, 65th and 80th minutes. John Trollope produced the fourth, after one of his well known overlaps.

The attendance numbered 14,743 spectators. We shall be pleased to repeat that figure in addition to the score-line.

Today, Oxford occupy fifth place in the League table with 33 points from 30 games. Swindon are in twenty-first position with 23 points from 29 games. A difference of 10 points, yet who would say that Oxford were in any way the better team when they defeated us 1-0 at Manor Ground on 16th December, 1972, just nine weeks ago. However, football fortunes change rapidly, and Swindon may easily gain the extra ten points.

Our present position has brought the usual crop of forebodings and prognostications, in some cases looking back and comparisons with other seasons.

Some of us can, I feel, look much further back than most of the writers. It was just fifty years ago, February 1923, that I first became actively engaged in the affairs of Swindon Town

F.C., and although there may have been slight breaks, especially World War II, that involvement has continued. A few weeks after February 1923, there came to the County Ground as Stewards' helper, a young stripling who, having just left school, had started work as an office boy in the Great Western Railway. Today that lad is with us still, filling most competently the hazardous and not very rewarding position as Chief Gate Steward. A great record of service to one club.

We still remember those days and the characters in the game at that time: 'Tober' Weston (a local); Bill Waring (a great captain); Danny Bew; Charlie Crossley; Jack Johnson; 'Jock' Macconichie; 'Ossie' Randall; Frank Richardson. Later, such names as George Morrall, Alex Lambie, Ben Morton, Abe Morris, etc.

Two names stand out, however: Harold Fleming, undoubtedly the greatest player ever for Swindon; and the one and only Sam Allen, a wise and sagacious man, the doyen of managers. With due respect to all who have followed, including those who claim to have balanced the books, he still stands out, head and shoulders. Known and respected throughout the football world, he was a great negotiator, and one who was responsible for bringing some of the greatest players to Swindon. His forecasts and predictions are still coming true.

So you see, the Chief Steward and myself could so easily say: 'We have seen it all before'. True, but we still have faith in this 'our' club. Come what may it will go forward, and indeed that can be now.

A repeat today of last season's performance will be quite sufficient.



# Les Allen's Column

Last Saturday's match at Queen's Park Rangers proved to be our most disappointing game to date. We failed in most departments and seemed to stop believing in ourselves as the game progressed. But let us take nothing away from Q.P.R., they are a very good side indeed, and any club that spends something in the region of £500,000 are entitled to see some reward for their outlay. We have now to do well in our remaining fixtures to keep out of relegation trouble, but with the right application on the field I am sure we can pull round. We need all the encouragement we can get from you right until the end of the season — even when things are not going quite right.

I would like to thank all the supporters who have written to me over the past few weeks giving me backing and sometimes advice. I do believe that everyone has an opinion, and your letters do not go into the wastepaper basket. One such letter on support for the team read as follows:

Dear Mr. Allen,

I would like to say how disappointed I have been with the Town end supporters. A few seasons ago no matter which team or supporters came to Swindon they were always outnumbered and could very rarely be heard because of the Town end supporters. So I would like to appeal to you and ask you to put a piece in the programme and in the local papers asking all the young supporters up to the age of about 25 to go to the Town end and make their support heard, because I think this would help the players no end. Just look at last Saturday's game between us and Aston Villa — there was no singing or chanting from the Swindon supporters. Aston Villa supporters summed it up well when they sang: 'Swindon, where are you?'. I hope you feel the same and try and do something about this. I would like to hear your views on this, if you could write

back. I will be there at the Town end against Oxford and hope to see hundreds more of us.

