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NEWS & VIEWS

Today we entertain a club, with an outstanding record, and how sad it is to see this fine team, fighting to avoid relegation to the Fourth Division. What famous names come to memory, especially during their golden era from 1919 – 1930, a stretch of eleven seasons.

It is hard to believe that in 1919 Huddersfield, was about to close down and move to Leeds. One man was mainly responsible for saving the day. He was later to become Chairman of the Football Association Sir Brook Hirst O.B.E. He appointed Herbert Chapman (probably the greatest manager ever in British Football).

Under his guidance Huddersfield became the leading club in the country, gaining promotion to Division 1 and being finalist in his first season. In 1921-22 they won the F.A. Cup defeating Preston 1 - 0 in the Final.

Then came the winning of the League Championship three years in succession, followed immediately by the position of runners-up twice. What players comprised the team – Wadsworth, Goodall, Wilson, Glen Stephenson, Billy Smith, Alec Jackson, Bob Kelly - all internationals. Herbert Chapman of course moved on to

Arsenal, and that club became an outstanding one in the thirties, as Huddersfield had been in the twenties.

We last played Huddersfield in League Division 2 in season 1973-73. Both games resulted in 1 - 1 draws.

The match at Swindon on Saturday 11th November 1972, produced a splendid first half, but the second provided a poor spectacle; mainly due to the fact the visitor's goalkeeper was sent off, after disputing a penalty. Gowling scored for Huddersfield and Treacy equalized after a retaken penalty. Seven players were booked by the referee. Two from Swindon John Trollope and Tommy Jenkins (his first appearance).

Swindon – Downsborough, Thomas, Trollope, Smart, Burrows, Potter, Peplow, Howell, Treacy, Noble, Jenkins.

The composition of teams soon change.

Unfortunately at the end of the season. Huddersfield was relegated, but only due to the fact, their goal average was inferior to Cardiff City who finished with the same number of points. Now they are fighting for survival in Division 3.

Ex-champs Huddersfield in dire trouble

A shattering sequence, which saw them win only twice in 16 League games played between November and March left Huddersfield Town bottom of the table, facing the drop to Division Four for the first time in their history. If they do go, Huddersfield will become the first ex-champion club ever to fall into the Fourth Division.

Manager Bobby Collins certainly hasn't been sitting around waiting for things to happen, though. He went into the transfer market for two experienced players -- Brian O'Neil, from Southampton, and Colin Garwood (Oldham) -- and he has been instrumental in giving several of his best young players a run.

Just before this season's deadline Mr. Collins arranged a swop deal with Blackburn, Bobby Hoy leaving for Ewood Park with Barry Endean signing for Huddersfield.

O'Neil played for the England under-23 team and the Football League XI in his Burnley days, then he moved on to Southampton in 1970 to become the powerhouse of the Saints in midfield. His move to Leeds Road cost Huddersfield £40,000.

Garwood, a one-time England youth cap, began his League career with Peterborough in 1968 and soon became one of their successful strikers. Oldham signed him in 1971 and he continued to find the target regularly for them until his transfer.

Endean began life as a striker with Watford, leading their scoring list in his first season (1968/69) in their senior team.

Charlton signed him for £20,000 in 1971 but he stayed only eight months before moving on to Blackburn.

Endean usually plays in midfield these days so, unless there have been further changes, the strikers could be Garwood, Alan Gowling and Jimmy Lawson.

With 25 goals, Gowling was one of the country's most successful strikers last season. He also topped Huddersfield's list with 17 goals the previous year and, at the moment, leads again with 16. Certainly he has fully justified the club record £60,000 fee which Huddersfield paid Manchester United for him in 1972. Alan's early appearances for United's first-team were limited but he became a United regular three seasons ago when he also gained an England under-23 cap.

Lawson was only 18 when he got his chance in Middlesbrough's team in 1966/67. Two years later he was transferred to Huddersfield for £6,000 and three seasons ago he was the club's leading scorer.

Apart from Endean and O'Neil, the other contenders for midfield places include Terry Dolan (who has also played in defence), Martin Fowler, Lloyd Maitland and Terry Gray.

