NEWS&VIEWS

This afternoon we welcome back another of our friends from the Southern League days, who like ourselves became original members of League 3.

Unfortunately Gillingham (earlier known as New Brompton) dropped out of League soccer altogether in 1938. However in 1950 they gained re-election to the old Third Division South, when the South and North divisions were each extended to 24 clubs. They went down in 1958, but in 1964 returned as champions.

Gillingham is one of those clubs too close to London, and by virtue of low attendances is forced to live on a shoestring budget. That the club keeps going in an area where there is not much enthusiasm for soccer, is in no small measure due to the efforts of Dr. Grossmark, Chairman for many, many years. He is one of the four associate members of the League Liaison Committee representing the Third and Fourth Divisions, and devotes much of his time fighting for more recognition of the smaller clubs. He tried very hard to get the League Pool distributed proportionately rather than according to each club's gross receipts at the end of the season.

Gillingham has always been somewhat of a 'bogey' team for Swindon, both home and away. If you study the actual results (printed on another page), goals have been hard to come by at Gillingham, especially since their return to the league in 1950. Somehow they have presented tough opposition on the County Ground. In season 1957-58, they gained a magnificent draw 2-2 despite the fact goalkeeper Simpson was injured early in the game and hobbled badly throughout the rest of the match (no substitutes).

The last time Gillingham played at Swindon was on Tuesday, 25th February 1969, the year we won the League Cup, and gained promotion. Swindon occupied top position in the league table with 43 points from 30 games, whilst our visitors were third from bottom with 22 points from 28 games. The game was played on a very wet foggy evening before a gate of 17,458 (oh for that number this afternoon). Despite the difference of position between the two teams, Gillingham put up a great fight and actually missed several good chances to score in the first half. Although Swindon dominated the whole of the second half, no goal was forthcoming until the very last minute of a somewhat lengthy period of injury time.

As already stated Swindon gained promotion but am sorry to say our visitors

Tough going for Gillingham by Tony Pullein

Gillingham, one of last season's successful Fourth Division promotion candidates, have been finding the going mighty tough in the higher League, a recent run of eight games without a win plummetting them to bottom place in the table. So it is small wonder that new manager Len Ashurst, who joined the Gills from Hartlepool during the summer, has been making a number of changes.

One man who has given Mr. Ashurst hope is Peter Feely who has been on the mark regularly since joining them on loan from Fulham. Peter, a former England amatuer international, played a few First Division games for Chelsea but was transferred to Bournemouth in 1972/73. Fulham signed him this summer. Gillingham have now completed Feely's transfer for £6,000.

Feely initially came in for Brian Yeo, the club's record breaking goalscorer. Brian joined the Gills from Portsmouth in 1963 and he has now scored 131 League goals for them.

Damien Richardson, Alan Wilks, George Jacks and David Chadwick number among Gillingham's other strikers.

Richardson joined Gillingham from Shamrock Rovers in October 1972 and enjoyed a tremendously successful first season, ending up top scorer with 14 goals. Last season he bagged 18. Wilks began his professional career with Chelsea, didn't make the League eleven and so moved to Q.P.R. in 1966. Gillingham signed him during the 1971 close-season.

Jacks got only one League game with his first club, Queen's Park Rangers, but met

with more success after joining Millwall in 1965, making over 150 first-team appearances for the Lions. He joined Gillingham two seasons ago.

Chadwick arrived this season from Bournemouth, where he had spent three years. He began his career with Hampshire rivals Southampton, moved on to Middlesbrough in 1966 and then enjoyed two years at Halifax before signing for Bournemouth.

Midfield players could be selected from Kenny Hill, David Galvin and Neil O'Donnell.

Hill is a former apprentice who made his League debut in 1971/72. Galvin had a few First Division games with Wolves before joining the Gills in 1969.

O'Donnell arrived during the recent closeseason after making 50 League appearances for Norwich City.

Goalkeeper Ron Hillyard was one of many close-season signings. He was once a York City regular and also spent half a season in Hartlepool's senior team while on loan to them.

