Three draws and a win in their last four visits here makes Swindon Town a team deserving of every respect and they will be particularly keen to get back amongst the points today after losing something of their early-season edge in recent weeks,

It is only in the last twenty seasons that we have encountered Swindon Town at first hand, but they have an interesting history that goes back exactly a hundred years. For the first forty seasons of their existence they operated outside the Football League, but as members of the Southern League they twice reached the semi-final of the F.A. Cup before the First World War.

They were then members of Division Three (South) throughout its existence from 1920 to 1958. Since then they have had two short spells in Division Two, the second of these beginning in a most spectacular manner when they not only topped Division Three but also won the League Cup. beating Arsenal 3-1 at Wembley after extra time. A season later they reached their highest ever position, fifth in Division Two, and also won the Anglo-Italian Cup. In 1974, however, they slipped back to Division Three since when they have had rather a fluctuating existence. In 1974/5 they just missed promotion; a year later they just escaped relegation; in 1978/9 and 1979/80 they mounted promotion bids only to fall away in the latter part of the season and in a tight finish to last season they just stayed up by drawing their last game against Brentford.

Yet at times last season they looked a very good side as when winning 2-0 here and 4-3 at Exeter and when beating promotion winners Barnsley and Charlton at the County Ground.

THIS SEASON

Memories of these performances and of their run to the semi-final of the Football League Cup in the previous seasons seemed

to provide the necessary spark in the first two months of this season. Though going out of the League Cup to Wrexham they won three and drew two of their first five League games. Then after home defeats by Reading and Chesterfield they won three games in a row before their recent lean spell of one draw and four defeats in five games.

At the time of writing they have actually gathered 11 of their 21 points this season in away games and though Chris Kamara who got both their goals here last season is now with Portsmouth they have prolific Andy Rowland in his fourth season as top scorer since moving from Bury. Paul Rideout, who has graduated from the apprentice ranks since last season is his likely striking partner today with former Hereford man Roy Carter finding the net regularly from midfield. He is likely to be linking up with Brian Williams (ex-Bury and Q.P.R.) and Gary Emmanuel a newcomer this season after previous experience with Birmingham and Bristol Rovers.

Brian Hughes is another young player in his second season in midfield while in defence Londoner Charles Henry is in his second season on the opposite flank from David Peach, formerly of Gillingham and Southampton. Central defenders are Russell Lewis, a Welsh-born player in his fourth season and comparative newcomer Mike Graham in his first season. Behind them Jimmy Allan is a Scotsman rapidly approaching his 300th League game. Mr. ALAN SAUNDERS (Newcastle-upon-Tyne) Commenced refereeing with local junior and senior leagues, then progressed to the Northern Lge, and the Football League list. Refereed the Northern League Cup Final in 1976 and 1979, an England v Scotland (Fire Services) match in 1974. He was Senior Linesman at a European Cup match in 1976, the Quarter Final of the F.A. Cup in 1977, and also Scotland v Finland in 1976.

A married man, with one son, he is a Supervisor for the housing department Likes swimming, plays five-a-side football and enjoys refereeing local Youth and Boys' Club competitions.

A very disappointing season in the League, finishing in 20th position with only 35 points, just escaping the ignomy of relegation by one point. The teams taking the drop were Lincoln City and, most surprisingly, Portsmouth.

The highlight of the season was an exciting F,A. Cup third round replay victory against the mighty Wolves. This was the first match played at Leeds Road under floodlights. The average League gate for the season as a whole was 13,433 yet 46,155 spectators turned up to see not only the new floodlights but an exciting 2-1 Town victory.

CUP TIE ARRANGEMENTS

As all Town fans are already aware, our opponents in the first round of the F.A. Cup is Workington. The match is to take place away, at Borough Park next Saturday, 21st November, kicking off at 3-00 p.m. Workington, once a Football League club as recently as season 1976/77, has a ground which is quite reasonable by non-League standards, having been well maintained, so I'm told, during the last four years. The Stand however boasts a seating capacity of only 1,100 with a small paddock in front of it. We have taken our full allocation of Stand Tickets (250) and these are priced at £2.50 each with no reduction for either children or pensioners. In addition we shall have on sale 200 tickets for the paddock costing for adults £1,75 each with a reduction for children and OAPs to £1.25. Admission to the Stand and Paddock is therefore by ticket only. Admission to the ground is by payment at the turnstiles, charges being £1.50 for adults and £1.00 for iuveniles and OAPs. Stand and Paddock tickets are NOW on sale from the ticket office today, and throughout next week.

