



The meeting of the Football Executive Staffs Association which I attended recently in Coventry proved very interesting. You will recollect that my column has been devoted on two occasions in recent weeks to an airing of your views, and mine, on the subject

The possible change to a "Summer Season" was one of the items down for discussion on the agenda. Many varied points of view were mooted - including some of your own, and a lively debate ensued.

Obviously, a change to a football season spanning say April to October would require careful planning and thought in regard to its initial introduction, and no definite conclusions were reached on this point, or the actual months the proposed new season would COV

The most significant factor to come out of the meeting was the fact that at the end of the day more than two thirds of those present declared themselves in favour of a change away from the traditional Winter months. It will be interesting to see what con-

change away from the traditional Winter months. It will be interesting to see what conclusions have been reached at the League Chairmen's seminar at Solihull. This was one of the subjects they had down for discussion.

There were some forthright comments from Gordon Taylor, Secretary of the Professional Footballers Association who spoke out strongly against the ridiculous levels to which transfer fees had risen. Mr. Taylor pointed out that in his view (and he's not alone in this), the game was being ruined financially because Clubs were paying out far more money than they could realistically afford and often re-selling the same playerts) at a heavy loss, Mr. Taylor believes that not only is there a pressing need for a curb on transfer fees, but that there needs to be a set method of computing the realistic market value of a player, in which age and length of service to his club could be taken into account the could be taken into account to the could be taken into account to the could be taken into account to the could be taken into account the could be taken into account to the could be taken into account the could be taken into account to the could be taken into account the could be taken into value of a player in which age and length of service to his club could be taken into ac-

Mr. Taylor was of the opinion that it is the fault of the clubs that players wages have got out of hand but stressed that the P.F.A. would strongly resist any attempt to return to a maximum wage.

If a club pays 1 million pounds plus for a player then he is entitled to think in terms of a wage of say £1,000 a week. The real answer is for the level of transfer fees to be brought down and clubs would then be justified in scaling down wages accordingly. High transfer fees, high wages and a declining income through the turnstiles, plus ris-

ing costs, does not make economic sense.

Another subject under discussion was the effect, if any, that the introduction of the three points for a win have had in making football matches more entertaining. The general concensus of opinion was that it had not made any significant difference. It was suggested that points for a win might be increased to four with a bonus point for X number of goals, and away wins. Something after the style of the Pepsi "Golden Goals" format. Frankly, I believe that if it is the policy of a manager that his team should go out on to the park to play positive football and go for a win, then they are going to do that whether there are 2, 3 or 4 points at stake, and it won't change the attitude of teams content to settle for a draw, or whose strategy is built on sewing things up at the back and hoping for the odd breakaway goal.

It was interesting to meet and listen to the three World Cup managers talking about their build-up for the finals in Spain and of their hopes for their respective countries. Naturally, there was some light hearted banter between Ron Greenwood and Billy Bingham concerning the Home International match between England and Northern reland due to be played at Wembley shortly after the meeting. I wonder what Billy thought of the result on Tuesday night? Robsons first goal for England was the quickest on record at Wembley since 1951 - just 40 seconds.

This afternoon we welcome Swindon Town to Brunton Park. The "Robins" made a great start to the season and were early "pace-setters". Unfortunately for them, they have not been able to maintain the momentum and are now struggling at the bottom end of the table. No doubt their mid-week victory over Portsmouth will have given them some confidence and we can expect a hard match from John Trollope's team. Whatever the result, I hope you will be well entertained. That after all, is what sport should be about.



SWINDON TOWN PEN PICS 1981/82

JOHN TROLLOPE, Team Manager. Born at Wroughton near Swindon, he joined the club as an apprentice and made his debut in 1960 against Halifax Town. He played in the promotion winning teams of 1963 and 1969 and at one stage played in 368 consecutive first team games. The height of his playing career came when he played in the side that beat Arsenal in the 1969 League Cup Final. In March 1978 he made his 832nd first team appearance (727 in the league) and retired to become the club's youth manager. He was however, recalled to first team duty later that season and in the following season. It seemed that a game at Blackpool in May 1979 would be his last but another recall in September 1980 saw him make a new appearance record for a single club of 770 league games. If cup games are included he has played 878 matches for the club nearly all of them at full back.

The Manager's job became vacant in October 1980 and after considerable thought John decided to accept the position in November even though there was a real threat of relegation. He

was awarded the MBE in 1978.

STEVE ABBLEY, Forward. Born Liverpool. Signed from local football in season 1978/79 a winger whose opportunities have been limited in the first team. He made his debut at Exeter City in April 1980 and had made 4 full League appearances at the end of last season.

JIM ALLAN, Goalkeeper. Born Inverness. Experienced goalkeeper who has been with Swindon since signing from Scottish junior football in 1970. He made his debut against Q.P.R. in September 1971 and has been the regular first team keeper for several seasons. Had made 272 league appearances at the end of last season.

KEN BEAMISH, Forward, Born Birkenhead. Joined Swindon in July 1981 as player/coach. He began his career with Tranmere Rovers making 175 league appearances before moving on to Brighton (86 games), Blackburn Rovers (86 games) Port Vale (84 games) Bury (49 games) and finally back to Tranmere Rovers. A consistent goal scorer wherever he has played.

KEVIN BADDELEY, Defender, Born Swindon. Young defender who served his apprenticeship with Bristol City and made his league debut for that club last season. He was unable to claim a regular first team place and moved to Swindon in the 1981 close season.

