



"MATCH OF THE DAY" IN RETROSPECT

IT IS not often that we at Oxford United appear on the BBC "Match of the Day" programme but our supporters had the opportunity of re-living part of our game with Shrewsbury Town over again on Saturday, 3rd December.

The last time BBC cameras were on our ground previously was February 9th, when Manchester United were our guests and we won a closely fought Division Two battle by 1-0.

It is interesting to remember that this was Hughie McGrogan's first match and the United team that day was: Roy Burton, Jimmy Light, John Shuker, Dave Roberts, Colin Clarke, Billy

Jeffrey, Steve Aylott, Colin Duncan, Derek Clarke, Andy McCulloch, Hugh McGrogan, with Max Briggs as the non-playing substitute.

Classic

It will also be remembered that Derek Clarke scored a the only goal and this, being a classic, was often replayed by the BBC in snippets in connection with the "Match of the Day" programme.

However, so much for 1975, and back to 3rd December, 1977.

It was a great shame we could not claim the main "Match of the Day" that Saturday, for the game first spot - Leeds United versus Queens Park Rangers was, in my view, far from a classic, and I'm sure it only

needed an extra goal or two in our game for it to have been the top match.

Information was first received that our game had been selected as "Match of the Day" when the Football League sent a letter about four weeks before the television cameras were due to appear.

Visit

I then had a visit from the BBC to settle on the various positions of the cameras, the food arrangements for a crew of 35 persons, passes to the ground, car parking arrangements for the day, the parking of the large vans and the installation of the wiring, etc.

Probably the biggest problem encountered was that of

advertising, because it is not generally known by those outside of staging television games that the same advertised name cannot appear next to each other on more than three occasions and that meant that several of the "Unipart" adverts appearing on our ground had to be split up and reallocated to other spots by kind permission of, and the assistance of, the Unipart Division of British Leyland.

I am pleased to record that on the day of the match everything went perfectly and we look forward to the next visit of BBC "Match of the Day.'

No. 10 — Jason Seacole

JASON SEACOLE'S long term ambition is to play for England. It's a hope he shares with all young professional footballers, but Jason is determined that it should be more than just a dream.

And after 28 full games for Oxford United and his appointment as a full England Youth International team member, it's more than a pipe dream.

In fact Jason played for the England youth team in Las Palmas — and was one of the stars although he doesn't brag about it. He also scored two goals for the England Youth Team in the 3—all draw against Everton's youth team at Goodison Park earlier this month.

Already at the age of 17, Jason, a local lad from Bampton who attended Herny Box School, Witney is, as his 28 games imply, a regular member of Oxford United's first team squad.

He played first team football for the club in his first year as a professional.

But that doesn't mean that Jason has his head in the clouds. As he says: "My main ambition at the moment is to play regularly for Oxford and, perhaps, score a few goals."

His first professional goal came towards the end of last season in a home match against Shrewsbury. "The score was 4-2," recalls Jason.

"I started off this season substituting for a couple of games but now I am a regular in the side," he adds, going on to talk about the tight marking in Third Division football.

As a schoolboy/amateur footballer — he played in the Witney and District and North Berks League — and it was all good, competitive fun.

He's discovered early on, however, that professional football is all about taking the rough with the smooth — having a positive attitude, and making his own chances rather than expecting them to come his way.


Jason, who still lives at home in Bampton, has

TODAY'S VISITORS

Swindon Town: The men to watch

JIMMY ALLEN — Goal-keeper. Born in Inverness he was signed from Brora Rangers in October 1970 as an apprentice. Signed on full forms in July, 1971, he made his League debut two months later, but had only occasional spells as first choice until last season by the end of which, he had made a total of 114 League appearances.

STEVE AIZLEWOOD Centre Half. Began his League career at the age of Newport sixteen with County Football Club, his home town club for whom he made 191 League appearances before his transfer to Swindon in March, 1976. He won four Welsh under-23 caps with Newport and had made 43 League appearances for Swindon to the end of last season.

TREVOR ANDERSON Forward. Comes from Belfast and started his career with Portadown before transferring to Manchester United for whom he made 13 League appearances. Joined Swindon in November, 1974 and has played a number of times for Northern Ireland being a regular cap last season. Very much a player of pace and skill on the ball he had made 101 League appearances for Swindon to the end of last season.

MICKY FRENCH — Forward. A native of East-bourne his first professional club was Q.P.R. but in Season 1974/1975 he moved to Brentford without any League experience. He played 56 League games for Brentford before his transfer to Swindon in Febuary, 1977, since which time he has made four full and four substitute appearances for the Club.

