

The club hopes to be compensated by a much bigger gate than usual today and trust anyone here on what might be their annual visit will be tempted to return on a more regular basis in the New Year!



JOHN TROLLOPE (Manager). Born at Wroughton near Swindon, he joined the club as an apprentice and made his debut in 1960 against Halifax Town. He played in the promotion winning teams of 1963 and 1969 and at one stage played in 368 consecutive first team games. The height of his playing career came when he played in the side that beat Arsenal in the 1969 League Cup Final. In March, 1978 he made his 832nd first team appearance (727 in the league) and retired to become the club's youth manager. He was however, recalled to first team duty later that season and in the following season. It seemed that a game at Blackpool in May, 1979 would be his last but another recall in September, 1980 saw him make a new appearance record for a single club of 770 league games. If cup games are included he has played 878 matches for the club nearly all of them at full back.

The Manager's job became vacant in October, 1980 and after considerable thought John decided to accept the position in November even though there was a real threat of relegation. He was awarded the MBE in 1978.

MARK STEVENS (Goalkeeper). Young goalkeeper who served his apprenticeship with Bristol Rovers and signed for Swindon in the 1981 close season.

JIM ALLEN (Goalkeeper). Born Inverness. Experienced goalkeeper who has been with Swindon since signing from Scottish junior football in 1970. He made his debut against Q.P.R. in September, 1971 and has been the regular first team 'keeper for several seasons. Had made 272 league appearances at the end of last season.

DAVID PEACH (Defender). Born Bedford. The most experienced player in the present squad he began his career with Gillingham making his league debut in September, 1969. After 186 league appearances he moved to Southampton for whom he made 220 more

such appearances. Whilst there he won an F.A. Cup winners medal, scored in a League Cup Final, won representative honours for the Football League and as an over-age player in the England under 21 side. Although he usually plays at left full-back he has also played in midfield. He signed for Swindon in March, 1980 making his debut that month at Millwall and had made 42 league appearances for the club at the end of last season.

CHARLIE HENRY (Defender). Born London. Joined the club from school as an apprentice signing full professional forms in February, 1980. Although his first team debut was at centre forward in a league cup game at Lincoln City in September, 1980 he is normally a defender and quickly settled into the right back position where his determined play made him popular with the supporters. He made 31 league appearances last season.

KEVIN BADDELEY (Defender). Born Swindon. Young defender who served his apprenticeship with Bristol City and made his league debut for that club last season. He was unable to claim a regular first team place and moved to Swindon in the 1981 close season.

KEN STROUD (Defender). Born London. Served his apprenticeship with Swindon, signing professional forms in 1970 and is now the longest serving player with the club. He made his debut against Q.P.R. in September, 1971 and had made 272 league appearances at the end of last season. Much of his early career was spent in midfield but he is now established as a central defender.

RUSSELL LEWIS (Defender). Born Blaengwynfi. After being spotted playing part time football in the Welsh league, he signed for Swindon in September, 1976 making his league debut against York City in April, 1977. He had to spend several seasons as reserve centre-half but in August, 1979 had the opportunity to play at full

back which resulted in him holding down the right back season. A former England Schoolboy International he scored a position for the rest of that season. Last season he reverted to hat trick against Scotland Schoolboys in May, 1980. centre-half

MIKE GRAHAM (Defender). Born Lancaster. Began his career with Bolton Wanderers and played his first full league game in September, 1978. His chances were limited at Bolton but he made about 30 league appearances mostly at full back

before moving to Swindon in July, 1981.

ROY CARTER (Midfield). Born Torpoint. Played Western League football with Falmouth before joining Hereford United in the summer of 1975. He made 64 league appearances there and was a member of the Third Division Championship side in 1976. He signed for Swindon in December, 1977 making his debut against Carlisle that month. He had made 147 league appearances for Swindon to the end of last season and when not required elsewhere plays in midfield. A genuine utility player he can play on either side in midfield and in all back four positions.

GARY EMMANUEL (Midfield). Born Swansea. Began his career with Birmingham City making his league debut in KEN BEAMISH (Forward). Born Birkenhead, Joined Swindon similar number of league appearances for Rovers and joined

Swindon in July, 1981.

apprenticeship with Swindon and made his first team debut at Lincoln City in a league cup tie in August, 1980 only a few months after signing professional. He usually takes up the central position in midfield and made 18 league appearances last season.

PAUL RIDEOUT (Forward). Paul signed pro forms on 14 August last but appeared in the first team last season as an apprentice. He scored on his debut against Hull City in November, 1980 and made 12 full league appearances last against Carlisle the following month.

