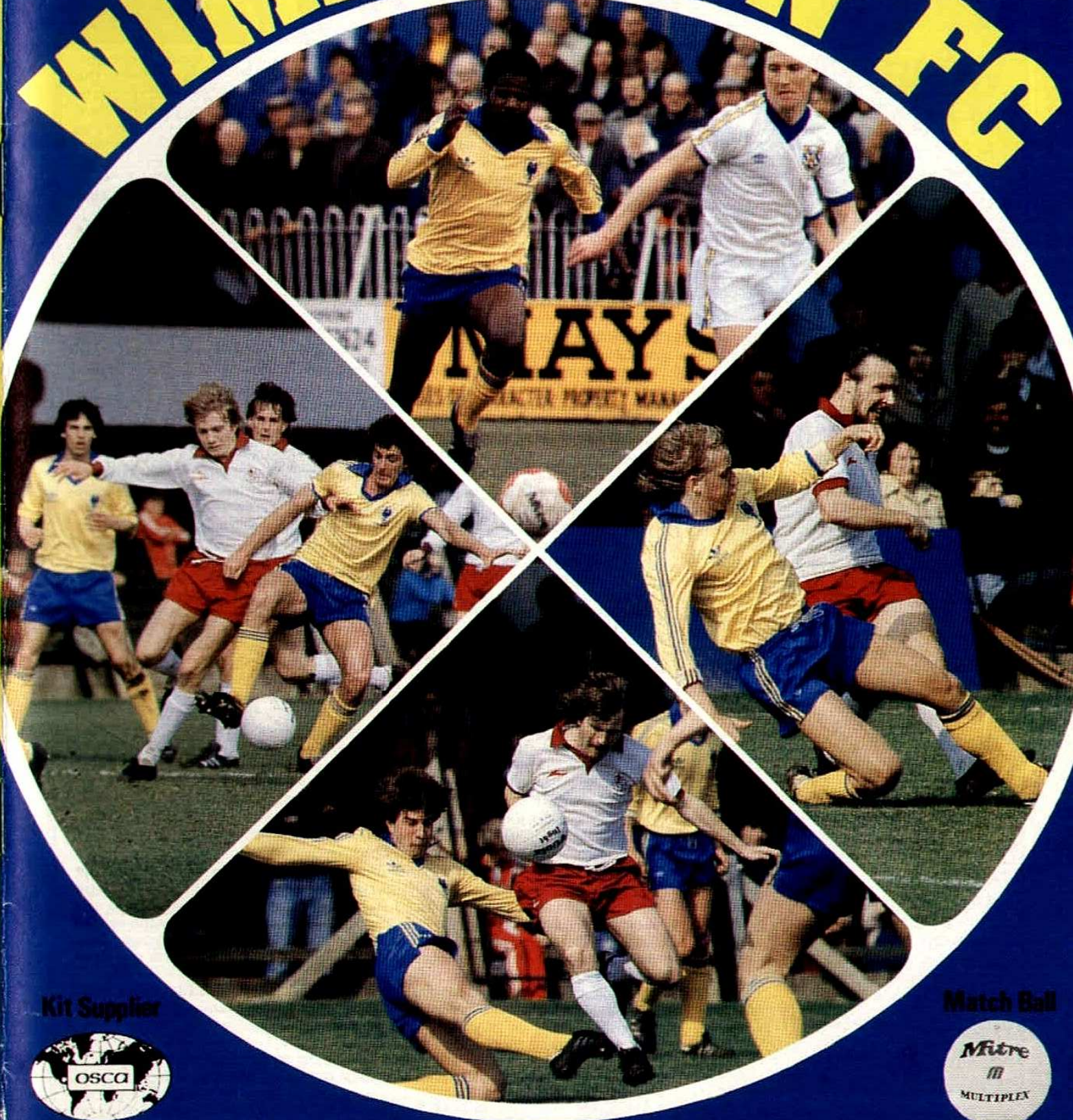

At long last it would appear that we can play a game of football unhampered by the weather. There have been many comments concerning the break in football due to the snow. Many feel the crowds will not return to watching football due to losing the habit. I must confess the games I have seen have had attendances below their normal, which I feel was due to the cold weather and the horrible conditions. Had I not been working I would have been very reluctant to have ventured out in difficult road conditions and then spend the next 90 minutes becoming like an icicle.

