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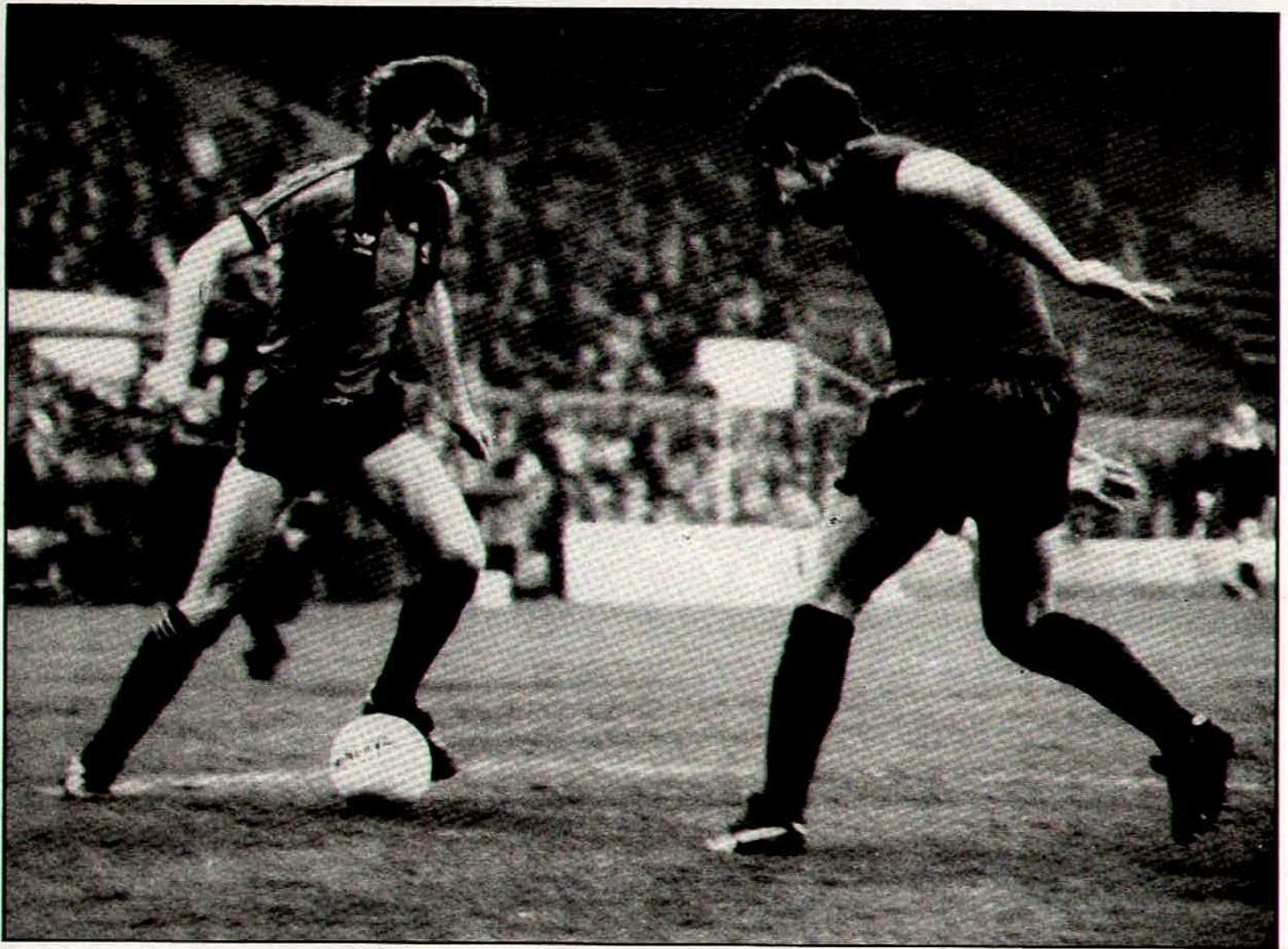

ROUND-UP

NEWS & VIEWS FROM AROUND THE LEAGUES

It may be of interest to our readers to learn of the birth of many clubs, famous and not so famous, both at home and abroad.

The Tigers history goes back to 1904 when the football club played friendly matches on the Hull Rugby Club's ground, later occupying Anlaby Road.

