

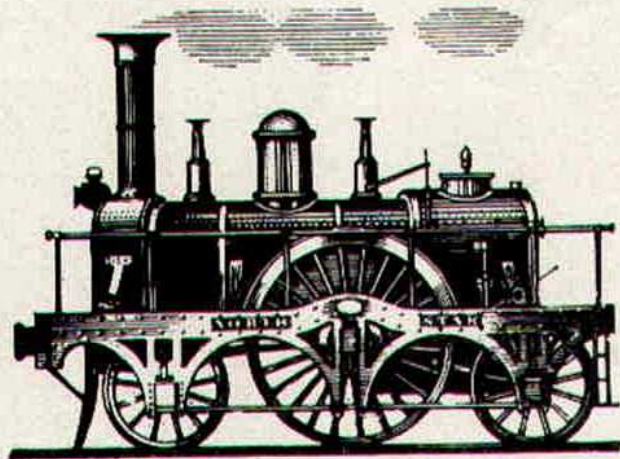

NEWS & VIEWS

We look forward to a grand game this afternoon. Our visitors are enjoying a very fine season, very much on the upgrade. Their league position is quite good, with 26 points from 24 games, and a goal average of 28 for and 22 against. They are within striking distance of the leaders with games in hand.

On Saturday last Bury were beaten 0-1 at Leicester in the F.A. Cup, fourth round, after giving a fine display, unlucky losers indeed.

Today they meet a much more confident, and in form team Swindon, who having won their last two games, feel the tide has turned, and look forward to more success.

We certainly have to return many compliments, with old scores to wipe out. Last season, when we had high hopes, Bury came to the County Ground, on the opening day, and won by two goals to nil — a miserable beginning for the home club. However, Swindon recovered and in the return game made a draw, 0-0. By the end of the season we finished in fourth position with 55 points from 46 games. Bury gained fourteenth place with 44 points.

Today not only are Bury in a higher position than Swindon, but we hope to retaliate for that 0-5 defeat in October. That month and the following one, were disastrous from our point of view. We lost 0-2 at Wrexham, followed by Bury, then came defeats by Southend (A) 0-3 Crystal Palace (H) 1-2, Preston NE (H) 1-3 Peterborough (A) 1-3.

With the coming of the F.A. Cup Competitions results improved, and with the exception of one dismal defeat, they are beginning to show much improvement.

So today two teams beginning to reach peak form meet, and we look forward to an entertaining game, plus we hope more points, and an improvement in our league position.

Bury situated as it is, has to face great opposition from a host of League Clubs including such big names as the two Manchester teams, Bolton, Oldham, and many others close at hand in Lancashire and Yorkshire.

It requires tremendous hard work and optimism on the part of the Board and the officials to maintain the club. The present position is a tribute to them. At one period in its history Bury enjoyed First Division football and even as late as 1929, were members of that league. They won the cup in 1900 beating Southampton 4-0, and in 1903 established the record Cup Final victory of 6-0 over Derby County.

In 1971 Bury was relegated to Division 4, but in his first season, the present manager Bobby Smith, achieved the distinction of gaining promotion to Division 3. Now they might well be on the way to Division 2. Certainly a great boost for the "Shakers".

However the great need for us at Swindon is a victory today, and a further boost to escaping relegation. Certainly the outlook is much brighter with the gap beginning to close.

May it continue in that vein.

JIMMY McILWRAITH (Striker). Jimmy's appearance in the side may be a nightmare for commentators — and many opponents! — but he has pleased manager Bobby Smith since his arrival from Motherwell last summer.
League record: Motherwell 18(5) aps., 5 gls. Bury 8 aps., 1 gl.

JOHN FORREST (Goalkeeper). Loyal John has been at Gigg Lane for over a decade and has been the Shakers' number one goalkeeper for most of the past seven seasons. He made his first appearance during the 1967/68 campaign.
League record: Bury 219 aps.

STEVE HO... joined Bury from Oldham Athletic. Though he got into Oldham's side since. League record: 112 aps., 3 gls.

BRIAN WILLIAMS (Striker). Brian is a Bury discovery who was drafted into the side in 1971/72 and who won a regular place two seasons back.
League record: Bury 94(11) aps. 14 gls.

