

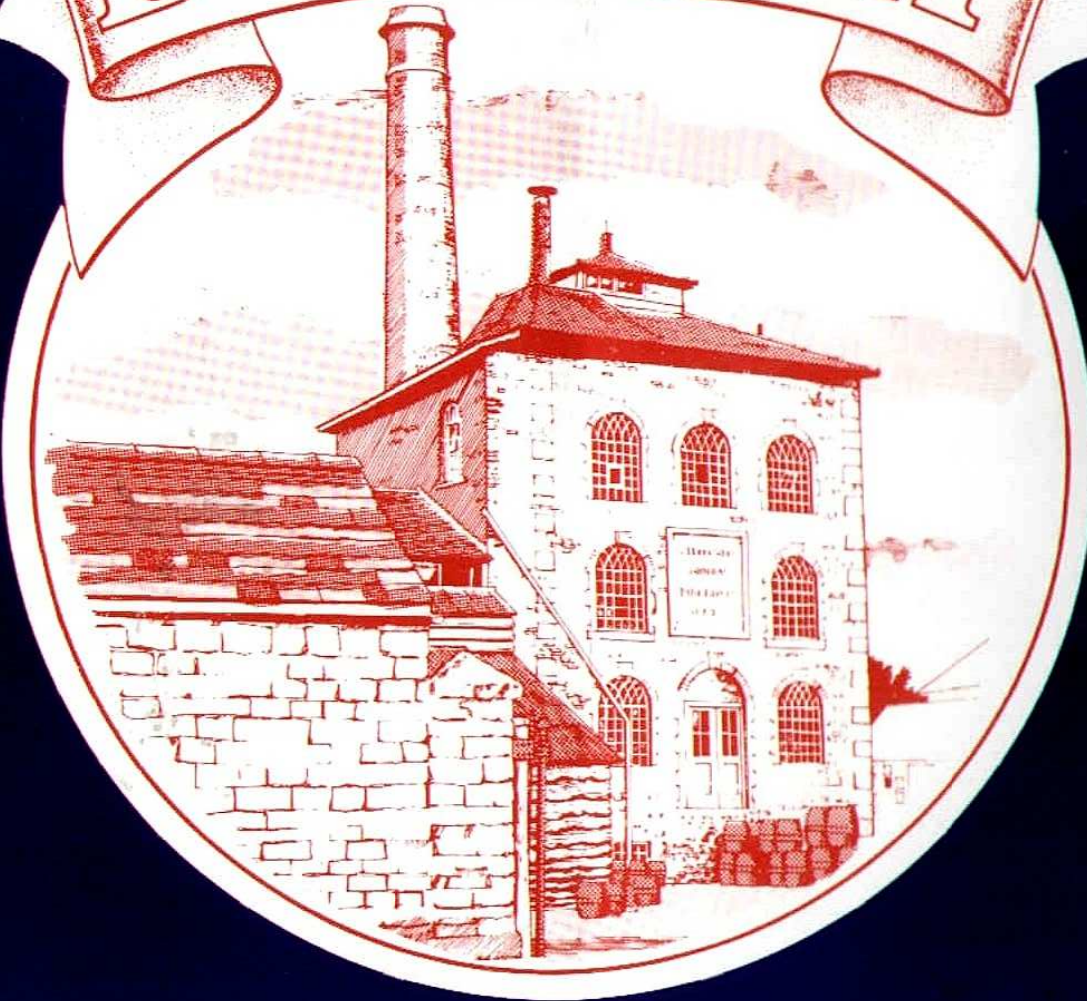

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# Talk of the Town by the Chairman

We are pleased to be able to welcome the Players and Officials of Chesterfield to our County Ground this evening. Chesterfield, like ourselves, have made a good start to this season and tonight's game should be very interesting.

Once again these notes have been written before the result of our local derby with Reading is known, and at the time of writing Reading are on top of the league with one more point than ourselves, and, of course, last Saturday's result will be very interesting to us all.

We were disappointed to lose by the one goal to AFC Bournemouth in the Football Association Youth Cup Competition played in Bournemouth. Our lads were unfortunate to lose this game because they scored what they thought was a good goal, headed in by Paul Rideout, but a Bournemouth player punched the ball back into play and we failed to score from the resultant penalty kick and finally went out of the competition when they scored from a rebound from one of our own players. This kind of incident is all part of our game, but I feel that when a ball is handled deliberately to prevent it entering the net, the rule should allow the referee to award a goal and not give the offender the chance to retrieve the position.

