

### **NEWS & VIEWS**

Today we begin the last four matches of this season. Vital games they are indeed, all played within the space of eleven days — two home (counting today) and two away. Next weekend we visit London on successive days — Fulham on Good Friday and Orient on the Saturday. Then on the following Tuesday (24th April) comes the final game of the season, Hull City at the County Ground. One hopes by then our league position will be secure, otherwise a few unfortunate people will be 'sweating it out' while clubs below us in the league table complete their fixtures.

Certainly the results of the last two games have put a much brighter future on our position. Clubs below us in the table have, in most cases, games in hand, and some could possibly overtake us; but points count and we already have those. Matches in hand do not necessarily mean points. The point gained at Cardiff was doubly welcome, as it still keeps us four points ahead, although having played three more games.

Today's game, as well as being most important for us, will no doubt be a hard one. Millwall, always a strong side, have shown great improvement since Christmas as instanced by their great Cup win at Everton in January.

Last season when they visited Swindon they were strong candidates for promotion, being second in the league, with the following record: played 16; won 8; drew 7; lost 1; goals for 28, against 20; points 23.

Millwall certainly proved their position to be a true one by winning by two goals to nil. It was a hard match, but Swindon enjoyed a fair share of the game in the first half, Millwall taking control in the second and scored through Possee and Bridges (both of those players have since left the club). They did not gain promotion, being beaten at the very end by Birmingham. This season, strange to relate,

they started very badly (Swindon drew one each at the Den in December).

They have now recovered the form of last season, and occupy eleventh position in the table with 37 points.

Congratulations to Bryan King, who played in the England XI at Malta on Monday. A splendid goalkeeper, missed by Swindon.

One often hears the comment 'Football is a funny game.' Surely the win by Sunderland in the F.A. Cup Semi-Final proves that. Remember when Sunderland visited the County Ground on 20th January. They were nineteenth in the league table with twenty points. Swindon were in sixteenth place, with tweny-two points.

It was an extremely wet day, and Bob Stokoe really wanted the game abandoned.

Swindon led at the interval by the only goal scored. Then Frank Burrows was injured and had to leave the field. Sunderland equalised, and were happy to go away with a point. That injury proved disastrous for Swindon, as we lost five games in a row, and even now have not regained our form.

Sunderland, on the other hand, have gone from strength to strength. Apart from reaching the Cup Final, they have improved their league position to thirteenth with 34 points from 32 games. They will need to add a few more points to their total, but no doubt their thoughts will be on Wembley.

It is good to see a Division II team contesting the Cup Final.

Sunderland last won the Cup in 1937, when a Swindon lad (John Mapson) played in goal for them.

We are now two points behind West Bromwich Albion with two games in hand, so if our lads can keep up the good form they have shown for most of the season. they must have an excellent chance of winning the title.



Bryan King

Born Bishops Stortford, Herts. Age 25. Joined Chelmsford City as a youth. Was transferred to Millwall 12th June, 1967. Made his debut in Football League in October 1967 v Blackpool. Took over as regular custodian in 1968/69 season. Reckoned by many to be the best keeper in Second Division.

### **FULL-BACKS**

Bryan Brown

Born Shoreditch, London. Joined Chelsea as apprentice in 1964, turned pro 1966. Was signed by Millwall in March 1968. Age 22.

**Harry Cripps** 

Born Plaistow, London. Joined West Ham United in 1959 and was signed by Millwall in 1961. Club's longest serving player and was given a testimonial last season. Holds club record for number of first team appearances.

#### HALF-BACKS

Alan Dorney

Born Bermondsey, London. Age 25. Joined club as schoolboy then amateur in 1963. After two years as amateur signed as a part-time pro whilst continuing his apprenticeship as a printer. Turned full-time in 1968. Made his league debut against Carlisle United on 13th September, 1969, and has been regular right-half ever since.

**Barry Kitchener** 

Born Dagenham, Essex. Joined club as apprentice on 10th August, 1964. A year later turned pro. Made his debut against Birmingham City in February 1967 and the following season took over as regular centre-half. Age 24.

#### **Dennis Burnett**

Born Bermondsey, London. Age 27. Joined West Ham in October 1962. Transferred to Millwall, August 1967. Originally a full-back converted to the role of sweeper.

#### SWINDON'S MINI-RESERVATIONS CENTRE

The box office of Swindon Town Football Club is a mini-reservations centre for Keith Prowse. The box office is installed with a computer terminal which is linked directly with a central Keith Prowse computer in Shaftesbury Avenue.

All the Keith Prowse allocations of seats in theatres, cinemas, sports arenas etc. have now been programmed on to the computer. Keith Prowse control over 40% of all London Theatre sales and have been in the business for nearly 150 years. They have, in effect, the best and widest allocations of seats of any ticket agency. This means that the box office manager a Swindon Town has direct access to any of these seats without having to use the telephone. All he needs to do when he receives an enquiry from a customer or an agent about the availability of a certain event is to press the relevant buttons. In a few seconds the answer is relayed via the teletype machine. If the seats requested are not available, the best alternatives are suggested. When the customer has made his decision, a sell button is pushed and within seconds the ticket printer prints out a ticket with all the information on it, as if purchased direct from the box office. The computer also automatically takes those seats out of circulation, so there is no risk of duplication.

Agents around Swindon can now make use of this new facility. It means that instead of those time-wasting costly telephone calls to London. Agents can now telephone Swindon Town and immediately find out the availability of seats. If the tickets are available, the Agent makes out his own ticket.


