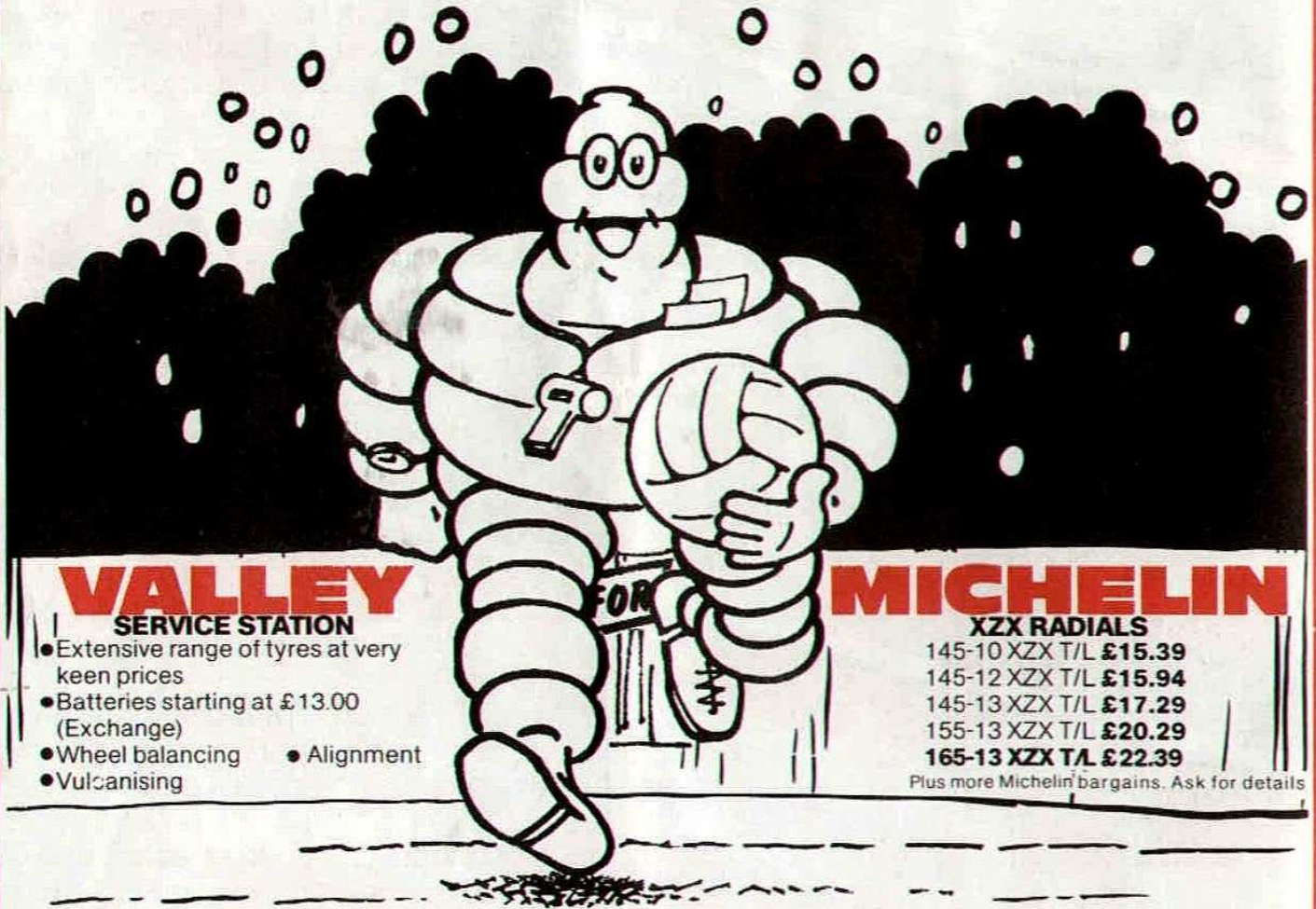

It is certainly tough at the top as we have been finding out in recent matches. Tuesday's 0-0 draw with South London neighbours Millwall was our fourth match without a win but there was plenty of good football and excitement in a lively game.

It was the first time this season that we had failed to score in a match at The Valley.

Millwall certainly played their part in providing our biggest League crowd of the season — 12,700 — with entertainment despite the lack of goals.

