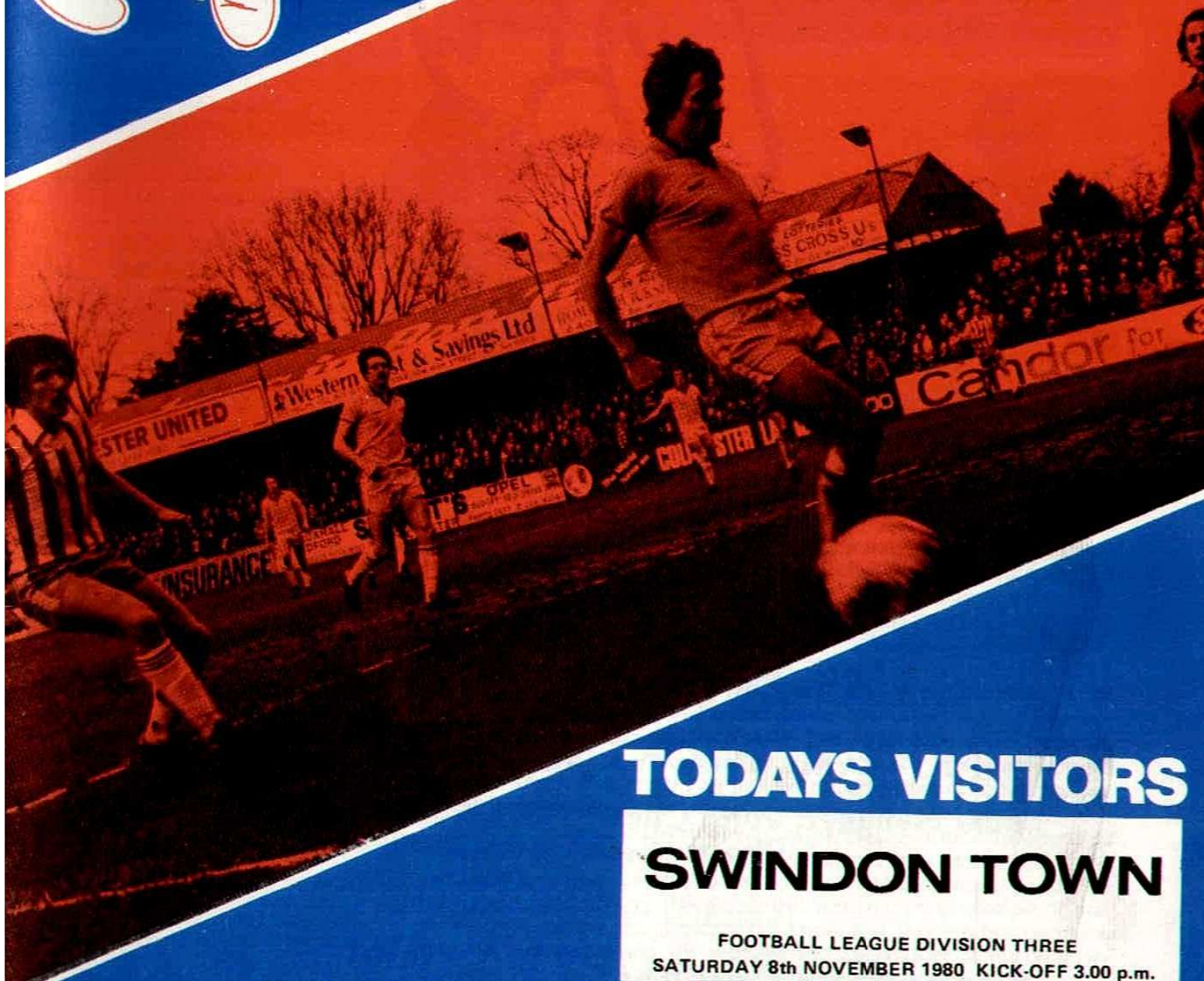

SWINDON

Jimmy Allan — *goalkeeper* — Born in Inverness, Jimmy will have been at Swindon for ten years this season, having been signed from Scottish non-league football. He made his debut against Queens Park Rangers in September 1971, and has been first choice keeper for most of the last four seasons.