On Wednesday evening, 14 October, we are presenting, on the County Ground, a representative match between a Football Association Eleven and a South West Counties Eleven, kick off 7.30 p.m. Devizes Town have two representatives in the squad and the remaining players in the South Western Counties Eleven are drawn from teams of Gloucester, Cornwall, Sussex, Somerset, Hants and Dorset and the Army and Navy.

I am frequently being asked for details of matches to be played on our Shrivenham Road Ground in the South East Counties League and the Midland Youth League under the jurisdiction of Don Rogers.

The South East Counties League is for the lads under seventeen years of age at the beginning of the season and the matches are played on a Saturday morning usually commencing at 11.00 a.m.

The Midland Youth League matches are played mid-week, usually kicking off at 2.00 p.m. but these fixtures are often changed with the agreement of both clubs when senior events clash.

Our home fixtures for the South East Counties league are as follows: 3 October Reading, 10 October Southend, 24 October Tottenham, 7 November Wimbledon, 28 November Brighton, 12 December Cambridge (12.30 pm kick off), 23 January Oxford, 27 February West Ham, 13 March Brentford, 27 March Bristol Rovers, 17 April Charlton.

Our home fixtures for the Midland Youth games are as follows: 22 October Northampton, 29 October Coventry, 4 November Birmingham City, 12 November Leicester City, 26 November Northampton, 14 January West Bromwich Albion, 28 January Bristol City, 11 February Coventry, 25 February Luton Town, 11 March Peterborough, 18 March Wolves, and 1 April Birmingham City. Some of the fixtures occur twice, but this is due to cup rounds in the Midland Youth League where a small league is run on a cup tie basis. I would point out, however, that these fixtures are subject to change.

Hoping that you enjoy tonight's game and thank you for your support.

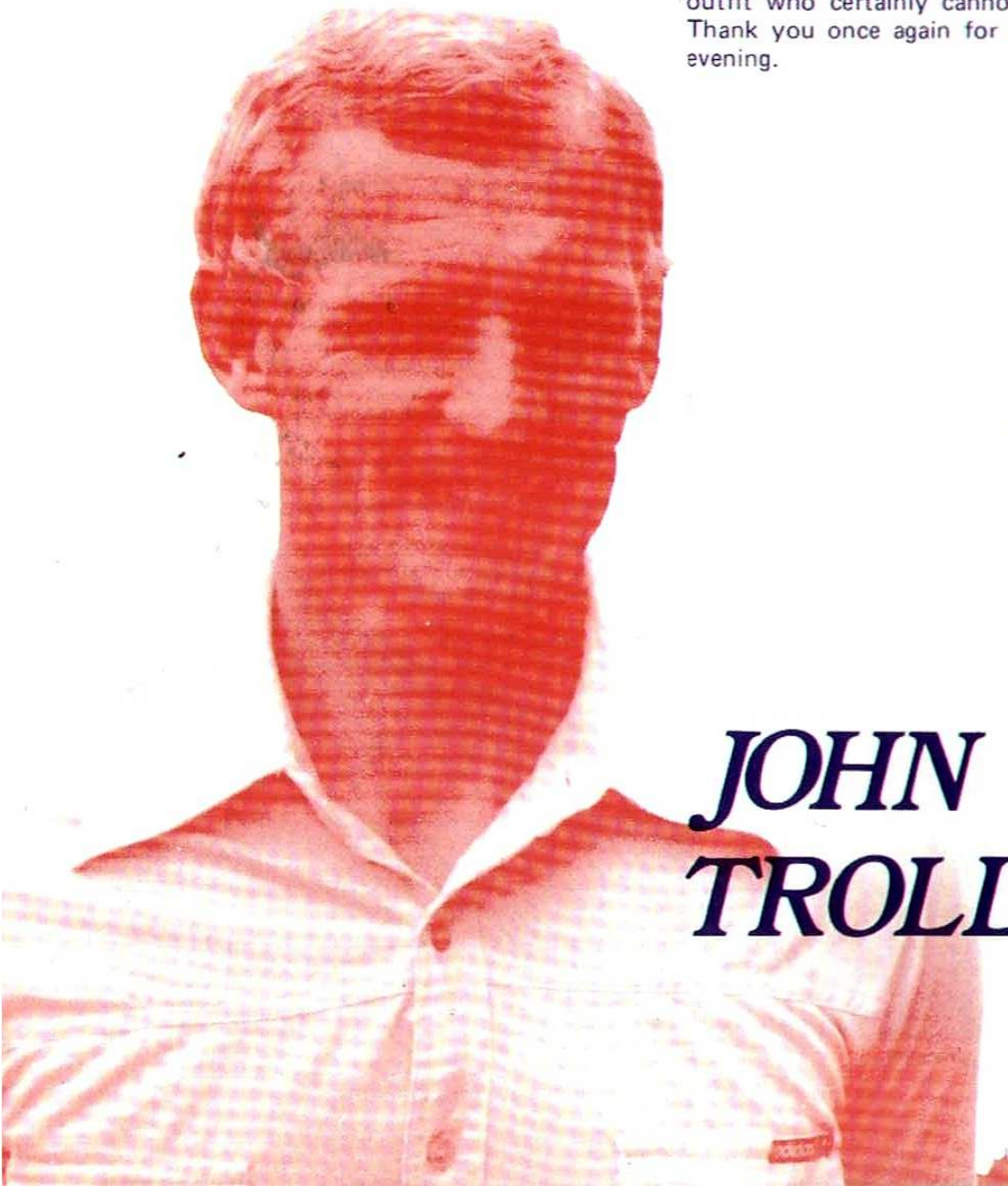
Firstly I must express the disappointment of us all in that we did not achieve a win on Saturday against Reading to take us to the top of the league. My biggest disappointment was not that we lost but the manner in which we were defeated. Reading came here as league leaders with a different defensive system from anything we have met so far and we just didn't have the necessary ideas to break this system down. This resulted in our lads knocking high balls into the centre which, of course, played into their hands having three big central defenders.