Today we welcome Swindon Town to The Valley for what will prove another hard match for us.

Swindon are not yet clear of the relegation zone and will obviously be battling hard.

The Wiltshire side are managed by their former player John Trollope who has a marvellous record of dedication to one club having played more than 700 games for them. On Sunday he was honoured by his fellow professionals when he won the Professional Footballers' Association Meritorious Award — an honour richly deserved.

Today's game is followed by two away matches, at Blackpool on Wednesday and Reading next Saturday.

The next League match at The Valley is the game with Huddersfield on Saturday, 4th April.

Our young supporters who are travelling to Reading are reminded that they have to be in possession of their Charlton Junior Passes to gain reduced admission at Elm Park.

We must once again apologise for the inconvenience caused to our supporters whilst work on the installation of seats behind the goals is carried out.

The North Terrace should be open again and in use very soon and many of the seats are already in place.

The reserves are away at Watford on Wednesday.

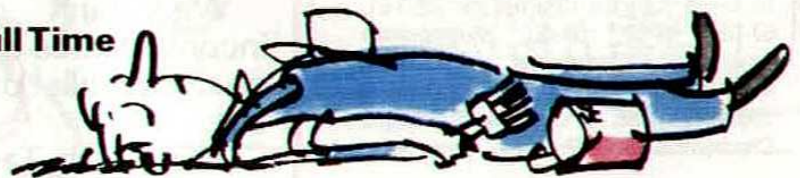

There was a tremendous atmosphere in the ground on Tuesday for the local derby with Millwall and nobody can complain about the entertainment both teams provided. It was certainly encouraging to see a big crowd which always helps the players to motivate themselves.

Obviously we can be a little disappointed at only getting one point but I couldn't have asked the players to give any more than they did.

Everyone worked tremendously hard and I thought we played some great football at times.

I was especially pleased with our showing defensively because we have let in some sloppy goals in a couple of games recently.

The match gives us the opportunity to consolidate our position and it will be an important psychological boost if we can break through the 50 point barrier with a victory.

We must keep patient and hope for the breaks to come our way as long as the team give 100% all the time we will achieve success.

We have already proved this season we are capable of winning through and your continued support in these final matches will be of crucial importance.

JIMMY ALLAN — Goalkeeper. Born in Inverness, Jimmy will have been at Swindon for ten years this season, having been signed from Scottish non-League football. He made his debut against Queens Park Rangers in September, 1971, and has been first choice 'keeper for most of the last four seasons.

COLIN BARRETT — Defender. From Stockport, Colin played a number of seasons at Manchester City making 50 League appearances and signing for Nottingham Forest in March, 1976. The following season he appeared in Forest's League Championship side and won a League Cup Winners' medal in 1979, but later his career was affected by injury. He made 64 League appearances for Forest and joined Swindon in June, 1980.

ROY CARTER — Midfield. Roy comes from Torpoint, Cornwall, and played part time Western League football for Falmouth before joining Hereford in the summer of 1975. He played in 64 League games there including the side which won the Third Division Championship in 1976. He signed for Swindon in December, 1977, making his debut against Carlisle that month, and had made 104 League appearances to the end of last season.

GLENN COCKERILL — Midfield. Glenn is from Grimsby and made his League debut with Lincoln City in season 1976/77. He played well over 50 League games for Lincoln and Swindon began watching him in March, 1979. He eventually signed for a then club record of £110,000 in December, 1979, but injury and other factors prevented his League debut until March, 1980.

ROY GREENWOOD — Forward. A native of Leeds, he served his apprenticeship with Hull City making his League debut in season 1971/72. He made 118 League appearances for Hull, and moved to Sunderland in January, 1976 in time to help that club win the Second Division. He played 45 League games for Sunderland but signed for Derby County in February, 1979 making 20 League appearances for them. A further move came just over one year later to Swindon.

CHRIS KAMARA — Midfield. Chris is from Middlesbrough but served his apprenticeship at Portsmouth where he was one of a number of teenagers given League debuts in season 1975/76. He went on to make 56 League appearances for Portsmouth and signed for Swindon just before the start of the 1977/78 season. His debut for Swindon was against Sheffield Wednesday in August, 1977.

