A very big 'Thank you' to Terry Neil for giving his player's, his own and his club's time for such a match so early in the season and it gives all local people a chance to see so many international stars in action on their doorstep. Players such as Charlie Nicholas who, I think, given time will prove to be as good as anything to come out of Scotland and with the likes of Graham Riv, Tony Woodcock and Pat Jennings to name but a few, a wonderful night in prospect.

Shots from the Past



MALCOLM CROSBY

Malcolm Crosby played over 300 first team games for the Shots and scored 26 goals before moving on to York City in the exchange that brought lan Macdonald to the Recreation Ground in November 1981.

Malcolm started as a 16 year old apprentice at the Rec in 1970 after being offered a trial by the then Boss—David Smith.

He signed professional forms in the summer of 1972 when he was 18 and by way of showing the club's gratitude a cheque for £50 was sent to Horton and Westoe Juniors in South Shields, the club which had produced both him and his friend—Joe Jopling.

Malcolm made his first team debut as substitute in the 4-2 defeat at Darlington on February 12th 1972.

The one game he remembers in particular was the League Cup 1st round, second leg match against Wimbledon in September 1981. Malcolm recalls "We had taken a few hidings at Wimbledon in the past but we all played great that night and won 3-1. I scored a goal from the halfway line, which is the best goal I've ever scored. That game and that goal I will always remember".

An enthusiastic competitor, Malcolm mainly played in midfield but also appeared at right and left back. He even took over in goal during the F.A. Cup game against Lincoln back in 1976, when Tony Godfrey was injured.

Malcolm although enjoying his football now at York obviously regarded the move as something of a wrench after being here for so long. He left behind good friends in Joe Jopling (who helped him so much in his early days at the club), Alex Macgreggor and Murray Brodie.

Malcolm would like to put on record his thanks to all those who treated him well during his stay especially Len Walker, Tommy Mac, John Anderson and a group of supporters from Ascot who still invite him and his wife Carole to their annual end of season dinner.

Backtrack to Season 1977/78

The opening game of the League season resulted in a 2-1 win at York, with Aldershot players scoring all three goals. Needham put the Shots ahead in the 23rd minute, but the home side were presented with a gift equaliser when Joe Jopling, attempting a back pass to Johnson, unfortunately lifted his pass over the keeper and into the top corner of the net. However, a clever Dungworth lob won both points for the Shots.

Home wins against Stockport (2-1) and Doncaster (1-0) gave Shots an ideal start to the season, and also won Tommy Mac the Bells 'Manager of the Month' Award.

Two consecutive draws (v Huddersfield and Barnsley) were followed by Shots' first-ever League visit to Wimbledon, which provided an exciting match that boiled to a remarkable climax. Shots took the lead in the 42nd minute. Crosby's inswinging corner took a deflection, giving Needham an easy chance. However, an identical situation arose in the 51st minute and gave the Dons the equaliser, Bill Edwards scoring. With both sides pledged to attack, numerous chances were created. The all-important goal was scored in the 81st minute, Brodie sweeping over a right wing cross which McGregor squared to Dungworth, who picked his spot with a powerful header.

With victories against Rochdale and Crewe, Shots went to the top of Division Four.

Two difficult away games followed, and both resulted in 1-0 defeats for the Shots - thus ending the unbeaten record.

A morale-boosting win over League leaders Watford at The Rec in front of a large crowd gave Shots revived confidence in their push for promotion. A rare goal by Malcolm Crosby in the 76th minute settled the issue. Watford included Roger Joslyn, former Shots favourite, who sprayed long and accurate balls from midfield up to the Hornets' impressive forward line of Jenkins, Mercer and Mayes. The noisy crowd, swelled by the Londoners' travelling fans, witnessed an absorbing contest which gave The Rec a rare atmosphere.

Aldershot's opponents in the first round of the F.A. Cup were near neighbours Reading. Shots began well and were awarded a penalty in the 25th minute, but Mick Earls drove his kick wide of an upright. Two minutes later McGregor received the ball on the halfway line and dribbled his way to the edge of the area, from where he hit a beautifully-judged angled shot over Death into the far corner of the net. However, two goals by Reading just before the interval set the game up for an exciting second half. Unfortunately, Shots conceded a goal in the 46th minute, and from this point the game became fiercely contested, with some blatantly late tackles and petty squabbles culminating in Tommy Youlden being sent off in the 63rd minute for a late tackle on Earles.

