

The Manager's View

This evening I would like to welcome Swindon Town on their first visit to Edgeley Park for 14 Seasons.

Everyone at the Club was very disappointed at our exit from the FA Cup in the First Round game at Mansfield Town last Saturday, but the dismay was not so much from a financial point of view as much as from a playing one.

To be realistic we were not likely to survive more than a couple of rounds, and with gates throughout football at their current level this would be unlikely to bring in the kind of massive cash boost that would make a significant difference to this or any Club.

The players themselves though are very upset at going out, for the cup provides tremendous interest and atmosphere for them and keeps everybody on their toes while they still hold on to their cup dream.

At Mansfield I thought that we did enough to earn a draw after starting the game very well and staying in control for the first half hour, but Mansfield's goal just before half time changed the whole atmosphere and set the home team up for the second half when they came out strongly before we regained control but too late in the game. Once again we missed chances.

I don't know which is the greater frustration in football, to create chances and miss them or not to make them at all.

Unfortunately, our financial limitations mean that our squad has been reduced to the bare minimum by injuries and such a small squad leaves us with few alternatives.

If someone goes out of the side injured, then there is no need to ask what will happen. The alternatives are usually reduced to just one.

We haven't been able to take any new players, even on loan, which is unfortunate, not only because new faces allow some variations to be made, but also because they add interest for the players already here, as well as the spectators.

On the injury front here at Edgeley Park, Steve Sherlock, who missed the cup tie, has been making progress from his muscle-injury, while Mike Power's arm is still in plaster, which rules him out for around three more weeks, and Tommy Sword is making steady, if slow, progress, and is still not ready for a first-team comeback.







From the Press Box

Attendance at Edgeley Park by certain First Division managers recently, and their apparent interest in one or two of County's playing staff, raises another interesting point about just how much things have changed in the game over the past few years.

Clubs such as Manchester United and Liverpool have always scoured the lower divisions and non-league football for talent—Keegan, Clemence and Coppell, are prime examples of the sort of bargain that can be picked up when a manager or scout backs a hunch and signs a player.

But it seems, with money becoming tighter and tighter, that these clubs are looking longer and harder at players nowadays before investing say £30,000 or £40,000 on somebody with only a few League games behind them but, perhaps, a lot of potential in somebody's eyes.

Previously the big clubs seemed to work on the basis that for every two or three players they bought for less than £50,000, one of them would make the grade, and even if the other players slipped by the wayside, you would get a return on your investment from the player who did make it.


But this absorption of talent does seem to be fading a little, as clubs count their pennies and look more and more towards their youth policies even here they have become more selective about who they take on the staff, as a way of bringing through young talent.

Of course, any youngster with real talent will get the chance to express himself at a higher level, it's just that he might be watched that bit more closely, and also cost a few extra thousands.

Following Elton Welsby's comments in this column recently about disputes arising because of the implementation of regulations concerning the so-called professional foul, I would like to make a plea on behalf of spectators everywhere—be they armchair or terrace.

It is a plea for consistency from officials relating to all the new interpretations on the rules, be it the four-steps rule, throw-ins, and of course that old 'pro-foul'. One of the most frustrating things, so far, about what has been a very mixed season, is seeing similar incidents in different matches—a player being pulled down when he is bearing in on goal, being punished in different ways, as referees go back to a previous season's legislation, or stick strictly to the letter of the new law.

Do not get me wrong, the last thing I want to do is criticise the referees, or the new rules, it is just the inconsistency that can be seen week in, week out, all over the country—be it Anfield or the local park, is so very, very, frustrating.





THE CUP DOESN'T CHEER

The FA Cup competition, financial hope of all lower division clubs, revealed its hopeful head last weekend.

At 3 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, 24 Fourth Division teams trotted out on to various pitches up and down the country with visions of Wembley in their minds. Ninety minutes later only nine had received assurity of a second round placing. For the rest (bar the five facing mid-week replays) the carrot had turned bad and Wembley had become a fading memory for yet another year.

