

With the formation of Division 3 and Division 4, they were placed in the lower division by virtue of having finished season 1957/58 in the bottom half of Division 3 (South). However in season 1959/60, they were back in Division 3. Since that date they have been relegated but in 1974/75 they once again gained promotion having finished in second position. They have made a great impact on the Third Division. Last season they finished in ninth place, and for a long time were in contention for a place in Division 2.

This year Shrewsbury have made a great start, and at present head the League Table with 12 points from 8 games, and a goal average of 19 for and 9 against. Their away record is quite good, won 1 drawn 2 lost 1, goals 6 for and 6 against.

They will therefore provide stiff opposition, for such an important game, after the last three of our results 19 goals scored means a good attacking side.

Last Saturday whilst Swindon was losing 1-4 at Reading, Shrewsbury defeated Portsmouth 4-1, a complete replica in reverse.



Despite this excellent form gates at Gay Meadow are extremely poor. Only 4,782 spectators were present at the Portsmouth game. It speaks volumes for everyone connected with the club, players and officials alike, that they can be so successful, with such a small number of supporters.

Undoubtedly, praise for Shrewsbury's success must go to manager Alan Durban, and coach Ritchie Barker. They had great faith in their players, because following relegation, only two players were added to the staff, namely Phil Bates and Ray Haywood from non-league Stourbridge and Shrewsbury went straight back to Division 4.

Shrewsbury has always played well against Swindon, especially in the early sixties, notable for some very famous cup-tie encounters. Their record victory in the league was against Swindon in 1955. A win by seven goals to nil.

I expect our supporters have noted the success of our previous player Ray Treacy, back with West Bromwich Albion in the First Division, and already scorer of three goals. Strange how the wheel of fate turns in the football world, usually the reverse to this story. Instance the bottom five clubs in Division One, Spurs, Leeds, Derby, West Ham and Sunderland. All of them fine clubs with great potential.

Since my last notes were written, we have only gained the one point from our last three games and although we can point to the fact that two of these games were away fixtures, it doesn't alter the points for total, which are the be all and end all for promotion. The bright side of things is that the lads fought hard and never gave up and were certainly unlucky to lose at Peterborough as they were unlucky to lose a point at home to Gillingham, but is it luck that seems to play such a vital part in games today? Luck does play a part in games as anyone knows and usually the bad is cancelled out by the good in the long run, but recently we have witnessed games, where decisions have changed the course of the game to the detriment of the players and spectators. We all know and appreciate that the officials have a difficult task to please everybody, but the one weakness that seems to be growing is the refusal to punish the obvious, because it could be unpopular, and yet clamp down on the trivialities.

A lot is written about hooliganism and how the players action on the field often leads to trouble on the terraces. I am certain that a lot of crowd trouble is also caused by referees who are cowards when it comes to making vital decisions inside the penalty area. Recently we have seen blatant fouls inside the box, with players sent 'sprawling' yards inside the area and referees giving the offence outside the area or totally disregarding it. The time has come for the professional game to be managed by the professional and only recently Mr. Ted Croker the Secretary of the Football Association has come out and declared this very point of view. We spend thousands of pounds setting up coaching facilities at places like Lilleshall, why not the same facilities for referees? We have some of the best referees in the world but we also have some of the worst when it comes to facing up to realities and the sooner that we erase these problems, the sooner we shall enjoy our games.

On Monday evening we entertained our generous supporters who sponsored the players' kit for this season. The players attended this get together in the Rendezvous Club and our sponsors were able to meet and chat with the lads and everybody seemed to enjoy the evening.

You will have read in our local press that we made a profit on last season's working and before anyone begins to think that this is a profit from the normal income and expenditure, I hasten to point out that this profit was the result of our selling and buying of players and our average gates of something like seven and a half thousand of last season really meant that we were losing approximately six hundred pounds a week and this is taking into account our income from our competitions, social clubs, sports and souvenir shops and catering activities.

We are not looking to sell our best player obviously, and so we hope to look to our supporters to increase our average gate takings. We are hoping that today's attendance will show the improvement that our last home game did and so enable us to plan for the future.

SHREWSBURY

KEN MULHEARN (Goslkeeper)

Ken is enjoying a run of 172 consecutive League appearances for the club. Once an Everton reserve. Ken began his League career with Stockport. Manchester City signed him in 1967 and he played 50 First Division garnes for them before Shrewsbury signed him in March 1971.

League record: Everton nil aps.; Stockport 100 aps.; Manchester City 50 aps.; Shrewsbury 244 aps.

JOHN KING (Defender)

John learned his game at Gay Meadow, graduating to the club's League team in March 1973 when he made his League debut at Rochdale. The following season he took over the right-back position he has held ever since.

League record: Shrewsbury 112(1) aps.; 1 gl.