A win, a draw and a defeat were Shots' results over the Christmas period, with the better performance being the 1-1 away draw with Northampton, where Shots had to battle for the majority of the second half with ten men, Jopling having been sent off.

In a remarkable game v Huddersfield, Shots saw a two-goal lead (Brodie and Bell) turn into a one-goal deficit within a 15-minute spell—Butler, the Terriers' striker, grabbing all three with fine opportunism. A late flurry by Shots saw Terry Bell grab the equaliser just on full time.

January/February saw a disappointing run of eight games without a win, on top of which bad weather in February meant the postponement of matches — which proved to be a disrupting influence on the team.

Dennis Longhorn became a Shots player in late February, signing from Sheffield United for a £13,000 fee. He made his debut v Darlington in 3-2 win.

Hartlepool were the opponents in Shots' final home game —a game which Shots had to win and Swansea to lose at home for Shots to have a chance of winning the final promotion place. Although Shots played their part in winning 3-0, Swansea's opponents, Halifax, could not muster the necessary away win, and therefore Shots had to be content with 5th position.

Dixon and Dungworth topped the appearances with 45—with the latter also scoring 23 goals and being voted 'Player of the Year'.

TODAYS OPPONENTS

Disappointment at failing to regain Third Division status last season has resulted in a number of personnel changes at The County Ground, where Ken Beamish is manager after a distinguished career as a player with many clubs and a spell as caretaker manager with the Wiltshire club.

Beamish was appointed in April 1983, having joined the club in the summer of 1981 as a player coach. His playing career spanned Tranmere, Brighton, Blackburn, Port Vale, Bury and then Swindon. He recruited a number of new players in the summer, including goalkeeper Scott Endersby, defender Nigel Gray, midfield player Paul Richardson, plus forwards Dave Hockaday, Alan Mayes and Gary Nelson.

Endersby was on the books of Kettering as a schoolboy when he became the youngest player to appear in the first round proper of the FA Cup some years ago. Now he has linked up with Swindon after keeping goal for Tranmere following a spell as an Ipswich apprentice.

Gray made his name as a centre-back with Orient and had been introduced by them to League football some eight years ago. He made over 230 League appearances at Brisbane Road.

Richardson is the Swindon player-coach and was an apprentice at Nottingham Forest originally before moving to Chester, Stoke and subsequently Sheffield United. He also had a brief spell on loan to Blackpool last season and has made over 400 League appearances in his career.

Hockaday was also at Blackpool, but this was his only previus club, having joined them as a youngster. He plays on the flank in attack and made over 100 League appearances for the Seasiders.

Mayes is in his second spell with Swindon, but started with Queen's Park Rangers and later played for Watford, Northampton (on loan) and then Swindon. He moved to Chelsea in December 1980 before returning to the County Ground in July.

Nelson was with Southend United before his move to Swindon and had appeared in around 125 League games as a forward for the club he joined from schooldays.

Ever-present players in the side last season were defender Mike Graham, who played extra cover in defence, and midfield player Leigh Barnard. Graham started with Bolton Wanderers and has been with Swindon for two or

three seasons. Barnard was with Portsmouth previously apart from a spell on loan to Peterborough and came to Swindon in the summer of 1982.

Goalkeeper Jim Allan missed only one League outing in 1982-83, and is the club's longest-serving player, having been signed in 1970. He is moving towards 400 League appearances now.

Andy Rowland missed only one League game himself and was second highest League scorer with 16 goals. Top marksman was Paul Rideout (now with Aston Villa). Rowland was with Derby County and Bury previously and has scored well over 100 League goals.

Full-back Charlie Henry has been on the senior roster since he was a teenager and has made over 100 League and Cup appearances for his only senior side, whom he joined as an apprentice.

Other full-backs at Swindon are Kevin Baddeley and Colin Bailie. Baddeley was with Bristol City previously but Bailie started as an apprentice.

Completing the staff are midfield players Paul Batty and Gary Emmanuel and forward Jimmy Quinn. Batty is a local discovery, Emmanuel was with Bristol Rovers and Birmingham City, while Quinn (an Irishman like Bailie) was signed from Oswestry.




