Frustrating — but we will fight our way up again

HOW many Football League club managers are there who dare ask the famous Eric Morecambe question "What do you think of it so far?" Let's not ask it at Peterborough United just yet because the season to date has been one of frustration for everyone connected with the club, and already it seems to me that we have been playing football for a long time this season when, in fact, we have played only seven Third Division games.

Our results have been about on a par with the first few games of last season but I sincerely believe that in comparison to last season we have a better team playing better football.

And yet there is a certain amount of disappointment and criticism of the team already. I accept complete responsibility for this and obviously I will not be satisfied until we are where I want us to be — challenging for a place at the top of the Third Division table.

We have made mistakes. For instance I decided before the Crystal Palace match to play David Gregory in a wide position. In hindsight this was a mistake and David is now

back in the position he enjoys — the position in which he regularly attracted First and Second Division club scouts to London Road.

Tonight will you welcome back Lyndon Hughes for his first game at home since recovering from the achilles tendon injury which has kept him out of the side since the beginning of this season.

Lyndon is an exemplary player and a player of great value to the team. He is obviously not of the same character of players like Tommy Robson or David Gregory who can sell themselves much more easily to the public. Lyndon needs the encouragement of the crowd, particularly now to help him to a full recovery from injury.

Again let me say how grateful I am to all the fans at London Road for their continued support and loyalty in this frustrating time.

At Peterborough United we are just a little disappointed. I know that many of the fans are, but please don't any of you think that you are the only ones. There are no more disappointed people in Peterborough at the moment than the players and the people connected with this football club.

But believe me we will fight our way out of the problems. We are not at the bottom of the League, and things we soon start to happen for us.

FOCUS ON THE
THIRD DIVISION

THERE'S no doubt that the seashiders of Brighton are riding on the crest of a gigantic wave at the moment.

Following their televised 7-2 annihilation of York the previous week, they collected a 3-1 win at Tranmere on Saturday to endorse the view that they are hot favourites for the championship.

And sandwiched between those two victories came a brilliant 2-0 League Cup triumph at West Brom which has launched them into the last 16 with a home tie against Derby or Notts County.

Brighton have never been averse to a spot of expensive shopping to boost their promotion hopes. Yet the man hitting the headlines for them at the moment cost nothing.

Young Peter Ward is already attracting big name clubs following his five-goal scoop in the last three matches, including both the goals at the Hawthorns.

Shrewsbury lead the chasing group following a 2-1 win at

Brighton are on the crest of big wave

Port Vale, the crucial winner coming in the last minute from their Whittlesey forward Brian Hornsby.

Tonight's visitors, Swindon, and Reading are also one point behind Brighton

But Swindon dropped a home point to Gillingham, while Reading inflicted more wounds on Portsmouth with a confident 2-0 victory at Fratton Park, Mel Hollis and Gary Peters scoring.

The Third Division's other League Cup heroes, Wrexham — 3-2 winners at Tottenham in midweek — conceded a home

point to Sheffield Wednesday after Bobby Shinton and Graham Whittle had given them a 2-1 interval lead.

After a sticky start to the season, Fourth Division champions Lincoln are beginning to make an impact, their latest victory being at the expense of bottom club Chesterfield.

Without a manager following the resignation of Joe Shaw, Chesterfield slumped 4-1 at home and have now conceded 14 goals in the last three matches.

Also among the strugglers are Northampton. They presented Walsall with their first win of the season when goalkeeper Alan Starling put through his own goal. Wonder whether he got the bird!

Mansfield, second before Saturday's programme, dropped six places following their 2-0 defeat at Crystal Palace for whom former Wycombe amateur Steve Perrin marked his debut with a goal.

Bury's Andy Rowland is the division's leading goalscorer with nine goals following his hat-trick against Posh, one more than Robin Wylde (Sheff Wed), Terry Eccles (Mansfield) and Damien Richardson (Gillingham).

York removed some of the shame of their 7-2 defeat at Brighton by defeating Oxford 2-1, but only 2,200 turned up — the lowest crowd of the day in the division.

