




The Chester Report has many alternatives to the present set up, but not many suggestions that will bring the spectators back to our grounds. The media have given the headlines with the impression that the clubs have thrown out the Chester Report and put their heads in the sand again but after being at the discussions on the various items it was very clear that the clubs were not going to change for the sake of change unless some improvements could be made. To merge the third and fourth divisions together and divide them into four sections of twelve and play each other four times did not appeal. The loss of two clubs in the First Division did not seem to appeal either, but the keeping of home gate money did, because it was felt that each club could then plan its own arrangements without being tied to having to make standard charges for adults, children and O.A.P's and having to pay the visitors a share on the numbers who attend. The voting of clubs will have a big say in the future, because of the three-quarters vote needed to gain a majority and a change is being sought to reduce this. The Milk Cup future will depend, as so many things will, on the clubs decision to accept either television or video next week and we shall have to wait for this outcome.

When you read these notes you will know our decisions on who will Manage our club next season. I know that whatever the outcome, we shall not please everybody, but I can assure you that the decision was taken with the future of our club in mind and I ask everybody to support our Manager in a very difficult task and that is to please everybody all of the time.



# BRIAN LLOYD (Goalkeeper) Brian began his playing career with his native Rhyl, before joining County for a small fee in 1967. After making just over 30 appearances with County, he was signed by Southend United for whom he made 46 appearances in two seasons at Roots Hall. In August '71 he joined Wrexham and from 4th March, 1972, up to and including 20th August 1977, he never missed a League game for the Welsh side. It was during this remarkable spell that Brian gained the first of his three Full

International caps for Wales.

JOHN RUTTER (Defender) As a youth John represented Warrington and Cheshire boys and on leaving school was signed as an apprentice by Wolverhampton Wanderers, where he gained a regular place in the club's Central League side. In August '73 he left Molineux to sign for Bournemouth where he made just four appearances for the Dean Court side, before joining Exeter City in a £15,000 deal. Whilst with the St. James's Park side John made 32 appearances in the League before joining County on a free transfer in the summer of '76. An ever present in three of his six seasons at Edgeley Park, John is currently the longest continuous serving member of the club's playing staff.

ANDY THORPE (Defender) Andy is a former Stockport boys' player, who was signed by County whilst still at school. Played for the club's U/18 and reserve sides before making his Football League debut in April '78. Andy signed full-time professional at Edgeley Park in the '78 close season and went on to make 38 appearances in his first full season with the club.

PAUL BOWLES (Defender) Paul is a former Manchester boys' player who signed as an apprentice for Crewe Alexandra in May '75, before making his first-team debut for "Alex" at home to Exeter City in October '74. After well over 200 games for Crewe. Paul was transferred to Port Vale in October '79, for a fee of £30,000. During his spell at Vale Park he appeared in 98 first team games, 44 of which were last season, before joining County on a free transfer during the 1982 close season.

Was signed by County in December '79 for a club record fee of £25,000, a record which still stands.

NIGEL SMITH (Defender) Nigel began his playing career with County some six years ago, but was not retained by the club. Towards the conclusion of the '78/'79 season he was invited back to Edgeley Park to play in the club's reserve side, where he made rapid progress, so much so that he soon made his first-team debut in the final game of the season at York City.

DEAN EMERSON (Midfield) Dean is a former Salford boys' player who as a 15-year old had a trial with Wrexham, before joining County as a non-contract player in November '79. After serving his apprenticeship for two seasons in the club's reserve side, Dean made his Football League debut for County in February '82 at Bournemouth.

MIKE POWER (Forward) Mike is a former Stockport boys' player who was signed as a schoolboy by Sheffield Wednesday, It' now six years since Mike began playing for County Colts U/18 side and after impressive displays in the Lancashire League side he finally made his Football League debut in October '80 after coming into the first team squad on his 19th birthday, Signed contract player. part-time professional for the club in December '81.

MIKE QUINN (Forward) Mike is a former Huyton boys' player who began his playing career as a schoolboy with Tranmere Rovers, before joining Derby County as an apprentice in July '78. After just 12 months at the Baseball Ground. Mike signed full-time professional for Wigan Athletic in September '79. Impressive displays in the Youth and Reserve sides led to him making his Football League debut against Halifax Town, He celebrated his elevation to the first team that day with one of "Latics" three goals and ended his first full season at Springfield Park '80-'81 as top goalscorer with 14 League o goals. Unable to command a regular place in their promotion side last season, Mike joined the paid ranks at Edgeley Park in the close season of 1982 on a free transfer.

OSHOR WILLIAMS (Forward) Oshor is a former Darlington boys' player who signed apprentice forms for Middlesborough in 1973 whilst still at school. Two years later during the summer of '75, he signed for Manchester United, but at the end of the following May he returned northwards to sign part-time professional for Gateshead in the NPL. Soon after this he was spotted by Southampton Manager Lawrie McMenemy and offered a contract with the Saints. Made his Football League debut whilst "on loan" to Exeter City, before returning to the Dell. Made six appearances for the Saints before joining County "on loan" in August '79.

TOMMY SWORD (Defender) Tommy is a Newcastle and Northumberland former boys' player, who signed apprentice forms for Nottingham Forest during the 74/75 season. After only a few months at the City Ground he returned northwards and signed for Whitely Bay in the Northern League. There he spent three seasons in the frontline before signing for Bishop Auckland for a small fee in the summer of 78 supplementing his income by working as a steel erector. During the '78/'79 campaign Tommy netted 35 goals for Bishop's, a feat which eventually led to his signing for County in October '79 for £6,000.