Reformed in 1946 the club moved its headquarters to Boothferry Park the present home.

The 'Trotters' of Bolton commenced as Christ Church FC all the players being pupils of Christ Church school.

Another Lancashire club Manchester United owes its being to the workers of the Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway Company when, as Newton Heath, they banded together to enjoy winter sports. That was in 1902.

The 'Sky Blues' of Coventry originally named Singers FC commenced operations in 1883 again due to the Cycle Company's workers taking up football.

West Bromwich Albion too owes its heritage to the workers at George Salters who clubbed together to purchase a football.

Up in the North East a group of teachers got together, in 1879, to play the game from which beginnings Sunderland FC came about.

Even stranger was the events leading up to Middlesbrough FC's creation in 1876.

A tripe supper held in the Town's Coronation Hall was the seed from which the club blossomed.

The mighty Glasgow Rangers owes its existence to the families Vallance, McNeill and Campbell of Gareloch, whilst the Droop Street boys formed Queen of the South.

Even foreign teams can thankfully look back in their history to their involvement being down to British origin.

Uruguayan club Penarol came about due to the efforts of four railwaymen working in the country, Roland Moor, Arthur Davenport, Frank Henderson and Frank Hudson.

Similarly Englishman Clement Cannock was the father figure

whose early efforts brought about the birth of Moscow Dynamo.

Having taken a set of shirts over to Russia, Mr Cannock was unable to purchase any football boots locally but got over the difficulty by having studs fixed to the player's ordinary shoes—strange but effective.

Brazilian team Santos was formed by a squad of British soldiers stationed in the country and the River Plate club came about through the efforts of a small colony of English residents out there in South America.

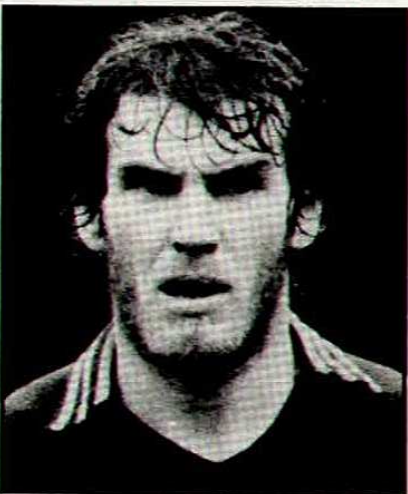
Names too have changed over the years. Oldham Athletic were once Pine Villa, Manchester United was Newton Heath and Motherwell started out as Wee Alpha.

Meanwhile looking around the home front the title races are still hotting up particularly following the mid-week games with Barnsley and Huddersfield storming ahead, winning handsomely

It is beginning to look like a four team race for the three promotion spots with the two aforementioned teams battling it out for the one place, accepting that Rotherham and Charlton do nothing to damage their lead at the top.

Chesterfield could only manage a home draw with lowly Swindon and like 'Pompey' seem destined to spend next season in Division Three.

Aston villa did their championship hopes a power of good with them defeating third placed Albion 1-0.



The solitary goal scored by Peter Withe came two minutes from the end and was the result of a slipshod back pass to goalkeeper Tony Godden by Brendon Batson.

For most of the match Albion held the upper hand with big 'Smokin Joe' Cyrille Regis missing chances to put them ahead.

That win by Villa took them three points clear at the top. Consequently the meeting of them and Ipswich scheduled for this evening at Villa Park, subject to FA Cup results, could decide the championship.

Whilst Villa were gaining their League win Ipswich were facing Cologne in the UEFA Cup and a goal by Wark gives them an advantage for the return leg in two week's time.

Liverpool meanwhile struggled to stamp their superiority on the game against Bayern Munich in the European Cup.

A gate of 44,000 watched the match and it remains to be seen if the 'Reds' can achieve the impossible by winning the second leg in Munich a feat not yet performed by any team this season, in any competition. Bayern Munich have an impressive record of having been defeated only twice in a 47 match span on their home ground stretching back 19 years.

Leeds Manager Allan Clarke has been quoted as saying that if the gates—for the remaining First Division games played at Elland Road this season—don't show a marked improvement then he will consider resigning.

His belief is that with the club having progressed up the League to a respectable mid-table position the fans should accept that the club needs their response, otherwise team strengthening with the acquisition of new players will not be possible, due to lack of funds.

