**DAVID McKELLAR (Goalkeeper)** Joined Brentford in September 1980 after making 50 First Division appearances for Derby County. A Scot who only missed one game last season.

**PETAR BOROTA (Goalkeeper)** Signed in August this year on a temporary basis. Previously played for Chelsea, having joined them from Partizan Belgrade. Yugoslav international.

**TERRY ROWE (Full-back)** Former junior who made his League debut last season with considerable success and is expected to progress further this season. Was called up for training with England's Youth squad and is more than a useful cricketer being offered a trial at Lords but turned it down in favour of football.

**GRAHAM WILKINS (Full-back)** Signed in the close season from Chelsea after having been a target of Manager Fred Callaghan for two seasons. Brother of England International Ray Wilkins and son of George who played for Brentford as an inside forward in the 1930-1940's.

**BARRY TUCKER (Full-back)** Very experienced full back with nearly 400 League appearances to his credit. Born Swansea and came to the front with Northampton Town where he oftened partnered Phil Neal.

DANIS SALMAN (Central Defender) Won five England Youth International caps and although only 22 has made nearly 250 first team appearances. Created a Club record when he made his debut at 15 years 7 months after being taken to the Club as a schoolboy by John Docherty currently Manager of Cambridge United. Born in Cyprus of Turkish parents.

ALAN WHITEHEAD (Central Defender) Dominant centre-half signed in the 1981 close season from Bury for a record fee of 78,000. Although he took a little time to settle down he was voted "Player of the Year" by the Brentford Players in recognition of his sterling defensive performances.

TONY MAHONEY (Forward) Came to Brentford on a free transfer from Fulham during the close season having been in and out of the Fulham side for several seasons but has nearly 100 League games to his credit. A Londoner, born in Barking.

BOB BOOKER (Midfield/Forward) Versatile player who started as a centre-forward scoring a hat-trick in a 7-2 defeat for Hull City shortly after getting into the side. Was however very impressive last season as a central defender after coming on as a substitute against Fulham. Is equally at home in mid-field. JIM McNICHOL (Central Defender) Former Scottish International 21 defender who came to the Club four years ago from Luton Town. Has played in a variety of positions and has nearly 100 games to his credit although often competing with Danis Salman for the number 4 shirt.

RON HARRIS (Defender) Was awarded a silver salver by the Club last season commemorating his 800 appearances in Cup and League football. Spent two decades at Chelsea during which time he skippered them to a famous FA Cup Final Replay victory over Leeds United. Joined Brentford in the summer of 1980 as Player-Coach although this season he is likely to concentrate on bringing the youngsters along in the Reserve team. Doubtless his experience will still be called upon from time to time in the Third Division.

TERRY HURLOCK (Midfield) Signed from Leytonstone & Ilford in August 1980 and has been an outstanding member of Brentford's midfield ever since, missing only a handful of games.

**PAUL WALKER (Midfield)** Former England Schoolboy captain who made his first team debut as a 15 year old but has never established a regular first team place although he has over 50 League appearances to his credit.

CHRIS KAMARA (Midfield) Club Captain, signed from Portsmouth in an exchange deal involving David Crown going to Fratton Park. Previously with Swindon Town his enthusiastic midfield play earnt him the Runners-up spot as the Supporters Club "Player of the Year" last season.

STAN BOWLES (Midfield) Thought by many to be Brentford's best transfer for years when he signed from Orient in September 1981. Made his name with Queens Park Rangers where he won five England International caps. Has made over 400 appearances in a career spanning Manchester City, Bury, Crewe, Rangers, Nottingham Forest and Orient. Still one of the games great entertainers and recognised by Brentford fans who voted him "Player of the Year".

### From the Brentford Archives

Business between Brentford and Swindon, both on and off the field, dates back to the early years of the century. Brentford joined the Southern League Second Division in 1898, playing home games in South Ealing, and met the Town for the first time on April 29 1901 - by which time they were renting premises in Boston Park from a local cricket club. Brentford had been undefeated in 1900-01, whilst Swindon had won only three games out of 28 and had finished bottom of the First Division that winter. The end of season meeting was a Test Match, the then traditional method of deciding promotion and relegation between divisions and, as such, was played on neutral territory at Elm Park Reading. In the event, neither side had scored at the end of ninety minutes - or at the end of extra-time which was brought to an end only be darkness.