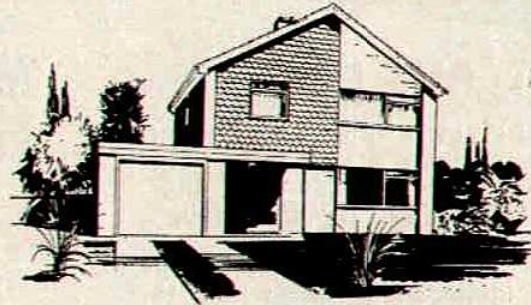

Top scorer in the youth team last season with 18, the Peterborough-based striker has already bagged nine in three matches this term.

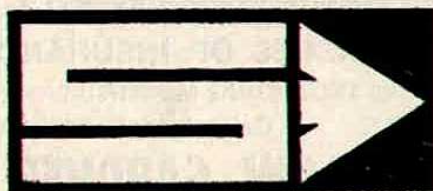
His latest haul — a hat-trick — came in the 6-3 win at Southend in the South East Counties League Cup competition.

(I've always wondered — how do you lock your car and leave the engine running? If it happened to you, please write and let me know).

Some announcements are fun to read out. Take the weekly winners in the Posh Lottery. Telling someone they are £100 richer is always a pleasure.

Wishing somebody a happy birthday or wedding anniversary is fun as well. You only have to let us know and we'll do the same for you. But the one I would have loved to have read went out some years ago — before my time in the box.

"Would Guard of British Railways please go to Peterborough Station where his train is waiting for him," was the message! The story behind that one would really be worth telling.

There are normally four of us in the announcer's box. Bob Burrowes, Colin Allpress and Keith Warren giving a running commentary to the District Hospital over the Radio Five link-up, and me, David Thorpe.

They will be happy to send a message to any of your friends who are unlucky enough to be in hospital. I will give out the good news if your friends are in the crowd — unless it is one of those occasions when the 'gremlins' strike.

One Saturday, Bob Burrowes had to get a three-way telephone hook-up with an engineer at home, and the Hospital broadcasting centre to trace and cure a fault that blotted the broadcast to patients just as the teams ran on to the field.

And if you are still puzzled why there was no music or announcements during a game last season I will tell you. I sit on a chair with a metal frame. Unknown to me, one leg was resting on the lead to the amplifier. I sat down, and the edge of the metal chopped a neat break in the wire! It was just as well some of the dialogue that followed was not broadcast!

We're a lot more careful where we sit now, and it will be a pleasure talking to you again. And don't forget. BROKEN LEG MARS YOUTH TITLE BID

A SERIOUS injury to forward Nigel Barnes has taken a little of the shine off the youth's impressive start to the season.

The Jack Hunt Schoolboy suffered a broken right leg in the 6-3 South East Counties Cup win at Southend last week following a tenth minute collision with the goalkeeper.

He was immediately taken to Southend Hospital, but was allowed to return home the same day.

"Nigel's injury is the most serious setback we have suffered" says youth team manager Peter Deakin. "We want to see him back to 100 per cent fitness which will be a matter of patience and rehabilitation".

"The injury naturally marred what was another fine performance by the lads, taking us to the top of the division and giving us high hopes of retaining the title."

"It was a physically harder game than the one against Spurs when we won by playing the better football and it is nice to know we have lads with character as well as skill".

Impressive again was Spalding youngster Rodney Leadbeater who is forming a deadly midfield partnership with Mark Heeley. Leadbeater, a tall, well-built youngster, has deft touches and a good work rate and looks likely to push for a place in the club's Mid-week team.

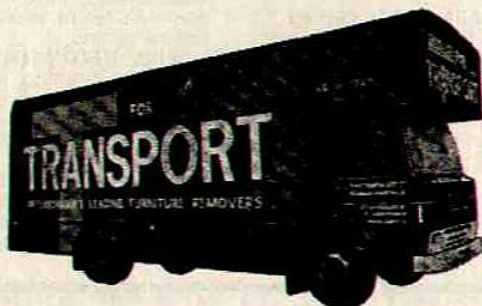

LIKE the Prodigal Son, winger Don Rogers returned to Swindon in March this year in a £20,000 deal from Queen's Park Rangers.

