TOWN WELCOME

A 5-2 win over Sheffield United last week lifted the gloom around Swindon's County Ground as they moved out of the bottom three, a position to which they had returned after losing their previous three games.

Despite their lowly League position Swindon are still a useful outfit as they showed when beating us at the County Ground in September and throughout their history they have made a habit of creating surprises of both kinds.

Whilst still in the Southern League they twice reached the semi-final of the F.A. Cup before the First World War. They were members of Division Three (South) throughout its existence from 1920 to 1958. Then after being allocated to the new Division Three they twice won promotion, their 1969 success being allied to a remarkable League Cup Final win over Arsenal at Wembley.

A year later they came within striking distance of Division One when finishing fifth in Divison Two and also won the Anglo-Italian Cup for good measure.

They slipped back into Division Three in 1974 and after narrowly missing promotion a year later they came close to slipping into Division Four a year after that. Two seasons ago they made another promotion bid that ended three points short and last season they were in third place at the halfway stage after beating Bury 8-0. Then came an unlucky fourth round F.A. Cup defeat by Wolves and an even unluckier semi-final League Cup defeat by Wolves and from that point on their season fell away. Despite a spectacular 6-2 win over Rotherham in April they ended up in tenth place.

THIS SEASON

This season they reached the third round of the League Cup before crashing 5-0 at Liverpool, but until a fine 4-3 win at Exeter at the end of October they had picked up only two away points. A managerial change saw John Trollope after a record 770 League games for one club hanging up his boots to take over from Bobby Smith, but results have continued to be a little inconsistent. They went out of the F.A. Cup 2-0 at Wimbledon and then after winning three games in a row without conceding a goal they lost the next three without scoring.

Then came last week's biggest win of the season with Andy Rowland, last season's leading scorer, getting a hat-trick. Andy, who was

formerly with Derby and Bury, is likely to be linking up with Roy Greenwood (ex-Hull, Sunderland and Derby) now that Alan Mayes has moved to Chelsea with lan Miller (from Doncaster two years ago) linking midfield and attack.

Brian Williams and Roy Carter are now well established in midfield after earlier experience with Q.P.R. and Hereford respectively. Tall Chris Kamara, a Geordie formerly with Portsmouth, completes the midfield while in defence Tony Henry, a newcomer this season, links up with home-grown Russell Lewis on the flanks. David Peach (ex-Gillingham and Southampton) was signed just a year ago and is likely to be at the heart of the defence with home-grown Kenny Stroud, who has now played over 300 League and Cup games. Behind them Scotsman Jimmy Allan is also nearing his 300th game and substitute in recent weeks has been young striker Steve Abbey, who made his debut last March.

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SETTING A TARGET

There was an item in the local press which caught my eye earlier this season. It featured Town secretary George Binns along with a visiting soccer enthusiast who was apparently very near to the completion of a self imposed task of personal visits to each of the 92 Football League Clubs. Town was 90th on his list.

This certainly appeared to be a matter calling for full investigation at more local level and a prolonged search through the record books reveals the intriguing fact that indeed it is very possible for a Town enthusiast by no means well advanced in years to have watched his side in action on the ground of each of the remaining 91 League clubs either in League matches or the F.A. and Football League Cup competitions.

And surprisingly enough, it is only necessary to have been actively engaged in following the side on its travels for the past 10 seasons to have had the opportunity of visiting no fewer than 88 out of the 91 grounds possible either in League or Cup matches. In fairness however it must be said that in some instances the opportunities have been extremely limited — for example Shrewsbury Town (1973-74), and Mansfield Town (1976-77) have been visited just once during this period, the latter in a first round Cup-tie.

For the sake of convenience the figures which follow have been broken down to cover the situation when the present season is completed. It should therefore be kept in mind that at the time of writing there are a number of clubs still to be visited this year who have not faced Town on their own ground for quite a number of years, Burnley and Hull City for example have not previously been met in an away game since season 1972-73.

The obvious query springing at once to mind must be as to the possibilities that some Town enthusiast has in fact achieved the 91 maximum, and if not then who is nearest to the target figure. As indicated 10 seasons of support could be sufficient to reach a personal total of 88 out of 91, the three clubs then still outstanding being Bolton W., Norwich City, each of whom were visited in 1969-70, and Notts County who easily head the list for it is now 23 years since Town were last at Meadow Lane, back in season 1957-58. As some kind of a guideline let me give my own total at present standing at 74. No claims therefore below this target figure!

As a footnote it is perhaps worth mentioning that since Town's entry into League football five additional clubs now no longer in membership have been met in League or Cup matches viz, Bradford P.A., Gainsborough Trinity, Glossop, Leeds City, and South Shields. And surprisingly enough that recent visit to Northwich Victoria was only the second time since 1910 that Town had travelled to a non-League club ground for a Cup-tie. The other instance in January, 1948, still produces personal feelings of distress and embarrassment for it was the occasion of that notorious 1-0 defeat at the hands of Colchester United then humble members of the Southern League!

career was Much of Stanley Matthews' remarkable. He started at an earlier age than most, retired later than almost any other player in the history of the game and enjoyed virtually three separate careers. The first of these was as a young player with Stoke in the 30's. After over ten seasons with the 'Potters' he was transferred to Blackpool for whom he had beenguesting during the latter part of the War. In the course of the next 15 years he was a key figure is one of the country's top teams of the time, this second 'career' reaching its climax when at the age of 38 he starred in a remarkable F.A. Cup final recovery that turned a 3-1 deficit to a 4-3 win over Bolton in 1953.