In this respect I would like to say a few words which may sound somewhat of a criticism of some of our supporters. When a side comes to the County Ground with a defensive formation, more especially with tall lads at the back, the only way to overcome their style of play is to keep the ball on the floor and this must commence from the goalkeeper, by Jimmy Allan throwing the ball to a colleague rather than kicking a high ball up into the middle. However,

I noticed that if this is done some supporters howl their disapproval resulting in the young players in the team hitting high hopeful balls into the opponents' defence. I would like you to be patient when this happens or indeed when a defender passes back to the keeper as this is only done when the opponents shut us down quickly. We have no real big men in the team and sometimes this style of play is necessary.

Notwithstanding this, it was gratifying to see the tremendous crowd that turned up for the game and, of course, we let them down, some players not having the correct attitude in the second half. I can understand that you become tense in the hope that success will come here to the County Ground, but it is important that you back and encourage the players however the game is going if this success is to be achieved.

Tonight we welcome the players, officials and supporters of Chesterfield for what I know is going to be another very tough match. I saw this team play last week and they are an impressive outfit who certainly cannot be over estimated. Thank you once again for your attendance this evening.

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# CHESTERFIELD

**FRANK BARLOW (Manager)** Born Sheffield. Captained England Schoolboys in 1962. Joined Sheffield United from School, spending 8 years there and making 116 appearances in Divisions 1 and 2. A then Club record fee brought Frank to Saltergate in July 1972 and up to an injury-enforced retirement in season 1975/76 had made 140 appearances for Chesterfield. Appointed first-team coach in July 1976 and manager in succession to Arthur Cox in September 1980.

**BILL DEARDEN (Coach)** Born Oldham. A vastly experienced player who began his career with Oldham Athletic. Moved to Crewe Alexandra and then on to Chester. Joined Sheffield United in 1970 for a bargain £10,000, scoring 61 goals in 170 League appearances in the top flight. Returned to Chester in July 1976, finally arriving at Saltergate in July 1977. Scorer of over 100 League goals. Appointed reserve and youth coach in July 1979.

**GARY BELLAMY** Born Worksop. Former Worksop Boys Captain who joined Chesterfield from school. Signed full-time in July 1980, making his debut at the end of last season.

