

IT HAPPENED

A Diary of Town Events that occurred during this month.

September 7th 1895 Town played the first ever game at the County Ground against a representative side - Nat Whittaker's XI. Mr. Whittaker was a top referee of the period and was later appointed secretary of the Southern League. He officiated in Town's opening Southern League fixture mentioned above.

September 27th 1902. Town wore red shirts for the first ever time at Elm Park, Reading. The change from white brought no immediate luck - Swindon being five goals down at half-time! Tommy Davis pulled back a goal for the Town in the second half, but Reading added a sixth

September 5th 1908 Swindon hammered Norwich City 10-2 at the County Ground. Centreforward Jim Hogan grabbed four goals, Harold Flemming three and Archie Bown a brace, with Frank Heppenstall completing the scoring. Only three days later, Jim Hogan scored another hat-trick as Gillingham, then known as New Brompton, lost 1-6 at Swindon.

September 25th 1911. Swindon (Southern League champions) met Manchester United (Football League champions) in the Charity Shield at Stamford Bridge before a 12,000 crowd. After being a goal up within seven minutes, Town finished on the wrong end of an incredible 8-4 scoreline. Harold Fleming, Freddy Wheatcroft, Billy Tout (penalty) and Bob Jefferson were the successful Town marksmen.

September 16th 1936. In Aldershot's 5-1 defeat at the County Ground the entire Town forward line of Fred Chandler, Alan Fowler, Arthur Hetherington, Bill Storey and Don McPhail got their names on the score sheet.

After just three League matches of the

new season had been played, the Second World War intervened. Aldershot provided the last pre-war opposition, taking a point home with them from a 2-2 draw. Alan Fowler, sadly killed in enemy action, scored both Town goals.

September 7th 1946 When the League matches of 1939-40 were 'replayed' Town trimmed Aldershot 7-0, Bill Stephens scoring four, including a penalty. He followed this with a hat-trick five days later at Carrow Road, Norwich as Town stormed to a 5-1 win.

Swindon fired seven goals past ex-Town keeper George Ephgrave at Vicarage Road, Watford, the home side replaying once. Maurice Owen claimed three and Harry Lunn two. Six days later, Watford arrived at the County Ground - and won 1-0.

September 27th 1958. . . Keith Morgan made the first of his 325 League appearances in a Town shirt - in a 3-0 win at Saltergate, home of today's visitors Chesterfield. Jim Kelly scored all three goals.

September 15th 1959. Sixteen years-old 'Ernie' Hunt made his League debut for Swindon in a 0-3 defeat at Grimsby.

September 1963 Following the club's first ever promotion, Swindon went to the top of the Second Division and stayed there throughout this month. Home victories were chalked up against Grimsby (2-1), Rotherham (3-1), Manchester City (3-0) and Sunderland (1-0) and away points gained at Leeds and Maine Road, Manchester (both 0-0). Town's first defeat of the season came on the 28th at Northampton, where 18,177 saw the home side win by four goals to nil.

September 18th 1968. Bournemouth became the first side,

since the start of the new season, to put a League goal past Town keeper Peter Downsborough - after well over five hundred minutes of football.

September 10th 1969. Town defeated A.S. Roma by 4-0 at Swindon to take the Anglo-Italian Cup-Winners Cup on a five goals to two aggregate, Arthur Horsfield scoring three.

Talk of the Town

By the Chairman

Today we look forward to entertaining our friends from Chesterfield. It has been encouraging to have a couple of gates around the nine thousand and I hope that we can keep our successful start going and I am sure that you will support us.

Last Saturday at Walsall we were robbed of at least one penalty if not two and anyone that had the opportunity of seeing the game on television will know that this is not just an excuse, because we lost the game.

There can be no excuse to look for an excuse, not to give an honest decision and the fact that possibly we shall get away with such a decision in our favour does not make it honest.

Our next home game is against Bury on Friday evening 16th September, a seven thirty kick off. This has been arranged by the Football League and we also play Shrewsbury on Friday 30th at 7.30 p.m. This is not a forerunner of things to come although we have agreed to play Colchester away on Friday 11th November. This must make it difficult for our supporters that never miss an away game, but it is not our arranging.

Although our older supporters will remember those more halcyon days when Reg Wise and his staff were responsible for the Catering Arrangements at the County Ground, most of our present supporters appear to be unaware that changes have taken place, and that today, the whole of the catering on the ground and in the stands is organised by the Club itself, and all profits derived from this source help to relieve the club's financial burden.

When Reg retired, the Directors gave successive private companies the catering rights, in return for a small 'rental' fee. The Directors, at that time, were split on the advisability, or otherwise, of setting up their own catering organisation, the chief objection being the loss that might be sustained in spoilt food if there was a postponement prior to the gates being opened on a match day. Those Directors in favour argued that all income from matches played at the County Ground should acrue to the Club itself rather than to outside private interests. which you feel could improve our

Gradually, as the need to attract additional money to the Club became more urgent, the doubters were won over and in 1975 a step forward was

made, when, at a Board Meeting, the Directors set aside a sum of money to acquire and refurbish the Bars and Kiosks already situated in the stands and around the ground, which were the property of the previous contract-

A standard of cleanliness was set, the local Health Inspectors advice heeded and the opening match versus Chesterfield on 16th August, 1975, saw the launching of our new venture.