David Peach — *defender* — David comes from Bedford and started his career with Gillingham. Moved to Southampton during the 1973-74 season. His debut for Swindon after signing in March 1980 was at Millwall, but an injury restricted him to ten games before the end of last season.

Chris Kamara — *midfield* — Chris is from Middlesbrough but served his apprenticeship at Portsmouth where he went on to make 56 League appearances. Signed for Swindon just before the start of the 1977-78 season. His debut was against Sheffield Wednesday in August 1977. An attacking midfield player, he began last season being put up for transfer and almost left but finished being voted "Player of the Year".

Russell Lewis — *defender* — Born in Blaengwynfi, he joined Swindon from Welsh League football in 1976 and made his League debut at York City in April 1977. His first team chances were limited until last season when he broke through to the first team, playing mostly at full-back.

Roy Carter — *midfield* — Roy comes from Torpoint, Cornwall, and played part-time Western League football for Falmouth before joining Hereford in the summer of 1975. Signed for Swindon in December, 1977, making his debut against Carlisle that month. His usual role is as an attacking midfield player, but he is a true utility player.

Ian Miller — *forward* — Ian is from Perth and made his League debut with Bury before moving to Notts Forest. He did not make the first team there, but a move to Doncaster Rovers in August 1975 gave him regular first team football. Signed for Swindon during the 1978 close-season and made his debut against Bury in August 1978. An orthodox winger who uses pace to beat opponents.

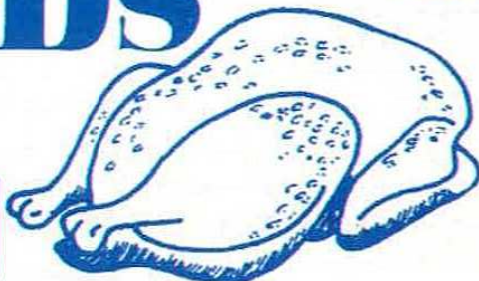
Glenn Cockerill — *midfield* — Glenn is from Grimsby and made his League debut with Lincoln City in season 1976-77. He played well over 50 League games for Lincoln and Swindon began watching him in March 1979. He eventually signed in December 1979, but injury and other factors prevented his League debut until March 1980.

Andy Rowland — *forward* — Born in Derby he was apprenticed with his home town team until a transfer took him to Bury before the start of the 1974-75 season. He was three times leading scorer before his move to Swindon in September 1978 and his debut came that month against Blackpool.

Alan Mayes — *forward* — A Londoner whose first club was Queens Park Rangers. He signed for Swindon in February 1979, scored a hat-trick on his debut at Rotherham and had made 65 League appearances to the end of last season. A mobile striker, he was joint leading scorer last season with 28 in all competitions.

Brian Williams — *midfield* — A Mancunian, Brian is another player who was formerly with Bury. He made his League debut during season 1971-72. Transferred to Queens Park Rangers in July 1977. He spent one season in London making only nine full League appearances, and signed for Swindon in June 1978.

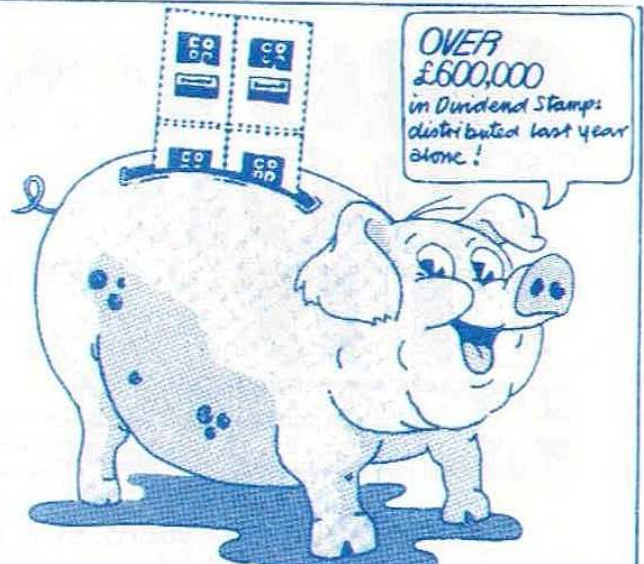

Football and the Community

I was only too happy to agree to the request by Hilary Matheson, your Sports Promoter, to write an article for this programme about your Club's involvement with the "Football and the Community" Scheme.