**ALAN BIRCH** Born West Bromwich. A former England Youth international, Alan joined Walsall from school, making nearly 200 appearances for the Saddlers for whom he was "Player of the year 78/79". Moved to Chesterfield in July 1979 for a then Club record fee, becoming "Player of the year 1979/80". Top scorer last season with 23 goals when he was also a P.F.A. award winner.

**PHIL BONNYMAN** Born Glasgow. Joined Rangers from school but gained first-team experience only after moving to Hamilton Academicals. In March 1976 he signed for Carlisle United where he developed from a back-four player into a highly skilful midfielder. Became Chesterfield's first six-figure signing on transfer deadline day in March 1980.

**ALAN CRAWFORD** Born Rotherham. Joined Rotherham United from school, making his debut in 1973 after a short loan spell with Mansfield Town. A natural and tricky winger, he has a flair for finding the net, having scored 31 goals in season 1976/77 alone. Signed from the Millers in July 1979.

**BILL GREEN** Born Newcastle. Joined Hartlepool United from School, staying there four seasons before moving into the 1st Division with Carlisle United for a bargain £16,500. In June 1976 moved to West Ham for £90,000 but at the start of the 1978/79 season joined Peterborough United for £60,000. Signed for Chesterfield in June 1979 for a then Club record fee. A P.F.A. award winner in 1979/80. Team captain and player/coach.

**LES HUNTER** Born Middlesbrough. Discovered playing local league soccer in the North-East. Signed as an apprentice in 1974, making his debut that same season. Became a full-time pro in July 1975 and his outstanding performances won him an England Youth trial. "Player of the Year 78/79".

**ANDY KOWALSKI** Born Mansfield. A former England Boys Club international, Andy joined Chesterfield as an amateur in December 1971, signing full-time in December 1972. Made his debut in March 1973 and has held a regular first-team place ever since. Is the Club's current longest serving player.

**SHAUN O'NEILL** Born Belfast. A former Irish Schoolboy international, Shaun's first League Club was Leeds United. Only 3 games were played for the Elland Road Club, 2 of those being in the UEFA Cup. Joined Chesterfield in July 1974 and has since become one of the most reliable defenders in the Division.

# CHESTERFIELD

**PAUL GREGORY** Born Sheffield. A promising young goalkeeper who has come up through the Club's ranks. Made an impressive debut in the Anglo/Scottish Cup Final last season.

**GARY POLLARD** Born Staveley. A produce of the Club's youth policy, now in his fifth year as a professional. A former England Youth trialist and a promising central defender.

**JOHN RIDLEY** Born Consett. Began his career with Port Vale for whom he played either in midfield and defence. Leicester City signed him for £55,000 in October 1978 and, after a season in Division 2 and a summer in the U.S.A. with Fort Lauderdale Strikers, he joined Chesterfield in August 1979. Club Captain, he has a B.Sc. honours degree in maths.

**PHIL WALKER** Born Kirkby-in-Ashfield. Joined Chesterfield as an amateur in August 1976 and made such outstanding progress that he was signed full-time in December 1977. Made his debut in March 1978 and has shown immense potential ever since. Was the attraction of many top clubs last season.

**GEOFF SALMONS** Born Mexborough. Joined Sheffield United from school, and in July 1974 became the most expensive player to leave Bramall Lane when he signed for Stoke City for £165,000. A short loan spell with the Blades at the start of the 1977/78 season was followed by a permanent move to Leicester City in a £60,000 transfer deal. Signed Chesterfield in August 1978. Last season topped 400 League appearances.

**JOHN STIRK** Born Consett. Joined Ipswich Town with whom he made only 6 first-team appearances before signing for Watford for £30,000 in July 1978. Was an ever-present member of their 1978/79 promotion winning side and was also a PFA award winner that same season. Signed for Chesterfield in March 1980.

**COLIN TARTT** Born Liverpool. Began his career with Port Vale whom he joined from college. Spent five years at Vale Park before coming to Saltergate in March 1977. Is a fully qualified school teacher. "Player of the Year 76/77".

