

Welcome back to Shrewsbury who last visited the County Ground on Saturday 28th September 1968, the season we gained promotion to Division 2. The result that day was a win for Swindon by three goals to nil, and an attendance of 12,092. How we would love a repeat of those two facts today.

Our visitors have to date enjoyed a wonderful season in Division 3 after winning promotion last year. In fact they are not really out of the hunt for promotion again, as they occupy eighth position in the table with 43 points, five less than Brighton and Crystal Palace in second and third places respectively.

How strange is football form, and how difficult to assess. Last season Shrewsbury finished in second position in Division 4 table, Swindon occupied fourth place in Division 3, yet today is just one position off the bottom of the table.

I well remember the first visit ever of Shrewsbury on Wednesday 30th April 1952, kick-off 6.45. Many of our supporters will recall that was the year 1951-52, when we enjoyed a wonderful cup run, of ten games in all, finishing with defeat at Luton 1-3.

Shrewsbury came to the County Ground for the last match of the season. It was their first year in Division 3 South, having spent one in Division 3 North.

They were most anxious to remain in the Division, but at the time feared seeking re-election, and possibly elimination, as they were one place from the bottom of the table. They had to win, to move away from the dreaded two positions. One can imagine their great joy on winning 2-1.

Shrewsbury is a happy, hospitable club, with a delightful ground aptly named Gay Meadow. I wonder if they will be so kind as to return the compliment, which we so desperately need — a win. The Swindon team for that game was - Uprichard, Hunt, May, Kaye, Hudson, Gray, Millar, Onslow, Owen, Betteridge, Bain.

Shrewsbury seems to be involved with vital games at Swindon. Many will recall the cup battles (both League and F.A.), when our visitors seemed to be a real "bogey" team. The days of Arthur Rowley as Player Manager. Too many times have they taken away the points.

Probably the most outstanding games in the minds of our supporters, was the final home game of season 1962/63. We won, very luckily by one goal to nil. Roger Smart scored in the last minutes (the ball just crept in) to clinch promotion for the first time to Division 2.

It is always good to see a Southern Club in the F.A. Cup Final, and we congratulate our near neighbours and friends, Southampton and wish them every success. Many of us still remember the thrilling games played between the two clubs both at the Dell, and the County Ground. Many will also remember their Chairman, Mr. George Reader, as an active referee. The last match he refereed at Swindon was an F.A. Cup match against Stoke City in 1949.

We are certainly keeping our chances of survival alive, and it could all depend on the last game of the season before it is all finally settled. We opened our new Club premises last night, and because these notes are written prior to this opening, I obviously cannot comment on its success or otherwise. I would like to say thank you to Mr. Bill Dore our Director for his generosity and for the great enthusiasm he has shown in this project. It is a tribute to all the hard work and determination to turn, what was a few months ago only a shell beneath the stand into one of the most modern and pleasant clubs in the town. At 50p. for membership and a chance to become a helpful member of our football club it is not surprising that there has been a constant demand for membership application forms.

Members of our Rendezvous Club on renewing their membership will find that their renewal fees will incorporate an automatic membership of our new Club without any increase in their old fees.

This is a change indeed to get something extra these days, without extra charge, but we are trying to encourage everybody to help make our new venture a success.

If you have not notified Bob Jefferies of your wish to attend the Club's Dinner and Dance at the Blunsdon House Hotel, on Wednesday 21st April, please do so as soon as possible to avoid being disappointed.

During the last week in which our local newspaper has printed a spate of letters from those who think they can do my job successfully, and if they have the magic formula for success I wonder why they do not give their self confessed talents to the game, we have played two away games with mixed fortunes our display at Chesterfield left much to be desired, mistakes were made and justifiably punished with goals against us. Our play at Colchester may not have been the supporters' ideal entertainment, but it was the type of play which should have been prevalent more often in the season, everyone working hard and keeping the play as much as possible in the opponents half. The two points have given the lads a filip at a vital time, and we must maintain that effort during the next six games. We all realise how frustrated you all feel, and I am sure that you must appreciate how up-tight we all are; I know that frustration leads to criticism, but honestly this constant harping does nothing to help the lads. We all have the same purpose in mind, the survival of the Club, and surely we must all pull together until the end of the season.

I have also read a letter in the local newspaper saying that the Board of Directors have done nothing in latter years, to restore the Club to it's old form - what a pity it is that the paper does not ask for our comments because I am able to refute that statement.

During the season 1973/74 and 1974/75 we spent £197,182.00p. on strengthening the team and a large part of this money was provided by the members of the Board, this outlay was a calculated gamble to improve our status and it very clearly worked, but not withstanding that last season we were just two points away from promotion, that we had the best home record in the whole of the Football League, and that Peter Eastoe was joint League goal scorer, our league gate average only 7,000, no further comment is necessary I am sure.

### SHREWSBURY TOWN F.C.

The Shrewsbury Town Club was founded in 1886 and has survived over the last 89 years, and indeed has made considerable progress, particularly since the 1939/45 War.

The present ground is a picturesque one at the Gay Meadow, Shrewsbury, adjacent to the river and in beautiful surroundings. Almost three sides of the ground are covered, and recent additions include a new office and administrative block, a Club Shop, a modern centre stand and dressing room accommodation.