Assuming today's game is played, it will be our first home fixture since the Newport County game and only our third since that game. Unfortunately, during this time we have had the visit to Enfield, where we were soundly beaten in the end. This was a great disappointment to me but I feel it is essential to point out that the team that played that night in no way resembled the Wimbledon team that gained promotion and started off the Third Division campaign. Naturally, the record books will always show that Enfield won and that we lost. However, I must put the record straight as we only had David Beasant, Steve Ketteridge, Wally Downes and John Leslie playing that were regular players in our promotion team. It must be appreciated therefore, that a side cannot be decimated to this extent and then expect it to remain successful. It is impossible, as there is no understanding in a new side as this takes time to build up. I do not wish to criticise any of the young players who have come in and done an excellent job but we have asked them to perform at a level for which they are not yet ready. I commented to my Assistant Manager Alan Gillett, whilst the game was going on, that our side resembled a side more fitting to the Midweek League. I am sure that this result will remain as an indelible mark on my memory forever and I am sure that certain of our players will also feel the same. It is easy for the neutral to say that professionals were playing semi-professionals but many of our players on that evening had very few football League games to their credit and I, personally, do not regard a player as a fully fledged professional footballer until he has at least completed a minimum of 60-70 games in the Football League.

I do not wish to dwell on the past as the future is the only important factor and it is important that we all work hard to remain in the Third Division for another campaign. This target was helped by the very encouraging win at Bristol City, a result that was well deserved by our players. If we can repeat this performance and gain some confidence it will augur well for the future. The postponements due to the weather conditions should enable us to have players, who have been injured, back for games re-arranged for later in the season. This will mean a strengthening of the side and also provide competition for places. In actual fact, Mick Smith was able to return for the Bristol City game but our injury hoodoo continued with Peter Suddaby, who got a knock in a friendly game at Worthing, being unfit. In actual fact, Paul Lazarus is very doubtful for today's game due to an injury received accidentally in training. It amazes me how we had continual injuries this season when this has never been a problem in the past.

Returning to the weather, I must confess that I am an advocate of Summer Soccer. I find that the conditions prevailing around this time of the year frequently mean a cancellation of fixtures. In addition, I feel it also is very cold to watch football and that in the summer when people can watch the game in shirt-sleeves in comfort, they would enjoy the whole aspect of football even more. I am, therefore wondering what your views on the subject are and should you wish to write to me on the subject I would be only too pleased to hear.

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BLUES NEWS

What frustrating times these last seven weeks have been, almost as bad as in the 1962/63 season when, due to the bad weather, there was no game here from 15th December to 9th February. We can only hope that we have had the bad weather early this winter and the worst is now over for this season.

After such a long wait for a game of football it is especially pleasant to welcome our opponents, Swindon Town F.C. to Plough Lane today for a Third Division fixture.

Swindon, whom we met in our first League game this season, have failed to maintain their early season form and are now down in the danger zone with us, with 22 points from 20 games. Today's match therefore is an important one to win for both teams. We shall be looking to repeat the result of our only previous Third Division encounter here with them when we won by two goals to nil. We shall have to look for another goalscorer today though, for Alan Cork got both the goals on that occasion.

Incidentally Alan is making good progress from his broken leg and is now at Headley Court Rehabilitation Centre. Hopes are high that Alan will be back in action before the end of the season. Steve Jones is also with Alan at Headley Court and it is hoped he will be playing again next month.

OF WIMBLEDON NEWS

The rain in Spain, they say, falls mainly on the plain. The plain truth, though, is that Spain's reign as World Cup hosts, will mainly fall well short of success, if last Saturday's draw is anything to go by.

What a fiasco, and somewhat ironical that the entire spectacle, beamed live worldwide, should be based on a load of balls. Little balls, containing team names, being flung out of much bigger balls.

From the word go I knew we were in for something special, with no one thinking to provide the media with a translation of the welcoming speech.

Then there was Jimmy Hill on BBC putting his foot in it, referring to one young man caught by the Spanish cameras as "attractive." Quickly switching channels to ITV revealed he was, in fact, the King's son.

The only thing that wasn't apparently fixed, surrounding the draw, was the very mechanics of it. A big ball, meant to be spinning, stopped. A small ball, meant to conceal a team name, split in half.

Then the flinging thing failed.

Compulsive viewing as Scotland and Belgium were drawn in the 'wrong' groups and were immediately relocated, without going back to the balls.

And who can blame Scotland their doubts over how fair the draw was — with England strangely seeded; then being drawn with Argentina but minutes later switched alongside Brazil; and finally learning that group rivals Russia had already booked hotel accommodation in Malaga, one of the group's venues, BEFORE a single ball had bobbed or boobed?

