# Jack Charlton talks

During this past month or so, we have had to play on a good many pitches, most of them of the "sticky" variety, and it has made all of us realise how fortunate we are to have such a marvellous playing surface at Ayresome Park. I would like you to know though that this playing surface has only been attained by really hard and diligent work by Wilf Atkinson and his staff, who as soon as the match is over on a Saturday, usually go straight out onto the pitch, and starts putting it back after we have kicked H . . . out of it. This has meant working quite late on Saturdays and Sundays over many weeks when other people are out enjoying themselves. Well done Wilf and your lads! Ayresome Park is a credit to you and to all of us.

After our defeat at Wrexham, I was asked what I thought about the game, and in particular about the Draw, Southampton against Wrexham, and I did say at the time that Wrexham would cause Southampton quite a few problems, especially if they caught them on a sticky wicket-and so it turned out. Wrexham putting on another very stout display and by all accounts, winning on merit. This kind of thing is very good for football, and I personally like to see this happen; apart from creating much more interest in the town of Wrexham it will go a long way to helping that club, particularly financially, at a time when everyone is worried about inflation and rising prices. We wish them the best of luck.

I was very proud of our lads at Hull last Saturday. After losing two matches, one by



a big margin, it showed that they can come back with a great win by displaying character and detremination. The win was a very good one, particularly their first half display. There were a few reports in the papers about my being angry at their relaxation during the course of the second half, and although this was slightly exaggerated, I have had words with one or two players who I felt were responsible, and I am sure they appreciate what is required. A special word of praise for Peter Brine who did extremely well, in an unusual position, apart from the relaxation in the second half-probably because Peter was feeling the strain of playing in a strange position, and the pace and his assessment of the game.

Once again the Juniors put up a good performance on Wednesday against Liverpool, to progress into the 5th Round of the F.A. Youth Cup. Their 3-2 victory was gained by a competent all round display. They now go forward to meet yet another First Division Junior side in the 5th Round, when we will be at home to Arsenal. The date of this match has not yet been agreed. We are very optimistic after beating both Leeds and Liverpool, of reaching the Semi-final for the first time.

It is a great thrill for the kids to be involved in this competition, against youth sides they are not liable to meet in the course of their normal games—they will only become better players because of it—well done! Keep going!



# MIROUGING...

# SWINDON TOWN BY TONY PULLEIN



A run of adverse results has placed Swindon in serious danger of relegation. But manager Les Allen has not been sitting back waiting for things to happen. With some of the money received from the sale of defender Rod Thomas, to Derby, and striker Ray Treacy (who has joined Preston) he has purchased defenders David Munks, John McLaughlin and Bill Dixon. Mr. Allen also signed Peter Eastoe on loan from Wolves, but he has now been recalled to Molineux.

McLaughlin, a 19-year-old who won a regular place in Colchester's Fourth Division side last season, initially took over at right-back but he then gave way to Bill Dixon, the former Arsenal and Reading player, who started this season with Colchester.

So the back four has been lining up: Dixon, Harry Burrows, David Munks and John Trollope.

Burrows first entered English football with Scunthorpe in 1965 after serving Raith Rovers. Swindon signed him in 1968 and only injuries have since kept hilm out of the side. Munks, a former England youth player, began his career with Sheffield United, transferring to Portsmouth in 1969. He is now settling down after his latest transfer.

Trollope has been on parade — apart from a srort injury absence — continually for 12 seasons. He has now beaten the club record of 554 League appearances set up by Maurice Owen nine years ago, and in one unbroken run he played 368 consecutive games.

The midfield players include Terry Hubbard, Joe Butler, Tom Jenkins, Ken Stroud and David Syrett.

Hubbard, who made his debut in 1970/71. is a player who appears destined for the very top. And, following an injury-imposed lay-off, Tom Jenkins has been displaying the type of football that made him a force in the First Division—though

he has now switched from outside-left to midfield.

Swindon paid a club record £50,000 fee to Southampton for Tom last season. Once discarded by West Ham and Orient, Tom drifted into non-League football witr Margate until given a come-back chance by Reading in 1969. Within weeks he was the subject of a £60,000 transfer to Southampton.

Butler, who was signed from Newcastle in 1965, has played in several positions for Swindon, proving one of their most valuable players over the years. He recently shifted again from defence to midfield.

Syrett, who made his debut this season, and Stroud both developed in the club's junior teams.

Peter Eastoe, who took over as chief striker, scored four goals in his first five games for Swindon. Mick McGovern, a £10,000 signing from Queen's Park Rangers last season, was enjoying regular League soccer for the first time until struck down by injury a few weeks ago.

Raiding down the left wing is David Moss, now filling the role left vacant by the departure of Don Rogers last season. Moss is another Swindon discovery.

Goalkeeper Jimmy Allan developed at the County Ground, made his League debut in 1971/72 and this season took over permanently from Peter Downsborough. Because of his religious beliefs, Allan became the first professional to take advantage of the option in his contract not to play on a Sunday. This gave Alan Spratley an £8,000 close-season signing from Queen's Park Rangers, his first game in Swindon's first team.

Manager Les Allen, the former Spurs and England player, began his managerial career with Queen's Park Rangers and took over at Swindon last season as successor to Dave Mackay.



# FROM THE BOARDROOM

Having received a large number of messages and letters, I wish to clear the air regarding my past statements to the Press, relating to the televising of Football League games. I do not propose to go into the pros and cons as to whether television is good for the game, but whether the present offer from the television authorities is reasonable in comparison to the cost paid by them for their other sources of entertainment. Their existing payment which ends this season, and their proposals for the next three years are ludicrous,

It must be realised that only a handful of the 92 League clubs can exist on the cash they receive through the turnstiles, whilst at the same time, many millions of pounds are circulating in commerce, and not only television but the football pools, press, transport and many businesses thrive on the existence of the clubs. It is only right therefore, that those who benefit so much by our efforts should be prepared at least to ensure that we have the necessary financial support to plough back into the game.

The hard facts are these. A team like the Boro needs an average attendance of about 25,000 at each of our home games, just to maintain a Second Division set up. This is without allowing for the financing of any items such as new signings, major ground improvements etc. The contribution made to our finances from television and radio is negligible. example, for the 1972/73 season we received £3,245, made up of £2,045 from the League Television Pool, £1,200 from Tyne Tees and Yorkshire T.V., £3.15 per match broadcast by B.B.C. Radio, and nil from Radio Teesside. These are gross figures from which must be deducted the loss of revenue for seating occupied by technicians, etc. during the game.

Make no mistake, we are in the entertainment business in a big way, and our first loyalties are to the fans who come to Ayresome Park. If their entertainment is to be shared by millions of non-attenders, the television authorities should recognise that they must pay a figure which is far more realistic than the present offer in return for the many hours of viewing supplied by the football clubs.



My suggested figures of 3½ million per year television (£65,000 a week) equal to one ½p per person for the 10-15 million viewers who want football on their screens live.

Edited versions do not give a proper

and true picture of the game.

From the various pools giants, not less than £10 million, preferably £15 million. After putting £1 million a year for the benefit of players, a further million to a joint Football Association and Football League Fund, the rest should go to the clubs and properly used, would result in vastly improved stadiums for all types of sport, plus better performances from clubs in the lower divisions.

There is no doubt that a worried beard almost always affects the playing standards and all praise must be given to the Directors (especially to those of 3rd and 4th Division), for their very hard work trying to keep their heads above water,

year after year.

The figures above are positively realistic more so when a young man playing football for millions of people has a football "life" for an average of ten years, after which time he has to start all over again—very often from the bottom rung of the ladder.