Dolan previously played for both Bradford City and Bradford P.A. prior to signing for Huddersfield in 1970. Fowler developed in the club's juniors, making his League debut in November 1973.

Maitland was once with Coventry as a junior. Huddersfield signed him initially as an apprentice and he got his chance in

their first-team this season.

Gray, who can also play in defence, was once with Chelsea as a schoolboy. He joined Huddersfield in August 1972, and it was at Southend in November 1973 that he made his League debut at left-back.

The back four has been reasonably settled with Graham McGifford, John Saunders, Roy Ellam and Paul Garner in the back four.

McGifford took over the right-back spot for the latter period of last season after previously making only one substitute appearance.

Huddersfield signed Saunders from Mansfield in October 1972 after he had spent two years as a Stags' first-teamer. Now he has settled in exceptionally well at centre-back for Huddersfield.

Ellam is now in his second spell at Leeds Road. He initially signed in 1966 after four years as a Bradford City regular and he left for Leeds United in 1972. He got only occasional first-team chances at Ellend Road, however, so he returned to Huddersfield this season.

Richard Taylor has taken over in goal from Terry Poole. Taylor arrived at Huddersfield as a 15 year old and last season played five times in their League eleven.

Huddersfield Town have long since surrendered the limelight to their close neighbours Leeds United, but there was a time when they were even more famous than the current Leeds' club. Huddersfield were the first club to win a hat-trick of League Championships (they were also runners-up three times) and between the wars they appeared in five F.A. Cup finals, winning the trophy in 1922.

They were great years, all right, the twenties. For apart from their League successes, the Town won the F.A. Cup in 1922 and were runners-up in 1920,

1928 and 1930. As sensationally as they hit the top, so the Town faded quietly away. After that period of unprecedented success they only once again (1934) managed to finish as high as second in Division 1 and only once again (in 1938) reached the F.A. Cup final.

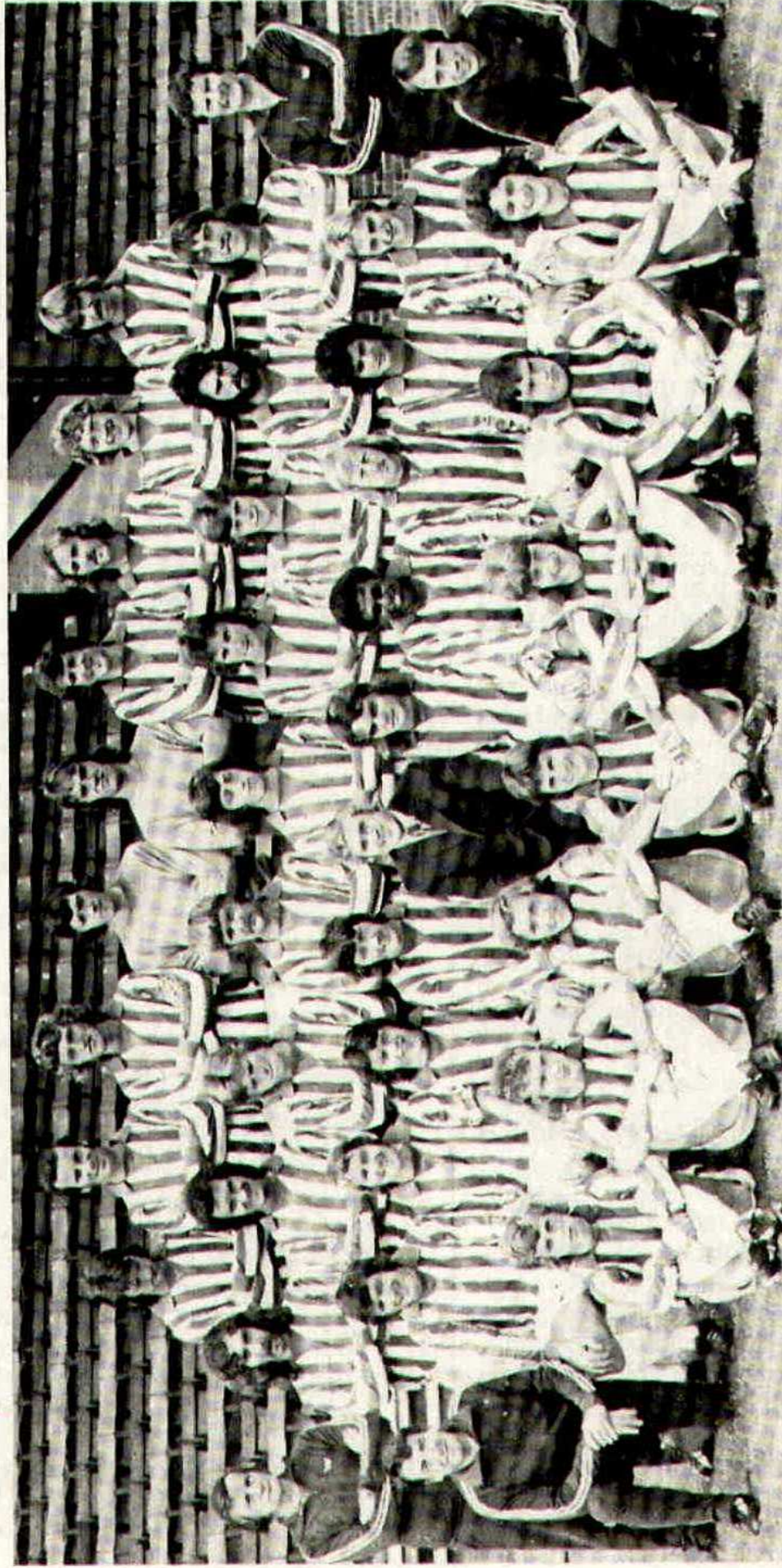
After an unbroken run of 25 seasons in the top section, they were relegated to Division II in 1952, but regained their place at the first attempt.