The Club has had other grounds at Sutton Lane and at Copthorne and played in many and various Leagues, including the Welsh League, the old Walsall Senior League, the Birmingham League, the Midland League and, of course, the Football League, Football Combination, West Midland (Regional) League, the Midland Intermediate League and the Northern Floodlit League.

In addition, the Club at one time entered the Welsh Senior Cup regularly and after a number of years entered again in season 1973/74. They hold more victories in the Shropshire Senior Cup than any of the county's Senior Clubs.

Shrewsbury entered League Football in the autumn of 1950, and had one season in the old Third Division North, followed by 7 seasons in the Southern Section, gaining promotion from the newly formed Fourth Division in 1958/59.

Floodlights were installed at the ground in November 1959. For the beginning of season 1973/74 the new Mercury Halide lighting was installed giving four times the strength of the old lighting system, and acceptable for colour transmission. The ground holds 20,000 people in comfort and great steps have been taken in the last few years to make the Gay Meadow a modern and well appointed enclosure. The record attendance is 18,917 versus Walsall in a Football League match on April 29th 1961.

In 1964/65 and 1965/66 Shrewsbury Town created a Club record by reaching the Fifth Round of the F.A. Cup being defeated narrowly by Leeds United and Chelsea in Fifth Round Ties.

Former Manager, Arthur Rowley, is the holder of the record number of goals to be scored by any player in Football League matches, and up to his retirement at the end of 1964/65 season he had scored 434 goals, this also beating the Scottish record held by Jimmy McGrory. A number of players have been Capped whilst playing with Shrewsbury, the best known being Jimmy McLaughlin, the Irish International player, Terry Harkin also an Irish International, Denis Hawkins, Welsh Under-23 International, Terry Hughes and David Collier, Welsh Youth Caps.

The present manager is Alan Durban, former Derby County player and Welsh International. Mr. Durban took over from Maurice Evans in December 1973. Other Managers have been Sammy Crooks ex Derby and England; Walter Rowley ex Bolton Wanderers; Harry Potts now at Blackpool; Arthur Rowley now at Southend United and Harry Gregg now with Crew Alexandra.

Whilst Shrewsbury is a County town, there is a keen ambition to progress into a higher Division of the Football League, and this keenness reflects in the youth policy which is followed and developed. The present teams are the First Team in the Football League, the Reserves in the Northern Floodlit League and the 'A' Team in the Midland Intermediate League. So three teams turn out each week aspiring to fame and fortune on behalf of Shrewsbury Town.

# Alan Durban

(Shrewsbury's Manager)

Alan Durban this season completed a wonderful record by appearing on his 92nd Football League ground. A long and distinguished career which took him through all four divisions, and to international football, enabled him to complete what may well be a unique "set".

Cardiff City discovered him in junior football and he made his League debut for them in 1959/60. Three years later he was picked for the first of his four Welsh under-23 caps - he was never on the losing side.

In 1963 he moved to Derby County for a bargain £10,000 fee and he was the Rams top scorer twice in his first three seasons there. It wasn't until May 1966 that he won his first full Welsh cap, coming on as substitute against Brazil in Belo Horizonte. It was almost a year before he got another chance but, after returning against Northern Ireland, he became a regular member of his national team for five years. His final cap total was 27.

He remained with Derby until 1973, making over 350 first-team appearances. When he was no longer sure of a first-team place he decided to join Shrewsbury and it wasn't long before he was appointed player-manager to succeed Maurice Evans.

Last season, his first full campaign in charge, he led the club to promotion to the Third Division.



# Third Division Scene by Tony Pullein

### Consolation For Palace

Crystal Palace's dream of becoming the first Third Division side to reach the F.A. Cup final may have been shattered by last Saturday's semi-final defeat by Southampton, but they did have the consolation of being joint favourites with Hereford to win promotion to the Second Division. And that, to manager Malcolm Allison was even more important than getting to Wembley.

"The semi-final was really a fun game for all of us. The players tried to go out and enjoy themselves," said Allison. "Of course it would have been great to have won but we are not allowing ourselves to get upset. All through our Cup run we have continued to treat League matches as the more important. We need to get back into the Second Division this year."

Last Saturday night's form tables showed Palace and Millwall at the top of the chart over their most recent three home and away League games. And if all the sides maintain their current form for these vital closing games, the divisional championship will be decided on goal-average between Palace and Hereford (60 points each) with Millwall (57) being the side to go up with them.

Brighton, given the advantage of a few more away points, and Cardiff both have an excellent chance of creeping in, though. A marginal improvement by either side is all that is needed.

Warning lights have been flashing at Hereford whose current form is no better than most of the relegation strugglers. The possibility of their large lead being frittered away, even at this late stage, is enough to cause a few fluttering hearts at Edgar Street.

The situation is even closer at the bottom of the table with so many more clubs involved. On the evidence of current form the eventual unlucky four will be:

Swindon (36), Southend (35), Colchester (34) and Sheffield Wednesday (33).

Again, the situation is so tense that a fractional improvement by any of the four could lift them clear. And clubs like Aldershot and Grimsby, presently suffering difficult times, could so easily find themselves finishing in the bottom four unless they show some improvement.