Should a replay prove necessary for the F.A. Cup First Round tie against Workington there will not be any tickets placed on sale in advance. Admission to all parts of the Ground and Stand will be by payment at the turnstiles. Usual 'League' prices will apply. Stand Season Ticket holders please PAY AT the TURNSTILE and enter the stand to occupy your own seats, which still remain reserved for your use for cup ties. Please have your Season Ticket with you in case it is required for identification and your entitlement to a specific seat. The date fixed for a possible replay is Tuesday, 24th November, Kick-off 7-30 p.m.

A Look at the Regulations 10 — The Award of a Goal

Law ten covers the award of a goal and again is very simple in its basic statement that a goal is to be awarded when the whole of the ball has passed over the goal-line and between the goalposts and under the cross-bar. Thus disputes when a player clears the ball from a position just over the line are often settled by the defending side being given the benefit of any doubt. Without being right in line with the goal-line it is impossible to determine whether part or all of the ball is over the line and such is the pace of the game that not even the most fleetfooted linesman can be consistently in position to judge accurately.

The F.A. advises referees that ' to give an absolutely safe decision it is necessary to be close to the goal at the time of the shot with a side view if possible. In this respect the officials at Coventry recently were rather caught out when none of them was in a position to see that Clive Allen's shot following a freekick actually came back off a net support. It would seem that when there is a free-kick close to goal there is always the distinct possibility of the ball passing into goal and so one official at least should be in a position to see clearly. The argument for an extra 'goal judge' at each end of the field would seem to be a strong one as it would relieve referees and linesmen of an extra burden that produces at least a few controversies every season.

Law ten also specifies that a goal cannot be allowed if the ball is thrown, carried or propelled by hand or arm. Thus in the case of a throw-in a goal kick and not a goal will be awarded if the ball passes directly into goal.

Again a goal cannot be awarded if the ball is prevented by some outside agency from passing into goal. Thus if a dog or even a spectator happens to be on the field of play and prevents the ball going into goal a bounce-up is awarded at the place at which it occurred. On the other hand (as has actually happened) if the ball en route for goal strikes the referee the game is allowed to continue as the official is regarded in the same way as the goalposts and corner flags.

If I must agree that plagiarism is the ultimate offence for any scribe, nevertheless with recent Town displays in mind, I make no apology for suggesting yet again that soccer is a funny game!

Performances at home frequently defying analysis, away reverses despite an unquestioned dominance of play, perhaps my son had a better insight into the situation. For as I gloomily pondered on likely events at Doncaster a week ago he was quite clear in his mind that this was exactly the type of fixture that Town were most likely to win!

How right he was! For this time not only did our side hold the balance of play yet again, the final scoreline also reflected their just claims for victory.

But perhaps it would be as well to adopt a guarded approach to the situation for now it is up to Town to provide the evidence that they are about 'to get into the groove' so far as their matches at Leeds Road are concerned.

For as things began to go wrong in that uphappy meeting with Millwall a fortnight ago so the the response of those around me provided a perfect example of the deep rooted interest of the average Town follower in the welfare of his club.

'Committee Meetings' were going on everywhere, views expressed ranging from the frankly ridiculous to others which for me seemed to be based on an extremely sound analysis, every member of the team was either praised or criticised according to the viewpoint, This was not just a matter of grumbling because of another below par performance by Town, it was much more than that. The failure was a personal disaster for the vast majority and I would warrant that however gloomy the Town dressing room might have been after the game it could not have exceeded the disappointment of we diehard fans.

At once in all fairness it must be stressed that additional problems have had to be faced by a club such as Town who have had to get through a heavy load of fixtures with the handicap of a playing staff savagely reduced because of injury. And I would guery if any member of the side even on this afternoon of disaster could have been faulted for lack of effort.

Team changes have been made since the Millwall game, changes possibly designed to answer the two points of criticism which I personally would make. For there have been flaws in defence, of that there is no doubt, and there has been a pattern developing of a side which is particularly vulnerable in the early and late stages of play. And perhaps one would be justified in suggesting that a rich reward could result from more positive tactics when moving from defence to attack. In that Millwall game there were occasions when swift and accurate clearances produced acute embarrassment for the opposing rearguard.