RUSSELL LEWIS — Defender. Born in Blaengwynfi, he joined Swindon from Welsh League football in 1976 and made his League debut at York City in April, 1977. His first team chances were limited until last season when he broke through to the first team playing mostly at full back, although until then he had normally been a central defender.

TOM McALISTER — Goalkeeper. From Clydebank, his first League club was Sheffield United for whom he made his League debut in season 1971/72. He made 63 League appearances for the Blades but moved to Rotherham in 1975 after a period there on loan. In over three seasons he did not miss a first team game, making 159 League appearances, but the 1979 close season saw him move to Blackpool. This move did not work out very well, and after only a dozen or so

games, he moved to Swindon during the summer of 1980.

IAN MILLER — Forward. Ian is from Perth and made his League debut with Bury for whom he made 9 League appearances before moving to Nottingham Forest. He did not make the first team there, but a move to Doncaster Rovers in August, 1976 gave him regular first team football. He stayed for 3 seasons making 124 League appearances and signed for Swindon during the 1978 close season.

DAVID PEACH — Defender. David comes from Bedford and started his career with Gillingham for whom he made 186 League appearances. He moved to Southampton during the 1973/74 season and stayed there until March, 1980 when he signed for Swindon. During his time with the Saints, he made 220 League appearances, appeared in two cup finals (winning an F.A. Cup Winners' medal in 1976) and captained the side. His debut for Swindon was at Millwall in March, 1980 but an injury restricted him to 10 games before the end of last season.

ANDY ROLLINGS — Defender. Andy comes from North Weston and started his career with Norwich City for whom he made 4 League appearances. A move to Brighton in 1974 gave him first team football regularly, and he played in the sides that won promotion from both the Third and Second Divisions. He played around 170 League games for Brighton before signing for Swindon in May, 1980.

ANDY ROWLAND — Forward. Born in Derby he was apprenticed with his home town team but did not play League football until a transfer took him to Bury before the start of the 1974/75 season. He was three times leading scorer and made 169 League appearances before his move to Swindon in September, 1978.

KEN STROUD — Defender. Although a Londoner, Ken grew up in Swindon and joined the club from school, signing professional forms in 1970 and making his League debut the following year against Queens Park Rangers. He had made 243 League appearances to the end of last season, and is the longest serving player at the club.

BILLY TUCKER — Defender. From Kidderminster he played part time Southern League football for Hereford United but turned full time when that club was elected to the League in 1972. He played in the sides that won promotion from the Fourth Division and the Third Division Championship and made 135 League appearances for the club. In December, 1976 he moved to Bury and added a further 96 League games over the next 2 1/2 seasons. He moved to Swindon during the summer of 1979.

ROY WALSH — Midfield. Born in Belfast, Roy played for Glentoran Football Club on a part-time basis since 1972, where he captained the team. He also played twelve times in European games, including against Juventus. In the summer of the 1979/80 season, Roy played for the New Jersey Americans in the USA. Roy signed for Swindon Town in March, 1980.

BRIAN WILLIAMS — Midfield. A Mancunian, Brian is another player who was formerly with Bury. He made his League debut during season 1971/72, and played 148 League games before a transfer to Queens Park Rangers in July, 1977. He spent one season in London making only 9 full League appearances, and signed for Swindon in June, 1978.

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Around & About with Peter Burrowes

Visiting Manager John Trollope played against Charlton on many occasions in the past in his amazing career which ended earlier this season.

It was as long ago as 1 October, 1963 (the first birthday of Paul Walsh) when he played his first match against The Valiants.

We drew 2-2 with Swindon on that occasion and the scorer of one of our goals was our present Manager Mike Bailey.

When we met Swindon earlier this season John was making his 874th senior appearance for the Wiltshire club and had beaten Jimmy Dickinson's all-time record of 764 league outings for one club in Town's previous game against Carlisle.

A galaxy of well-known soccer names were present to honour John that night including Jimmy Greaves who presented the record holder with a memento to recognise his tremendous loyalty.

John's proudest moment as a footballer must surely have been at Wembley on March 15, 1969 when he was a member of the Swindon team that astounded the football world by beating Arsenal in the 1969 League Cup final.

John was honoured again on Sunday when he stepped up at the Hilton Hotel in London to receive the merit award from the Professional Footballers Association at their annual dinner.

To be recognised by ones fellow professionals is the highest accolade possible and two of our own Charlton players are to be congratulated on receiving recognition.