Strong words and strong words too from the Scottish Division of the National Federation of Football Supporters Clubs who are challenging the FA's right to prohibit England v Scotland match tickets from being sold in Scotland. The court case is due to be heard this week.

MAJOR MAN IN TIGERLAND

One person at tonight's match who hopes the evening will be a success, will be ex-Tiger Arthur Perry.

Apart from the match being sponsored by his present employers, Arthur still enjoys being involved with the club in a part-time capacity.

Born in the mining village of Rossington in South Yorkshire, Arthur first joined the Tigers as a Buckley Junior in the 1946-47 season, having played for Maltby Grammar School and Rother Valley Boys. The club put him into digs and to a trade (Engineering) and he then proceeded to play in the local League and Yorkshire League.

Over a three year period he played in every position and represented the ERCFA as a wing half, full back and goalkeeper. Whoever said that 'Variety is the spice of life' will get Arthur's endorsement. However, he feels that his experience in the various position he played in, has helped him to understand team mates points of view during after-match discussions.

He signed part-time professional on his 18th birthday, and had a short spell full time after army service, before joining Bradford PA at the end of season 1955-56 along with Charlie Atkinson. Two seasons later he joined Rotherham United and then moved to Scarborough.

Having married a Hull girl in 1953, it was no surprise for them to finally settle down in Hull in 1960, and since then he has been involved in the local football scene in various capacities.

After finishing playing, Arthur participated in local coaching schemes, and after a successful season with Kingburn Athletic, was invited to join the Tigers backroom staff by City's new Manager Terry Neill at the start of season 1970-71, in charge of evening training and the Junior XI.

Although still involved with the evening training, Saturdays are spent travelling for the club scouting, and over the past few years leisure time has been somewhat of a luxury, much to the surprise of his wife who thought she would see more of him once his playing days were over.

During the week, Arthur carries out his duties at *Major and Company* where he has been employed on the Operations and Maintenance Staff since 1974, after serving the Company for five years on the distribution side as a tanker driver.

He takes an active interest in the Sports and Social Club, helping to organise various outings and functions for employees in the area, and has assisted in getting the Company's five-a-side team into the YPI indoor league during the summer. His reward is seeing people enjoying themselves,

and in this direction wholehearted support has come from Mr Bob Craven-Jones, the Managing Director of the Company, also a sports-minded person who favours the social occasions that go to help make *Major and Company* such a friendly company, with excellent manager-worker relations.

During the summer Arthur likes the occasional game of cricket and golf, but spends most of his time relaxing with his wife Kathleen and daughter Arleen, without whose support he couldn't enjoy such a hectic soccer season.

His taste in music is varied, but favours solo singers Bobby Darin and Barbra Streisand, who he would like to meet some day, and groups like the Rolling Stones and Dr. Hook.

His favourite other team is Spurs and favourite other player is Glenn Hoddle. He likes good food and entertainment, but dislikes players on the football field who cheat by feigning injury or not giving their best.

Favourite TV programmes are sport and *The Two Ronnies*, and his ambitions for the future are to enjoy life and see City do well again.

Supporters—or rather lack of—is a topic much talked about these days; however for table-topping Aston Villa the visit of Liverpool produced their best gate for five years. A massive 48,000 fans crammed into Villa Park and were rewarded with a Saturday spectacular where 'Scousers' won the day.

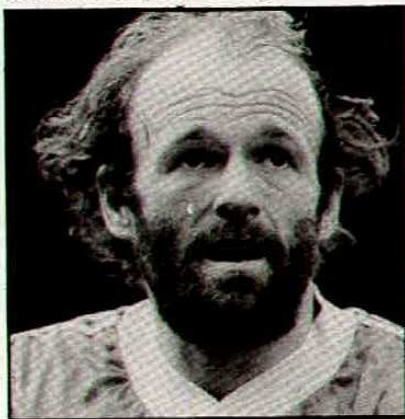
True Villa emerged triumphant but with goalscorers Peter Withe and Dennis Mortimer originating from Merseyside it could be said to be Liverpoolians day.

For all Peter Taylor's enthusiastic words Nottingham Forest couldn't do the talking on the Portman Road pitch going down 2-0 to a rampant Ipswich side, whilst in a game dominated by home side Everton, visitors Arsenal stole the points with two late goals.