The principle underlying this scheme is that football clubs should integrate more into the life of the community around them by providing additional sport and recreation facilities which can be used by all. The scheme started in 1978 from an initiative by the Sports Council, and so far the Council has spent nearly £2 million in grants to assist in the costs of these facilities at a number of Football and Rugby League clubs. The financial assistance given by the Sports Council has now been supplemented by funds from the Football Ground Improvement Trust.

It is with the help of this Trust that your club has now been able to provide a floodlit hard-playing area and a sports pavilion. You are also particularly fortunate in Colchester in being able to link in competitions with similarly well-established centres at the football grounds of Luton, Norwich, Peterborough and Ipswich. A wide selection of people will therefore now be able to take an active part in sporting recreation which they would not otherwise be able to do.

The scale of these individual schemes, and the facilities they provide, vary considerably. But, however great or small, they all have the same aim and driving spirit. They help provide valuable recreation facilities in areas where they are most needed. I sincerely hope that the new facilities will lead to greatly improved relations between football clubs, their supporters, and the people in the community at large. As clubs begin to play a larger part in community life, they will naturally hope that - even if only in the long-term - their gates will eventually increase. I certainly hope that one of the by-products of this greater involvement with the community will be a reduction in some of the behavioural problems currently and so sadly connected with professional football.

RESERVE COMMENT

RAY BUNKELL – RESERVE TEAM COACH

On Saturday, 25th October, 1980, we were away to Ely, the final result 4 - 4. We did not produce the type of football we have been playing recently, but we continued to score goals, which is always pleasing, both for the players and, naturally, the spectators. We went two goals in front from fine individual goals from first, Kevin Baker, who evaded two defenders in the box and then took the ball past the advancing Ely keeper and then, Leo Cusenza finished off a fine run from left mid-field to crash a twenty yard shot into the corner of the net.



Ely hit back with two goals when, defensively, we were very slack. Just before half-time however, we again went in front with a goal by Joey Peck following a free kick.

The second half saw us again go two goals in front, Joey Peck scoring a great volley from the edge of the box. Ely, to their credit, again fought their way into the game with another two goals, their forwards giving our defence plenty of problems. The last half hour of the match was a real cliff-hanger with the result in the balance until the final whistle.

4 - 4 at the end of 90 minutes was about the result both sides deserved for their efforts on the day. I obviously was

not over-pleased with the way we allowed Ely to get back into the game, twice being two goals behind, but to score four goals whilst not playing very well on the day, to a team that had previously only conceded six goals in 12 games, was very encouraging. This result gave us a good finish to last months matches; played 4, won 2, drawn 2 (both against Ely), and lost none, with 14 goals for and 5 against.

I hope the players get some encouragement from the way we are playing at the moment, I certainly have. Let us hope we can continue in this way.

TABLE TALK

NEWS AND VIEWS IN AND AROUND DIVISION III

Results in the Third Division continue to bewilder form experts, as week after week the top teams drop points as the lower teams pick up.

Chesterfield, ridiculously priced at 5-4 favourites to win the division, have slumped in recent games, only getting a point at Craven Cottage, where managerless Fulham are usually easy meat.

Bobby Campbell's departure there adds to the list of unemployed managers, and the troubled London club will do well to emulate their Rugby League compatriots and finish in a high league position. (Latest rumours suggest it is a straight fight between two former England internationals - Bobby Moore, manager of non-League Oxford City and ex-Arsenal striker Malcolm MacDonald.)

Swindon, another side without a manager, had no such luck, conceding three to Burnley at the County Ground to make sure they remain right at the wrong end of the table. Since Bobby Smith's sacking, things haven't got any better and a mid-table position is the best the West Country side can hope for.

Burnley, on the other hand, continue to thrive and with Martin Dobson scheming in midfield and Northern Ireland international Billy Hamilton rifling them home up front, they look a fair bet for promotion from their fourth position with 22 points from 17 games.

Before the mid-week games, Charlton took over the leadership with a battling 1 - 0 away win at Huddersfield and earned manager Mike Bailey the Third Division "Manager of the Month" award.