In that Second Division promotion campaign of 1952/53 Huddersfield created what is believed to be a League record in keeping their entire defence (Wheeler, Staniforth, Kelly, McGarry, McEvoy, Quedsted) intact for the whole of their 42-match programme.

The club spent three more seasons in Division One before settling down to a long spell of Second Division football. They rose to the First Division again in 1970 but dropped back again two years later. In 1973 they sank into Division Three.

The Chairmans Column

Today we meet Huddersfield Town, a team that has had success in the First Division and now sadly struggles to remain in the Third Division. It is not easy to gain promotion, as we know only too well, and each year seems to level the clubs in strength. This is the second game in a week when we have met opponents fighting to get off the bottom of the League, and in between these games have played Peterborough and Charlton at the top, and there is very little difference between any of these teams. One thing that the alteration to three up and down has done is to create interest for the public over a longer period. The relegation of Manchester United certainly caused greater crowds wherever they went this year and I am sure that if teams like Tottenham, Chelsea and Arsenal from the South should have to play in lower divisions, than they are in now, the interest shown would be reflected in the gate returns.

Our ground committee members have arranged a meeting for this coming week with the Sports Turf Research Institute when they will inspect the playing surface and advise us of the work required to be done during this coming close season. The drainage work completed during the last close season has proved very successful, and we can only hope that we shall be as lucky this time with the top soil. It would mean so much to us if we could give our present team a good playing surface.

Referees continue to attract the news with controversial decisions that are made controversial by the medium of the television and the press. Mr. Clive Thomas came under the limelight last weekend when he awarded a penalty to Liverpool against Birmingham, and in spite of the claims of the dissentors, the cameras came to his aid and proved beyond doubt that he was right. This was one case when television was a help to the referee, but I am afraid that this medium can react

against the referee too often, and a referee has to make instant split second decisions, and his decisions have to be binding and final. Sometimes a decision goes against one and sometimes for, and so we usually go through a season breaking even.