ANDY ROWLAND (Striker). Andy is Bury's top scorer with 13 goals, following last season's effort when he was second-highest with 11. Bury signed him at the beginning of last season from Derby County where he did not get into the first team.
League record: Derby nil aps.; Bury 54(5) aps., 18 gls.

DEREK SPENCE (Striker). Derek was picked for Northern Ireland four times last season, proving a tremendous hit in the three British Championship games. He joined Bury from Oldham for a derisory £2,500 but he had been Bury's top scorer for the past two seasons.
League record: Oldham 5(1) aps.; Bury 114 aps., 37 gls.

GEORGE BUCHAN (Striker). George is the brother of Scotland's Martin Buchan and was a colleague of Martin's at Old Trafford for a while. His senior chances were strictly limited, however, but he has been a big success since signing for Bury in 1974.
League record: Manchester Un. -(3) aps. Bury 48(4) aps., 4 gls.

BILLY RUDD (Midfield). Billy was a one-time Manchester United groundstaff lad who began his League career in 1959 after joining Birmingham City. York signed him three years later and he moved to Grimsby in 1966. Another move took him to Rochdale in 1968 and he eventually landed at Bury in 1970. League record: Birmingham 24 aps., 3 gls; York 193 aps., 30 gls.; Grimsby 59(1) aps., 9 gls; Rochdale 108 aps., 8 gls.

HUGHEN R... gave Hughen in 1967/68 and seasons with Crewe Alexander him last season. League record: 12 gls. Crewe Bury 44(2) ap...

STEVE HOOLICKIN (Defender) Steve joined Bury from Lancashire rivals Oldham Athletic during the summer of 1973. Though he got only occasional games in Oldham's senior side, he walked straight into the Bury side and has remained ever since.
League record: Oldham 8 aps., Bury 112 aps., 3 gls.

JOHN HULME (Defender). John enjoyed many seasons in the First and Second Division with Bolton Wanderers and then became a key figure in Reading's defence following his £10,000 transfer in 1972. He remained at Elm Park for two seasons, taking his place in the Bury side last season.
League record: Bolton 186(2) aps., 7 gls; Notts. Co. (loan) 8 aps.; Reading 86(1) aps.; Bury 65 aps., 5 gls.

TONY BAILEY (Defender). Tony began his career with Derby County, but with defenders like Colin Todd and Roy McFarland around there was precious little opportunity for him. A move to Oldham in 1974 enabled him to enjoy regular League football but, before the turn of the year, he had signed for Bury.
League record: Derby 1 ap; Oldham 26 aps., 1 gl.; Bury 45(1) aps., 1 gl.

KEITH KENNEDY (Defender). Soccer life started in earnest for Keith after he had been transferred from Newcastle to Bury in 1972. At St. James Park he had had little chance but he hasn't missed a match since joining the Shakers.
League record: Newcastle 1 ap.; Bury 146 aps., 2 gls.

JIMMY NICHOLSON (Midfield). Jimmy brings a wealth of experience to Bury's midfield. Capped 41 times by Northern Ireland, he began his career with Manchester United, then gave his best years to Huddersfield. Bury signed him in 1973.
League record: Manchester Un. 58 aps. 5 gls.; Huddersfield 280(1) aps., 26 gls. Bury 69(2) aps.

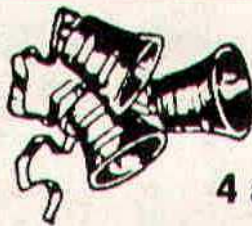

Third Division Scene

Palace for the Cup!

Soccer folk are suddenly beginning to take Malcolm Allison very seriously. When the Palace manager proclaimed several weeks ago that "We are good enough to win the F.A. Cup this season" most critics put it down as just another Allison-ism, not to be taken too seriously. But Palace's 1-0 win at Leeds has altered the whole atmosphere for this was no shock result, it was won on merit. And, surely, any team making Leeds look fools on their own pitch is good enough to win the trophy?

Indeed, it could be that we will see another new, powerful coaching partnership emerge at Selhurst Park where the more modest Terry Venables is complementing the loquacious Allison. Normally, one might have expected Palace's trip to Leeds being preceded by all manner of Allison forecasts. This time the game got scarcely a preview headline.

Explained Venables: "We wanted to play this down. We were quietly confident that we could do it but we didn't want to say too much, otherwise we may have motivated the Leeds players to prove us wrong."