Barnsley continue to prove they are a team likely to be involved in promotion matters next year. Norman Hunter has built a fine footballing side, who have the ability to pick up away points as well as win well at home.

After an unpromising start, probably partly due to the uncertainty of Allan Clarke's position, they have clicked for Hunter and after winning 3 - 1 at Plymouth, registered another fine win over in-form Chester by 2 - 0 at Oakwell.

Reading's transfer-listed striker Williams continues to work the oracle. The 20-year-old sank Colchester recently and repeated the dose after coming on as substitute at Exeter to score and boost his chance of getting another club.

Despite that win, the injury-hit Berkshire club still stay mid-table alongside Walsall, where player-manager Alan Buckley believes his side is about to end a goal famine that has wrecked their early season hopes.

Buckley was delighted after a 3 - 3 draw with Gillingham, calling it one of their best-ever performances and after failing to score in eight games Buckley was hungry for goals against leaders Charlton.

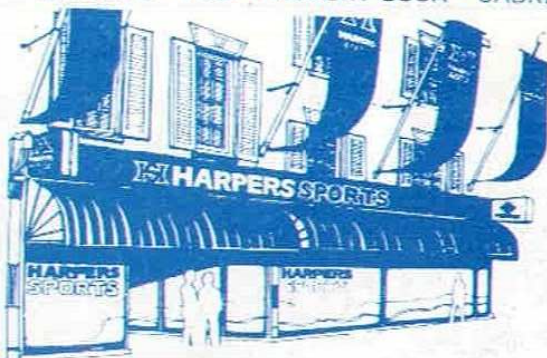

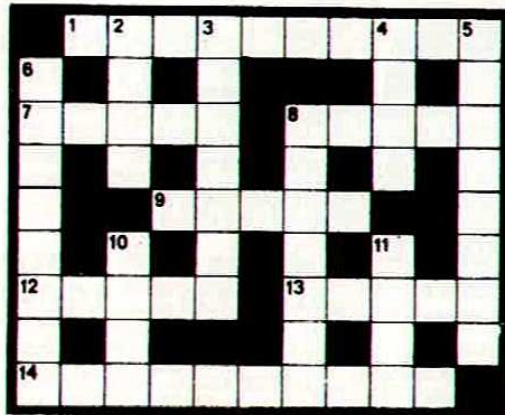

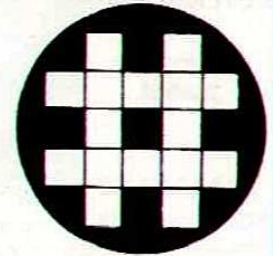

HISTORY

HIGHLIGHTS

Imagine a football match that had almost every possible excitement – eight goals, end-to-end thrills, a penalty shoot-out ending with an eighteen-year-old converting the spot-kick that gives the Fourth Division underdogs the Cup on the ground of their famous First Division rivals! Unbelievable – the sort of thing that only happens in boys comics!

Yet this actually took place at the Hawthorns on August 7th, 1971, when Colchester United defeated West Bromwich Albion to become the first-ever winners of the Watney Cup.

United, who only a few months earlier had performed that minor miracle in defeating mighty Leeds United, went ahead after only eight minutes through Mick Mahon only to concede two quick goals.

But United were in a fighting mood that afternoon and the 18,000-plus crowd didn't have long to wait before Dave Simmons put the U's level.

The Albion once again hit back immediately and with three goals having been scored in four minutes the crowd were still wondering if they had the score right at half time.

But it was 3 - 2 to the First Division side and things looked a little grim for the U's. Then the dashing Mahon took over. When he was on song the little winger was magic and that day was he on song! Soon after the break Mick weaved his way down the left wing leaving defenders bemused in his wake before crashing home an unstoppable shot from at least 25 yards out.

It was a fabulous goal by any standards and it looked to be the last one of the game – but no – four minutes from time Mahon zoomed into the penalty area and was brought crashing down.

Brian Lewis stepped up to smash the kick home to give the U's what appeared to be the winner. However, the U's large following had their hopes dashed when England international Jeff Astle equalised with the final whistle only seconds away.

So came perhaps the most dramatic period of the game – the penalty shoot-out.