ANDY ROWLAND (Forward). Born Derby. Andy was an apprentice with his home town club but his league debut came after a transfer to Bury in the summer of 1974. He was three times leading scorer and made 169 league appearances before his move to Swindon in September, 1978. He made his debut for the club against Blackpool that month and has been a consistent goal scorer throughout the 114 league games that he had played for the club up the end of last season.

STEVE ABBLEY (Forward). Born Liverpool. Signed from local football in season 1978/79 a winger whose opportunities have been limited in the first team. He made his debut at Exeter City in April, 1980 and had made 4 full league appearances at the

end of last season.


CRAIG MOORES (Forward). Born Macclesfield. Young winger or central forward who served his apprenticeship with Bolton Wanderers and made his league debut for them last

season. He signed for Swindon in July, 1981.

## THE DEREK HENDERSON COLUMN

## MEMORABLE MATCHES ENGLAND 3, HUNGARY 6 WEMBLEY, 1953

To appreciate the impact of such a scoreline upon the nation's football followers, one has to try to imagine the era in which it happened. Indeed, all historic events can only be judged in the context of

the time in which they happened.

England were still deluding themselves that they were the best in the world and could prove it any time they wanted. The delusion was only magnified by our refusal to appreciate clear warning signs provided by our eclipse in the 1950 World Cup in Brazil in which we had even been forced to swallow the ignominy of a defeat by the United States — one of the world's minnows.

That grey day in London, the myth of English superiority was exposed for once and all. The Hungarians, led by the incomparable Ferenc Puskas, a tubby general with a left-foot that struck like a

snake's tongue, tore us apart.

Somehow, we had repelled all nations outside the British Isles until that day. Looking back, the Hungarians did us all a good turn — for they not only gave us a football lesson, but they made us take a long, hard look at our football, and our approach to it.

Today, ironically, we rank higher than the Hungarians in the world table. Though we fell short of winning the European championship this summer, the Magyars didn't even qualify. Such is the

passage of time ....

However, in 1953 the Hungarians were the best, and their display that day at Wembley will never

be forgotten by those fortunate enough to witness it.

Inside half an hour, the Hungarians led 4-1. That they didn't go on to make it a massacre rather than a considerable defeat was probably due in part to English grit in the face of adversity, and also to the inclination on the Hungarians' part that they had made their point.


In any event, a year later we were made to suffer an even worse humiliation — a 7-1 defeat in

Budapest.

England's courage was typified by Stan Mortensen whose goal made it 4-2 at the interval. But any supreme optimists who hoped for a revival were dismayed when Bozsik, their wing-half and Member of Parliament, scored a fifth. It took an Alf Ramsey penalty to cut the final deficit to three goals.

As if to illustrate that nothing lasts for ever, the Hungarians failed to win the World Cup a year later. The hottest favourites in years, they lost to West Germany in the final in Berne — and the people back home couldn't believe it. To be runners-up was almost a national tragedy.



## PILGRIM POINTS

Opposition leader MICHAEL FOOT once again underlined his genuine interest in the fortunes of Plymouth Argyle when he ventured into the territory of that former Labour Party leader and Prime Minister HAROLD WILSON to watch Argyle in action at Huddersfield recently. It sounds easy to pin the tag of number one fan or VIP supporter on Mr Foot, but his frequent appearances when he can link his political activities with Argyle's trips around the country demonstrate that the former Devonport MP maintains a close interest in his home town club. The local hospital radio at Huddersfield took the opportunity of a pre-match interview with Mr Foot, who spoke highly of Argyle's chances — and was given full justification with Argyle's impressive performance which earned them an important away point in a goal-less draw.

It was, of course, unfortunate that the arrangement of the fixtures meant Argyle had to wait until today before continuing the good work of their current improved fortunes in the Third Division. It has been a long wait since four weeks ago when Argyle came from behind to thrash Doncaster Rovers 4-2. Ironically, it was the success Argyle have been enjoying in the League that made other clubs reluctant to fill a blank date a fortnight ago when so much of the country was hit by the blizzard conditions that did not reach Plymouth until 24 hours later. Instead of soccer action, the only business at Home Park that afternoon was a board meeting at which MR GRAHAM JASPER and MR CLIFFORD KENT became the club's newest

directors.