# From the Stockport Archives

When Stockport County took up occupation of Edgeley Park in 1902, it was the sixth change of address for the club that had started life as Heaton Norris Rovers in 1883. The club was elected to the Second Division in 1900 when home matches were played at Green Lane. County's first Football League game was at Leicester on September 1 when they were represented by the following: Moores, Earp, Wainwright, Pickford, Limond Harvey, Betteley, Foster, Paterson, Smith, Stansfield.

Proceedings were held up momentarily when neither the referee nor the captains - Earp for Stockport and Swift for Leicester could find a coin to toss to decide ends! But it all ended satisfactorily for the newcomers as Betteley and Smith scored in a 2 - 2 draw. Two days later the club recorded its first victory, 1 - 0 at Burslem Port Vale, but the first League game at Green Lane was something of a disaster. New Brighton Tower were the visitors and about five thousand people saw them bury County 5 - 0. Gate receipts amounted to just £108. On switching to Edgeley Park, which at first was shared with the rugby club, Stockport found that they had only forty season ticket holders! Effots to boost this number in 1903 included bringing manager Sam Ormrod from Manchester City and signing, as playercoach, John Reynolds the former England international wing-half. But County suffered a 1 - 5 home defeat by Preston in the opening game of the season and, although finishing one place higher than the seventeenth position they had occupied in each of the three previous seasons, they were out of luck at re-election time and had to spend 1904/05 in the Lancashire Combination. Ormrod went to newly-elected Clapton Orient and took with him goalkeeper Joe Butler and the talented former Swindon wing-half Ralph Codling. Finances troubled the club throughout the pre-first war period and a considerable deficit in 1909/10 was only offset by the sale of goalkeeper Jimmy Molyneux to Chelsea for £550. But things began to improve following the resumption of League football in 1919. Stockport

signed Arthur Metcalf - who had appeared in the 1914 F. A. Cup Final for Liverpool and was soon to sign for Swindon - and then Harry Hardy, the club's only international representative when he played in goal for England against Belgium in December 1924. Hardy did not miss a game for almost four seasons and, in conceding just 21 goals in 1921/22, helped County to become the first champions of the Third Division North. No one managed to beat Harry until October 8 that season, when Stockport went down 1-2 at Stockport. The club celebrated its Jubilee season in 1933/34 by achieving a new League record victory of 13-0 - against Halifax Town on January 6 1934, Percy Downes hit four goals and Alf Lythgoe, who netted 46 that season, scored another two.

### From the Commercial Office by Mike Lewis

The winners sheet produced each week by the Commercial Office, shows conclusively that all of the major prizes on the Bingo competition are paid each week.

Major prizes on the Bingo total £600 each week and in addition the other prizes make a total pay out of approximately 35%.

When the summer ticket is introduced the prize ratio will be increased to 40% and the prize structure amended to have one major winner in each house of bingo. This will also mean a bigger percentage of prizewinners across the board.

Finally, the ticket will have a brighter design to tie-in with the summer months.

Comments have been made concerning the non-payment of the major prize on the Moonraker Lottery. In fact in the past two months this has only happened twice.

Last week the £500 went to Mr. D. Telling of Swindon.

To ensure that all prizewinners are claimed we are also increasing the size of lottery batches - to allow for a two weekly lottery - and doubling the prize!

This will mean a payment of 40% in prizes guaranteed because the dates on the back of the ticket will allow time for a total sell out. At present we have a high percentage of tickets not sold.

All of the changes are aimed at ensuring the highest pay out to the punters - thus increasing the interest in the competitions, In addition a sell out boosts the funds going to the football club - obviously a vital source of revenue.



# JOHN TROLLOPE

During the last couple of weeks the Reserves have played three games - away to Luton, home to Oxford and against Queens Park Rangers which was staged on Rangers' Training Ground as our pitches were unplayable due to weather conditions. In all of these games we fielded a mixed bag of players, made up of five or six professionals, three or four apprentices and two or three non contract players. In all of these games we gave a good account of ourselves as far as effort was concerned, but against Q.P.R. and Luton we found that their more experienced players made it difficult for us to play our own game. Although it is not nice to be on the receiving end of too much pressure, it does serve to show me whether these younger players have the necessary character to cope with pressure, as we can all show character and play well when we are winning, it is when things are going against us that we need to roll up our sleeves and battle on.

On the Youth front, we have only had one game versus Bristol Rovers at home when we won an exciting attacking game by four goals to three. This result kept us in the top five of the league and we have only one more game to play, next Saturday, 7 May at Shrivenham Road, versus Luton town, kick off 11.00 a.m.

As you probably already know, the Club are to continue to run a Reserve side in the Football Combination League. The make up of the team will, on the whole, be the same

as have played over the past few weeks, and of course this is due to the trimming of the professional staff.

On the Youth Side, the future of this is still very much in the balance. It is hoped to continue with our Youth Policy as we have run over the past few years with success, but again, due to the lack of finance it means we must find sponsors to be in a position to continue.

Being a member of the Supporters Co-Operative Committee, we have had discussions regarding the possibility of helping the youth by contributing monies raised. The Co-Op have joined forces with Speedway's Phil Crump and will be staging many joint ventures, including a Disco in the Supporters Club on 9 May, a Football Match at the County Ground on Friday, 20 May, and a Programme Fair on 22 May, a Jumble Sale on 27 May, hopefully, after our summer break, a cricket match will take place, and competitions and quizzes also have been lined up.

A very kind gesture by Mrs Bishop of Pinehurst, who apparently is not a football supporter, indicated her wish to help the youth side of the Club by donating a large teddy bear dressed in Swindon Town colours to be used as a means for raising money. I think this says a lot for the public of Swindon really do care about our young lads. Thank you Mrs Bishop.