With a local derby at Chelsea — the club where Venables won fame as a player — in the next round, Palace seem virtually certain of equalling a club record of reaching the sixth round. But don't expect to hear Allison or Venables making any predictions. This game, like the one at Leeds, will draw little comment from them — until after they have won!

Palace won all the fourth round headlines and one tends to forget that Third Division Southend United are also through to the fifth round, equalling a club record. It is 24 years since they last got this far and, on that occasion, they were beaten 1-2 at home by Sheffield United.

The Shrimpers have a far more daunting task this year, with a visit to the League Champions, and current F.A. Cup favourites, Derby County. It is a completely hopeless prospect for Southend — on paper. Yet, could this not be lined up as one of the classic shock results of all time? First Division clubs have been falling like nine-pins this season to suggest that it is just possible that tradition could be thrown to the winds and

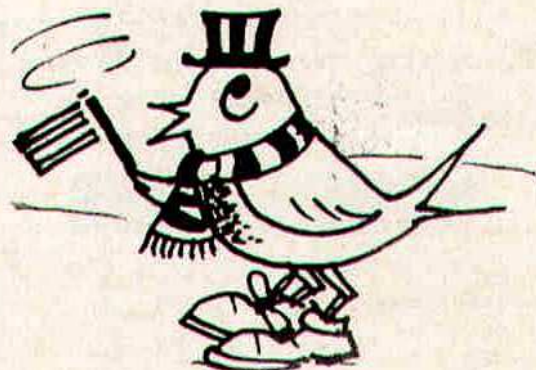
that a Third Division club will reach the final of the F.A. Cup for the first time in the competition's 104-year lifespan.

How ironical if both Crystal Palace and Southend should reach the semi-final and be drawn to play at Hillsborough, traditional home of one of the semi-finals. For the owners of this famous stadium, Sheffield Wednesday, are now on the point of dropping into Division Four for the first time.

Hillsborough will be packed with 55,000 fans to watch two strange teams in the semi, yet Wednesday's own attendance are now down to a paltry 8,000 — the worst in their history — and a run of 11 League games without a win, stretching back to early November, has left them firmly entrenched in the bottom four. A tragic sight.

Bobby Smith (Bury Manager)

Bobby Smith got an unexpected chance to step into club management only a few weeks after his playing career ended. When freed by Hartlepool at the end of 1972/73 he accepted an appointment as coach at Bury. When manager Allan Brown left a few weeks later, to take over Nottingham Forest, Mr. Smith was invited to take over.

He met with immediate success by leading Bury to promotion from the Fourth Division at the end of that season.

Mr. Smith set out as a potential Busby Babe at Old Trafford. When he didn't make United's first team he was transferred to Scunthorpe in 1964. From that time he started to play regu-

larly in their League eleven.

Midway through season 1966/67 he was transferred to Grimsby where he remained until joining Brighton at the Goldstone Ground in 1968. Over three seasons he made well over 70 League appearances for them, then he moved on again to Chester.

But he played only twice for Chester before joining Hartlepool, initially on loan in 1971. Two years later, having studied coaching, he decided the time had come to pack away his boots.

After that events moved rapidly for him.

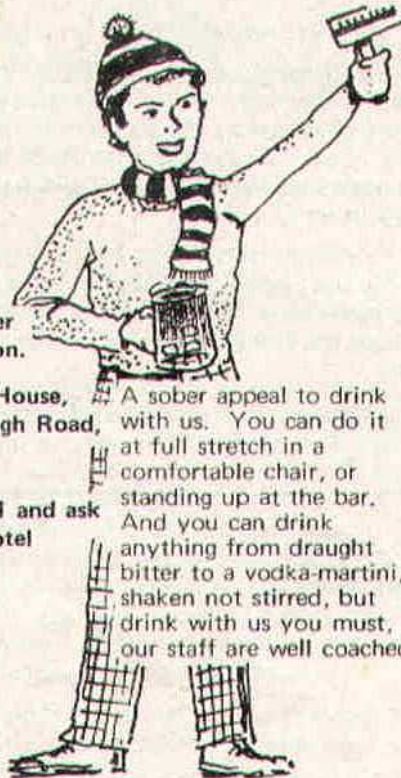