Over the years refereeing has become more difficult because the game has become faster and when a man is nearing fifty years of age it seems ridiculous to ask him to keep pace with the young players of today. That he does keep up with the game is a tribute to the man's keenness to keep himself trim, and to this end the Referees Association held a training session on our ground on a Sunday which was run by Frank Burrows, Jim Barron, Eddy Buckley, helped out by several of our lads. After this session they held their meeting, and I am sure that they were pleased to rest after their training session. These get togethers must do a lot of good to produce good relations between referees and professional clubs.

Our game against Charlton Athletic was exciting to the very end, and very few people left the ground until after the final whistle. Arthur Horsfield played very well for them in the middle of their defence. He was a popular player with us as a centre-forward, and he was generous in his praise for our team after game.

We hope today's game will be as entertaining and thank you all for your support.

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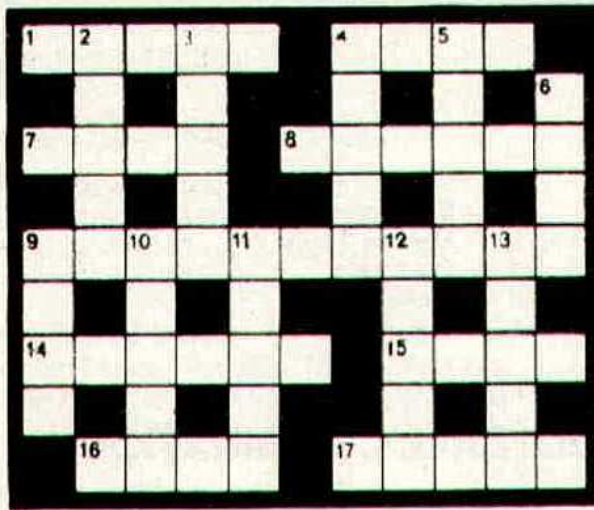
Danny's Desk

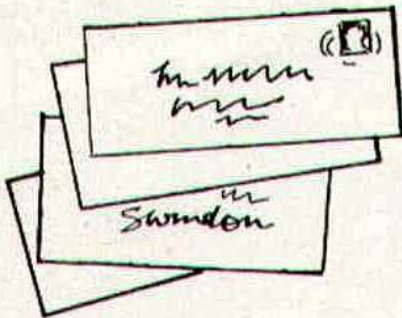

Bournemouth & Huddersfield say farewell

Successive Easter defeats for Bournemouth at Brighton (1-2) and at home to Halifax (0-1) - - - virtually sealed their relegation fate for, though they had two games in hand over many of the clubs above them, they were going to be of little use to the Cherries on their present form.

On Saturday night Bournemouth looked back on a run of only one win in 11 games which had produced only two goals - - - one of the worst runs in the history of the Football League. Even a sharp improvement now will probably be too late to save them now.

Huddersfield managed to pick up one point from their first two Easter games but they were extremely unlucky not to have won at Blackburn. They led for much of the match but eventually let in a late goal to give the league leaders a most undeserved point. Defeat at Walsall (0-2), however, on Saturday left Huddersfield with a near-impossible salvation task.

Everyone at the County Ground today will be wishing both Bournemouth and Huddersfield a speedy return to Division Three.

The pressures were showing on all the leading clubs over the holiday. Charlton struggled at home to earn a 1 - 1 draw with Grimsby while Plymouth Argyle had trouble in successive home matches with Halifax and Brighton.

Argyle beat Halifax only with the help of two very late goals, one of them an own-goal. Next day their own Henry Burrows conceded an own goal to give Brighton a 2 - 2 draw. We've already mentioned Blackburn's struggle with Huddersfield and, on the Saturday, they only just beat Hereford 1 - 0.

For Crystal Palace it was a frustrating weekend. Their Good Friday game was postponed and, as they had no game fixed for Saturday, they could only look on helplessly as Plymouth opened up a four point gap on them.

If goal-average should eventually decide promotion, then the three clubs currently in possession of the important places will come off best. The figures, after Saturday's games were: Blackburn (1.54), Charlton (1.37), Plymouth (1.35), Port Vale (1.21) and Crystal Palace (1.09)