Indeed this is a scene of some complexity, but to the genuine Town supporter it produces not apathy but a reaction of anxiety and particularly so with the successes of the past two seasons still clear in mind.

To me support of this kind is a unique characteristic of the Leeds Road scene and does a great deal to explain just why I happily make the round trip of 122 miles for each 'home' game. And I have found that to one or two of my friends on Merseyside the explanation makes sense,

Not everyone is attracted to a soccer world where seemingly success is purchased, problems overcome, by the signing of a cheque around the seven figure mark.

Fulham beat Newcastle United 4-1 on aggregate.

Lincoln City beat Notts County 4-3 on aggregate.

Oxford United beat Millwall 4-3 on aggregate.

Bristol City beat Carlisle United 2-1 on aggregate.

Fulham were the only side to win both legs and it was fitting that their manager, ex-Newcastle United striker Malcolm MacDonald should make a nostalgic return to his former club and come away with a fine 2-1 result.

PEPSI GOLDEN GOALS

United they stand in Pepsi 1 Top Spot

Despite their position in the League, Manchester United had made little impact in the Pepsi Golden Goals campaign — until Saturday. Their 5-1 away thrashing of Sunderland gives them 13 Pepsi points and an early lead in the chase for November's £1,000 prize in Pepsi I. Swansea lie second after their superb 3-2 victory at Portman Road and move up to third spot in the season's table where only two points separate them from leaders West Ham.

In Pepsi III high-scoring Exeter celebrated their £1,000 October award with another sparkling display in their 4-3 home win over Reading. But, with away goals counting double, Reading are actually joint top with Brentford for November. A 3-2 result in the return at the County Ground with goals from Cunningham, Cockerill and Shipley ensured a memorable victory.

Oxford United relied heavily on striker Keith Cassells to put them through at the expense of Millwall. He scored twice, one a penalty, in the 3-3 away draw at the Den in the first leg, and scored the only goal of the game three weeks later in front of his own supporters. These three goals have now boosted his current goals tally to ten.

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International Games to Savour

N. Ireland v Czechoslovakia - July 17, 1958

At a time when it is possible that as many as four countries from the British Isles will reach the final stages of the 1982 World Cup it is appropriate that we recall the last time this was achieved. This was in 1958 when England, Scotland and Northern Ireland got to Sweden and little Ireland hit the headlines by actually reaching the last eight.

They found themselves in a comparatively difficult group, but earned themselves a play-off with Czechoslovakia by taking three points from three games, beating Czechoslovakia, losing to Argentina and drawing with West Germany. This play-off was fixed for Malmo and the Irish had to bring in Portsmouth's Norman Uprichard for the injured Harry Gregg and selected Jackie Scott of Grimsby for the number 9 spot.

In fact right from the kick-off Jackie took up his position on the wing with Peter McParland operating in the centre of the attack. He as usual showed plenty of dash, but little went right for Ireland in the early stages. Norman Uprichard twisted an ankle in going for a high ball and spent the rest of the game limping and this enforced lack of mobility did not help when winger Zikan headed Czechoslóvakia into a 17th minute lead.

Right on half-time, however, came the lift that Northern Ireland needed. A fine run by Billy Bingham on the right saw him put Wilbur Cush through. The Leeds man had three separate shots all of which were blocked and as the ball rebounded to him again he pushed the ball into the path of Peter McParland who was racing up to bang it home.

Early in the second half Norman Uprichard was in the wars again injuring his hand as he dived to save a powerful shot. In so doing his hand was badly swollen but he played on bravely and only after the game did an X-Ray reveal a broken bone. Then Bertie Peacock was injured in a goalmouth scramble and hobbled for the rest of the game on the wing with an injury that was to keep him out of the game for the first three months of the following season.

The scores were level at full time. 'Go at them; they are more tired than you are,' were Peter Doherty's words as he urged them on. Ten minutes into extra time skipper Danny Blanchflower took a free-kick and McParland crashed the ball past goalkeeper Dolejsi from 20 yards. Czech wing half Bubernik was sent off for spitting in the referee's face and after a Peacock shot had found the net but been ruled offside the whistle finally sounded.

In the quarter final Ireland went down 4-0 to France with a team containing several walking wounded. But nothing could take away the glory of getting there against the odds.