West Bromwich Albion continue to chase the First Division leaders and sank lowly Leicester with goals by Martyn Bennett and John Deehan.

In the case of youngster Bennett it was his first goal for the Club and for 'Dixie' Deehan his first of the season for Albion's senior side.

Bennett is currently keeping the seasoned Alistair Robertson on the sidelines whilst Deehan came in for tonsillitis victim Cyrille Regis.



ARCHIE GEMMILL

Birmingham City's side to face Spurs at White Hart Lane looked a little strange with midfield maestro Archie Gemmill turning out in the back four and doing a splendid job alongside Colin Todd.

Spurs were on top for long spells and it looked for a long time as if City would steal a point, but Garth Crooks obviously thought differently and his 15th goal of the season brought victory to the Spurs.

The Second Division's top battle went on at Swansea's Vetch Field where the home side were looking to shake off the aftermath of that crushing 5-0 Cup defeat the week earlier.

It was not to be, the 'Swans' going

down 3-1 leaving them still in second place in the table but trailing the 'Hammers' by six points.

Other promotion hopefuls had mixed fortunes. Over 25,000 saw Sheffield Wednesday and Chelsea fight a dour battle with neither side able to find the net, however Derby County did themselves some good defeating bottom team Bristol Rovers by the odd goal in three.

That match and the one at Blundell Park produced Division Two's only home wins. Grimsby's 'Mariners' are making quite a run up the table and were the day's joint-highest scorers in defeating Bolton 4-0.

In Division Three despite a fight back by the Tigers, Charlton maintained winning ways and continue to head the table from Yorkshire teams Barnsley and Rotherham.

Barnsley beat Plymouth whilst Rotherham could only draw at home to lowly Oxford.

Huddersfield knocked in four against Newport to maintain their challenge.

At the other end of the table another Club has dropped into the relegation bracket.

Alan Ball's Blackpool side is not having matters their way at all and defeat at Colchester pushed them down into the bottom four.

The Fourth Division's leaders Southend were able to sit back and watch the chasing pack, having defeated Darlington on a Friday evening fixture.

Lincoln City had the opportunity to close the gaps at the top but had to settle for a draw with Bradford City.

Mansfield, Hartlepool and Doncaster all won which means little change at the top.

Hereford United continue to make news, the wrong kind that is, and despite having dipped into the transfer market for Laidlaw Showers and Musial have dropped a little further at the foot of the table; losing at home to fellow strugglers Bury.

Near neighbours Scunthorpe shared the points in a one all draw with the 'Posh' at the Old Showground.

Malcolm Allison is reported as being keenly interested in signing Peter borough's successful striker Robbie Cooke. Cooke a £12,000 purchase from non-Leaguers Grantham has scored 20 goals in this his first season in League soccer.

Another striker to make the news is one-time Spurs and England favourite Martin Chivers. 'Chiv' only recently gave up managing Dorchester and has accepted a two-year contract with Vard of Norway.

Two 35-year olds also make news with, on the one hand Sunderland's Bryan Robson looking for another Club, and on the other Franz Beckenbauer making a welcome return to Germany's National side to play Albania in a World Cup qualifying tie. Beckenbauer last played International soccer three years ago.

For many of the better non-League Clubs it was back to Cup action again with the F.A. Trophy first round matches being played.

Enfield, recent F.A. Cup conquerors of Fourth Division Port Vale could do no better than draw 2-2 at Aylesbury whilst the Spartans of Blyth who fought for so long against the Tigers in our epic Cup tie defeated Burton Albion 2-0 to make further progress.

Scarborough lived to fight again drawing 2-2 away at Mossley, with the replay taking place after these notes were penned, and Goole successfully overcame Morecambe's challenge.

One statistic to emerge from the League programme—the last time that the Cards system was used by Referees—is that only one player received marching orders.

Stoke City lost Paul Richardson in the 44th minute when they trailed Crystal Palace by a solitary goal, however they overcame the handicap of only having 10 men to score an equaliser and share the points.

Finally one hears of crowds and disturbances at football matches and in many cases pointing fingers at Clubs and soccer as being the cause.

Not a football was in sight as Harrods London store opened its doors to customers attending the New Year sale, yet a mini-riot took place with thousands of pounds worth of damage being done as customers wrestled for bargains. Injuries occurred but what a 'gate'—an estimated 300,000.