Even worse, of the 10 who had first round knock-outs, three were beaten by non-league sides. The most embarrassing defeat was Halifax's in their home-clash with Northern Leaguers North Shields. Shields recorded a famous victory when Bede McCaffrey hit the back of the net with a 40 yarder.

Altrincham, so long giant killers and Boston United, were the other non-leaguers to claim Division Four scalps. Altrincham overcame the challenges of nearby Rochdale in a game which was marred by four sendings off. Ex-Everton, Roger Kenyon, and Garry Anderson of Altrincham and Eugene Martinez and Mickey French of Rochdale were the players who received their marching orders. However after the Alliance Premier League side's 2-1 win, Altrincham Manager, Tony Sanders, said: "Only one person in the ground thought they should have gone off and that was the referee. Everyone else was mystified".

Crewe also succumbed to an APL side, namely Boston United. Alexandra were not only beaten but they were also disgraced in a 3-1 defeat.

Of the other Division Four teams who faced non-league minnows, Chester must



have been one of the most relieved. At home to Northwich Victoria. Chester playing in front of their largest gate this season (4,400) were 1-0 down with only seconds to go. However Lane equalised to spare the blushes.

Elsewhere, Blackpool had some problem defeating the remarkably named club Horwich Railway Mechanics' Institute (1-0). But both Aldershot (4-0 victors over Wimbourne) and Tranmere (4-2 over Scarborough had easy second round passages. In the latter's case, Rovers may have been knocked out of the cup through their own failure. Faced with extinction in the next couple of weeks, there may be no Tranmere Rovers to take part in anything at all, unless funds appear rapidly.

On a brighter side, Hartlepool United recorded the most satisfactory result, when they defeated Third Division leaders, Lincoln City, 3-0 at home. Equally surprising was York City's 3-1 crushing of Bury and Torquay's 2-0 win at Colchester.

Other results saw Peterborough hold Chesterfield (2-2), Hull draw with Sheffield United (1-1) and Northampton record a stalemate with Wimbledon (2-2), while Scunthorpe beat Darlington (1-0) and Mansfield overcame Stockport (3-2) to show not all Fourth Division clubs fared badly.

However, in general when one adds the scalps of Bristol City (beaten 4-1 at Orient), Port Vale (beaten 1-0 at Vale Park by Bradford City) and Hereford (beaten 4-1 at Portsmouth) the first round of the FA Cup for this season was not very kind to the basement division sides. Does the cup cheer?



SWINDON TOWN

HISTORY

Swindon Town shocked the soccer world in 1969 when they defeated Arsenal in the League Cup Final at Wembley and went on to couple this success with promotion to the Second Division.

These were the greatest highlights of an interesting existence which stretches back to 1881. They became one of the founder members of the Southern League in 1894. They took the championship of that competition on two occasions before they joined the Football League in 1920 as a founder member of the Third Division (South).

It was in 1963 that they moved into Division Two for the first time in their history, a star-studded team of local discoveries taking them there.

The 1963 team was the creation of Bert Head. And, in the opening weeks of their Second Division début season, Swindon went to the top of the table!

Yet, after making a wonderful start to their Second Division career, Swindon failed to make any lasting impression. And, within two years, they were back in the Third Division.

In 1968/69 it all began to happen for them. On the way to Wembley, Swindon beat Second Division sides Blackburn and Derby, plus First Division Burnley in the semi-final.

Came the great day on the quagmire at Wembley. Roger Smart scored an early goal to give Swindon a half-time lead. And when both sides were shattered in the mud, Swindon should have been exploded by Bobby Gould's equaliser for Arsenal four minutes from the end.

In the event, Swindon held out better in extra time when two memorable individual goals by Don Rogers won the Third Division side an outstanding victory.

A few weeks later Swindon clinched promotion to the Second Division.

They were relegated again in 1974.

