

It is with real pleasure we welcome once again, Aldershot to the County Ground this evening. A grand little club, which we feel is a real friend of long standing, dating back to the early thirties.

Never a fashionable or wealthy club, Aldershot has always been extremely well run. Despite many ups and downs, and spells in Division 4 (with it's long expensive journeys), we believe it is one of the few clubs in the country, who have rarely been in the "red" with it's bank balance.

It faces great opposition by view in it's proximty to London and Division 1 football. Nevertheless teams can expect to have a hard fought game when they visit the Recreation Ground with it's light sandy soil, never muddy and rarely wet.

The two fixtures last season proves the fact.

The home game played on 17th September, 1974 resulted in a win, by three goals to two, but only after a very close contest. It is worth noting that two ex-Swindon players, Jack Howarth and Dennis Brown scored for the visitors.

The return match played at Aldershot on 12th February, 1975 was a very close affair, with Swindon (rather luckily) winning by one goal (Peter Eastoe) to nil. It was unfortunate for the home team, as there was real danager of relegation (after only one season in Division 3) and this result seemed to make their position even more desperate. Fortunately they recovered, and ended the season in twentieth position, and thus escaped relegation.

Today the position is somewhat reversed, if only slightly. While it is imperative, that we gain more points tonight, the need of Aldershot

is almost as urgent. At this moment in time, Swindon is in 20th place in the league table with 21 points from 26 games, whilst our visitors occupy 17th position with 22 points from 25 games. Tonights result will have an important bearing on the league position of the two clubs. Without wishing to cause any embarrassment to such a friendly hospitable club, we must on the other hand improve our own position. Granted there are many more games to be played, time is not on anyones side.

I feel mention must be made of Maurice Edelston, who died last week at the early age of 57 years. Most of our supporters will know him, more by his voice, than his name. For almost twenty years he has been a well known radio commentator on Soccer, Cricket and Tennis. A perfect gentleman, with a splendid personality and wonderful disposition, and one who sought to seek the best in everyone and everything. I was fortunate to meet him on many occasion, always a grand companion. He was a great friend and incidentally admirer of Swindon Town F.C. He entered broadcasting through another friend of Swindon Town, Mr. Tony Smith (who I am sorry to say we have not seen for a long time, although at one time he was a frequent visitor to the County Ground) then in charge of Sports Western Region.

Some of our older supporters will remember Mr. Edelston as a Amateur International with Reading, at the time his father was manager of that club. He later turned professional, and in 1952 was transferred to Northampton Town. I believe I am right in saying he played his last game against Swindon at the end of that season.

A date we have definitely fixed is that for our Club Annual Dinner Dance, which is being held for the second year following at the Blunsdon House Hotel on Wednesday 21st April. If you are keen to attend this Dinner Dance, please contact Bob Jefferies as soon as possible, at the County Ground offices.

Our supporters interested in our Majorca trip have been contacting Bob Jefferies for details, and it looks as if we shall be having the Company of many of our friends who went to Tunisia with us and also many new friends. I would advise people to book as soon as they can, in case they find that we are over booked later.

Our Youth side has been successful recently with a 3-1 win over Aston Villa away and a win over Bristol City 2-0 on the County Ground. We have taken three points off the Bristol City team and as you will remember, we lost to the City in the F.A. Youth Cup in the last few minutes at Bristol. Since beating us the City drew at Sunderland in the next round, then beat them at home and now face Newcastle at Bristol. We wish them well, and hope Bristol will reach the final.

In our last home game we played two young boys from the Bath area recommended by Jack Smith the popular centre-forward in the 1960's who is now Manager of Bath City. With Bert Head a Director of Bath City, and Jack Smith the Manager, we have close ties, and I know Danny reciprocates when he can. Here is hoping for a good game tonight, and I hope the weather will be kind to help swell the crowd.

The last home game against Bury brought freezing conditions, and the 5½ thousand who supported us were truly supporters.



Tom McAnearney Aldershot's Manager

Tom McAnearney is now in his second spell as manager of Aldershot, achieving in 1975 an objective he had only narrowly missed during his previous term - guiding the club into the Third Division.

Mr. McAnearney spent the major part of his playing career with Sheffield Wednesday when they were a First Division club. They signed him from Dunee St. Stephens in 1952 and he made his initial appearance for them during the 1952/53 season.

Wednesday were relegated twice during his 13 year stay but each time they jumped back at the first attempt and in 1959 he collected a Second Division championship medal. Mr. Mc-Anearney made over 350 appearances for Wednesday before joining Peterborough United in 1965. But he didn't stay at London Road

very long. In March 1966 he was offered the post of player-coach to Aldershot and he moved a bit further south.