Goalkeeper Nicky Johns and striker Derek Hales were both included in the best Third Division line-up chosen by the players themselves.

Nicky Johns has had an outstanding season for us and a few weeks ago won the New Standard Footballer of the Month award.

Derek Hales scored his 22nd goal of the season at Sheffield on Saturday and was chosen as the Third Division marksman

along with Derek Kemp of Plymouth and Tony Kellow of Exeter — a really lethal trio.

One of the several links with Swindon is Fred Ford who made 22 senior appearances for Charlton in the late thirties.

Fred's managerial career started in 1960 when he held the reigns at Bristol City and then moved across to manage City before joining Swindon in a similar capacity. Nowadays Fred is scouting with Oxford United. He has been ill lately but we are pleased to say that he is back on the football scene which has been his life for so long.

One of our former players who will no doubt be particularly interested in today's result is Arthur Horsfield who had a three year spell at the County Ground before joining Charlton in 1972.

During his spell at The Valley "King Arthur" made 156 appearances for Charlton scoring 61 goals.

The Valiants turned into Owls on Saturday when they played Sheffield United at Bramall Lane.

Because the television cameras transferred from the postponed match at Rotherham to Bramall Lane the team could not wear their sponsored shirts.

A set were borrowed, not from United, but across town from neighbours Sheffield Wednesday and had the Owls motif on them.

YOUTH TEAM TOUR TO GERMANY

Charlton Athletic have for many years operated a highly successful youth policy. This is not simply a question of scouting for promising youngsters, coaching them and waiting for their talent to bear fruit. Although of course the young players of high ability have to be found in the first place and are immediately placed under the charge of the Club's respected coaching staff, this is only part of the story in the complete development of a Football League player. It is not generally realised the high cost involved in producing home-bred footballers. On occasions several clubs have attempted to evaluate the cost of players that have come through to the first team from the youth scheme. Bearing in mind the numbers that have been lost along the way for various reasons, the expenditure incurred in many instances has exceeded that of other players whose registration has been obtained from another club, even when the fee involved has been substantial.

In these recessionary times which like any other form of business, football clubs cannot be isolated from, I feel sure that supporters will take heart from the news that the club have decided to embark on a close season tour to Germany for the youth squad.

The tour arranged through club secretary, Mr. Bill Stevens, is to Hamm, near Dusseldorf, between 1st and 9th June. The host club is Hammer S.V. and our youngsters will be competing in a tournament with seven other clubs from Denmark, France, Germany and Hungary. Charlton are the only club from Britain.

POISON PEN?

They say that the pen is mightier than the sword and it is a pity that some writers in the National Press do not give more consideration to their facts before committing themselves to paper. In a so-called report of our match against Barnsley, an unnamed reporter in the fledgling Daily Star, commented that we will have to shake our ideas up next season in the Second Division. You note his assumption that promotion is a certainty; nobody at The Valley, would be so presumptuous at this stage, but we thank him for his confidence. Admitting that his deliberations were based purely on our showing with Barnsley, he nevertheless chose to vent his venom in casting doubts on the ability of Derek Hales to get goals at any level above Division Three. The article stated that our leading marksman has always failed to produce the goods outside of this grade. I am not unduly sensitive to criticism concerning Charlton players, or the team in general, provided that it is constructive. However, these remarks are unquantified, unjustified and completely irresponsible. Someone whose qualifications regarding the ability to judge a footballer may be non-existent, sets out to write-off a player's career. Derek, in my view has nothing to prove; if anything his record in Division 2 is better than his tally in the Third. Even at Derby, in the First Division, when consideration is given go the notorious lack of scoring opportunities created by the team in that era, Derek's performances emerge with a great deal of merit. While at West Ham, in a then struggling team, Derek was joint top scorer with David Cross, scoring 10 goals from 23 + 1 outings, highly creditable in a relegated side.

AWARDS

Just for the record if anyone needs reminding, our popular striker's best two seasons at Charlton, have both been in the Second Division: 1975-76 when in 40 appearances he found the net 28 times (an average of 0.7 per game) which he followed up in the following campaign before moving to Derby with 16 goals from the same number of games.

"As hard as one tries it is very difficult to keep up enthusiasm when you know there is little chance of getting into the first team", says Richie.