ROY CARTER, Midfield. Born Torpoint. Played Western league football with Falmouth before joining Hereford United in the summer of 1975. He made 64 league appearances there and was a member of the Third Division Championship side in 1976. He signed for Swindon in December 1977 making his debut against Carlisle that month. He had made 147 league appearances for Swindon to the end of last season and when not required elsewhere plays in midfield. He has also made the occasional appearance at centre for-

GARY EMMANUEL, Midfield. Born Swansea. Began his career with Birmingham City making his league debut in January 1975 and playing in 61 first division matches before his transfer to Bristol Rovers in December 1978. He made a similar number of league appearances for Rovers and joined Swindon in July 1981.

MIKE GRAHAM, Defender. Born Lancaster. Began his career with Bolton Wanderers and played his first full league game in September 1978. his chances were limited at Bolton but he made about 30 league appearances mostly at full back before moving to Swindon in July 1981.

CHARLIE HENRY, Defender. Born London. Joined the club from school as an apprentice signing full professional forms in February 1980. Although his first team debut was at centre forward in a league cup game at Lincoln City in September 1980 he is normally a defender and quickly settled into the right back position where his determined play made him popular with supporters, made 31 league appearances last season. BRIAN HUGHES, Midfield. Born Ludgershall. Served his apprenticeship with Swindon and made his first team debut at Lincoln City in a league cup tie in August 1980 only a few months after signing professional. He usually takes up the central position in midfield and made 18 league appearances last season.

Spotlight SWINDON T.

Swindon made a glorious start to the season, zooming to the top of the Third Division by mid-September. Sadly, they could not maintain the pace and as they endured a long run in which they won only once in 15 League outings they are once again in grave danger of dropping into the Fourth Division for the first time.

Newcomers include full-backs Mick Graham, Gary Williams, and Kevin Baddeley, midfield players Gary Emmanuel and Craig Moores, plus striker Howard Pritchard.

Graham joined Swindon from Bolton. He made his League bow for the Trotters in 1978

and became a regular member of their Second Division side last season.

Williams, who can play in midfield or at left-back, was signed from Blackpool for £40,000. He began his career at Tranmere and later signed for Swedish club Djurgaarden. He returned to England in 1980 to win a regular place in Blackpool's team.

Baddeley's first club was Bristol City but he didn't get into their League eleven. Swindon signed him last summer and he has turned out on several occasions at left-back.

Emmanuel joined Swindon from Bristol Rovers. His first club was Birmingham City and he made around 70 league appearances for the Blues before signing for Bristol Rovers for £30.000 in 1979.

Moores developed with Bolton but he got only one outing in their League eleven, as substitute, last season. Pritchard made his League debut for Bristol City in 1978/79 and for the past two seasons had become a fairly regular first-teamer. City had to release him as part of their economy drive.

Pritchard has been lining up in attack with Andy Rowland and Paul Rideout.

Rowland topped Swindon's scorers with 13 goals last season and once again leads the

way with seven. Swindon paid Bury £80,000 for him in 1978.

Rideout scored on his League debut against Hull City last November and recently scored in three successive games. He now seems to be establishing himself as a regular member of the attack.

In addition to last summer's newcomers, Swindon's midfield players include Brian Hughes, Roy Carter, Roy Greenwood, Steve Abbley and Ken Stroud.

Hughes served his apprenticeship with Swindon and turned profesional in July 1980. He made his League debut against Reading a month later and has now won a regular place in

midfield.

Carter joined Hereford from Falmouth in 1975 and quickly established himself in League football with the Edgar Street club. He moved on to Swindon during the 1977/78 campaign

and has now played almost 200 League games for the club.

Greenwood, who joined Swindon from Derby two seasons ago, was introduced to League football by Hull in 1972. Sunderland paid £140,000 for him in 1976 and sold him to Derby for £50,000 three years later.

Swindon became one of the founder members of the Southern League in 1894. They took the championship of that competition on two occasions before they joined the Football League.

It was in 1963 that they moved into Division Two for the first time in their history, a starstudded team of local discoveries taking them there.

Sadly they were back in Division Three within two years.

In 1968/69 it all began to happen for them. On the way to Wembley, Swindon beat Second Division sides Blackburn and Derby, plus First Division Burnley in the semi-final. They completed the dream by beating Arsenal 3-1 in extra-time at Wembley and regaining their Second Division status. They were relegated again in 1974.





LOOKING BACK

This week we take a brief look at what was happening on the soccer front in season 1903-4. Woolwich Arsenal (later re-named Arsenal) defeated a French XI 26-1 at Plumstead. F.I.F.A. was born with the object of introducing better control of the game at International level.

Belgium, France, Switzerland, Holland, Sweden and Spain were representated at the inaugural

meeting in Paris.

The First Division Champions were Wednesday (later Sheffield Wednesday) for the second year running, with 47 points from 37 games. Runners-up were Manchester City. Liverpool and W.B.A. were relegated to the Second Division.

Manchester City lifted the F.A. Cup defeating Bolton Wanderers at the Crystal Palace 1-0. Celtic defeated Rangers 3-2 at Hampden Park to take the Scottish F.A. Cup. Scottish 1st Division champions were Third Lanark. Leeds City (now Leeds United) was formed. They were admitted to Division II of the Football League in season 1905-6.

Tottenham were fined £350 (a lot of money in those days) by the F.A. because the pitch was invaded during their cup tie with Aston Villa.

The crowd invasion caused the abandonment of the match and the replay was won by Tottenham 1-0.