KENNY STROUD - Midfield. Although London born he served his apprenticeship at Swindon becoming a professional in 1970, but had to wait several seasons to gain a regular first team place. Has played as a central defender but is usually found in midfield from where he scored a spectac ular goal against Everton last season which was captured by TV cameras. Had made 120 League appearances to the end of last season.

COLIN PROPHETT — Defender. Comes from Crewe where he played as an amateur for Alexandra, but made his professional debut and a total of 113 League appearances for Sheffield Wednesday before moving to Norwich City in 1973. He played 34 First Division games there before his transfer to Swindon in September 1974.

CHRIS GUTHRIE - Forward. Born in Newcastle, but only made five appearances for his home town club before moving to Southend where he made 107 League appearances and in two seasons was leading goalscorer and voted player of the year for that club. Transferred to Sheffield United during the 1975 close season, but although he made 58 League appearances in his two seasons there he did not settle well and moved to Swindon in July, 1977. He also played for England Schoolboys.

RAY McHALE - Midfield. A native of Sheffield he played 123 League games for Chesterfield before moving to Halifax Town in October, 1974. In almost two years there he did not miss a match, making 86 League appearances and was leading goalscorer in 1975/1976. Transferred to Swindon in September 1976 he made 41 League appearances to the end of last season and likes to score goals coming from positions in midfield.

JOHN McLAUGHLIN — Midfield or Full Back. Born in London and served his apprenticeship with Colchester United for whom he made 66 League appearances. He has played for England at Youth Level and attracted a £25,000 fee when signing for Swindon in December, 1973.

DAVID MOSS — Forward. Signed from non-League football with Witney, his local team, he made his League debut for Swindon in April 1972 and has since played 172 League games to the end of last season. Last season's leading goal-scorer and player of the year he is an orthodox winger and although usually played on the left can play either side.

JOHN TROLLOPE - Full Back. The clubs longest serving player he is a former apprentice and professional in signed August 1960. Also holds the club appearance record with 698 League appearances to the end of last season and around 800 in all competitions. Now the only playing survivor with the club of the promotion winning sides of 1963 and 1969 the latter of which also beat Arsenal in the League Cup Final at Wembley. Born a few miles from the ground one of the most loval and hardworking players in the game.

CHRIS KAMARA. Born in Middlesborough and signed Schoolboy forms for that club. Joined Portsmouth as an apprentice and signed a full professional contract in December, 1975. He made 64 first team appearances for Portsmouth signing for Swindon in August, 1977.

Swindon intend to live down wretched away record

SWINDON travel to Oxford from the Manor with at least a United on Boxing Day intent on draw. living down their wretched away record this season.

Up until the beginning of December the side that can't stop winning on their own ground had failed to register a single away win in the Third Division - losing the last five on the trot.

In fact the Town hadn't won anywhere since Swansea City in the League Cup on the opening day of the season. In contrast, Swindon stormed to victory in all five of their home games at the County ground in November -

As a result Swindon are still comfortably placed in midtable not too far adrift of the Third Division leaders.

And after taking three points off United last season they are determined to return first 18 games.

Unlike their derby rivals, Swindon are still very much in contention in both the major Cup competitions.

Pipped

Victories against Swansea, Cardiff and Portsmouth put them in the last 16 of the League Cup where they faced Wrexham. And in the FA Cup they pipped non-League this season. Boreham Wood at the second attempt. Manager Danny Williams, in his second spell at cracking in 15 goals in the the club has made three significant signings since last

season. The Town splashed out £27,500 on Sheffield United centre-forward Chris Guthrie who quickly began to pay off his fee with eight goals in his

on an investment for the future on gifted teenager Chris Kamara from Portsmouth. Still unable to claim a regular place in the Town side the 19-year-old midfielder is, nevertheless, a player of immense potential.

And the £22,000 signature of Hereford's Roy Carter took the spending bill to over £75,000 in six months. But it has been Swindon's regulars who have been catching the eye again

Former Witney Town winger David Moss — last season's top scorer - is again among the goals with 11 up to the end of November. And Northern Ireland international Trevor Anderson is also into double figures.

In midfield Ray McHale - a bargain buy from Halifax a year ago - is proving one of up."

They spent another £17,500 the hottest shots in the division with eight goals - nearly all of them from long range.

At the back Welsh Under-23 international Steve Aizlewood has emerged as one of the Town's most consistently solid defenders at Centre half.

Missed

Relegated from the Second Division in 1974, Swindon narrowly missed promotion straight back up again the following season. But the next season saw them struggle against relegation before they finished mid-table last term.

"This is a make or break season for us," said Williams. "We've been back in the Third Division long enough and with the table so close we'll never get a better chance of going