As the local boy made good, West Country fans were anticipating that Rogers, whose moves in the transfer market have cost more than £350,000, would lift the gloom from the County Ground.

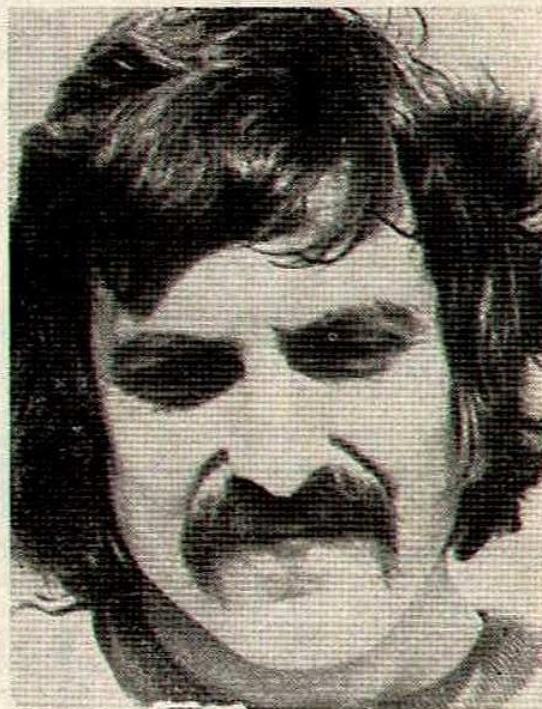
Rogers' return was especially welcome following the £80,000 sale of regular goalscorer Peter Eastoe to QPR.

Swindon's fortunes have taken an upward trend struggling in the relegation depths last season, but their impressive start has been made without the services of Rogers.

The former Crystal Palace and QPR star, who netted Swindon's League Cup Final winner against Arsenal in 1969, has been unable to find a regular slot.

Much of the credit for Swindon's revival is being showered on new coach Frank Burrows who held down the centre half slot for several seasons.

Swindon's other newcomers are midfield players Ray McHale and Howard Goddard from Halifax and Bournemouth respectively and full back Tony Taylor from Southend.

JIM BARRON (goalkeeper): First choice since July 1974 when signed from Notts Forest. Previously with Wolves, Chelsea and Oxford.

JOHN McLAUGHLIN (full back): Signed from Colchester in December 1973 in a £25,000 deal. Won an England youth cap while with Colchester.

TONY TAYLOR (full back): Signed on a free transfer from Southend in the close season. He cost Southend £25,000 when signed from Crystal Palace.

RAY McHALE (midfield): Signed recently from Fourth Division Halifax for £8,000. He made 82 appearances for Halifax and 123 with Chesterfield.

STEVE AIZLEWOOD (defender): Welsh Under 23 international, signed

from Newport in March this year. Made nearly 200 appearances for the Welsh club.

COLIN PROPHETT (defender): Signed from Norwich City in September 1974. Previously with Crewe and Sheffield Wednesday.

DAVID MOSS (forward): Signed from a local non-league club in 1969 and has made more than 130 league appearances.

WILL DIXON (midfield): Transferred from Reading in September 1973 after 150 league games. Previously with Arsenal.

TREVOR ANDERSON (forward): Began his career with Portadown, but transferred to Manchester United in October 1972, making 13 league appearances before moving to Swindon. A Northern Ireland international.

DAVID SYRETT (striker): Another former apprentice, he joined the club in July 1972. An England youth international, he had a period on loan to Wolves last season.

HOWARD GODDARD (forward): Signed on his 19th birthday from AFC Bournemouth in May this year. Made 62 league appearances for the Fourth Division club.

GERRY O'BRIEN (midfield): First played for Clydebank, but moved to Southampton in 1970. Signed in March this year after a loan period with Bristol Rovers.

DON ROGERS (striker): Made 401 appearances for Swindon before transferring to Crystal Palace for £150,000 in November 1972. Moved on to QPR two years later before re-joining Swindon in March this year.