Mention of that 4-2 win over Doncaster is a suitable cue to recall that the Argyle revival was rewarded by winning the Third Division section of the Pepsi Golden Goals competition for November. Eight goals in four games were enough to see Argyle pip Oxford for the £1,000 award. The competition is based on one point for each home goal, two for each away goal and three bonus points for a team scoring three or more goals in any game at home or away. Three goals against Fulham and four against Doncaster gave Argyle seven home points and six bonus points to go with two points for a 1-0 win at Newport. Although Oxford also finished with 15 points, Argyle took the monthly award because they had more bonus points.

Credit to the scorers of the goals that brought the £1,000 to Home Park. Top of the score chart was JOHN SIMS with four goals; then came JEFF COOK with three and KEVIN HODGES with one. Unfortunately the lack of soccer at Home Park during the past month meant that the Pepsi cheque could not be presented before a match. It was, however, handed over

during the annual Christmas Party in the Vice Presidents' Club last week.

With festive thoughts much in evidence today, supporters will doubtless spare a thought for BRIAN JOHNSON, who is currently having to come to terms with the prospect of seeking a new future after suffering a premature end to his career as a professional footballer. Brian, who was just 26 earlier this season, has been told to call it a day because of injury, but has been

granted a testimonial by the Argyle board.

Today, of course, sees the end of the old year at Home Park, with Bristol Rovers due to visit Plymouth next Saturday to start a new year. It is also a time when three former Argyle favourites are on the brink of continuing their soccer with new clubs. Striker **DAVID KEMP** was due to begin a loan stint at Gillingham, while winger **DONAL MURPHY** is back in the Torquay colours on a one-month loan. Also set to move to new pastures at Exeter is former skipper and key central defender **GEORGE FOSTER**. All three players have experienced lean times at Home Park this season, but have given excellent service in the past and supporters will wish them well in the future.

One man looking for a more settled time for his family in future is manager BOBBY MONCUR. Most of us have experienced the upheaval of moving home, but when that move involves a shift from Edinburgh to Plymouth (488 miles but who's counting) it is easy to see that the Argyle boss had a hectic time setting up his new home in the Plymouth area earlier this

month.

Following the recent shortage of first team games at Home Park, it is pleasing to note that today is the first of three successive Saturdays in which Argyle are at home. Next Saturday's clash against Westcountry rivals Bristol Rovers is followed seven days later by a visit from Burnley.



## PILGRIMS'PAST

A close, fast-moving contest festooned with goals galore and coloured with enough drama and excitement to keep the fans in suspense until the last frenzied attack.

That's the recipe for ideal holiday entertainment and those were the ingredients Argyle and Swindon Town stirred so effectively to lay on such an appetising feast of football on the last occasion they met here in Boxing Day conflict.

At this stage of the season seven years ago Swindon were among the Third Division promotion favourites after being relegated at the end of the previous campaign.

Argyle were still rank outsiders, despite recovering from an indifferent start to remain unbeaten since early October.

They started their Christmas programme in ninth position and Swindon didn't take long to emphasise why their chances of finishing in the top three were rated much higher.

For David Moss struck twice in the 22nd and 31st minutes to ease Danny Williams' men into a comfortable lead.

Argyle fans in the 18,000 crowd had enough faith in the lethal striking partnership of Paul Mariner and Billy Rafferty not to despair too soon, however.

But it was Argyle's youthful midfield pair Colin Randell and John Delve who dragged their side back into contention with a goal each either side of the interval. Back came Swindon for John McLaughlin to make it 2-3 within two minutes of Delve equalising.

Argyle refused to buckle without a fight. They gambled everything on all-out attack — and their ceaseless efforts paid off as Mariner and Rafferty, with a 77th minute penalty, completed a memorable comeback to triumph 4-3.

Argyle were an unstoppable force that day and showed the same durable qualities again and again that season to power their way into the Second Division.

Few home games in the 1974-75 promotion campaign gripped the big crowds at Home Park with so much tension and excitement.

Two of the players in the thick of the action went on to manage their clubs — Bob Saxton in the heart of the Argyle defence alongside Mike Green, and John Trollope, who went on to complete a record 770 League appearances before taking charge at Swindon.

Trollope's one-club career spanned two decades after being discovered by Argyle's veteran talent-spotter Ellis Stuttard playing in the same Swindon schoolboy side as Ernie Hunt and Roger Smart.

The Swindon line-up comprised: Barron; Dixon, Trollope, Hubbard, Burrows, Prophett, Moss, McLaughlin, Eastoe, Jenkins, Anderson. Sub: Butler.

And Argyle fielded: Furnell; Hore, Burrows, Saxton, Green, Delve, Randell, Johnson, Mariner, Rafferty, McAuley. Sub: Rogers.


## Man in the Middle