MIKE KEARNEY (Defender/Forward).

Mike can play either in defence or attack, and is enjoying himself up front now. Last season he was top scorer with 14 goals and now he is in the lead again with four. A local discovery, he came into the side in 1972/73.

League record: Shrewsbury 123(6) aps. 33 gls.

COLIN GRIFFIN (Defender)

Colin, who settled so well at centre back last season, made a quick rise to League soccer. He turned professional with Derby earlier last season and was then transferred to Shrewsbury for £10,000.

League record: Derby nil aps.; Shrewsbury 32 aps. 1 gt.

CARLETON LEONARD (Defender)

Carleton earned his chance in the first team last season. After making a brief appearance as substitute at Cardiff in November, he later came back to hold the left back position.

GRAHAM TURNER (Defender/Midfield)

Shrewsbury paid a club record £30,000 fee to sign Graham from Chester four years ago. He had been a Chester regular for five years after opening his career with Wrexham.

ALAN DURBAN (Midfield)

Alan is Shrewsbury's player-manager. Capped 27 times by Wales, he opened his career with Cardiff but moved to Derby in 1963. It was at the Baseball Ground that he enjoyed his most successful days. Shrewsbury signed him in 1973.

League record: Cardiff 52 aps., 9 gls.; Derby 336 (9) aps. 91 gls.; Shrewsbury 123(2) aps. 30 gls.

PAUL McGUIRE (Midfield)

Paul, discovered in Scottish junior football this summer, was given an early chance to show his paces in League football and scored a goal in an early game against Gillingham.

League record: Shrewsbury 3 aps., 1 gl.

IAN ATKINS (Midfield)

Ian was drafted into the first-team last season and quite early on took over the penalty-taker's job. He has already scored twice this season — once from the spot.

League record: Shrewsbury 36(3) aps. 6 gls.

SAM IRVINE (Forward)

Sam, a former Shrewsbury apprentice, made his debut in 1972/73 and has been on regular duty for the past three years.

League record: Shrewsbury 125(8) aps., 8 gls.

BRIAN HORNSBY (Forward)

Brian was a close-season signing from Arsenal. Though he enjoyed several runs in the Gunners' side, he was never a regular. He celebrated his Shrewsbury debut with a point-earning goal at Lincoln.

CHIC BATES (Forward)

Chic has been a consistant scorer since he was introduced to the team on the opening day of 1974/75. He scored 17 that term, added 11 more last season and has netted three times in this new campaign.



What's In A Name?

What's in a name? Well, if you are in football and the name happens to be Best, it means an awful lot! So what is it about this unpredictable Irish character that can transform overnight the lives of thousands of ordinary people?

Fulham's gates shot up from 9,000 to 25,000 when Best arrived. During his first week at Craven Cottage the club banked close on £50,000 in gate receipts from two home games and one away — £30,000 above what they could have anticipated for the same games before Best's arrival!

Was it simply curiosity that drew those hordes of fans? Many had been led to believe that Best was over the hill. After all, he was sacked last season by Cork Celtic because he wasn't up to their standard!

Did the public turn up hoping to see Best fail, then go home preening themselves because they had said the club was mad to pay a has-been £500 per game? Did they, on the other hand, genuinely expect to see him turn on at will the magic of his truly great days at Manchester United?

Was the Football League's initial reluctance to sanction Best's registration a hint to fans that Fulham were up to something phoney and that they should be around to find out what the mystery was all about?

Fulham chairman Tommy Trinder, who added further drama to the whole affair by making a dash by taxi from London to the League's St. Annes headquarters to finalise the deal, couldn't really care why the fans now roll up, so long as they continue to do so.

The Cottagers made sufficient money from Best's first two home games to cover his contract for three or four years. Everything they rake in now is a bonus.

Even if we can't put our finger on any particular reason why one player should have such a dramatic effect upon a club's fortunes, we are left with the rather uncomfortable truth — where is there another player who could have the same effect?

There is no one else.

The sad truth is that our coaching system breeds some great teams. But it doesn't produce great players.

In years gone by Tommy Lawton had a similar effect at Notts County. Stan Matthews was even more sensational at Stoke.

There were a dozen or more players of Best's stature who would add thousands to the gate — Shackleton, Ford, Mortensen, Finney, Carter, Doherty, Wright and more recently Stiles, Charlton, and Law.

While there are very many excellent players in England, few have that added dimension that lifts them from the rank of good players into the super star bracket.

Rodney Marsh is another of the individualists, and crowd pullers, but he like Best was sacked by his First Division employers, Manchester City.

It seems there is no place in football today for the individualist. Fulham seem to have cornered the last two. And if they, as a result, gain promotion this season the remaining 91 League clubs will have to start asking themselves if they really have got their priorities right.