Steve Abley, Bryan Hamilton (now Manager of Tranmere Rovers), Ian Miller, Brian Williams, Andy Rowland, Alan Mayes, Glenn Cockerill.

The visit of the Swindon 'Robins' today brings us into conflict with fellow strugglers in the battle against relegation. Celebrating their Centenary, the 'Robins' can look back on a career which commenced League-wise with their election as an original member of the Third Division in 1920.

The intervening years have seen their fortunes fluctuate between Division Two and Three with the highest placing attained being Third Division Runners-up in Seasons 1962-63 and 1968-69. Also in 1969 Swindon really came to greater prominence when they defeated the mighty Arsenal in a stirring League Cup Final at Wembley by 3 goals to 1.

John Trollope currently manager of the Club turned out in that match and only recently did he convert to the Managerial Chair, having in the meantime bettered Jimmy Dickinson's record (for Portsmouth) of 764 League appearances for one Club. The General Manager is Danny Williams who served the Club as Team Manager on two previous occasions.

Prior to attaining League status the 'Robins' achieved fame with their player Harold Fleming, being capped nine times for England and also for them reaching the F.A. Cup Semi-Finals in 1910 and 1912.

Apart from Fleming there have been other players to catch the limelight, notably amongst them being Harry Morris, who still holds the Club record for highest total of goals scored in a season, 47 in 1926-27 and also the most League goals in aggregate, 216 in eight seasons.

Internationals who have turned out for Swindon include Norman Uprichard (Ireland), Mike Summerbee (England) and at Under-23 level Ernie Hunt and Don Rogers.

One-time Spurs hero Dave Mackay had a spell first as Player/Manager then as Manager, with the Town.

Currently in the 'Robins' squad is David Peach the Club's costliest signing, £150,000 being paid to Southampton for his services almost a year ago. One player familiar to home supporters will be Roy Greenwood who commenced his career with the Tigers. The pen pictures of the squad are as follows:—

STEVE ABBLEY—Forward. A young winger signed from local football, he made his debut in the First Team at Exeter City on Easter Saturday 1980, and subsequently made a further two League appearances last season.

JIMMY ALLAN—Goalkeeper. Born in Inverness, Jimmy will have been at Swindon for ten years this season, having been signed from Scottish non-League football. He made his debut against Queens Park Rangers in September 1971, and has been first choice 'keeper for most of the last four seasons.

COLIN BARRETT—Defender. From Stockport, Colin played a number of seasons at Manchester City making 50 League appearances and signing for Nottingham Forest in March 1976. The following season he appeared in Forest's League Championship side and won a League Cup Winners' Medal in 1979, but later his career was affected by injury.

ROY CARTER—Midfield. Roy comes from Torpoint, Cornwall, and played part-time Western League football for Falmouth before joining Hereford in the summer of 1975. He played in the side which won the Third Division Championship in 1976. He signed for Swindon in December 1977, making his debut against Carlisle that month.

GLENN COCKERILL—Midfield. Glenn is from Grimsby and made his debut with Lincoln City in season 1976-77. Swindon began watching him in March 1979 and he eventually signed for a then Club record of £110,000 in December 1979, but injury and other factors prevented his League debut until March 1980. He is a hard working and determined midfielder.

ROY GREENWOOD—Forward. A native of Leeds, he served his apprenticeship with Hull City making his League debut in season 1971-72. He moved to Sunderland in January 1976 in time to help that Club win the Second Division. Signed for Derby County in February 1979. A further move came just over one year later to Swindon for whom he made his debut against Carlisle in April 1980.

CHRIS KAMARA—Midfield. Chris is from Middlesbrough but served his apprenticeship at Portsmouth where he was one of a number of teenagers given League debuts in season 1975-76. He signed for Swindon just before the start of the 1977-78 season.

RUSSELL LEWIS—Defender. Born in Blaengwynfi, he joined Swindon from Welsh League football in 1976 and made his debut at York City in April 1977. His First Team chances were limited until last season when he broke through to the First Team playing mostly at full-back, although until then he had normally been a central defender.