**JOHN TURNER** Born Gateshead. Began his career with Derby County but had to seek loan spells at Doncaster, Peterborough and Huddersfield to gain first-team experience. Moved to Reading in May 1975 and was a member of their 1975/76 promotion squad. Signed for Torquay in August 1978 and his outstanding form there prompted Chesterfield to pay a then Club record fee for his services in February 1980. Was a P.F.A. award winner 1979/80 season.

**DANNY WILSON** Born Wigan. Was originally on schoolboy forms at Sunderland but came to prominence after moving to the then non-league Wigan Athletic with whom he won a Northern Premier League championship medal. Bury snapped him up for a bargain fee in the summer of 1977 and since then has developed into one of the most hard working midfielders in the Division. Signed for Chesterfield for a Club record six-figure fee in July 1980. A PFA award winner and "Player of the Year" last season.

**DAVID WINDRIDGE** Born Atherstone. Signed from Sheffield United on transfer deadline day in March 1980. An aggressive attacking player, he made his League debut at the end of last season.

**RUSSELL ATHERSYCH** Born Sheffield. Former Sheffield Boys and South Yorkshire Boys player who signed apprentice forms in May 1979. An England Youth trialist, he signed junior professional forms in July 1980.

**JOHN PARTRIDGE** Born Chesterfield. Former Chesterfield Boys and Derbyshire Boys player who signed apprentice forms in May 1979. Signed junior professional forms in July 1980.

# Colin Benson spotlights

## DANNY WILSON

Chesterfield fans simply showered Danny Wilson with accolades last season, voting him top man in the 'Player of the Year' awards and the number one choice for the fans 'Man of the Season' competition.

"It is certainly some reputation to live up to this season," comments the stylish midfielder who joined the club in 1980 hoping that he would be able to make a useful contribution to a very successful team.

Well he did more than that and although young Danny is still only 21 years old, his story could be a lesson to many aspiring youngster who finds the path of professional football full of pitfalls.

"That is right. At one stage I did not think I would make it," confirms the Chesterfield star. "I thought League football had passed me by when at the age of sixteen Sunderland released me. It was a terrible feeling, it was like the end of the world.

"I had no alternative but to return to Wigan where I carried on playing as an amateur in Athletic's Northern Premier League side and luckily for me we hit a winning streak taking the cup, and then the following season the league championship.

"Because of our success we attracted a lot of League club scouts and in my case it was someone you know very well at Swindon - Bobby Smith, then with Bury - who came along and offered me a job in League football.

"I played a few matches in the Reserves and then I was given my baptism in the Third Division. I enjoyed it very much and managed to establish myself as a regular in the side and by the start of my second season at Gigg Lane I had been appointed captain."

The teenage failure was now acclaimed a good player and clubs were queueing up eager to splash out six figure fees for his services. After 90 League games for the 'Shakers' he moved over to Chesterfield in July 1980 and is now attracting the attentions of several First Division clubs.

"My ambition is to play in the First Division of course it is," says this amiable young man. "But right now all we are concerned about is getting Chesterfield into the Second Division. We did not have a good start in the League Group Cup but in the League we are now starting

to put our game together, and the results are coming.

"We have more or less the same team as last season although I think this division is going to be even harder to get out of. There are some really good teams like Carlisle, Portsmouth and Swindon Town and I think there could be at least a dozen clubs in the scramble at the end.

"It should be a good answer to all those people who are giving football and footballers stick. I think the standard of play in the Third Division is getting better and that there are better individual players at this level than there used to be. We can be a good advert for the game and I am sure that tonight's match will be no exception."

Danny made 50 League and Cup appearances for the 'Blues' last season, scoring six goals, but after two seasons in which Chesterfield have produced good football and won over many admirers, he is now conscious that anything short of promotion next spring will be deemed as failure by their fans.

# John Ward talks to Gary Emmanuel

Gary Emmanuel signed for Swindon the Monday the players came back after their summer break in one of the neatest deals worked out under the new freedom of contract system. He was in dispute with Bristol Rovers over his contract at the end of last season, and when Brian Williams found himself in the same position at Swindon an exchange was arranged to the satisfaction of both players and managers.

Gary who is now 27 had been at Bristol Rovers for 2½ years, a regular in the first team apart from one short spell, playing in mid-field. Before that his only club had been Birmingham City, whom he joined from school and where he remained for 8½ years. On the verge of the first team for some time he played the first fourteen games under Jim Smith in the year Birmingham were relegated, before it became clear that he didn't figure in the manager's plans.