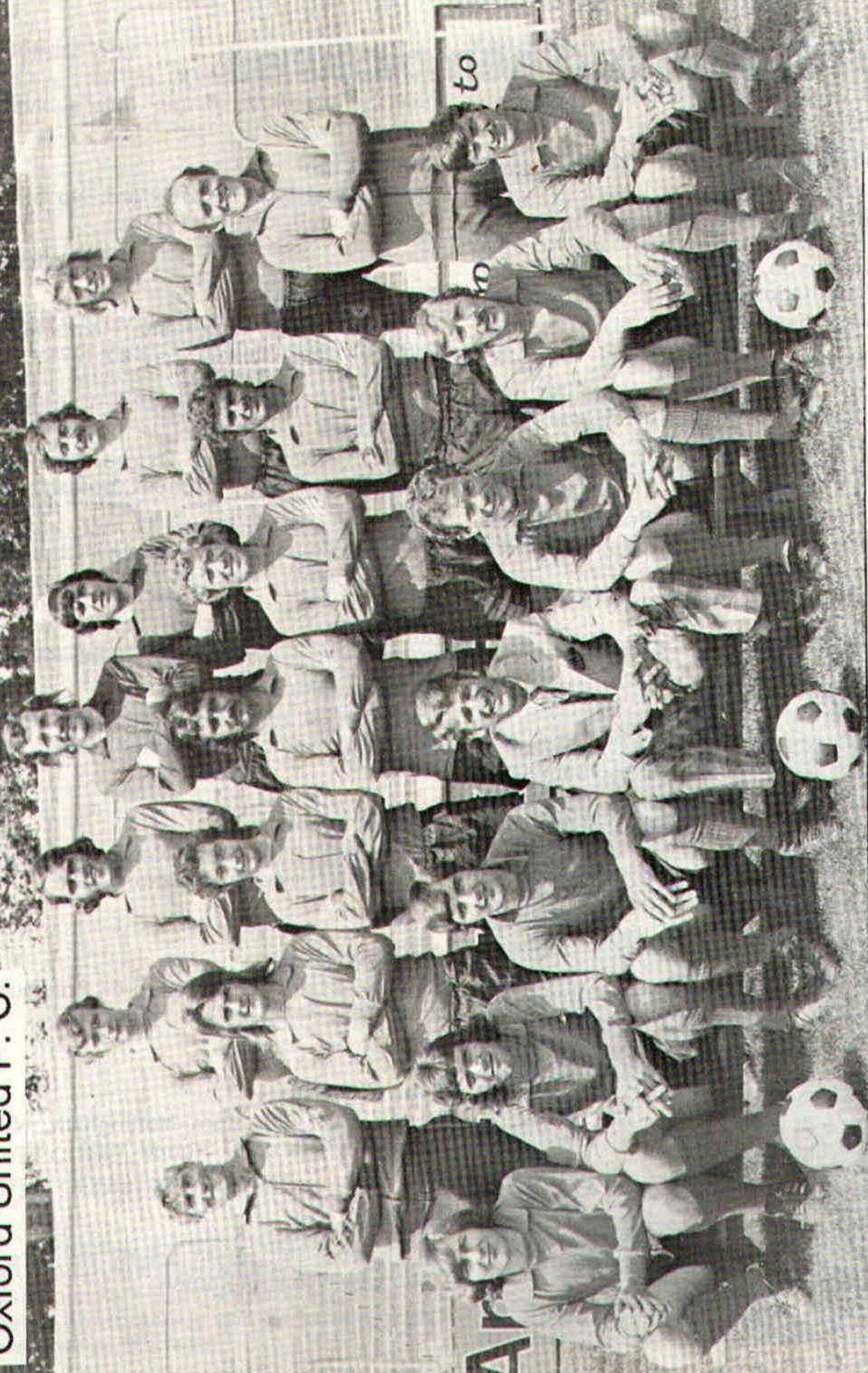

## W. J. Gow

### Swansea

Seconded to both the F.I.F.A. and U.E.F.A. referees' panels in 1966 by which time he had been a Football League Referee for three years. A schoolmaster, he started refereeing in 1953 in Swansea and graduated through the Welsh League and the Football Combination before being elected to the League line in 1961.

A very experienced international referee, he has taken charge of numerous European Nations Cup ties, European Cup games and internationals. He refereed the Northern Ireland v Scotland game in 1965/66, the Welsh Cup Final in 1967 and Football League Cup semi-final in 1969/70. He also took charge of the England v Northern Ireland game last season.

Married, with two daughters, he is interested in painting and gardening.