TOM McALISTER—Goalkeeper. From Clydebank, his first League Club was Sheffield United for whom he made his League debut in season 1971-72. He moved to Rotherham in 1975 after a period there on loan. In over three seasons he did not miss a First Team game, but the 1979 close season saw him move to Blackpool. He moved to Swindon during 1980.

ALAN MAYES—Forward. A Londoner whose first Club was Queens Park Rangers, Alan's League career began in November 1974 following a transfer to Watford. In 1976 he was on loan to Northampton but then returned to Watford. He signed for Swindon in February 1979. He scored a hat-trick on his debut at Rotherham.

IAN MILLER—Forward. Ian is from Perth and made his League debut with Bury for whom he made nine League appearances before moving to Nottingham Forest. He did not make the First Team there, but a move to Doncaster Rovers in August 1975 gave him regular First Team football. Signed for Swindon during the 1978 close season. He made his debut against Bury in August 1978. An orthodox winger.

DAVID PEACH—Defender. David comes from Bedford and started his career with Gillingham. He moved to Southampton during the 1973-74 season and stayed there until March 1980 when he signed for Swindon. During his time with the 'Saints,' he appeared in two Cup Finals (winning an F.A. Cup Winners' Medal in 1976) and captained the side. His debut for Swindon was at Millwall in March 1980. A naturally left-sided player who can play at full-back or in midfield.

ANDY ROLLINGS—Defender. Andy comes from North Weston and started his career with Norwich City. A move to Brighton in 1974 gave him First Team football regularly, and he played in the sides that won promotion from both the Third and Second Divisions. Signed for Swindon in May 1980. An experienced and dependable centre-half.

ANDY ROWLAND—Forward. Born in Derby he was apprenticed with his home town team but did not play League football until a transfer took him to Bury before the start of the 1974-75 season. He was three times leading scorer before his move to Swindon in September 1978. His debut came that month against Blackpool. Although he plays as the target man, he also scored 28 goals in all competitions last season.

KEN STROUD—Defender. Although a Londoner, Ken grew up in Swindon and joined the Club from school, signing professional forms in 1970 and making his League debut the following year against Queens Park Rangers. He is the longest serving player at the Club. Although much of his career has been spent as a ball winning midfielder, he prefers to play as a central defender.

BILLY TUCKER—Defender. From Kidderminster he played part-time Southern League football for Hereford United but turned full-time when that Club was elected to the League in 1972. He played in the sides that won promotion from the Fourth Division and the Third Division Championship. In December 1976 he moved to Bury and moved to Swindon during the summer of 1979 making his debut against Sheffield United in August 1979.

ROY WALSH—Midfield. Born in Belfast, Roy played for Glentoran Football Club on a part-time basis since 1972, where he captained the team. He also played 12 times in European games, including against Juventus. In the summer of the 1979-80 season, Roy played for the New Jersey Americans in the USA, and was also in the side that beat New Zealand in the Irish League International 'B' Team. Roy signed for Swindon Town in March 1980.

BRIAN WILLIAMS—Midfield. A Mancunian, Brian is another player who was formerly with Bury. He made his League debut during season 1971-72. Transferred to Queens Park Rangers in July 1977. He spent one season in London and signed for Swindon in June 1978. A left-sided midfield player he can also play on the left-wing or as a central forward.