How the Soviets knew where they were going is anyone's guess. One thing's for sure, with a choice of 13 possible venues for group matches, their guess was pretty well informed.

Anyway, it's to headlines of 'Kuwait for it, Lads'; 'Ron gets the hump'; and 'It's Czechs, mate', we roll towards another World Cup, all hoping Spain know their onions a little better when it comes to kicking, rather than drawing.

And what of the pressures the newspapers will bring to bear on the three competing home countries? The build-up to England's 1-0 win over Hungary that clinched a World Cup place back in November was bad enough.

That game was on a Wednesday, but the typewriter tourniquet was turning five days before when national newspapers, radio and TV entrenched themselves in and around England's hideaway hotel in Cockfosters, Hertfordshire.

Saturday's front page headline read: "Bomb blast hits law chief's home", while the back page screamed out: "Ron blows a fuse" as manager Ron Greenwood banned TV cameras from a press talk-in. Saturday's top sports story, then, was on football reporters rather than reporting on football.

On Sunday, Kevin Keegan was promising we'll all be "Drunk with Pride", while even Martin Chivers — a

member of the England team that failed to qualify in the Poland disaster eight years earlier — was allowed a lengthy say, recalling a game in which England created 17 chances and I can't remember him being involved in any.

Monday was bleak on news, but no one does much on a Sunday — or do they? Tuesday revealed: "England stars stay out until 1.30 a.m." "Night Clubbers" squealed the main headline, and we're informed that "four players were surrounded by girls" at a late night Sunday disco, which must have made pleasant reading for Ken Sansom's wife, Ken being one of the four. His wife was at home expecting a baby.

Sansom, a non-drinker, the report explained, spent the whole night at the bar.

And so to the morning of the game, Wednesday, with the announcement that Alvin Martin would be wearing the number five. Hours before the 23-year-old's biggest game of his young life did not appear to me as the ideal time to start questioning his ability. But one paper did.

Picture Martin waking up on the morning he wins only his second full cap, in a game with the world at stake. He picks up the paper and reads he is notorious for pre-match nerves; physically ill before the start of matches; has been sick in the tunnel before a Cup semi-final.

Martin had the ideal answer, with a commanding display and a major role in England's only goal.

But in reality, we in the reporting game piled on the players as much pressure as they put on themselves for failing to qualify at two earlier opportunities.

Third time, however, was lucky for England — just as they will be hoping their number 13 draw in Spain last Saturday will be unlucky for the rest.

But England proved once more against Hungary that it is what's done on the pitch that matters, not what's said before. Which reminds me of my old school motto — our school five miles, if that, from England's Cockfosters hotel.

Perhaps Greenwood and Co. spotted the badge on the blazers of children waiting to catch the school bus outside the hotel. "Res Non Verbe", they will have read.

Deeds not words.

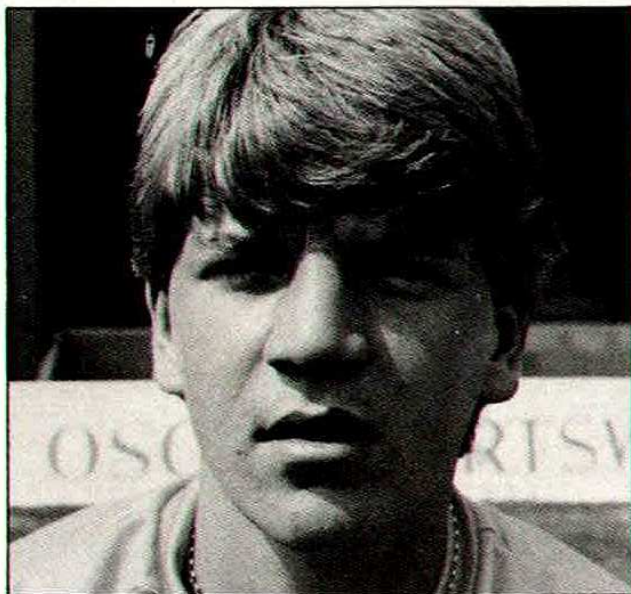

PLAYER PORTRAIT



GLYN HODGES

Born Glyn Peter Hodges in Norbury on 30 April 1963, "Hodger" first began to attract the attentions of local scouts as a 12 year old. He spent 3 years, along with Paul Fishenden and Peter Brown, under the guidance of Dario Gradi at Chelsea before Dario moved on to Derby County.