Albion took the first penalty and it was saved – but had to be retaken as Graham Smith had moved. It was converted and Lewis also scored at the second attempt.

It grew more and more exciting as Brian Gibbs and Brian Owen converted theirs and then the fourth and fifth Albion takers missed leaving United to convert their last penalty to take the Cup.

Showing no nerves at all up stepped eighteen-year-old Phil Bloss, playing only his second full game for the U's to coolly slot the ball into the right-hand corner of the net and the Cup was on its way back to Layer Road.

It was an incredible match enjoyed by millions on Match of the Day that night and the following week the U's paraded the Watney Cup around the town in an open-top bus. A very proud moment indeed in the history of Colchester United.

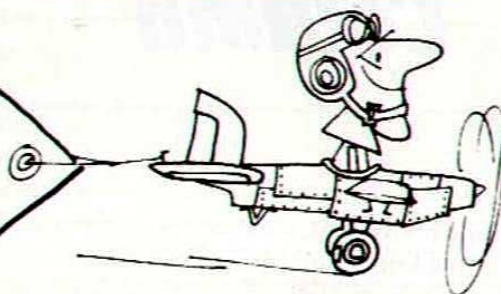

Given a few more matches to fit in, and to adjust to the pace of even Third Division football, I think we are going to see just what a shrewd signing Kevin Bremner was. His ball control, beautiful footwork and all-out work-rate has delighted everybody – I only hope by now he may have broken his duck and gained that bit of encouragement he so much wants. If only that one against Barnsley had proved the winner! Incidentally, I've never heard why it wasn't, have you?

I know that most of the supporters (including me) don't know half the Rules – more to our shame, but can anybody tell me, seriously, whether there is a rule forbidding Linesmen to tap the ball to a player for a throw-in? I think there must be something of the sort, or else they are sometimes plain "bloody minded", as I have lost count of the number of times, a linesman will allow the ball to roll to his very feet, and stand there waiting for a player to come and get it, rather than roll it to him. It's only a silly little point, perhaps, but it can become very annoying, just as much as deliberate time-wasting, both by opponents here and,

probably, by our own boys when they are playing away! Is there a Linesman's Union that prevents it?

Well, let's have your usual encouragement today, it makes such a difference to everybody – not least to our League position, and a few favourable results may even see the gates creeping up once more. I've stuck my head on the block by saying that it would, and probably Bobby is waiting, with axe poised, ready to lop it off, if I'm proved wrong!