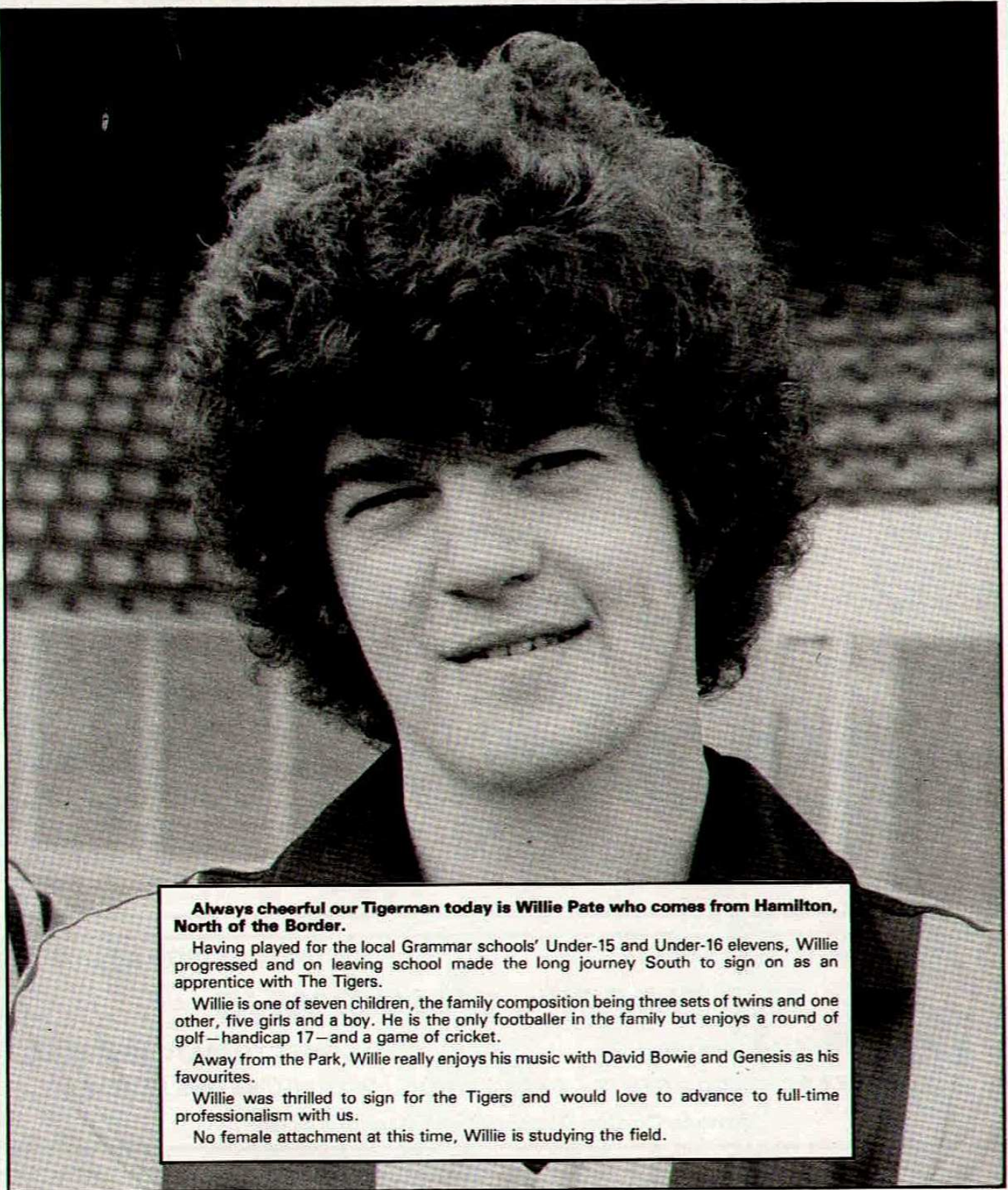

AA Winter Motoring Hints

Foggy Nightmare—

Noises seem muffled. You lose an accurate sense of speed and a feeling of total disorientation creeps in.

No, it's not a nightmare, but the probable effects on a motorist attempting to cope with the relatively common phenomenon of driving in the fog.

To alleviate these effects keep to main roads as much as possible and try to travel a route you know well with familiar landmarks. Take the nearside kerb or hedge as a guide—NOT the centre-lines—but be on the watch for parked vehicles.

Drive only at a speed which enables you to stop within the distance of your vision and to aid the latter, use washers and wipers frequently. Drive on headlights, not just for you to see better but for others, particularly pedestrians, to see you.

At night it is more effective to use dipped headlights rather than full-beam to avoid dazzling oncoming traffic and possibly yourself.

Don't drive on sidelights alone, they simply aren't good enough and it's also illegal. These pinpoints of light barely penetrate the gloom and are seldom visible any sooner than the outline of the vehicle itself.

On motorways, fog causes particular problems because of the higher speeds at which people travel. ALWAYS conform to speed restrictions which are imposed in foggy conditions and avoid driving within sight of the tail-lights of the vehicle in front. This can result in vehicles being too close together and the drivers at the back of the queue may not be able to react quickly enough to avoid the vehicle in front.

Remember that it is always more fatiguing to drive in fog because of the extra concentration required, so pull off the road and stop if you begin to feel tired. Overtiredness leads to accidents.