A few weeks later, Brentford formed a limited company and adopted professionalism, under which their first match was played at Swindon on September 7 1901. Again there were no goals. Brentford took the First Division wooden spoon from the Town in 1903 and continued to struggle until moving to Griffin Park a year later. The club suffered a setback in the summer of 1906 with the death of secretary-manager Dick Molyneux - but they recovered to make a profit on the following season's business for the first time since gaining promotion. After another disastrous year, when Brentford again finished last, goalkeeper Archie Ling was signed from Swindon to bolster the defence. Ling, a Cambridgeshire cricketer, made some seventy appearances for the Bees before the club was relegated in 1913. Brentford had also signed a winger by the name of Elias Henry Hendren, but better known as 'Patsy', the Middlesex and later England batsman whose career in cricket was to last until 1937.

During the First War the Bees competed in the London Combination - which they won in 1918-19 - and could call on the services of Fred Keenor, the Cardiff and Wales centre-half, winger Charlie Allwright who was to join Swindon in 1920, and Ephraim Rhodes whose long and distinguished career at full-back was to continue until 1922 when he was appointed club trainer. A pre-First War Bees' winger, William Brawn, looked after team selection from 1920, when Brentford were elected to the Football League and re-signed Hendren, a Middlesex colleague in goalkeeper F.J. Dulston - all six feet five of him - and a former Town fullback Lionel Piggin. Harry 'Abe' Morris, who was such a success at the County Ground later in the decade, signed for Brentford in 1921 and was top goalscorer in 1921-22 and 1922-23 before being sold to Millwall for £500.

- 1925 Frank Richardson scores four times, taking his F. A. Cup tally to eight, as the Town demolish Kent League side Sittingbourne by seven goals to nil. Swindon: Nash, Dickenson, Weston, Archer, Bew, Adey, Denyer, Wall, Richardson, Johnson, Davies.
- 1934 There are another seven goals as Lincoln are beaten 4 3, Alan Fowler gets two, with with Harry Bowl and Gordon Gunson adding two more. Houlsworth, Duckworth, Herod, Cousins, Armstrong (W), Merrick, Flanagan, Armstrong (T), Fowler, Bowl, Gunson.
- 1949 Swindon attract a record crowd of 18,604 to Brunton Park, Carlisle, but come away losers 0 2. Burton, White, Young, Cowie, Ithell, Kaye, Lunn, Dawson, Owen, Simner, Bain.
- 1953 Southern League Hastings United provide the shock of the Round with an emphatic 4 - 1 victory over injury-hit Town. Burton, Hunt, Elwell, Cross, Batchelor, Johnston, Bull, Onslow, Tilley, Lunn, Sampson.
- 1962 Young Don Rogers plays only his second senior game for Swindon in front of a capacity thirteen thousand crowd at Yeovil. 'Ernie' Hunt and Cliff Jackson score to see the Town safely through 2 0 Turner, Wollen, Trollope, Morgan, McPherson, Woodruff, Summerbee, Hunt, Smith, Jackson, Rogers.
- 1967 It is January 10 before Swindon manage to get their Second Round tie against Southern League Ashford Town played. Don Rogers (two), Dennis Brown, Bruce Walker and Willie Penman all hit the target without reply from the Kent club. Hick, Thomas, Trollope, Smart, Nurse, Harland, Rogers, Brown, Penman, Butler, Walker.
- 1977 Today's visitors, Brentford, were at the County Ground five years ago on December 17. Three goals, all in the second half, came from Colin Prophett and Ray McHale for the Town and Steve Phillips, from the penalty-spot, for the 'Bees'. Swindon: Allan, McLaughlin, Trollope, Kamara, Aizlewood, Prophett, Moss, Stroud, Guthrie, McHale, Cunningham. Sub: Ford for Aizlewood.