His commanding midfield displays proved much an inspiration to his colleagues that in little over a year he was promoted to player-manager and the Shots were most unfortunate not to gain promotion during his reign in charge.

In 1969 he received a call from his old club, Sheffield Wednesday, to join their coaching staff. Later he took a coaching job with Crewe Alexandra and then was appointed manager of Bury.

Three years ago he was invited to return to Aldershot and it wasn't long before the club gained promotion for the first time in it's history.

JIM WALLACE (Defender) Jim joined Aldershot from Dunfermline last summer after losing his place in the Scottish club's first-team. Now he is playing regularly as Aldershot's left-back.

League record: Dunfermline 73 aps. 3 gls. Aldershot 12 (3) aps.

MICHAEL EARLS (Defender) Michael is a Republic of Ireland youth international who got his League chance with Southampton two seasons ago. He joined Aldershot last summer.

League record: Southampton 8 aps. Aldershot 5 (1) aps.

BOBBY WALLACE (Midfield) Bobby opened his career with Huddersfield Town, making his League debut in 1966/67. Before that season was over he moved to Halifax Town where he was a regular for over 5 years. Bobby spent 1972/73 with Chester, then signed for Aldershot. League record: Huddersfield 4 aps Halifax 190 (11) aps. 16 gls, Chester 41 aps 9 gls., Aldershot 51(2) aps 1 gl.

PAT MORRISSEY (Midfield) A former Republic of Ireland under-23 international, Pat entered English football with Coventry in 1966/67, linked with Torquay in 1968 and with Crewe a year later. Crewe's top scorer with 22 goals in 1970/71, he moved on the following season to Chester and then Watford

After signing for Aldershot in 1965, he was top scorer for six seasons until the club surprisingly sold him to Rochdale.

Third Division Scene by Tony Pullein

CAN HEREFORD PIP PALACE NOW?

Hereford United's brilliant run, in which they collected nine points from five games, has made them favourites to pip Crystal Palace for the Third Division championship. And one man who is now convinced they can do it is Hereford manager John Sillett. After the sides had drawn 1 - 1 at Edgar Street, he said: "Our defence is better than Palace's and our two strikers, Dixie McNeil and Steve Davey, are the best in the Third Division. I think we can overtake Palace now."

With Palace also pre-occupied with the F.A. Cup, and currently going through a poor period in the League, Hereford have an excellent chance of proving their manager right. The point which they took from Palace kept Hereford one behind the leaders ---- with two games in hand. The crowd of 12,970 was a club record for a League match, though still far short of the all-over high of 18,114 for an F.A. Cup tie with Sheffield Wednesday in 1958. That figure will never be beaten as the ground was reduced to 17,500 following a road widening scheme which chopped off a slice of the stadium a few years ago.

Mr. Sillett's opinion of his strikers is being borne out by their scoring output. McNeil's goal against Palace was his eighth in five League matches, taking his total to 18. Davey has netted ten times.

Meanwhile, Palace boss Malcolm Allison was musing over a run which has seen his team win only once in seven League outings.

Hereford are not Palace's only worry now, of course. As they have let things slip a bit, several other clubs have crept up. Brighton, Peterborough and Walsall were all within three points while the revitalised Cardiff City have forced themselves right into the reckoning with a series of good performances. Tony Evans, the Blackpool discard signed on a free transfer last summer, has netted 17 goals for them whilst Australian international Adrian Alston, signed a few weeks back from Luton, has already hit 10 goals for the Bluebirds.

The Welsh challenge doesn't end there, either. Wrexham, who are still in the European Cup-

Winners' Cup, stretched their unbeaten run to eleven matches thanks to an Afron Griffiths penalty against visiting Grimsby.

Sheffield Wednesday's shock training tactics seemed to do the trick. Assistant-manager Tony Toms took the squad up onto the Pennines for a camping expedition - - - on the coldest night of the year. Bedraggled players returned to Hillsborough at 10.00 the following morning.

"It was a complete change from our normal routine", explained Toms. "This often works".

Wednesday, who had not won in 11 League games proceeded to beat Chester 2 - 0 to give them a sporting chance of escaping the indignity of relegation to Division Four for the first time.

One departure from Hillsborough is striker David Sunley who has appealed against his price tag. An independent tribunal reduced it to £7,500, a figure which attracted Hull City. Now Sunley is hoping to pick up the strings of his career at Boothferry Park.