Several players are challenging for defensive positions, among them being Keith Lindsey, David Shipperley, Graham Knight, Dick Tydeman and George Ley.

Lindsey, a man of many clubs, set out on his League career with Scunthorpe in 1965/66. At the end of that season he went to Doncaster but, after only a short stay, he went non-League with Cambridge United. Southend brought him back into League soccer in 1968. A further move took him to Port Vale in 1971 and two seasons ago he signed for Gillingham.

Shipperley, the former Charlton player who served Plymouth on Ioan for a while last season, arrived this summer. Knight and Tydeman both developed in the club's juniors while Ley was signed only recently from Brighton. A one-time Arsenal winger, he switched to full-back with Exeter and then joined Portsmouth in 1967. Brighton signed him in 1972.





FEELY'S FIRST HAT-TRICK

Gillingham, who come to the County Ground today, ran up their best win of the season when they crushed Halifax 4-0 last Saturday, thanks largely to a hattrick — his first in senior football — by Peter Feely, their recent £6,000 signing from Fulham. It was Feely's tenth goal in eight games for the Gills.

Feely's scoring burst must rile Bournemouth fans. Feely was given a free transfer by the Cherries at the end of last season but they could do with him now. Bournemouth's 0-2 reverse at Walsall was their fifth successive defeat and they have managed to score only twice in six games. This latest set-back put them in second-from-bottom place.

Aldershot goalkeeper Tony Godfrey has won his fight with the specialists and, after being told he would never play again, he has now been given the go-ahead. Godfrey had been out of match action since injuring a knee against York City last Christmas though he had kept in training throughout the current campaign.

"I could train all right and even play in practice matches out on the field," he said. "The big problem was that I was not able to dive and that's quite a disadvantage for a goalkeeper!"

Hereford's fine run of nine games without defeat ended at Wrexham where they went down 1-2. Dixie McNeil, as usual, got his name on the scoring list with his 13th goal of the season for Hereford. Team of the moment in Division Three is Plymouth Argyle. They were robbed of both points in their home match against Watford when Leo Markham equalised for the visitors two minutes from time. Even so, they looked back on a run of five games which had produced nine points — quite the best current sequence in this division. Argyle's goal was scored by Brian Johnson, his third in successive matches.

Graham Tutt, who has recently taken over in Charlton's goal, is at six feet, three inches, one of the tallest players in the League. Yet five years ago, Charlton turned him down because they said he was — too small! He was only a school-boy then and was rather late developing but, once he did start to put on the inches, you could almost watch him grow!

Tutt didn't have a happy time last weekend, however. Promotion-chasing Charlton was beaten 3-0 at Aldershot.

Southend's amazing 4-1 win at Preston last Saturday equalled the highest away score achieved by any Third Division club away from home this season. It wasn't quite the best victory, though. That honour went, ironically, to Preston who earlier won 4-0 at Brighton. It was Southend's best performance away from home since they succeeded 4-2 at Chesterfield in March 1973.

Huddersfield's Alan Gowling, their top scorer for the past two season, is fast

The Chairmans Column

Directors of football clubs are not often in the news unless it is when a club dismisses it's manager or perhaps when telling the public that the club cannot afford to spend money on new players. But they have now been attacked by Mr. Bob Lord, Chairman of Burnley Football Club and member of the Football League Management Committee. Mr. Lord accuses Directors of football clubs of generally being on the Board of clubs just for the sake of the kudos of the game and also of being ignorant of the game in general. This is a most unfair criticism of men all over the country who spend their time and money helping to provide enjoyment to many thousands of people. Men join clubs from all walks of life as Directors and who is Mr. Lord to say that they are even ignorant of the laws of the game.