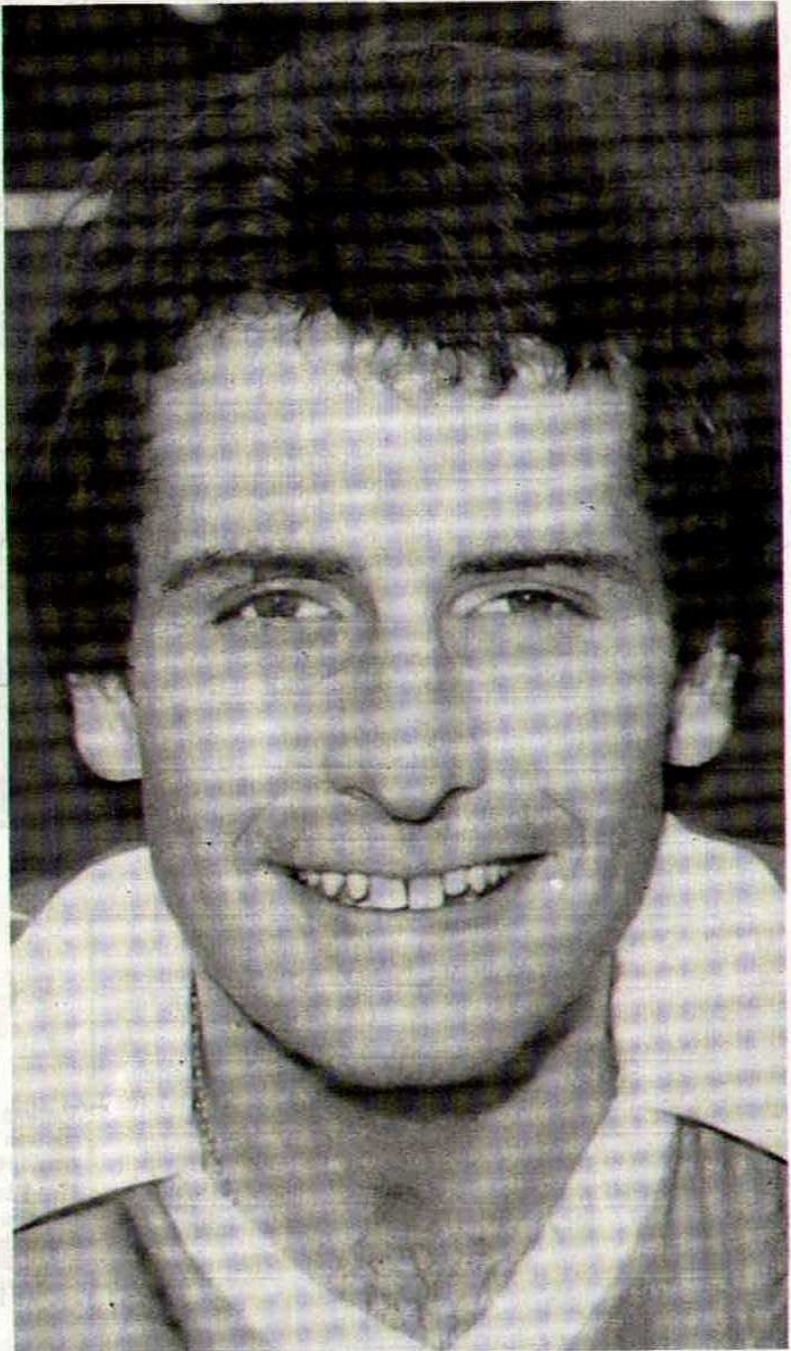
"I am obviously delighted that the club is enjoying some success at the moment but I am equally disappointed that I have not been part of it. I still feel I have something to offer".

BACK TRACK

with Colin Cameron

Over the years since we first met in 1922, we've had several vital matches against Swindon and it's certain that both clubs will regard today's meeting of extreme importance.

Many of our supporters will remember the Robins last visit to The Valley. It was in the early part of our promotion season (1974/75) and after a promising start to that campaign, we had just suffered two successive away defeats at the hands of Colchester (0-3) and Preston (0-2).

We were soon in big trouble against Swindon — **PETER EASTOE** (4 mins.), then **DAVE SYRETT** (38 mins.) giving the Wiltshire club a 2-0 interval lead.