In spite of his long stay in the Midlands, Gary has not lost his connections with his birth place, Swansea, returning regularly for holidays and 6 years ago to marry a Swansea girl. "You've got to be joking," was his comment when I expressed surprise at his not marrying a Birmingham girl." I couldn't understand them."

18 months ago he moved with his wife and 2 year old daughter, since joined 3 months ago by a son, into a house at Chipping Sodbury. "We will be looking for another nearer Swindon", Gary said "but it's the right side of Bristol so I can manage for the time being." His family take up most of his time outside football, but he is also a keen badminton player. 7 years ago he took his F.A. preliminary coaching stage and although he has not bothered to progress to the final stage, he has been coaching local teams and schoolboys in Bristol. He had become friendly with a local teacher and in principle would like to continue coaching there, but it may prove more practical to make himself available in Swindon.

I asked if there were any other clubs he had considered when it became clear that his time was up at Bristol before he settled for Swindon. "I would like to have gone to Liverpool!" he replied immediately with a smile, "Simply

because they have got the best team in the country; but when times are hard as they are now you can't always afford to be choosy. The very good players will always do well, but when it's hard for the clubs in the lower leagues its hard for the players too. You think twice before turning down an offer because that way you might find yourself out of a job."

Had he noticed any major differences in training methods at his new club I wondered. "Pre-season training is much the same everywhere," he replied. "It's running, and then more running. Luckily I don't put on too much weight, so I don't find it too hard starting up again after the summer."

Doubtless, Gary will not feel that he has anything special to prove in the two games with Bristol Rovers this season; "footballers rarely bear any animosity towards the clubs that sold them," he said. "For instance, I always still look for the Birmingham result first in the paper." But the prospect of Gary, hitherto always in mid-field and by his own admission, mostly right footed, finding himself up against Brian Williams will give that particular local derby an extra special flavour.

# From the Secretary

Following the defeat of the England team at Norway the sports columns of the national newspapers were full of warnings that gates at League games throughout the country would fall as if the sports writers were advocating that people stay away from their local clubs as a protest against the failure of the national team. Yes - gates have fallen nationally and the sports writer writers have been persistently headlining the fact on the sports pages. I really believe that one or two of them would be delighted if the game folded so that they could write "I told you so!" So intent are some of these harbingers of gloom in their criticising the game that they haven't realized the game provides them with a good living and, incidentally sells very many newspapers. I wonder how the sale of newspapers would be affected if football were not reported - drastically I would suggest.

I am not suggesting that the failure of the international team had no effect upon gates but not, I am sure, to the extent the papers would have us believe. For instance, if the sports writers took sufficient time to read the front pages of their publications they would learn that the nation is suffering a recession, and that many folk must conserve their money for necessities rather than pleasure. It is only too obvious that this is the main reason for the fall in gates.

Yet again, in latter years, people have found more activities in which to indulge, for instance participation in other sports such as golf and squash, eating out has become far more common and, of course, the motorways have brought the coast and big cities much closer to the suburban areas.

I am convinced that if Clubs win their matches by playing attractive goal scoring football, then their gates will improve as I am sure will happen here at Swindon if our good results continue this season. No one can blame the supporter for finding something else to do on a cold wet Saturday afternoon if their team does not take the trouble to attract them to their ground. In this I agree with the sports writers, Clubs must improve their facilities, but this is a little like wanting a Rolls Royce when one can only afford a Mini! There are a number of organisations throughout the country and to name just two, the television authorities and the pools organisations, who are making a great deal of money out of the game without making a fair return.

One often reads of the superior facilities of stadiums in other countries but, of course, many of these countries do not have the extreme weather conditions that we experience during the football season in this country. I have seen stadiums in Spain, Italy, Gibraltar, North Africa and America and in these countries most of the stands, for instance, have no roofs thereby reducing their building costs by many tens of thousands of pounds (or the equivalent). Then again, in America, Soccer Day is a Fun Day and families go to the ground some hours before kick off and have picnics and barbeques - can you imagine our supporters picnicing in the car park on a typical wet Saturday afternoon? So many of the comparisons that are made cannot be considered seriously.