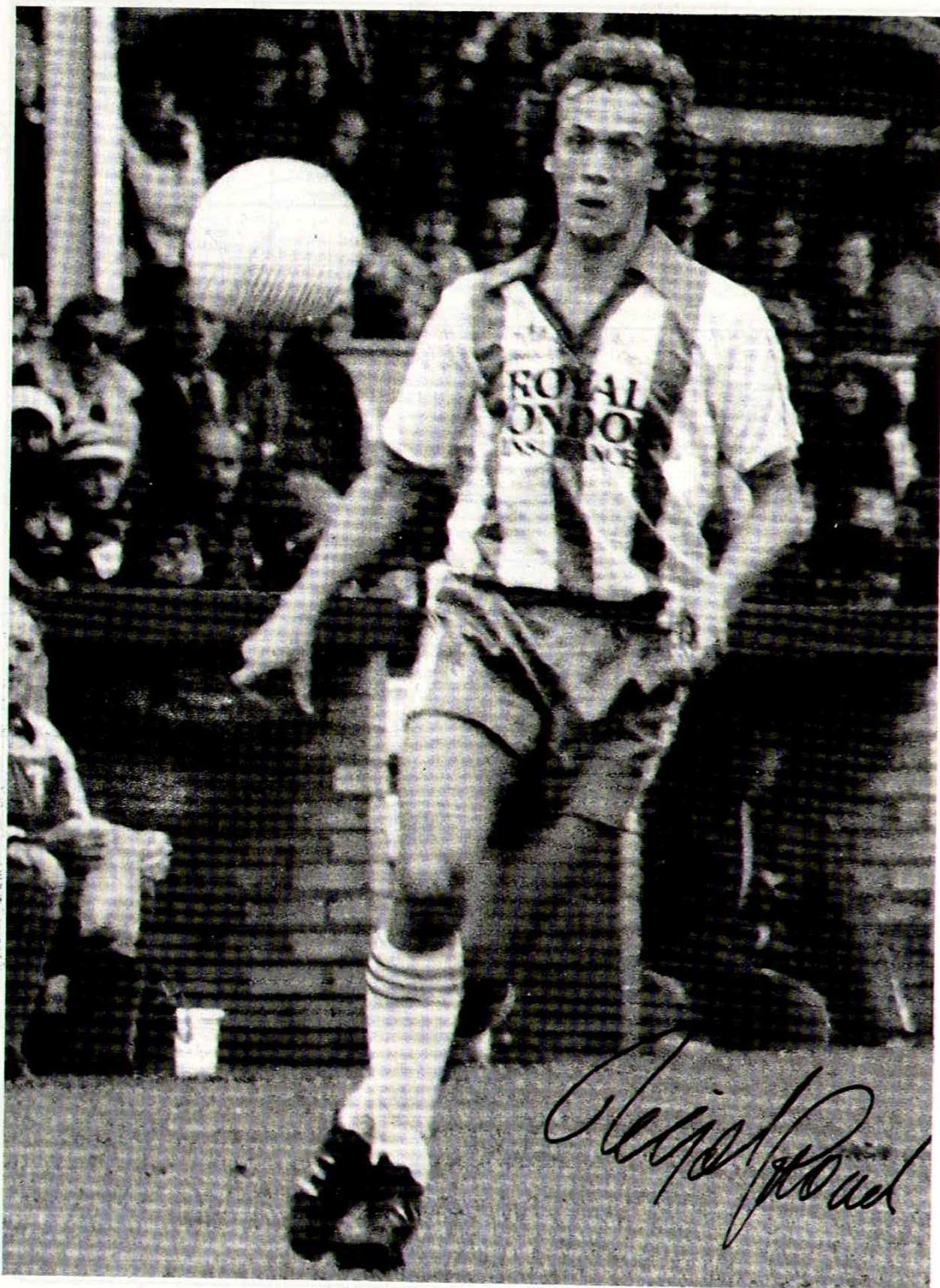


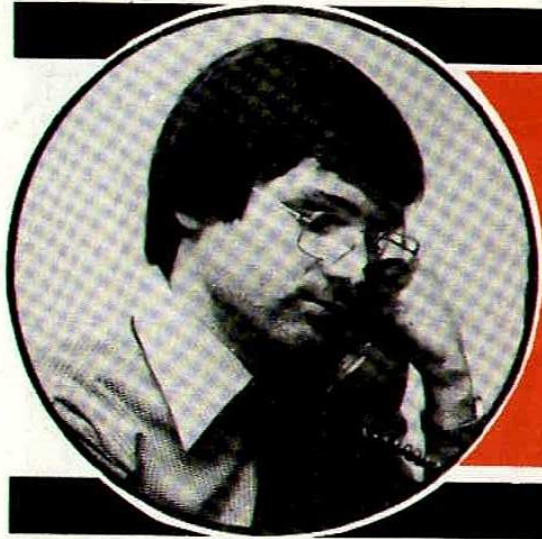

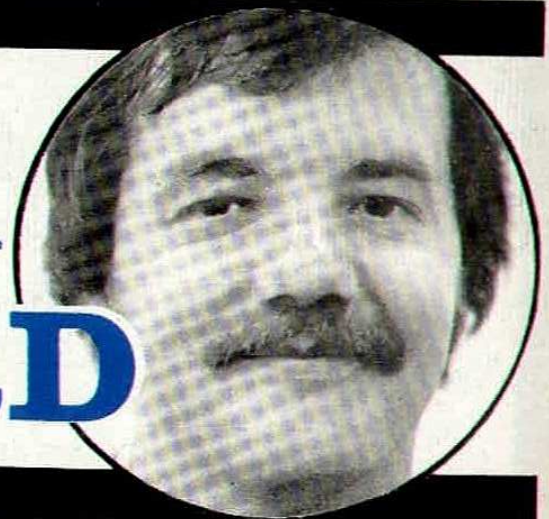