Three minutes after the break, however, we were back in business when **COLIN POWELL** opened his account for the season. This was the morale booster we needed, evidenced in the following eight minutes with **BOB CURTIS** crashing home his fifth penalty in ten games and **POWELL** snatching the lead for us after 58 minutes.

Swindon, to their credit, were not to be denied and finally made the result 3-3, thanks to another **EASTOE** goal eight minutes from time.

It was an entertaining enough match for the small crowd (4,527) but new manager **ANDY NELSON** was far from happy with the lack of steel in the team, and said so! Andy also informed the Press that he had pencilled in the name of 18 year old **LES BERRY** to play in the above match if **EAMONN DUNPHY'S** injured ankle had not healed.

Dunphy, in the event, was declared fit but even if he hadn't

got the go ahead, Andy's emergency plans could not have been put into force because Les had been involved in a serious car accident on the eve of the match which was to delay his League debut for a whole year.

Getting back to that 1974 match, Swindon's three goals represented their biggest haul at The Valley since May 6, 1922 when they beat us 5-4 in the their first-ever trip to our headquarters. That victory, 59 years ago, still represents Swindon's one and only win at The Valley, so we're hoping to keep up our great record today when it counts for so much.

XMAS DAY MASSACRE

Charlton have scored in all 16 previous meetings against Swindon at The Valley and our biggest haul came in the 1934/35 campaign which ended with promotion to the Second Division.

Swindon visited us on Christmas Day of that season with the knowledge that we had already accounted for Newport (6-0 at home), Gillingham (6-3 away) and Reading (3-1 at home) in our previous three matches.

Our chief marksman during that great run was **RALPH ALLEN** with six goals, which included four at Gillingham. Ralph, of course, was the brother of Newcastle's **JACK ALLEN** who scored the famous disputed goal which won the Cup for the Magpies against Arsenal at Wembley in 1932.

Following his transfer from Brentford, Ralph was building a big reputation for prolific scoring and had already hit 13 goals in only 10 outings when he faced Swindon in that Valley

match, over 46 years ago.

Despite their dominance, it took Charlton 30 minutes to open the scoring and it was goal-scoring machine Allen who finally netted; quickly following up with another.

HAROLD HOBBS added a third and after the break our superiority was emphasised with further goals from **HOBBS** and **ALLEN** (completing his "hat-trick") and another from **FRANK HARRIS** to give us a valuable 6-0 victory.

Although it was a different story when we visited Swindon the following day, we nevertheless salvaged a point in a thrilling 2-2 encounter and again it was that man **ALLEN** who was our saviour with two fine goals — **T. ARMSTRONG** and **FISHER** netting for the Robins.

Three days later Allen was producing the goods again, scoring twice in our 3-1 home win over Cardiff which brought his tally to seven goals in five days of real destruction.

Ralph went on to net 32 goals in 28 matches and to this day this represents the record League haul for a Charlton player in a season.

APOLOGIES: — In the Barnsley match magazine, I stated that **BILLY KIERNAN** netted our goal at Barnsley in our 7-1 beating in 1958. The goal in fact belonged to **EDDIE WERGE** and I have to thank Billy himself for pointing my error to Charlton follower **LEN ROBINSON**.

EVERGREEN HATTON

Anyone connected with our Club who has carefully studied the career of Sheffield United's **BOB HATTON** will know what a scourge he has been to Charlton defences. United were also the sixth club, out of a total of eight he has represented, for whom he has scored against us.

His goal at Sheffield last Saturday was the 190th League goal of his fine career and the eleventh he has netted against Charlton.

Paul Walsh, another scorer in the Bramall Lane mudbath, was only 4 years old when Bob played his first match against Charlton at The Valley on Feb. 11, 1967.

His club, Wolves, were promoted to the First Division that season and it was Bob's goal that day which cancelled out an early **MATT TEES** goal and set the Midland Club up for a valuable 3-1 victory.

Two other players who participated in that match are still playing League football, i.e. **BILLY BONDS**, our former full back, who played so magnificently for West Ham against Liverpool at Wembley last Saturday and **ALAN CAMPBELL** who is now assisting Carlisle.

Another former Charlton player who will certainly remember that important match is **MIKE BAILEY** who wore the No. 4 shirt in the powerful Wolves line-up that day.