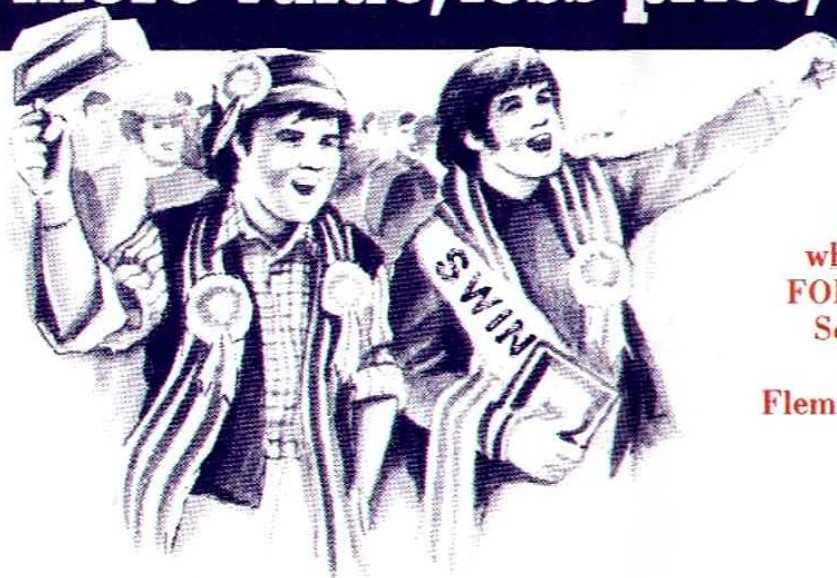
In Italy and many other countries, Clubs have no need to concern themselves with the expense of building and maintaining their grounds for they are owned by the local authorities and clubs merely pay a percentage of their gate money for rental on match days. We, of course, in this country if we do not own our own grounds, have to pay rental charges, maintenance costs and be responsible for our own capital expenditure, so once again there is a vast difference between the circumstances of clubs of this country and those abroad.

However, there is a need for improving our facilities - how wonderful it would be to have an enclosed, all seater stadium here at the County Ground - and we shall rely upon Mr Walker to help bring this about. Already he has negotiated the Pepsi Golden Goal Sponsorship scheme, a scheme designed as a goal scoring incentive to all players and clubs in the four divisions. Goals are the magnet that bring the crowds through the gates this experiment will encourage both players and clubs to set themselves new targets for attacking play. Let Mr Walker now lean upon the Pools and Television authorities and other organisations who are parasitic to the game.



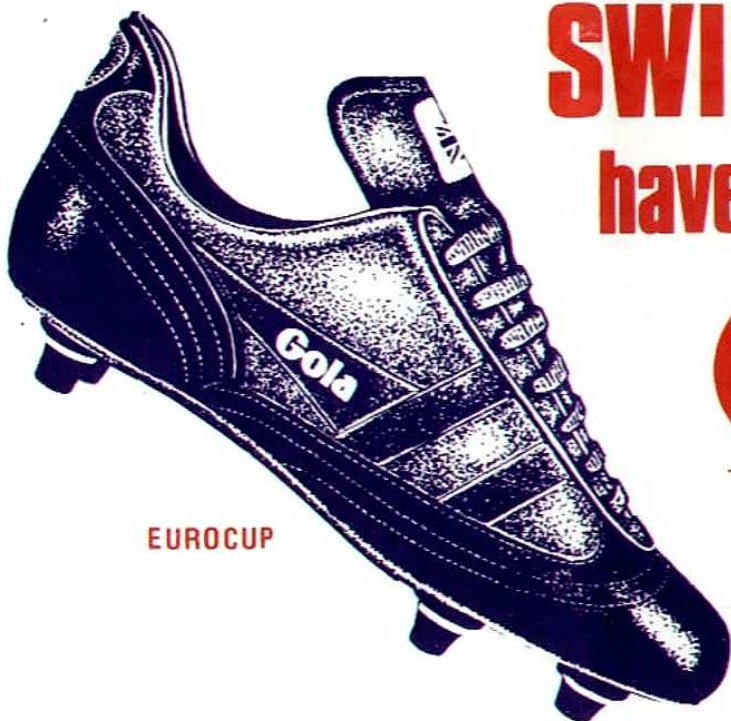