Glyn attended Eastfield High School playing Sunday Soccer for local youth side Mitcham Royals. At 15 he was invited by Dario to join the Dons South East Counties squad and on leaving school a year later "Hodger" signed Apprentice Professional forms for Wimbledon.

Glyn had to wait until 11th October 1980 for his full League debut when he played in our 5-0 defeat of Hartlepool, having previously appeared as substitute on 27th Sep-

tember at Halifax, making him the Dons youngest League debutant — a record now held by Kevin Gage.

"Hodger" is now approaching 50 League and Cup appearances, and is the scorer of 5 League goals to date, his best effort coming in last season's promotion clinching win over Rochdale when he headed home a Ketteridge cross from the right into the bottom left of goal with the 'keeper stranded.

In his brief soccer career Glyn has achieved more honours than many seasoned veterans. Apart from representing Surrey Schools he has attained 3 Welsh Youth Caps with his proudest soccer memory to date being a goal in Wales' 1-0 victory over Greece in the European Youth Championships last year.

Since then Glyn has progressed to the Welsh under-21 squad when he was named as substitute for the match against France in October. He is hoping that he won't have to wait too long before his progression into the full international scene.

During the summer Glyn spent 3 months playing for KPT in Finland, the same club Mick Belfield had such a successful close season with.

Away from soccer "Hodger" enjoys a spot of squash, and swimming. He lives on the South coast, which he enjoys, particularly the nudist beach at Brighton! His other nicknames include Whale, Fatty and the 'MARS BAR KID'. He drives a blue Vauxhall Cavalier.

WELCOME TO SWINDON TOWN

Currently just above the relegation zone, Swindon recently did both themselves and Division Three credit when going down 2-1 at Luton in an F.A. Cup tie against a team making the promotion running for a place in Division One. In our only two previous Football League encounters with the 'Robins' we won at home and lost away to a club whose history goes back over a hundred years though they were not elected to the Football League until the foundation of Division Three (South) in 1920.

They stayed there throughout the whole of the existence of Division Three (South) and since the reorganisation in 1958 had had two different spells in Division Two. The second of these began in a most spectacular manner when in 1968/9 they not only topped Division Three but also won the League Cup, beating Arsenal 3-1 at Wembley after extra time.

A season later they reached their highest-ever position of fifth in Division Two and also won the Anglo-Italian Cup. In 1974, however, they slipped back to Division Three since when they have had a most fluctuating existence. In 1974/5 they just missed promotion; in 1975/76 they just escaped relegation; in both 1978/79 and 1979/80 they mounted promotion bids only to fall away in the later stages. Then last season they just managed to stay up after drawing their last game at Brentford.

THIS SEASON

It seemed that they were on their way to another promotion bid when they won three and drew two of their first five League games. Since then, however, they have won only three more League games and at the time of writing have the unusual record of an equal number of points gained away as at home. Another win is certainly overdue as they last gained maximum points when beating Bristol Rovers in October.

ANDY ROWLAND (from Bury three years ago) has been one of the Third Division's most consistent scorers ever since while PAUL RIDEOUT, who made his debut just over a year ago, has also snapped up some useful goals this season. HOWARD PRITCHARD from Bristol City and GARY EMMANUEL from Bristol Rovers are two new arrivals this season who have found the net while MIKE GRAHAM has arrived from Bolton to enhance the defensive strength as he links up with RUSSELL LEWIS in the centre. KEVIN BADDELEY is another ex-Bristol City man on the right flank of the defence with BRIAN WILLIAMS (ex-Bury and Q.P.R.) on the left and Scotsman JIMMY ALLAN nearing his 200th League game in goal. Nor must we forget ROY CARTER a useful goalscorer from midfield who came from Hereford four years ago and BRIAN HUGHES a home-grown product in his second season.

SWINDON THROUGH THE YEARS

Alf and John Stephens are one of three examples of twins appearing together for the same team in the Football League. What's more both scored for Swindon against Exeter in a Division Three (South) game in September 1946. The Swindon v Southend game in November 1949 ended in a 2-2 draw though a total of six goals were disallowed, all for offside.

Just over a year later in February 1951 Swindon lost 8-2 at Southend after being two goals up.

Both Swindon fullbacks, Owen Dawson and John Trollope, scored within two minutes of each other for Swindon against Mansfield in April 1966.