Since that date all profits from the sale of liquid and edible refreshments from eleven bars and kiosks have helped towards our steadily mounting expenses.

Under the guidance of Mr. Arthur Done a Director, who personally orders supplies, supervises the catering staff, prepares the cash for banking etc., standards are frequently checked and maintained and the innovation is proving to be a great success. I would like to say that this entails a lot of hard work, which is all voluntary from Arthur.

In Reg's days hot beverages were dispensed by a young man who walked repeatedly around the parimeter of the ground, with a thermus cylinder of tea strapped to his back, and which was operated by a tap. In the stands tea was sold from very large tea-pots which had to be constantly replenished, thus causing delays.

Today, things are very different, Tea, Coffee and Beef drinks are bought in individual plastic cups, hermetically sealed, and which only need filling with boiled water reduced to a heat of 80F. These 'Klix' products have proved generally satisfactory, but because of the heat generated through the cup some find them difficult to handle, and the manufacturers have now come out with a new idea. They have produced a heat resistance cup which can be held in the hand without discomfort and we are pleased to be able to introduce this new type of utensil to our supporters TODAY. Although the new cup is dearer, we feel that it will attract more customers, and so we shall not be passing on the extra charge to them.





CHESTERFIELD DRAW BIG CROWD

Chesterfield's match at Portsmouth last Saturday attracted the second largest crowd (11,132) at any Third Division match this season, but they did not give one of their better displays. They lost their 100 per cent League record in a 3-0 defeat — all Pompey's goals following free-kicks for fouls.

This was a big disappointment for Chesterfield following their fine midweek League Cup performance against First Division pacemakers Manchester City who were limited to a 1-0 victory at Saltergate.

Portsmouth's display against Chesterfield was undoubtedly inspired by their excellent showing against First Division Leicester City in the League Cup. Pompey won 2-0 and in the next round, of course, we shall be travelling down to Fratton Park to face this hard-up club whose team is very much on the upgrade at the moment.

Bobby Stokes hit his first goal since his recent transfer from Southampton as Portsmouth ran up their first League win of the season.

Sheffield Wednesday, who made such a promising start to the season, slumped badly at Bury where they were beaten 3-0, two of the Shakers' goals coming from Andy Rowland penalties. Rowland, Bury's top scorer with 21 goals last season, hadn't managed to score in five previous games this term.

Unless Wednesday show a quick return to their early form their support will surely wane. After last weekend's games they were still the best supported team in the Third Division. Leading positions:

Tranmere became the only 100 per cent club in the Third Division when they beat Colchester, who shared the record until then, with a later goal by Ronnie Moore. It was Moore's first goal of the season and now he has somewhat restored his confidence he hopes for many more. Two seasons ago he scored 37 goals but last season his tally dropped to 10.

Bits and Pieces

Chesterfield, having celebrated its centenary some eleven years ago, is one of the oldest clubs currently in membership of the Football League.

The club moved to its present home, the Recreation Ground at Saltergate, in the 1880's and has played in colours of red and blue and the Union Jack.

Chesterfield was admitted to the Football League Second Division in 1899 after a three year apprenticeship in the Midland League. It played under the name of Chesterfield Town for a few seasons from 1904.

After finishing in the bottom three places in the division for the fourth successive season, the club lost its Football League status in 1909.

When the Northern section of the Third Division was formed for the 1921-22 season, Chesterfield came back to the League fold.

In 1931, Chesterfield won the Third North championship by a single point from Lincoln City, but lasted only two seasons in the Second Division.

The club almost climbed back at the first attempt, however, finishing only one point behind promoted Barnsley. Two seasons later, in 1936, Chesterfield, although collecting one point fewer (60) again took the championship - this time by five clear points from Chester.

Chesterfield last played in the Second Division in 1951 and actually finished in fourth place in the first post-war season - 1946/47. The club dropped into the Fourth Division after finishing at the foot of the Third in 1961.

The scorer of the most goals for Chesterfield in one season was Jim

Cookson, who totalled 44 in 1925/26. Ten years later, he joined Swindon scoring 31 times in just 50 appearances

Other players to have served both clubs are Harry Cousins, who joined the Town from Chesterfield in 1932, Frank Large and Ray McHale, whose goals knocked Swindon out of the League Cup in October 1973. Tony McShane, 41 games for Swindon, later became manager of the Derbyshire

One face missing from the usual band of Town's away supporters at Walsall was that of Hove-based Andy Fitzgerald. His non-appearance brought to an end a run of 126 consecutive Town games stretching back to March 1975. Andy, 21, has decided to take up a playing career in a Brighton Saturday League after previously turning out only on Sundays. But he will not be far away when Swindon play in midweek games.