What are the general duties and responsibilities of a football club Director? I have been a Director of Swindon Town for more than fifteen years and in my humble opinion the most important duty is to help carry out the club policy. The most important members of a happy and successful club are a good team manager, a good team of players, a good club secretary and a Board of Directors who are prepared to back their manager without interference and at the same time keep an eye on the finances of the club. To do this means giving up a great deal of spare time to attend Board meetings where decisions are taken regarding the best ways to keep the club solvent whilst at the same time trying not to tie down the management too much.

Many clubs have to call upon their Directors to lend sums of money to help strengthen the playing staffs, some even to help meet the wage bill. Are these men then deserving of the criticism levelled at them and are they not deserving of some of the perks of the game? I am sure that Mr. Lord's comments will bring forth a lot of comment and I consider that the Daily Express has taken the right line in ridiculing this attack in a very humerous

article.

We are still keeping amongst the leaders of the third division, our away points being of immense value. I am sure that our supporters will be very pleased with Danny's team building and when every player is fit for selection he will have his problems. But that is his job and he revels in it.

Our reserve team does not get the publicity that the first team receives for obvious reasons but behind the scenes they are far from forgotten. Our reserve strength is ultimately the strength of our first team. Owing to the present financial position of clubs today, few of them can keep a big staff for the reserve team and we at Swindon have embarked upon a policy of playing our young apprentices at reserve level as far as possible blended in with the usual two or three senior players. The few hundred or so who attend our reserve games of course soon get to know who the youngsters are but I am sure there are many of our followers who would like to know a little more about these up and coming youngsters. Jimmy Allan of course needs no introduction and although only twenty years of age is one of our ex apprentices who has already made the first team and we are certain that there is a bright future for Jim in the game and I hope that he will remain with us for many years. The deputy for Jim is a lad of sixteen years of age called Mike Lawrence and he is one of our apprentices. Mike of course plays in our Midland Youth Team, he is 6'3" tall, comes from Stourbridge and looks to have a future in the game. Playing at full back, or in the back four if you prefer that terminology, are two young lads called Geoffrey Chalklin and Keith Tanner. Geof is eighteen and a former apprentice and is a strong determined player, whilst Keith, at sixteen, really looks like making a good player. We had both John Trollope and Terry Wooland, both local boys, in our first team at sixteen years of age and so why



SECRETARY'S NOTES

As a consequence of the recommendations of a Working Party set up by the Minister of Sport to investigate crowd behaviour at soccer matches we have erected two fences on the terraces at the County Ground and, in so doing, have created an enclosure under the South Stand. Although we are delighted with the behaviour of our younger supporters this season I am sure that there are very many folk who stay away from the County Ground for fear of interference from hooligans. In order that they might now attend our matches in complete safety it is our intention, from Saturday next to restrict entry into the enclosure to adults and those children and young people who are accompanied by adults only. Young folk not accompanied will not be allowed into this area. Entry into the enclosure will be through those turnstiles at the Shrivenham Road/Car Park South West corner of the ground — there will be no admittance to the Town End through these turnstiles. Entry to the Town End will be through turnstiles at the North Stand end of the terrace and the juniors' turnstiles have been relocated at that end.

Any unaccompanied child not wishing to stand in the Town End, and I am sure there are many, are still assured of covered accommodation and they should enter the ground either at the Stratton Bank end or at the centre of the South Stand, the Eastern end of this covered terrace accommodation being available to them.

In short, there are no restrictions to adults and unaccompanied children can enter any part of the ground with the exception of the new enclosure.





BEEF BRAISED IN RED WINE

1 lb. Beef Flour Butter 2 Onions (small) 2 Carrots 1 glass Brandy Bouquet Garni Pepper and salf ½ bottle Burgundy Beef stock cube

Cut the meat into large cubes, discarding the fat. Cover them in flour and brown well in butter. Chop the carrots and onions and cook them in butter till soft. (Add a few herbs if desired). Set the brandy alight and pour it over the beef. Add the cooked vegetables (with their butter). Add the bouquet garni and seasoning. Add the burgundy. If it is not enough to cover the meat, make up some stock with the beef cube. Cover tightly and cook for about 2% hours.