From that time on there were forecasts that each season would be his last. Yet he not only stayed with Blackpool in Division One until he was in the mid-forties, but then in 1961 moved back to Stoke and played for them for four more seasons. By this time he was being used skilfully in short bursts during a game — and what bursts they were. He was 48 years old when he lined up for a Second Division game against Luton in May, 1963. A win would give Stoke promotion back to Division One. A scrambled goal in the first half put them ahead.

Midway through the second half Stan began one of his electrifying bursts. He usually made for the corner flag and crossed accurately. This time, however, he moved inside. Players of both sides tried to anticipate the ball that would, it seemed, inevitably be played into the goalmouth. Though he had once got a hat-trick in an international Stan rarely tried a shot at goal. This time, however, he raced on like the great goalscoring wingers did in those days. Suddenly he was clear of the defence. Goalkeeper Ron Baynham, an England man himself, raced out to meet him. But Stan drove the ball wide of him as he did so. The ball was in the net, Stoke were two up and Stan had clinched promotion for them.

This was not the end of the story. He went on to play for them in Division One, his last game being after his fiftieth birthday and on his retirement in 1965 he was immediately knighted — the first footballer to achieve this honour. Stan still plays in Malta.





The three teams carrying the Third Division banner in the last sixteen of the F.A. Cup last Saturday had all suffered defeat in their previous League games, not the best of preparation for either club for their fifth round away encounters.

Exeter City were still smarting from a crushing 5-0 defeat away at Portsmouth in mid-week, in which Tait notched a hat-trick, but they fared much better at Newcastle United. A late goal from Lee Roberts, which cancelled out a second-half opening goal from Shoulder, kept City in the quarter-final draw. Tottenham now entertain the winners of the replay at White Hart Lane, the result of which is not to hand at the time of going to print. One certain fact, however, is that the victors of the replay will be the only representative outside the First Division left in the competition.

Mike Bailey of Charlton Athletic was named Third Division manager for January, but someone forgot to tell the team how to celebrate. In their next game they visited Chester, without a win for five games and with only one goal scored. Chester's team boss Alan Oakes was delighted if somewhat non-plussed as he saw his rejuvenated side take the League leaders apart 4-0. Again Charlton's performance was better in the Cup away at First Division pacemakers lpswich Town as they held out for almost an hour before John Wark opened the scoring, with Paul Mariner making the score more respectable in the dying minutes of the game.

With Barnsley's 20 match unbeaten League run having been ended here at Leeds Road in our last home match. Norman Hunter's men had no distractions left as they concentrated all their efforts against Middlesbrough at Ayresome Park. Having struggled against non-League Enfield in the previous round, they assumed the role of the underdog and almost did a giant-killing act themselves with a marvellous second half display. The First Division outfit looked to be cruising with goals from Procter and Jankovic in the first 24 minutes but Lester reduced the arrears with a shot from just outside the box. Goalkeeper Platt was mainly responsible for keeping galla..t Barnsley at bay and keep the scoreline 2-1 in his own side's favour.

Helping Football



Since 1975 a quiet revolution has been taking place at football grounds up and down the country. New segregation fences have been built, crush barriers strengthened, new toilets installed, police control facilities provided, floodlighting increased and — at some clubs — terraces and stands completely rebuilt.

The name of the game is safety. First and Second Division clubs have been ordered to do this work by law — the Safety of Sports Grounds Act of 1975 to be precise — if hey hadn't the local council could even have closed their grounds. And many clubs in the Third and Fourth Divisions have also chosen to carry out safety and other work of their own accord, as have Town.

Building work these days is not cheap, but none of the M.Ps. who helped pass the new law in 1975 can have guessed that the cost of safety work at football grounds would have amounted to more than £10 million over five years — a staggering sum when you consider the rocky finances of most clubs.

Fortunately for football, the clubs have not had to raise all the money themselves. Grants of up to 60 per cent of the cost have been available from the beginning. These are paid our by the Football Grounds Improvement Trust —

an independent body set up by Britain's three big pools companies, Littlewoods, Vernons and Zetters, and financed wholly out of their Spotting-the-Ball competition. The Chairman of the Trust is Lord Westwood, the President of the Football League, and one of the Trustees is the World famous former Preston and England winger. Tom Finney. Here at Huddersfield Town we have received a total of £2,874 from the Trust, out of the £6.8 million which the Trust has paid out to League clubs as grants for safety work. Should we be promoted to the Second Division much more will be forthcoming at that stage.

The money given to the F.G.I.T. is only a part of the millions the Pools put into football each year. This year, for the use of fixture lists, the pools will pay some £3.95 millions (plus V.A.T.) and, of course, nearly all this money will be shared out amongst the League clubs. In addition to this large sum over £4.1 million will go to The Football Trust and be shared out — about £2.4 million to the F.G.I.T. for safety work and improvements at League grounds, the rest to be used by The Football Trust for the wider benefit of football, and especially for tackling problems of crowd behaviour.


In all that means over £8 million yearly provided by the Pool Promoters for football, and the figure is going up every year with the increases in turnover.

Obviously football is a big pools winner. The pools' substantial contributions to football are evidence of their will to play their part in helping British footbali.