Until this year they had been able to boast that they had never played in the Fourth Division but they cracked at a critical moment last season, a run of eight games without a win plunging them into the bottom four by mid-April.

They seemed to recover and it looked as if they would escape the drop with two games to go. Even after a 0-3 defeat at Portsmouth the Robins could still have escaped by winning their last game. They lost 0-1 to a penalty at Newport County and that put them into Division Four for the first time.

VISITING MANAGER

JOHN TROLLOPE took over as Swindon's manager in November 1980 soon after setting up the most fabulous appearances record in the history of the Football League.

A left-back for much of his career, Mr. Trollope made his League début for Swindon in 1960 and 'finally' retired in 1979 to become youth team coach. When the club was going through a crisis in 1980/81 he was recalled to first-team duty and duly surpassed Portsmouth's Jimmy Dickinson's record of 764 League appearances for one club.

Trollope took his tally to 770 before making his final break as a player.

The proudest moment of his playing career came in 1969 when he was left-back in the Third Division Swindon Town side that humbled Arsenal 3-1 in the League Cup Final at Wembley.



Swindon, playing in the Fourth Division for the first time in their history, are playing with a determination that suggests they will regain their Third Division status at the first attempt.

The Robins' two chief strikers Andy Rowland and Paul Rideout are scoring consistently well and it's rare for a



match to go by without one of them getting his name on the scoresheet.

ANDY ROWLAND, who has scored eight league goals so far, topped Swindon's scorers with 13 goals two seasons ago. Three seasons back he hit 28 goals for them. He didn't get into Derby County's League 11, but thrived after signing for Bury in 1974. He topped the Shakers' scoring list three times and Swindon Town paid £80,000 for him in 1978.


PAUL RIDEOUT scored on his League début against Hull City in November 1980 and was top scorer with 14 goals last season. He has also scored eight times in the League so far.

HOWARD PRITCHARD, who will probably operate as third forward, made his League début for Bristol City in 1978/79 and made well over three dozen League appearances for the Ashton Gate club before joining Swindon Town in 1981.

Sometimes BRIAN HUGHES wears the number seven shirt. He is a former Swindon apprentice who turned professional in July 1980 and made his entry into League soccer the following season.

Gary Emmanuel, Paul Batty and Leigh Barnard have been operating in midfield.

GARY EMMANUEL joined Swindon in the summer of 1981 after

two-and-a-half years with Bristol Rovers. His first club was Birmingham City and he made around 70 League appearances for the Blues before signing for Bristol Rovers for £50,000 in 1979.

PAUL BATTY was introduced to the League 11 against Crewe Alexandra in September and has since been holding his place.

LEIGH BARNARD was signed from Portsmouth this summer. Leigh entered League soccer with Pompey in 1977/78 and last season he spent a loan period with Peterborough.

Another midfield player is ROY CARTER who joined Hereford United from Falmouth in 1975 and quickly established himself in League football with the Edgar Street club. He moved on to Swindon Town during the 1977/78 campaign and has now played well over 200 League games for the club.

Normally we see CHARLIE HENRY at right-back. Charlie served his apprenticeship with Swindon Town and made his League début at Reading in August 1980 as substitute. He made such a good impression that he has been holding the right-back position for most of the time since.

KEVIN BADDELEY, who plays on the opposite side of the defence, was with Bristol City but he didn't get into their League 11. Swindon signed him in 1981. One of the central defenders is MICK GRAHAM who joined Swindon from Bolton Wanderers in the 1981 close-season. He made his League bow for the Trotters in 1978 and became a regular member of their Second Division side in 1980/81.

The second centre-back RUSSELL LEWIS is a Swindon discovery who can play in both full-back positions and centre-back. He won a regular place three seasons ago and has been settled in the middle of the defence this term.

Goalkeeper JIMMY ALLAN has been a Swindon Town professional since July 1971 and he has now played more than 300 League games for the club.