The same John Trollope, who is Swindon manager nowadays, made his debut as a 16-year-old in August 1960. From 1961 until breaking an arm in 1968 he played in 368 successive games. What's more he was an ever-present in 10 different seasons, an all-time record. By the time he hung up his boots to become manager last season he had played in 770 games for Swindon — the highest total of league games ever played by one player for the same club. Swindon twice reached the semi-final of the F.A. Cup (in 1910 and 1912) while members of the Southern League.

Trevor Anderson netted a hat-trick of penalties for Swindon against Walsall on April 24, 1976 in a Third Division game.

The first final of the Anglo-Italian Cup in Naples in 1970 was abandoned with Swindon leading Napoli 3-0.

OUR VISITORS

JIM ALLAN (Goalkeeper) Born Inverness. Experienced goalkeeper who has been with Swindon since signing from Scottish junior football in 1970. He made his debut against Q.P.R. in September 1971 and has been the regular first team keeper for several seasons. Had made 272 league appearances at the end of last season.

KEVIN BADDELEY (Defender) Born Swindon. Young defender who served his apprenticeship with Bristol City and made his league debut for that club last season. He was unable to claim a regular first team place and moved to Swindon in the 1981 close season.

ROY CARTER (Midfield) Born Torpoint. Played Western league football with Falmouth before joining Hereford United in the summer of 1975. He made 64 league appearances there and was a member of the Third Division Championship side in 1976. He signed for Swindon in December 1977 making his debut against Carlisle that month. He had made 147 league appearances for Swindon to the end of last season and when not required elsewhere plays in midfield. A genuine utility player he can play on either side in midfield and in all back four positions. He has also made the occasional appearance at centre forward.

GARY EMMANUEL (Midfield) Born Swansea. Began his career with Birmingham City making his league debut in January 1975 and playing in 61 first division matches before his transfer to Bristol Rovers in December 1978. He made a similar number of league appearances for Rovers and joined Swindon in July 1981.

ROY GREENWOOD (Forward) Born Leeds. First club was Hull City where he broke into the first team in 1971. He made 118 league appearances for Hull and moved to Sunderland in January 1976 in time to help that club win the Second Division. After 45 league games there he moved to Derby County in February 1979 and made a further 20 league appearances before moving to Swindon in March 1980. He made his debut against Carlisle the following month and had played 27 league games to the end of last season. Although originally an orthodox winger he now plays as a central forward.

CHARLIE HENRY (Defender) Born

London. Joined the club from school as an apprentice signing full professional forms in February 1980. Although his first team debut was at centre forward in a league cup game at Lincoln City in September 1980 he is normally a defender and quickly settled into the right back position where his determined play made him popular with the supporters. He made 31 league appearances last season.

RUSSELL LEWIS (Defender) Born Blaengwynfi. After being spotted playing part-time football in the Welsh league, he signed for Swindon in September 1976 making his league debut against York City in April 1977. He had to spend several seasons as reserve centre-half but in August 1979 had the opportunity to play at full back which resulted in him holding down the right back position for the rest of that season. Last season he reverted to centre-half and was voted Player of the Year by the supporters for his tireless efforts in defence. He had made 89 league appearances at the end of last season.

HOWARD PRITCHARD (Forward) Born Cardiff. Began with Bristol City

working his way through the junior sides to make his league debut in August 1978. He made only one appearance that season but began to appear fairly regularly over the next two seasons mainly as an orthodox winger. He made around 40 league appearances for City and signed for Swindon in August 1981.

PAUL RIDEOUT (Forward) Paul signed pro forms on 14 August last but appeared in the first team last season as an apprentice. He scored on his debut against Hull City in November 1980 and made 12 full league appearances last season. A former England Schoolboy International he scored a hat-trick against Scotland Schoolboys in May 1980.

KEN STROUD (Defender) Born London. Served his apprenticeship with Swindon, signing professional forms in 1970 and is now the longest serving player with the club. He made his debut against Q.P.R. in September 1971 and had made 272 league appearances at the end of last season. Much of his early career was spent in midfield but he is now established as a central defender.

TODAY'S REFEREE: JOHN DEAKIN (Bedford)

Began refereeing in 1966 while in the R.A.F. Progressed via the South Midlands League and the Football Combination to the Football League. Has refereed service games in Berlin and Cyprus and an F.A. Vase Quarter-Final in 1980. Acted as linesman in an F.A. Cup Semi-Final in 1981. A married man, with two sons, he is a chief technician in the Royal Air Force. He is interested in railways and steam locomotives and enjoys watching cricket and horse racing.
